Mr. Dulin stated that the first bale of 1921 cotton to be received at Colorado was expected to be brought in next week. "I know of three cotton farmers who expect to bring in the first bale and each plan to start picking next week." NEW RURAL TEXT BOOKS RECEIVED BY JUDGE HALL

Seven cases of new text books to be parceled out to the several rural schools of Mitchell County were received this week by Judge J. C. Hall, ex-officio county superintendent of public instruction. The shipment is valued at \$2,212.00.

Approximately \$1,400 worth of class books returned by rural schools last year are stored in a vault at the court house, while practicaly every school of the county has libraries. Judge Hall estimates that all together these text books represent a valuation of from \$12,000 to \$15,000.

Loraine and Colorado Independent districts receive their text books from the department at Austin independently of the county superintendent.

LEVIED BY CITY COUNCIL CHAMBER OF COMMERCE DEMANDS ADEQUATE FREIGHT STATION HERE

In the endeavor to have the Texas & Pacific Railway Company provide adequate freight station facilities at Colorado, the Chamber of Commerce has made formal appeal to the Railroad Commission, according to information made public Wednesday.

The freight station at Colorado was burned down almost a year ago and since that time the Chamber of Commerce has continually requested of the Divisional offices at Big Spring and the general offices at Dallas that an adequate fire proof station be built here replacing the former structure. The railway company has promised to relieve the situation here at various times, it is claimed, but to date have made no visible plans in that direction.

The complaint of the Chamber of Commerce was docketed August 8 by the Railroad Commission and will be heard on Tuesday September 13. Intelligence of this fact was received Wednesday in a letter from Allison Mayfield, chairman of the Commission.

If will be recalled that Colorado was compelled to go before the Railroad Commission on a former occasion, when this city was demanding passenger station facilities. The old Colorado Commercial Club sent Judge C. H. Earnest to Austin to represent the city in a hearing before the Commission and the present building was the result.
