COLORADO GIVES VISITORS AN ENJOYABLE TIME

The livestock committee composed of C. C. French of the Fort Worth Stock yards, J. W. Ridgway of the Mistletoe Creamery Company and B. M. Whitaker, exhibits manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, spent Thursday afternoon and evening in Colorado City in the interest of the campaign. They spoke to a fair sized crowd at the courthouse in the afternoon on the subject of hogs, dairy cows and farm products and exhibits.

In the evening the visitors were guests at the banquet of the Colorado Chamber of Commerce, at which C. M. Adams was toastmaster. Geo. A. Reese, manager of the Colorado, Texas Oil Company announced that the company's well at Iatan flowed for about one hour that morning from the 2682 feet sand, and gave it as his opinion that the company had brought in a real well. J. W. Ridgway congratulated the Coloradans on the coming of oil, but told his audience that "milk wells" are the most permanent.

Mr. French spoke for 15 minutes on hogs and the hog's place on the farm. Mr. Whitaker spoke of the value of exhibits as advertising. The Revs. Bishop and Browning of the Baptist and Methodist churches, respectively, made short talks and others who spoke included Judge Coe, mayor of Colorado, Judge Earnest and Attorney Sandusky.

Colorado Chamber of Commerce has under way at this time the important proposition of water bonds, extended sewer system, better and larger public school buildings, a new court house, and a new bridge across the Colorado river just west of the city is being considered by the Commissioners' Court.

This county has a system of splendid roads entirely across the county in fact this city is getting in line for making Colorado one of the cleanest and most attractive in West Texas.

On Wednesday the campaigners addressed a crowd at Merkel, and on Friday they appeared before a crowd of 100 persons at Loraine.

The exhibits manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is engaged in working up interest in the sending of exhibits to the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show at Fort Worth.—Star-Telegram.

OIL DEVELOPMENT IN BIG SPRING SECTION

Work on McDowell No. 4 has been going forward steadily the past week and this test is now around the 2500-foot level.

We understand that a smaller bit is to be used from now on and until they reach the depth at which oil was encountered in McDowell No. 1.

During the coming week there should be some interesting development definitely determining whether or not oil in commercial quantities is to be found in that immediate vicinity.

A party of Pennsylvania oil men are due to arrive this week to make arrangements for starting a deep test on the C. D. Read ranch, 17 miles northeast of Big Spring. These men are connected with the Tanico Oil Co., which company has already had a derrick for a standard rig erected on their twenty-five hundred and sixty acre lease.

In addition to making plans relative to starting work on this test they will also consider taking a lease on an immense amount of acreage in that district.

Paul S. Edward of Chicago, president of the Chicago-Texas Oil and Gas Syndicate, is due to arrive in Big Spring January 24th for the purpose of having drilling started on their No. 1 well located one and one-half miles south of Sterling City. This company has a block of twenty thousand acres in that locality and one of the best derricks in West Texas has been erected at their location for the first test well. The proposition of swinging the tools and starting work will be arranged during his visit to this section.

In addition to his interests in the Chicago-Texas Oil and Gas Syndicate Mr. Edwards is owner of valuable leases in Howard county.

The task of recovering a lost joint of casing from the Enders-Cushing test on the Cushing ranch, twenty miles southeast of Big Spring, was completed last week. After cleaning out the well the casing was reset and drilling is again under way. After penetrating shale and sand the bit is now pounding away in a lime formation at 2940 feet.

W. F. Cushing, field manager, is attending a meeting of the officials of the Cushing Ranch Drilling Association in Boston, Mass., and upon his return it is probable that work will be started on the company's second test well, Sparkman No. 1, which is located about three miles southeast of Enders-Cushing No. 1.

The Colorado-Texas Petroleum Company is going forward with preparations to market the crude oil secured from its Foster No. 1.

A two-inch pipe line has been laid from the well to the siding at Iatan distance about one-half mile, and a loading rack will be constructed just as soon as some connections are received.

It is conceded that Foster No. 1 is good for one hundred barrels of oil per day with the possibility of this amount being increased if the sand was removed from the bottom of the well.

That the Foster No. 1 proved that territory is evidently believed by the stockholders for they are having the second well drilled. Foster No. 2 is about 2000 feet southeast of No. 1.

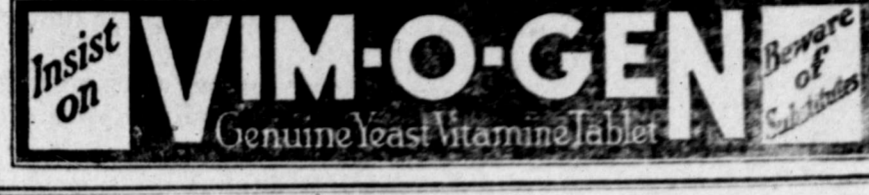
