The Red Cross will maintain a health center and ladies rest room in Colorado, should plans discussed at the annual business meeting of the Mitchell County chapter, held Tuesday night in the basement of the Methodist church, materialize. The need of such an institution in the

city was discussed by Mrs. J. G. Merritt, chairman of the nutrition department of the chapter, and others, after which resolutions approving the plan were passed and a committee, of which Mrs. Merritt is chairman, appointed to represent the chapter in placing the matter before the public.

In making an appeal for support of the proposed center, Mrs. Merritt outlined the need of a rest room for women from the country who come to the city. "There is now no place for these ladies to go and rest and the need for such a place is very much in evidence, especially in the case of those women with small children," she stated.

Mrs. Merritt praised the work of the Red Cross nutrition worker recently employed by the chapter and cited instances wherein children found underweight had become normal through the system of diet arranged under direction of the worker, Miss Cavett. Scores of physical defects in school children were detected by Miss Cavett, that perhaps otherwise would never be known to the parents, she said.

Mrs. Merritt stated that club women of the city had pledged their full support to the plan and would furnish some one to be in charge of the health center, should it be established. It would be a part of the program of the proposed plan to continue the work started in the county by the nutrition worker, in so far as it was possible to do so. Children would be weighed and literature supplied by the government furnished interested mothers. This literature would outline remedial measures for overcoming the various defects generally prevalent in children.

A meeting of the committee to investigate the feasibility of the plan will be convened Friday, Mrs. Merritt has announced, and its findings will be referred to executives of the chapter at a later meeting.

Following reports on activities of the Mitchell County chapter during the past year by the chairman, J. H. Greene; the treasurer, T. W. Stoneroad; Mrs. Thos. Dawes, Mrs. H. S. Beal and Mrs. Merritt, officers and executive committeemen for the ensuing year were elected, as follows:

J. H. Greene, chairman; Rev. M. C. Bishop, vice chairman; Mrs. J. G. Merritt, secretary; T. W. Stoneroad, treasurer and J. Riordan, Rev. C. L. Browning, Rev. D. R. Hardison, executive committeemen.

Resolutions thanking officials of the City National Bank for courtesies extended in the way of furnishing free of cost an office suite as headquarters for the nutrition worker and use of one of the executive rooms as a place for holding meetings of the chapter, were adopted and ordered incorporated in the minutes.

In his report, Mr. Stoneroad stated that funds received from the membership drives in 1920 and 1921 were approximately the same, there being a few dollars more received last year. After current indebtedness of the chapter is paid, he stated, there will remain approximately \$340 to credit of the treasury.

NEW PASTOR APPOINTED FOR SWEETWATER CHURCH

Rev. D. B. Doak of Abilene has been appointed by Bishop William F. McMurry to fill the unexpired pastorate of Rev. E. A. Clements, who has been compelled to resign as pastor of the First Methodist church at Sweetwater on account of ill health.

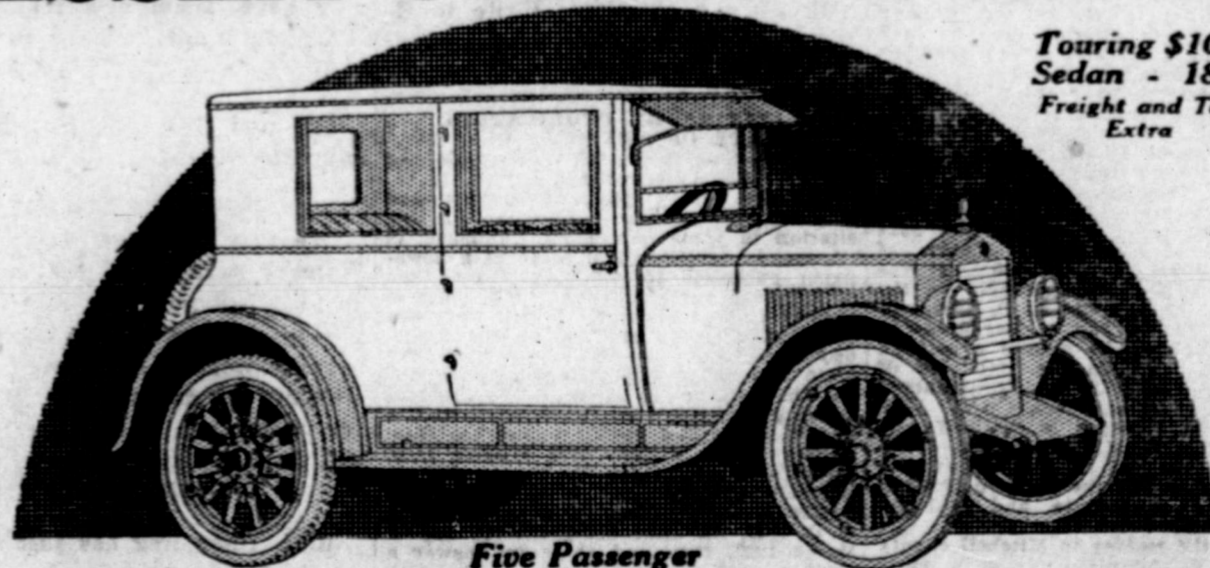
