## 200 EXPECTED TO JOIN BOOSTER EXCURSION TO WEST TEXAS FAIR

### MORE THAN FORTY CARS SIGNED FOR TRIP TO ABILENE CELEBRATING COLORADO DAY AT WEST TEXAS FAIR.

Colorado will be in Abilene approximately two hundred strong for "Colorado Day" at the West Texas Fair Friday, according to those who have arrangements of the booster excursion in charge. Thursday morning a total of 43 automobiles had pledged to accompany the excursion, which is scheduled to leave Colorado promptly at 6 o'clock Friday morning.

Iven Tilden has been in Abilene all of the week completing arrangements for the program to be carried out there following arrival of the Colorado delegation. These plans will include a big parade by the boosters from this city, the line of parade to lead through the principal streets of Abilene and to the fair grounds. The parade will be headed by the Booster Band and a specially decorated float has been secured by Tilden for the band. Tilden wired Tuesday that the parade would be formed in the western city limits, in the vicinity of the old foot ball park and every car making the trip is expected to be at this location not later than 10:30 Friday morning.

Several cars will leave Colorado Thursday afternoon and the drivers of these are expected to meet the Colorado excursion at the place designated Friday morning and form in line for the parade. Every car will carry special pennants and each individual will wear a Colorado badge. It is very important that every person going to Abilene provide these pennants and badges, which will be distributed by J. H. Greene at his store.

The regulation convention hat to be worn by all members of the booster delegation will also be supplied from the store of Mr. Greene. This also is of much importance. Get your hat at the same time the pennants and badges are obtained.

The Colorado Band has been placed on the fair program for the day and will have a part in the concert

music at the coliseum at Fair Park. The band from here will also have a part in the big band parade at Abilene Friday, participated in by bands from Stamford, San Angelo and Brownwood. These are said to be four of the best bands in West Texas. The Chamber of Commerce, Booster Club and Lions Club will have official cars in the long automobile excursion to go from here to Abilene. Dr. P. C. Coleman, president of the Chamber of Commerce, will send his car as the official car of the Chamber; J. H. Greene, president of the Booster Club, will drive the official car of that organization, and Col. C. M. Adams, president of the Lions Club, will ride in the official car carrying the pennant from the Colorado den.

In addition to those who have pledged definitely to make the trip and take their cars, others have expressed their intention of joining the excursion if possible. It is believed that at least fifty automobiles will make the trip. Those who have not yet definitely decided to go and can do so, are urged to be ready to leave Friday morning. Mitchell County has an exhibit in Abilene that would be a credit to any county of West Texas. Fair officials have officially named Friday as Colorado Day at the West Texas Fair. We should send one hundred automobiles to Abilene for that day, fill the city and fair grounds with Colorado boosters, to impress upon the thousands of visitors there the fact that we have here a live little city and one of which we are proud.

## COLORADO SCHOOLS WILL OPEN MONDAY, OCT. 2ND.

The Colorado schools will open Monday morning for the 1922-23 term and E. F. King, superintendent of schools, has recently issued a statement calling upon patrons of the schools to co-operate with the faculty in having as many scholars as is possible enrolled on the opening day. Mr. King made the prediction a few weeks ago that not less than one thousand pupils would be enrolled the first day of school.

The late date for opening the schools this year will not in any way effect plans of the school board to conduct a school of nine months, Mr. King stated. The delay was unavoidable, due to use repairs to the Grammar school could not be completed in time for commencing the school work earlier.

Patrons of the schools are invited to attend the opening exercises, which will be held Monday morning in the high school auditorium. Much of the time Monday will be devoted to the assignment of pupils to their class rooms and the distribution of class books.

## PLAN 1923 FAIR WILL BE DISCUSSED TUESDAY

F. E. McKenzie, president of the Mitchell County Fair Association, has called for a mass meeting of citizens to be convened at the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday afternoon of next week at 2 o'clock for the purpose of inaugurating plans for the fair next year. The Mitchell County fair is here to stay, according to fair officials, and should the present plans materialize, the fair in 1923 will eclipse the one here Friday and Saturday by one hundred per cent.

Fair officials and all other interested citizens are urged to attend the meeting Thursday. Definite steps will be probably taken at this meeting to meet the demand for larger exhibit space and also to concentrate the various attractions more closely together.

## MITCHELL CO. EXHIBIT IS WINNER AT ABILENE

The Mitchell County exhibit in the agricultural building at the West Texas Fair at Abilene was awarded third prize this week, according to a message received from Miss Georgie Laceywell, home demonstration agent, who is in charge of the exhibit. Miss Laceywell wired that the first prize went to Callahan County and the second to Runnels County.

In winning third place Mitchell County defeated some of the leading counties of West Texas, among them being Lubbock, Jones and Fisher. This county would have won even higher honors at the fair had a larger variety of products been shown. The quality of products shown in the Mitchell County exhibit are among the best ever exhibited at Abilene, it is claimed.

## BADGETT WELL COMES IN AS GIANT SALT PRODUCER

The first big gusher in the Mitchell County field blew in Sunday afternoon and has been producing from five thousand to ten thousand barrels all the week. The big gusher, however, is not producing oil, but rather a strong salt solution. The well is said by oil men of Colorado to be a mystery as it is the first of its kind known to the local oil fraternity.

Casing out the strong gas pressure, which was encountered at 1050 feet several days ago, drilling was resumed last week and Sunday afternoon when a depth of 1100 feet had been reached the big gusher came in. A solid stream of water and salt is being thrown from the well, going from fifteen to forty feet above the crown block. Several acres surrounding the well is covered with salt and presents the scene of winter following a snow storm.

Roaring of the well is plainly heard for a mile away. The glistening white formation being hurled into space from the well is plainly visible for a distance of five miles. Ditches have been made, turning the solution into the Colorado river and it was claimed late Wednesday afternoon that the strong brine had reached Colorado in its flow down the stream. The well is fifteen miles northwest of town.

The crew at Smith No. 1 has been rigging up this week and it is understood that drilling is to be resumed at this well at once. Operations in the field are progressing at all unfinished wells and those wells under pump continue to hold up to initial production.

Interest is being centered around Richardson No. 1 of the California Company, five miles southwest of Colorado, and Foster No. 1 of the Magnolia Petroleum Company, three miles south of laton, either of which would materially extend the field.

## MITCHELL COUNTY EXHIBIT WEST TEXAS FAIR, ABILENE

Mitchell County has one of the most attractive exhibits in the agricultural building at the West Texas Fair, which opened at Abilene Monday, according to citizens of Colorado who have visited the fair this week. The exhibit was collected from the Mitchell County Fair exhibits here last week and shipped to Abilene by truck. The oil exhibit shown there was collected and carried to Abilene by A. W. Palmer.

Palmer and W. S. Cooper left Colorado Sunday morning for Abilene and Miss Georgie Laceywell and Mrs. A. L. Whipkey left that afternoon. All four worked until after midnight one night and part of two days in completing the decorations of the booth and setting the exhibits in place. Miss Laceywell is in Abilene in personal charge of the exhibit.

## INITIAL MITCHELL COUNTY FAIR GRAND SUCCESS VISITORS SAY

### CROWDS SHOW GREAT INTEREST IN ALL EXHIBITS; LONG LIST OF PRIZE AWARDS ANNOUNCED BY FAIR OFFICIALS

The initial Mitchell County Fair at Colorado Friday and Saturday surpassed even the most remote expectation of fair officials in every respect. The exhibits were larger and better and attendance records were larger than had been expected. There was not an exhibit in either the main building or the livestock building which failed to prove interesting. The fair was opened Friday morning with a parade which formed at the court house and passed through the principal business streets of the city, ending at the fair grounds. Scores of automobiles in the parade were profusely decorated. Following the parade, the address of welcome was delivered by L. W. Sandusky, followed by the response by R. M. Chitwood of Sweetwater.

In the livestock department more than twenty-five entries of pigs and calves were registered. These entries were made by boys of the pig and baby beef clubs of Mitchell County. The animals were fed under supervision of the county agent, W. A. Dulin. Dulin stated Saturday that every pig and calf entered was a registered animal. Judging in these entries was done by John Simpson, animal husbandman of A. & M. College.

Perhaps the most attractive exhibits at the fair were the fancy pack vegetables, fruits, etc., exhibited by the federated clubs of the county. These exhibits were prepared under direction of Miss Georgie Laceywell, home demonstration agent and the quality of the products, as well as the large variety shown, were outstanding features commented upon by the judges. The Pioneer, Thrift, Buford and Longfellow federated clubs had excellent exhibits, and Mr. and Mrs. Will Berry, of Hillcrest Farm, and R. A. Hood showed attractive exhibits.

In the fine arts and needlework department, scores of interesting exhibits were made. These included products of fancy needle work from the smallest dollie up to counterpanes and hand made quilts. Many beautiful paintings were on exhibit in this department.

Hurd's Bakery, Fair Fill Service Station, J. H. Greene & Company, The Gulf Production Company, Winn & Pidgeon, C. M. Adams, F. M. Burns, DeGarmo & Son, the Dodge and Velle and Chevrolet motor car agencies, The Texas Company, Whipkey Printing Company and the Continental Oil-Cotton Company and Westbrook citizens had attractive displays in the main building.

Perhaps the longest automobile parade ever witnessed in Colorado was the Ford Round-up Saturday afternoon, given under direction of the local Ford agency. A. J. Herrington, Ford dealer here, estimates that more than one hundred Ford cars and trucks formed in line for this parade. Some of the cars were very attractively decorated.

The Fair was closed Saturday night with the American Legion dance on the court house lawn, which officially opened with ceremonies attending the coronation of Miss Lottie Pritchett as Queen of the First Mitchell County Fair. The coronation oration was delivered by C. L. Browning, Jr., John Majors of Sweetwater was chosen as the prince consort to conduct her Majesty to the Royal Throne.

Miss Pritchett wore a dress of white duchess satin, trimmed with iridescent pearls and with elaborate court train. Her crown, of glittering silver background, was richly bedecked with diamonds, rhinestones, emeralds and sapphires. Her Majesty could not have looked better nor filled more impressively the honor she was awarded.

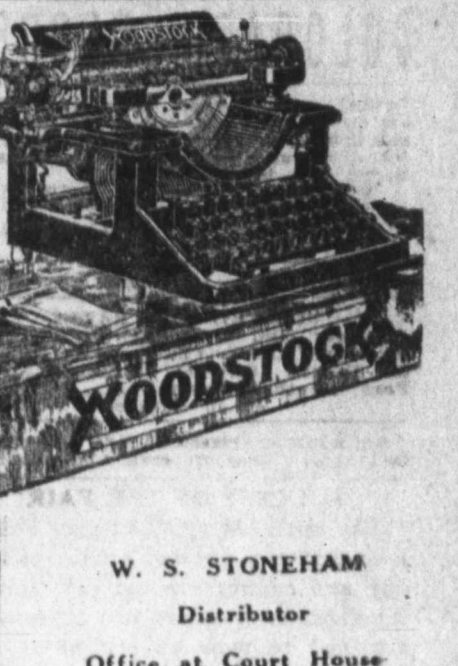

John W. Hodges and Bride of Big Spring stopped in Westbrook Saturday to see his uncle, T. E. Hodges, while en route to Dallas.

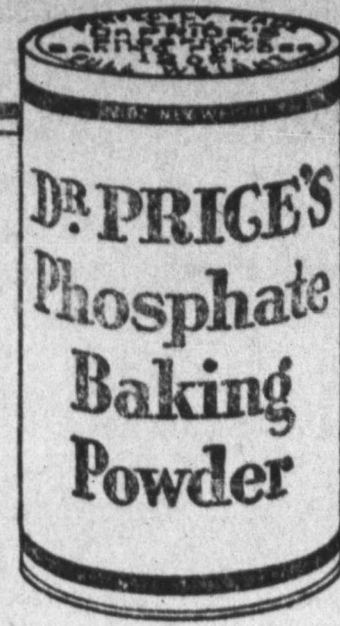

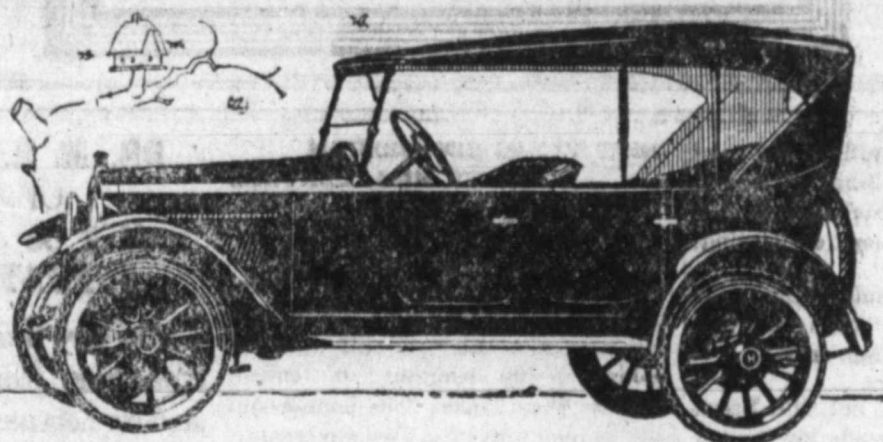

WEST TEXAS COMMISSION TO VISIT MILL CENTERS

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce will send a commission to the cotton mill districts of North Carolina and other Southern states and mill centers to study the mill situation looking to the bringing of cotton mills to West Texas. The commission will be made up of a few representatives of the organization and the Colorado Chamber of Commerce was recently requested by Porter A. Whaley, manager of the West Texas Chamber, to furnish a representative on this commission.

In the letter received from Mr. Whaley, he outlined that this city was favorably situated as one of the proposed sites for the mills to be sought for West Texas. Mitchell County is in the center of a large cotton producing area and the adjacent oil fields is promising of cheap fuel.

The committee to make the inspection, and encourage construction of big mills in West Texas was authorized by the board of directors at its meeting at Brownwood several weeks ago. Herbert L. Jones, of Post City, manager of the Postex Mills, will probably be named chairman of the committee.

It is not known definitely whether the Colorado Chamber of Commerce will comply with the request of Whaley and send a representative from this city. Members of the board of directors, however, who have been approached in the matter endorse any program having for its purpose the securing of additional enterprises for Colorado.
