PICNIC AND BARBECUE AT RENDERSBROOK SUCCESS

Three hundred and fifty visitors attended the Fourth of July celebration at Rendersbrook Tuesday, given by the Business Men's class of the First Methodist Sunday school. Those attending report the occasion one of the most enjoyable picnics for some time.

Under the direction of O. P. Jones, manager of the Spade ranch, an interesting wild bull and cow riding contest, goat roping and cigar race events were held, in which some twenty-five cow boys of the Spade and other ranches participated. Concert music was furnished throughout the day by the Colorado Booster band. At noon a basket dinner, supplemented by barbecued calf and goat, was spread in the grove near Rendersbrook spring. Supper was also spread at 7 p. m. at the same place.

In the wild bull riding contest, prizes were awarded as follows: Roy Clarke and Darrell Garrett tied for first prize.

Joe Bowman, second prize. In the two-year old steer riding events Ruel Low was awarded first prize, Pete Amisworth second prize and Roy Lane, third prize.

Mr. Bowman was slightly injured when the bull he was riding stumbled and fell, turning completely over and pinning the rider underneath him. As the animal rose from the ground and ran he kicked Bowman in the head.

Pete Amisworth carried off first prize in the goat roping and cigar races. Amisworth roped and tied his goat in ten and three-fourth seconds. He finished in the cigar races in twenty and three-fifth seconds.

O. P. Jones, manager of the Spade ranch, was awarded second prize in the cigar races, completing the final in twenty-one and one-fifth seconds. Erwin Williams and Levi Garrett tied for second place in the goat roping contest, with a time of fourteen seconds.

Another interesting feature of the day's events was the appearance of John Lane, dressed as a cowboy clown, on the field and at the pens while the riding events were on.

SEWER AND WATER BIDS WILL BE OPENED JULY 17

Bids for construction of the sewer system and water extension at Colorado are to be considered by the City Council July 17. Joe H. Smoot, mayor pro-tem, stated Monday, Mr. Smoot said that with but few changes the original plans submitted by Myers & Noyce last year would be followed out in the two projects. The council has estimated that the two projects will cost the city approximately \$50,000.00 or probably less.

The sewer system will cover the entire business district and the major residence portion of the city, extending as far out as Ninth street in North Colorado. Tentative location of the sewage disposal plant has been made at the intersection of Lone Wolf Creek with the Colorado river.

The water extension will also cover the principal sections of the city, the plan being to extend the mains as far north as Ninth street and across the river into South Colorado. This extension will furnish water for domestic and commercial use and a fire protection to those parts of the city not now reached by the mains.

LORAIN BANK ERECTING NEW BANKING HOUSE

The First State Bank moved Monday of last week into their temporary quarters in the building south of J. F. Reeder's grocery. The work of tearing down the old building was started Tuesday, W. D. McCarty having the contract to wreck the old building. A. G. Furlow has been awarded the contract to construct the new bank building, which will occupy the place of the one that is being torn down. The new building will be constructed of brick and Mr. Furlow says work will begin just as soon as the ground is clear of the old material. Loraine Leader.

COLORADO OBSERVES 4TH ATTENDS ATTRACTIONS

The Fourth of July celebration at Colorado by the closing of the banks, stores and offices. Large numbers of citizens attended Independence celebrations and all of them report having spent a most enjoyable day.

The rodeo here Tuesday and Wednesday was well patronized, while others motored to Sweetwater, to Abilene and Snyder to attend Fourth of July celebrations there. The largest delegation to leave Colorado for the day went to Rendersbrook, twenty-five miles southwest, for the picnic and rodeo. Sixty-eight automobiles, all bringing visitors to Rendersbrook, were registered.

The celebration at Sweetwater was given by the American Legion there, while the attraction at Abilene was the annual Fourth of July automobile races at the West Texas Fair park. Several thousand people were in Abilene throughout the day.

CONTRACTS AWARDED FOR NEW VIADUCT AND BRIDGE

The Abbott-Brown Construction Company of Loraine were the successful bidder for contract to construct the new bridge across the Colorado river, when bids submitted to Commissioners' Court were opened Monday. The bid was for \$44,327.31. Other bids were submitted as follows:

Austin Brothers, Dallas, \$45,483.77; Illinois Bridge Company, of Austin, \$55,057.40; Kansas City Bridge Company of Kansas City, Mo., \$58,278.49.

In addition to J. E. Abbott of Loraine, representative of the successful bidders on the structure, representatives of the following structural steel and material supply companies and contractors were here Monday conferring with Commissioners' Court.

J. B. Templeton and J. B. Moore of Dallas, representing the Austin Bros. Bridge Company; L. A. Idle, of the Kansas City Bridge Company; H. K. Webb, of Illinois Steel Bridge Company; W. M. Thornton, of the Texas Portland Cement Company; E. W. Habbe, of the E. P. McElrath Construction Company of Corsicana; W. S. Thomas, of the Texas Portland Cement Company, Abilene; A. G. Gindinger of Dallas, representing the Mosher Steel and Machinery Company.

F. E. DuBose, engineer in charge of construction, stated Monday afternoon that the contract specified that work on the new bridge would be commenced at the earliest possible date. While the new bridge is under construction the street there will not be closed, it was stated, but an improvised crossing of corduroy construction will be made near the bridge site.

The new bridge will be 330 feet 6 inches in length, and including the approaches the project will be 1200 feet in length. The floor of the new bridge will be three feet and one inch higher than the old bridge. The bridge will consist of six 31-foot concrete trestles and one steel span 150 feet in length. The entire floor is to be of concrete. The bridge will be 19 feet clear driveway, with a sidewalk four feet, six inches on the outside.

The Abbott-Brown Construction Company was also the successful bidder for construction of a new bridge across Bear Creek, southeast of Colorado on the Colorado-Strong City road. This bridge is to be a steel span, 110 feet in length and supported by concrete piers. The present bridge there will be moved to the crossing on Silver Creek, south of Loraine. The contract was bid there in at \$4,730.

E. W. Habbe of Corsicana, representative of the E. P. McElrath Construction Company, stated Monday afternoon that the Colorado river bridge here would be one of the best in the State. He praised very highly the plans and specifications as made by engineers of the Highway Commission.

The fact that sand and gravel materials to be used in construction are available in the river near the bridge site figured a material saving to the county and state in awarding the contract. Under usual conditions these materials must of necessity be hauled from pits located at a distance.

HUTCHINSON PURCHASES A J. HERRINGTON BUILDING

H. I. Hutchinson has purchased the A. J. Herrington building on Second street, formerly occupied by Mr. Herrington as Ford sales and service headquarters. Consideration in the deal was not made public.

Hutchinson will move his furniture and hardware business from the C. H. Earnest building, corner Second and Elm, into the new location when improvements and an extension onto the rear of the building are complete, which will be about thirty days.

MARRIED AT COURT HOUSE.

FAIR DIRECTORS MEET AT CHAMBER COMMERCE

An enthusiastic meeting of the officers and directors of the Mitchell County Fair Association was held Saturday afternoon at the office of the Chamber of Commerce for the purpose of arranging for the Fair to be held here on September 27 and 28.

W. A. Dulin, County Demonstrator, gave a brief outline of the work that he is conducting in the Pig Clubs and also the Calf Clubs. Mr. Dulin stated that he had somewhere in the neighborhood of 60 boys feeding pigs and about 20 boys feeding calves, and these were to be exhibited and prizes given for the best animals. He also told the Association that he has one of the best agricultural counties in the State of Texas, and other counties not so good send exhibitions to the State Fair and Cotton Palace, and why not ours, and that he felt like the Association would be a means of causing rivalry among the communities of the county to see which would raise the best crops, and cattle, and that those winning out in the County Fair would be urged to exhibit at other Fairs and Fat Stock Shows.

F. E. McKenzie, president of the association, stated that he felt like this was a starter for what he hoped would give Mitchell county a permanent and a good Fair each year, and that something like \$100 had already been promised without any solicitation, to help make the Fair a success.

S. E. Brown, president of the First State bank of Loraine, and vice-president of the association, stated that it was up to the business men of the County to get behind this movement and put it over, and that unless they would co-operate with the association in every way possible that it would be practically impossible to make a big success of the Fair.

The amount of \$60 was raised among the directors and officers to help get the Fair started. A representative of an Attraction Company was present and bid on the Concession and Entertainment rights, and offered to furnish the Fair with a large tent for an auditorium, peepers, free entertainment, and a band and orchestra. It was decided that the judging of the exhibits of live stock and poultry be done by a man from A. & M. College, who was thoroughly conversant with such.

Another meeting will be held on Saturday, July 8th, at 2 p. m. at the Chamber of Commerce, and the president would like for all officers and directors, and all committees and others interested in the Fair Association meet with him at that time.

CANNING DEMONSTRATION AT LONE STAR SATURDAY

Under the supervision of W. A. Dulin, county farm agent, a demonstration in canning will be given Saturday at Lone Star school house, north of Loraine, by Miss Stella Spann, home demonstrator of Nolan County.

Instructions in canning both vegetables and fruits are to be given by the expert, Dulin stated. An attempt will be made by the women of Mitchell County to induce Commissioners' Court to co-operate with the Extension Department, A. & M. College, to obtain the services of a home demonstrator for Mitchell County. A representative of the College was at Colorado a few weeks ago and expressed the desire to furnish a demonstrator for this county, on condition that the commissioners would co-operate in the work.

BOOSTER CLUB WILL MEET THURSDAY NIGHT, JULY 13

The July meeting of the Colorado Booster Club will be held Thursday night of next week at Union Tabernacle. The meeting will be called to order at 8:30 by J. H. Greene, president.

Mr. Greene announced Wednesday that the meeting would be moved from the tabernacle for the one meeting in that there be sufficient seating capacity for all who will attend. Resolutions were passed at a mass meeting Wednesday afternoon at the tabernacle, requesting that the change be made.

At a recent meeting of the club the first Thursday night of each month was named as the regular meeting dates, but because of the revival in progress this week at Union Tabernacle by Rev. M. C. Bishop, the meeting was postponed one week in that no conflict with these services be had. Hereafter, it has been announced, the club will meet regularly on those nights.

The Colorado Booster Band will furnish concert music as usual at this meeting. Roy Farmer, member of a committee appointed at the meeting last month, stated Wednesday that he would be able to report funds subscribed with which to purchase uniforms for the band. Roy has subscriptions totaling \$450 to be applied to this fund.

Refreshments are to be served and this regular feature of the Booster Club is to be observed without cost to anyone. It has been stated that funds are available to meet this expense and thus eliminate for this meeting the expense of one dollar usually collected from each member of the club.

Mr. Greene stated that every citizen of Colorado and of the Colorado Independent school district was urged to attend the meeting Thursday night of next week. Matters of interest concerning the schools are to be discussed.

WILLIAM LAFEVERE KILLED AT LORAIN RACE TRACK

William Lafevere, farmer 49 years of age of the Lone Star community a few miles north of Loraine, died Saturday night as the result of injuries received Saturday afternoon when a horse being ridden by Polley M. Goss on the race tracks at Loraine bolted the track and ran into a crowd of spectators.

Sam Williams, Lem Fowler and Melroe were also injured. For a few days following the accident the injuries of Williams were considered serious.

The horse left the track and raced into the crowd just after passing the judge's stand.

RODOLPH VISITORS EXPECTED BARBECUE, IT IS CLAIMED

Visitors to Colorado Tuesday, attracted here to witness the rodeo held west of the city, claimed to have been under the impression that barbecue dinner would be served, according to information given The Record Wednesday. If such a report was circulated and thereby misleading any of the visitors here, it was unauthorized by the Chamber of Commerce or any other business interests of Colorado in so far as could be learned.

The rodeo was held independently of the Chamber of Commerce or the general public.

JOHN LANE RUNNING IN PRIMARY FOR COMMISSIONER

John D. Lane stated Wednesday that the fact that he had failed to get his application filed with the County Democratic chairman in time for a place on the ballot, was purely an oversight, a matter which he had not contemplated doing under any conditions. In an article appearing in The Record today, Lane outlines the reasons for this and states that he is still in the race for county commissioner from precinct three.

U. P. & R. CO. OFFERED TWO MILLION FOR HOLDINGS

Two million dollars has been refused by the Underwriters Producing and Refining Company for their Mitchell County property. The company owns leases on 10,000 acres and has a well pumping 280 barrels. Another well is drilling at about 2,800 feet. The California Company, a subsidiary of the Standard Oil Company of California made the offer, according to J. L. Vaughan, vice president and general manager of the Underwriters corporation.

The California Company recently acquired several thousand acres in south central Mitchell County for development purposes. The company plans to drill several wells in this county and have a number of representatives in Colorado.

Maxwell and Johnston, Ft. Worth operators, are at this time the most active in the field. This firm is to drill three tests. The first was spudded July 4, and is located on the Stewart land in section 32, township 1 north, block 29, T. & P. survey. The Capps Lucas No. 1, of the firm is preparing to spud and is located in section 13, block 30. The firm's Jones No. 1, will spud by July 12. The Jones location is said by several eminent geologists to be on an ideal structure. Unusual interest is being manifested in this test due to the many favorable reports.

The A. T. Spaulding Oil Company's Zilpha Morrison No. 1, section 31, block 28, is pulling rods and cleaning out. Conservative oil men are of the opinion that the well will make 100 barrels when again put on the pump.

The Fenland Oil Company's Reed Nos. 1, section 27, block 30 is preparing to spud. This test will be closely watched by the oil fraternity as it is being drilled on the Reed Anticline which eminent geologists proclaim as a perfect structure and ideal for production. The company owns approximately 4,000 acres at favorable location.

The Remotes Oil and Land Company has made a location in section 17, block 28.

The Macosha Petroleum Company Koster No. 1, section 18, block 29, is preparing to spud.

The Colorado Texas Oil Company's Foster No. 2 is drilling in line at approximately 2100 feet.

Daniel O. Adams, Loraine No. 1, is drilling at 750 feet.

Reidy's Murphy No. 1, section 24, block 29, is drilling at approximately 2050 feet.

Flucher's Petroleum Company's Coleman No. 1, section 60, block 95, is drilling at about 1450 feet.

Bowyer and Reed's Redger No. 1, section 67, block 97, is ready to spud.

Western Petroleum Company's Etta Brennan No. 1, section 1, block 29, is drilling at approximately 2,200 feet.

Creighton Drilling Company's Smith No. 1, is fishing for drill at 2380 feet.

Underwriters Producing and Refining Company's T. & P. No. 3, section 41, block 28, has made location and expect to erect derrick by end of the week.

RAZING LASKER BUILDINGS COMMENCED BY CONTRACTOR

J. M. Morgan of Big Spring, contractor to construct the new Colorado National Bank building, commenced Wednesday the work of razing the two brick buildings, known as the Lasker buildings, corner Second and Walnut streets, to clear the site of the new building.

Morgan stated that he was ten days late in starting on this work but had been delayed in completing a contract elsewhere.

District Judge Warns Parents.

There are sixty other boys in the county, comprising the club members recently organized by the farm agent, who, like the boy referred to, plan to carry off a prize at the Mitchell County fair. Then, there are twenty or twenty-five young Americans on the farms of Mitchell county who are feeding registered calves and will show them among the exhibits to be entered at the fair. The girls, too, are manifesting unusual interest in the coming fair and many of them will exhibit poultry, canned and preserved foods, textile articles, etc. The boys and girls of Mitchell County are to be congratulated and given every assistance in this work.

WHY IT DIDN'T APPEAR
It has been just one darned thing after another at The Herald office for ten days—until the return of T. E. Jordan, manager, and A. G. Jordan, linotype operator, Tuesday of this week. When they started on their vacation to Christoval they had arranged to have a linotype operator on the job, but the son-of-a-gun failed to appear. MASS MEETING HELD TO DISCUSS SCHOOL MATTER

"The records will show that I have paid more money into the school funds of Mitchell County than any other citizen," Dr. P. C. Coleman stated in an address Wednesday afternoon at a mass meeting held for the purpose of discussing the school question. "I have never complained about taxes and in case it be necessary to carry on the schools here, I call upon the school board to double my present valuation of property, or increase it three times, if necessary."

The same spirit was evidence by all others present at the meeting who expressed themselves on the school question. According to data submitted by H. L. Hutchinson, president of the school board, and E. F. King, superintendent, taxes from the present property valuations in the district will represent approximately fifty per cent of the amount to be required in maintaining the schools for a term of nine months.

Property valuations of the district as assessed for taxes on the rolls, total two and one-quarter millions of dollars, Hutchinson stated. To conduct the schools nine months and take up a deficit in the sinking fund this valuation must be placed at more than four million dollars.

The large increase in scholastics, necessitating the employment of additional teachers last year, together with the high prices paid for all school supplies has served to almost bankrupt the school district under the old property valuation. Another year, these expenses will be increased and one of two inevitables is to be met, increase the taxable values in the district, or expect a school of five or six months.

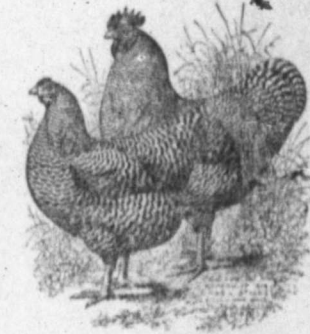

Our entire people mourn deeply the loss of one of her most noble and most highly esteemed young men, that of William Lefevere, who was fatally injured Saturday afternoon about four-thirty by a horse which became unmanageable on the race track north of town and from which he died Sunday morning at 12:40 at the J. L. Pratt home, where he was carried, when hurt.

The funeral was held at the Methodist church at six o'clock Sunday afternoon, Rev. S. H. Young pastor of the M. E. Church, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. M. F. Richardson, pastor of the Baptist church.

Deceased was born at Jonesboro in 1904, joined the Methodist church in Erath County at the age of eight and remained strong in that belief as long as he lived. While it seems to us he was called away so young we are made to think of that old saying, "The good die young" and in the dicit, "Nobody knows but Jesus" sung by Misses Pearl and Ruby Beight, we feel that he does know and that it is best just as it is.

He leaves a father and mother, one sister and one brother besides other near and dear relatives to mourn his loss to whom sympathy of all our city is extended.

Trades Day Accident.

On the race track about one-half mile north of town, Saturday afternoon, a horse ridden by Polie McGee became unmanageable, flew the track and ran into the crowd hurting five boys before they could get out of the way, it was reported that the horse stumbled some ten steps and then fell on William Lefevere, who was fatally injured. Sam Williams was knocked down and seriously injured, Lem Fowler was hit by one of the stirrups and a bad gash cut on his forehead. Hollis Pendergrass got his shoulder hurt and Polie McGee his arm broken. Lefevere, who lived north of town, was unconscious when picked up and never regained consciousness. He was taken to the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Pratt, where he died at 12:40 the next morning. It was thought that he was hurt internally. Williams' head was injured and one of his wrists broken. He was taken to the M. D. Cranfill home and the services of Miss Amy Green, a nurse from Colorado, secured. At this writing he is reported to be doing as well as could be expected. The other three boys were not seriously hurt.

LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

The Record: We noticed in last week's issue of the Record an effusion written by Mr. Harris from a place called Loraine, which he takes occasion to explain in Mitchell county. We are glad that he dropped in that explanation, because we couldn't find the place on the map, and in making inquiries as to where the place is, one man gave it as his opinion that it was a discarded suburb of Roscoe. We are, therefore, thankful for the explanation.

This Mr. Harris says he is, offended because of a statement made in the columns of your paper two weeks ago to the effect that the prizes that were offered to individual winners in the County Interscholastic League Meet which was held last March, said prizes being offered on condition that the meet be held at Loraine and not offered if the meet should be held elsewhere, had not been received in so far as Colorado was concerned. He calls the statement insinuating and misleading. I have this statement before me and I fail to see anything insinuating about it. It seems to be plain English. We repeat that no prizes have been received by any of the winners from the Colorado High School that we have heard of, and we have made inquiry concerning

the matter. He says that the money, \$75.00, is in a bank at Loraine. That is just what the competing schools object to, the prizes should be purchased and the winners should have them. Prizes were given to the winners in the District meet at Abilene and the winners received them within a week or ten days after the meet was held. However, the Loraine meet was so tremendously large, the prizes so varied and prices so hard to get that it takes a great deal of time, more than three months. Probably these prizes are to be curios from China or Japan. In that case it will require much time to secure prices and get the order filled. We are sure, however, that they will be splendid when they come.

Now, all this windjamming he does about points is entirely beside the question. Mr. G. Foster, who had charge of the athletics in this school, and who attended the meet in question, made the report that Mr. Harris refers to as being misleading and faulty. I believe then and believe now that Mr. Foster made a correct report. It has not been questioned so far as my knowledge goes until the eruption of last week. Mr. Foster's report shows 185 points won by Colorado. Then the other schools could not have won that number, because there were not than many more to win.

We have never thought of questioning any one's integrity, but we are emitting no shouts of approval of the speed with which these prizes are being pinned on the winners. We

just think that since it has been more than three months since this meet was held that it is time to put up or shut up.

As to entering into any newspaper controversy about the matter, that is not our purpose. And as for the Chamber of Commerce of Colorado, this body of men is too busy putting over the building of fifty thousand dollar viaducts, forty thousand dollar bank buildings, sixty thousand dollar school buildings, seventy-five dollar hotels, one hundred and twenty thousand dollar water works system, and scores of what, for Colorado are minor things, but would be large affairs for small places, to bother with such little things as who won the most points in a potato race.
