MITCHELL COUNTY FARM SURVEY WILL BE MADE

A complete farm survey of Mitchell County is to be made soon, under plans now being worked out by E. M. Baldwin, secretary of the Mitchell County Farm Bureau, Mr. Baldwin stated Tuesday that the plan to make such a curvey was meeting with the general endorsement of the farmers of the county, as well as the business men of Colorado. He will be assisted in compiling the survey by W. A. Dulin, county farm agent.

The plan is to have printed cards with blank spaces for filling the folowing information:

Owner or tenant, number of acres in farm or ranch, number of acres in cultivation, number of acres not in cultivation, number of acres tilable land, nature of soil, topography of land, how watered, timber, number of horses, mules, dairy and stock cattle, hogs, poultry, etc. The report is also to give actual acreage devoted to cotton, corn, the sorghums, and other crops, as well as orchards, truck, gardens, berry patches and vineyards.

A complete farm survey has never been made by any county in this state, Ba:dwin stated, and the information to be obtained should be of inestimable value to the public.

The campaign is to be carried out through the schools, Baldwin stated. At each school in the county the matter is to be taken up with the teachers and trustees and with their cooperation a speaker will visit the schools to explain in detail the purpose of the campaign and give information as to how the cards are to be filled out. One of the cards will be left for each family in the several communities and these will be requested to give the information desired and return the card to Mr. Baldwin in an addressed and stamped envelope furnished by him.



Some Aspects of the Farmers' Problems

By BERNARD M. BARUCH

(Reprinted from Atlantic Monthly)

The whole rural world is in a fer ment of unrest, and there is an un paralleled volume and intensity of de termined, if not angry, protest, and ar eminous swarming of occupational conferences, interest groupings, political movements and propaganda. Such & turmoil cannot but arrest our atten tion. Indeed, it demands our careful study and examination. Investigation of the subject concluaively proves that, while there is much everstatement of grievances and misconception of remedies, the farmers are right in complaining of wrongs long endured, and right in holding that It is feasible to relieve their ills with benefit to the rest of the community. This being the case of an industry that contributes, in the raw material form alone, about one-third of the nadonal annual wealth production and is the means of livelihood of about 49 per cent of the population, it is obvious that the subject is one of grave concern. Not only do the farmers make up one-half of the nation, but the well-being of the other half depends upon them.

So long as we have nations, a wise politcial economy will aim at a large degree of national self-sufficiency and self-containment. Rome fell when the food supply was too far removed from the belly. Like her, we shall destroy our own agriculture and extend our source's of food distantly and precariously, if we do not see to it that our farmers are well and fairly paid for their services. The farm gives the nation men as well as food. Cities derive their vitality and are forever renewed from the country, but an impoverished countryside exports intelligence and retains unintelligence. Only the lower grades of mentality and character will remain on, or seek, the farm, unless agriculture is capable of being pursued with contentment and adequate compensation. Hence, to em mixed with oats, chaff and the like. offer and impoverish the farmer is to dry up and contaminate the vital ources of the nation.

The war showed convincingly how dependent the nation is on the full productivity of the farms. Despite berculean efforts, agricultural production kept only a few weeks or months shead of consumption, and that only staple crops at the cost of reducing that of others. We ought not to forget that lesson when we ponder on the farmer's problems. They are truly common problems, and there should be no attempt to deal with them as If they were purely selfish demands the rest of the community. Rather should we consider agriculture in the as we consider oil, coal, steel, dyestuffs, and so forth, as sinews of national strength. Our growing population and a higher standard of living demand increasing food supplies, and more wool, cotton, hides, and the rest. With the disappearance of free or from costly effort. This we need not expect from an impoverished or unhappy rural population.

It will not do to take a narrow view of the rural discontent, or to appraise it from the standpoint of yesterday. This is peculiarly an age of flux and change and new deals. Because a thing always has been so no longer means that it is righteous, or always shall be so. More, perhaps, than ever before, there is a widespread feeling that all human relations can be improved by taking thought, and that it is not becoming for the reasoning animal to leave his destiny largely to chance and natural incidence.

Prudent and orderly adjustment of production and distribution in accordance with consumption is recognized as wise management in every business but that of farming. Yet, I venture to say, there is no other industry in which it is so important to the public-to the city-dweller-that production should be sure, steady, and increasing, and that distribution should be in proportion to the need. The unorganized farmers naturally act blindly and impulsively and, in consequence, surfeit and dearth, accompanied by disconcerting price-variations, harass the consumer. One year potatoes rot in the fields because of excess production, and there is a scarcity of the things that have been displaced to make way for the expansion of the potato acreage; next year the punished farmers mass their fields on some other crop, and potatoes enter the

community. The average farmer is busy with production for the major part of the year, and has nothing to sell. The bulk of his output comes on the market at once. Because of lack of storage facilities and of financial support, the farmer cannot carry his goods through the year and dispose of them as they are currently needed. In the great majority of cases, farmers have to entrust storage-in warehouses and elevators and the financial carrying of their products to others.

Farm products are generally marketed at a time when there is a congestion of both transportation and finance-when cars and money are scarce. The outcome, in many instances, is that the farmers not only sell under pressure, and therefore at a disadvantage, but are compelled to in order to meet the charges for the service of storing, transporting, financing, and ultimate marketing-which charges they claim, are often excessive, bear heavily on both consumer and producer, and are under the control of those performing the services. It is true that they are relieved of the waks of a changing market by Iling at once; but they are quite will-

ing to take the unfavorable chance, If the favorable one also is theirs and they can retain for themselves a part of the service charges that are untform, in good years and bad, with high prices and low.

While, in the main, the farmer must sell, regardless of market conditions, at the time of the maturity of crops, he cannot suspend production in toto. He must go on producing if he is to go on living, and if the world is to exist. The most he can do is to curtail production a little or alter its form, and that-because he is in the dark as to the probable demand for his goodsmay be only to tamp from the frying pan into the fire taking the consumer

Explanation and Remarks-These predictions are not guess work, but are based on the grandest law of the Universe, always in existence form the foundation, but unknown to man it about two and a quarter centuries ago. So, if it is necessary, plow and prepare in the wet rather than wait for it to dry up. Much depends upon pitching the crops at an early date as the seasons will admit, especially small grain. But with a seasonable May or June, which I anticipate, the chances are good for fair crops of all kinds during the year 1922.
