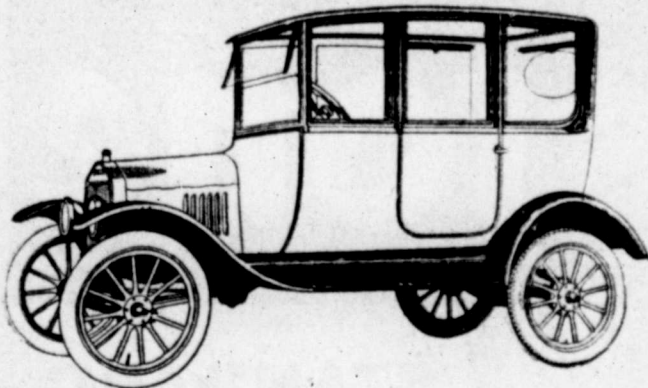

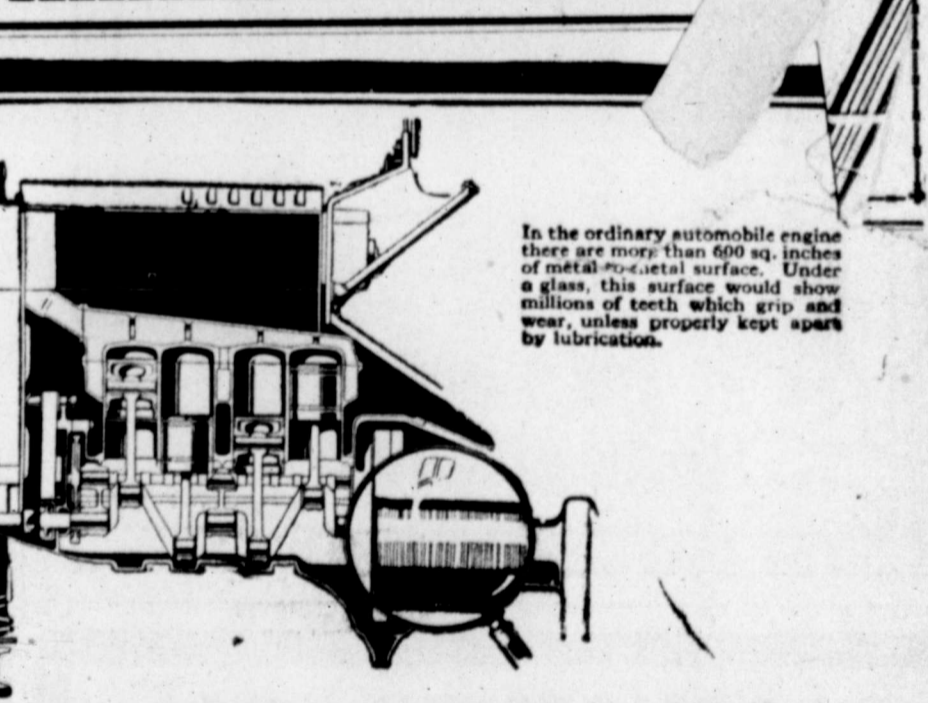

W. L. EDMONDSON'S BUILDING AND STOCK DAMAGED BY FIRE

When J. E. Spike came down to open up his meat market at 6 o'clock Wednesday morning he saw smoke coming from the basement of the Edmondson building and upon investigation found that the building was on fire. He sounded the alarm and although it was early and not many people stirring, in a few minutes a large crowd had gathered to help save the building and T. H. Scown, water commissioner, was summoned to see that the water supply was kept up.

Only the heroic work of the Loraine Volunteer Fire Department and the splendid water pressure of the Loraine Water Works saved the town from loss of approximately \$100,000 worth of property. T. H. Scown had a tank full of water and his motor and everything in good working order so there was no neglect of duty in that department. And the Volunteer Fire Department fought the fire under almost unsurmountable difficulties of smoke and heat until the building was saved and a large part of the stock. The Leader considers the damage in the neighborhood of \$15,000 to the building and stock; but it is hard to estimate the damage at this time. The grocery stock is almost a complete loss and the dry goods and furniture are badly damaged. The origin of the fire is unknown.

Friday afternoon about 1:30 o'clock the engine house at the City Water Works caught fire and was burned down before anything could be done to save it. The wood cover to the concrete reservoir was also burned off. We have been unable to

learn at the time of going to press just what the damage, but doubtless the gasoline engine was ruined.—Lorraine Leader.

IATAN WELL MAKES GOOD.

W. L. Foster visited the Iatan well on his Mitchell county ranch last Monday and was highly pleased with the promises of the new oil well, No. 1, which was recently completed and placed on the pump. As yet, no definite amount of production has been given out, but various experienced oil operators estimate that it is good for from 50 to 200 barrels per day. And the inclination is to the belief of a hundred barrels, or better. The manager of the well said that owing to the extreme low price of crude oil at this time, it would not pay to sell the production; consequently, they are only pumping enough to run the machinery and keep a good supply on hand.

Aside from the production of oil in the Foster well No. 1, a good flow of gas is coming from the well and is being used in the furnace for fuel. It is thought that both the production of oil and gas will increase as time goes by.

Casing, rig iron and other materials are on the ground for Foster No. 2 well, which will be located about 2000 feet southeast of No. 1. This latter well will be spudded in within the next few weeks. George Wahler, who is well known here has the contract for putting down the new wells, which gives assurance that the bottom of Foster No. 2 will be reached before one realizes that drilling has hardly begun. Many experienced drillers pronounced Foster No. 1 a lost well when Mr. Wahler went on the job, but he cleaned it out and put in the best of condition.—The Sterling City News-Record.

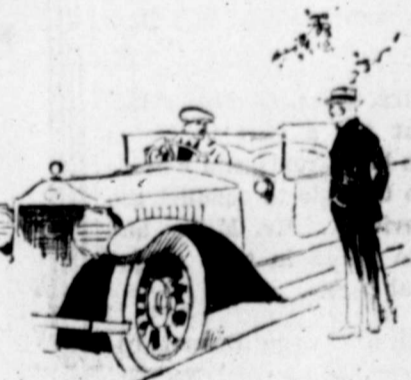
