MORRISON NUMBER TWO WILL HAVE NITRO SHOT

Arrangements for shooting Morrison Number Two were begun Thursday morning and it was planned to shoot the well late that afternoon, S. S. Owen, a representative of the company, stated before leaving Colorado for the location. The nitro and shooter arrived from Ranger Tuesday night, but because of the severe cold weather nothing could be done until Thursday.

The well flowed for three hours Wednesday afternoon, according to visitors from Colorado, who were there. For several minutes the oil was thrown above the crown block.

AMERICAN GLYCERIN CO. PLANS COLORADO STATION

J. H. Moyer of Ranger, district manager for the American Glycerin Company, has been in Colorado since Wednesday morning making preliminary arrangements for opening a shooting station at Colorado. His company has the contract for shooting the Morrison Number Two, which according to W. J. Vaughan, would be given a shot of 100 quarts late Thursday afternoon, just after this edition of The Record goes to press.

Mr. Moyer was present at the Morrison Wednesday afternoon when the well was flowing and expressed himself as being elated over the well. There is no doubt, he stated but that a big field is going to be opened in Mitchell County.

LOGS OF WELL WATCHED FOR POTASH FORMATION

Logs of the wells being drilled in the Colorado field are to be watched closely for indications of potash formation, according to the Chamber of Commerce. An analysis of formation found in the Smith well at 1,050 feet showed a potash content of 11.6 per cent potash, of the part soluble in water.

W. J. Thomson, contractor at Morrison Number Two, believes that a formation even richer in potash than that found in the Smith well, was drilled through in the T. & P. well. At the time he T. & P. well was drilled there was no knowledge of the existence of potash here and consequently no attempt was made to preserve samples of the red crystal salt formation penetrated.

FIVE STENOGRAPHERS BUSY IN COUNTY CLERK'S OFFICE

A total of five stenographers, busily engaged at their typewriters, were counted in the office of County Clerk W. S. Stoneham Monday morning. The impetuous in lease trading and the subsequent demand for abstracts has caused this office to assume the aspect of a real bee hive of industry.

The abstract offices at Colorado report business with them unusually good during the past three weeks.

COLORADO RENEWS WEST TEXAS C. OF C. AFFILIATION

E. L. McCarter, field representative of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, stated Tuesday afternoon before leaving for Sweetwater that he appreciated very much the consideration shown the Chamber by the business interests of Colorado. McCarter was here to renew the affiliation of this city for the fiscal year, commencing March 1.

There were twenty-two contributing members in the West Texas Chamber of Commerce last year, McCarter stated and the number was increased this year. He stated that some business men were out of the city and others could not be found in the short time he was here but that a total of thirty memberships were taken. DIKES CONSTRUCTED AT MORRISON NUMBER TWO

Earthen dikes have been constructed to surround the storage tanks at Morrison No. 2, as a precaution against the possible spreading of fire over the prairie, should the oil stored there become ignited. The construction work was done by Watt Collier.

CRIPPLED ELECTRIC SERVICE DELAYS US

Because of the West Texas Electric Company lines being out between Colorado and Sweetwater for almost forty-eight hours, this edition of The Record was gotten to press with difficulty. Throughout the entire day Tuesday and all of Wednesday morning the linotype machines could not be operated, because there was no power and the result is that much of our current publicity matter was eliminated. We were forced to go to press with only eight pages.

BLIZZARD WEATHER OVER COLORADO AND VICINITY

One of the most severe blizzards of the winter gripped the Colorado section from early Monday night until Thursday. The fall in temperature which began late Monday afternoon was accompanied by a gale from the north and later during the night snow commenced to fall. The thermometer registered 18 degrees above at 8 o'clock Tuesday morning and continued at around that point throughout the day. Snow and sleet fell intermittently throughout the day.

One of the high voltage lines of the West Texas Electric Company between Colorado and Sweetwater went down early Monday night during the gale and repairs were not made until late the following afternoon. During the twenty-four hours to intervene electric service in Colorado was badly crippled. The Record office suffered from the crippled service, as neither of the two linotype machines could be operated. In order to get the paper into the mails on time Thursday afternoon it was necessary to reduce the paper to ten pages this week.

Reports from many of the outlying rural districts are meager and difficult of obtaining. The general opinion among local cattlemen at Colorado is that range cattle suffered from effects of the blizzard but such could not be confirmed on account of tripped telephone service and curtailment of travel to and from points in the country.

TEXAS OIL WORLD GIVES PUBLICITY TO MITCHELL

The Texas Oil World, Fort Worth, one of the leading oil journals of the Southwest, carried an interesting article on the Colorado oil field in the edition of Saturday, February 25. A staff correspondent of the periodical visited the Morrison and other wells in Mitchell County this week.

OIL JOURNALIST ELATED OVER MITCHELL PROSPECTS

Frank E. Force, associate editor of the Texas Oil World, Fort Worth, and a contributing editor to the National Petroleum News, Cleveland, Ohio, spent Tuesday at Colorado and at the Morrison well. Force faced the bitter cold Tuesday afternoon and made a visit to the well and expressed himself as very much elated over the potentialities of the Morrison and the Colorado field.

"The Underwriters Producing & Refining Company have a mighty good well in their Morrison No. 2," Force stated and there is no doubt in my mind but that a big producer will be brought in there when the well is given a light nitro shot. The geology of this section is very similar to that of Burk Burnett and you better commence preparing to meet a big boom, for it sure is coming."

Through cooperation of the Colorado Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Force employed the services of a local representative at Colorado to cover the oil situation here for his two papers. The National Petroleum News is one of the leading oil journals published in the world and through the Chamber of Commerce arrangements have been made for carrying publicity from Colorado in that paper.

Force praised the conservative policy of the public here as to news reports about oil development, stating that his papers did not cater to publicity of any kind that could not be substantiated by actual conditions. "But the time is here for the people of Colorado to become active," he concluded, "and let the outside world know what you have. You have an oil field of wonderful possibilities and it is nothing but proper that the information be carried to the thousands of people in America who are interested primarily in oil and oil development."

The journalist left Tuesday night for Fort Worth and stated that he expected to return to Colorado within the near future. A feature story on Mitchell County will be carried in The Texas Oil World Saturday. Force stated that he had established a sales agency at Colorado with Roy Farmer and that the journals represented by him could be purchased here each week.

B. C. Warlick, manager producing department, Richmond, Warlick & Smith Company of Dallas, operators in the Navarro County field, spent Saturday and Sunday at Colorado. Mr. Warlick visited the Morrison well Saturday and stated that his company would very likely become interested in development here.

STANDARD OIL OFFICIAL SAYS MUCH OIL IS HERE

W. V. Thrace of Kentucky, an official representing the Standard Oil Company, visited the Morrison well Saturday afternoon and spent more than two hours there while the well was being swabbed. As the official watched the swab raised from a depth of one thousand feet several times, bringing up twenty five-barrels of oil each time without lowering the fluid in the well, he turned to a representative of the Chamber of Commerce and remarked:

"Well, there is no question about you having the oil here and I have every reason to believe you are going to have a big field in this vicinity when developed. If the gas pressure was sufficiently strong in the Morrison well, she would be a big natural producer just as she now stands."

Thrace left Saturday night for Ranger where a subsidiary of the Standard has some wells drilling.

PLAN DRILLING WATER WELL AT FOSTER NO. 2

The Colorado-Tex. Company will probably drill a well to supply water for operations at Foster No. 2 at Iatan, Horace Cook, a representative of the company, stated in Colorado Saturday. All available water in the vicinity has become exhausted, Cook stated, and unless rain falls to refill surface tanks, the drilling of wells will be the only solution of the difficulty to be met before drilling can be resumed.

George Adams, contractor at Foster No. 2, had reached a depth of eight hundred feet before closing down on account of the water shortage.

EX-UNIVERSITY STUDENTS TO BANQUET AT BARCROFT

Former students of the State University are to attend a banquet Thursday evening, March 2, at the Barcroft Hotel dining room, Thos. R. Smith stated Wednesday afternoon. Smith stated that up to Wednesday noon a total of 18 reservations had been made.

"All ex-students of the University are cordially invited to attend," Smith stated. "Especially do we extend this invitation to any visitors in the city who formerly attended the University."

\$9,000 REALTY DEAL WAS CONSUMED HERE MONDAY

J. A. Buchanan, local realty dealer, reported Friday that he had sold 320 acres of land six miles south of Colorado to F. P. Roney for a consideration of \$9,000. The property belonged to Joseph M. Brown, a client represented by Buchanan.

S. A. SLOAN HAS DRILLING CONTRACT ON 2600 ACRES

S. A. Sloan of San Francisco, California, has obtained a drilling contract on the M. Phelan ranch, 15 miles west of Colorado and the first test is to be started within ninety days from date of contract. Judge C. H. Earnest, who represented the Phelan interests, stated Saturday that the contract had been passed.

Sloan came into possession of 2,560 acres in lease holdings on the Phelan ranch through the contract. A provision in the drilling contract is that in case water may not be obtained by reasonable effort, the ninety day period for spudding the first well may be extended.

Sloan and associates have been identified with Mitchell County development during the past two years. They are drilling the Conoway No. 1, 14 miles southwest of Colorado and Zilpha Morrison No. 1, two miles west of Morrison No. 2 is being drilled by them on a sub-lease from the Underwriters Producing & Refining Company.

FEW REACH COLORADO TO ATTEND CHURCH CONFERENCE

Because of the severe winter weather which prevailed over the entire State this week, the West Texas Evangelistic Conference, held Wednesday at the First Christian Church of Colorado, was attended by only a few delegates and ministers from West Texas.

Rev. W. O. Dallas of Abilene, who presided over the conference, Rev. E. H. Holmes of Cisco, Rev. E. L. Hughes of Goree and Rev. J. Thomas Brown of Big Spring, were the only ministers to attend.

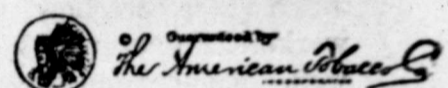

PALISTINE PAGEANT IS APPRECIATED BY COLORADO

The Palistine Pageant which has been shown in Colorado during the past week under direction of Dr. Allen Moore, F. R. G. S., is one of the best entertaining programs ever rendered in this city. His experience of 17 years as a missionary in Palistine has given to Dr. Moore a minute understanding and conception of Oriental customs possessed by few men in America and the plausible manner in which he describes those customs makes the lectures of unusual interest.

Sunday night the pageant was held at the Methodist church auditorium and when the seats were all taken chairs were brought up from the basement, but these were all taken and then the isles and along the chancel rail were literally crowded with people eager to hear every word of the speaker. Using the 23 Psalm as his theme, Dr. Moore gave a vivid description of Shepherding in the days of David, using characters dressed in the wanner worn by men of those days. The characters represented a boy sheppard, the porter, the hiring and the good or true sheppard.

In a most interesting way he described minutely the meaning of each verse in the Psalm, among them being reference to the good sheppard, green pastures, still waters, the rod and the staff, the anointing oil, the overflowing cup, etc.

Monday night Dr. Moore gave an interesting lecture on Solomon's Temple. "I am not a Mason, and therefore do not know anything about the order," Dr. Moore stated, "But everywhere I go 32-degree Masons tell me that in giving a description of Solomon's Temple, I am also giving this degree."

The last number of the pageant will be given Thursday night, March 2 and Dr. Moore leaves for Sweetwater where he is to put the week's program on exhibition.

Palistine Pageant to be Continued.

Owing to the inclement weather the Palistine Pageant going on at the Baptist church has been seriously interrupted. Numbers of people have been disappointed in missing the sessions.

The intellectual citizens of Colorado have so appreciated the cultural value of the Pageant that Dr. Moore has been requested to give three more sessions Sunday, Monday and Tuesday nights of next week. There will be no more programs this week but on Sunday night there will be a short preliminary lecture "Is there a Bible Reason why Jerusalem was a dramatic scene peasant life in the unchanging east?"

On Monday evening "Child Life in Mohammedan Palistine" will be presented in seven scenes portraying the life of the child from birth to marriage, a weird Mohammedan funeral will also be given.

This is one of the most appealing and effective programs given.

Tuesday night, will be a dramatic presentation of an incident in Dr. Moore's own life when a missionary in the Atlas mountains among the Barbic tribes of the Barbary states of North Africa. It is called "Be-friending a Dog." It is the story of how Dr. Moore's life was saved by a wild outcast dog he had tamed.

The programs are open to the public without admission but a silver offering will be taken. Colorado has responded enthusiastically to Dr. Moore's pageant and a splendid attendance is anticipated for the closing sessions.
