AS ACTING POSTMASTER. WATER AND SEWER BONDS VOTED BY AN OVERWHELMING MAJORITY

The water improvement and sewer bonds voted on Tuesday were adopted by the voters of Colorado by an averwhelming majority. A total of 220 votes were polled during the day. 185 votes were polled for the water improvement bonds; with 27 against. The sewer bonds received a vote of 186 for, and 26 against.

The total issue was for \$120,000, six per cent bonds, to mature in forty years and carrying the ten year option clause.

These bonds were voted to finance three projects. One of these is to impound a large lake of water on Lone Wolf Creek near the city. Another is to improve and extend the water mains in North Colorado and across the river into South Colorado.

South Colorado has never been served by the municipal water plant, and has consequently been without adequate fire protection heretofore. The other project is to lay sewers throughout the major portion of the city, including the business district and as far north as Ninth Street.

Engineers employed by the Chamber of Commerce have completed surveys and blue prints for all three projects. The city administration will push approval and sale of the bonds and expect to advertise for construction bids within the shortest time practicable.
