Improvements at Power Plant From Big Spring Herald: Improvements that will run into many thousands of dollars were started at the plant of the West Texas Electric Company in Big Spring Monday.

The capacity of the power plant will practically be doubled when the big new 225 horsepower Diesel engine has been installed, which will be within the next thirty days. W. J. Smith of Waco is here to superintend the installation of the big engine. The work of building the foundation is now under way and everything will be in readiness to put the engine in place just as soon as it arrives.

In addition to enabling the West Texas Electric Company to take on much new business the installation of this engine will insure an improved service in the way of electric lighting. A stronger and steadier light will be in evidence when the improvements are completed.

IMPROVEMENTS ON THE TEXAS & PACIFIC RAILWAY

In addition to the big improvement work of ballasting the Texas & Pacific truck westward from Sweetwater a number of other improvements are now under way on the Rio Grande division. The large electrically operated turntable is now being installed at the T. & P. shops at El Paso. This work will be completed by June 1st at which time the work of installing a similar turntable at the shops in this city will be begun. After the installation of the Big Spring turntable one will be installed at Toyah.

These turntables are one hundred feet long, sufficient to accommodate the big engines now in use, and weighing one hundred and ten tons each.

Steel tanks with a capacity of 170,000 gallons each are now being installed at Monohans and Loraine to enable a larger supply of water to be available for the locomotives.

The work of drilling a test well seven hundred feet deep near the big spring is now progressing. Drilling on the first well started had to be stopped when the casing collapsed at about 285 feet. This well will be completed at that depth as it is said to be one of the best wells yet secured by the company—Big Spring Herald.

RADICALS TO GET GARLAND INHERITANCE

Claims Contribution to Workers' Education Bureau Denied for Lack of Being Radical.

Washington.—Charges that the fortune of more than \$800,000 which Charles Garland of Boston refused to accept as an inheritance from his father is being used to "bring together an interlocking network of pacifist and revolutionary organizations of more or less extreme character," were made in a public statement by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor.

Along with the statement, Mr. Gompers made public a letter from the American Fund for Public Service, Inc., to which Mr. Garland turned over the bulk of his wealth, refusing to contribute to the Workers' Education Bureau, a labor federation organization, because the bureau was "not definitely committed to a radical program," in the way of "carrying on the struggle for the emancipation of their class in every sphere."

An investigation of the Garland fund, Mr. Gompers said, has served "to reveal to some slight extent the ramifications of revolutionary propaganda and revolutionary influence in the United States," and to link the American Fund for Public Service, Inc., with perhaps fifty or more of the leading pacifist, pro-Bolshevik and parlor pink organizations.

He declared that Roger Baldwin, Robert Morse Lovett, Scott Nearing, William Z. Foster, Sidney Hillman and others of the directors of the Garland fund had been more or less constantly associated with radical labor and other organizations which the American Federation of Labor considered as "subversive to the best interests of American citizenship and the principles upon which the American Republic and the American Federation of Labor are founded."

Charles Garland of Boston is the young millionaire who gave away his fortune and subsequently gained considerable notoriety by his adventures with a "soul mate" in his New England cottage.

FINANCES AND 1924 MEET OCCUPY G. O. P.

Six Cities in Convention Race And Deficit is Cut to Three Hundred Thousand Dollars

Washington.—Preliminary discussion relative to the 1924 convention city of the Republican party, together with the making of plans to wipe out the remainder of the deficit incurred by the Republicans in the 1920 campaign and a survey of the general political situation constitute the outstanding developments of a series of conferences with Republican leaders concluded here by Fred W. Upham, treasurer of the Republican National Committee.

Participants in the conferences with Mr. Upham included John T. Adams, chairman of the Republican committee, who returned to Washington after a trip abroad; Secretaries Weeks and Davis, Rush L. Holland, Assistant Attorney General, and others prominent in the councils of the party. Mr. Upham, during his two-day stay in the capital, also has had two conferences with President Harding.

From some of those who saw the Republican treasurer have developed:

That consideration now is being given to six cities, Chicago, Kansas City, San Francisco, Cleveland, Washington and Buffalo as the site for the 1924 convention.

That the deficit of approximately \$1,700,000 resulting from the 1920 campaign has been reduced to about \$200,000, and that steps have been taken which it is hoped by party leaders will wipe it out completely by June 1.

That party leaders expect that the fortunes of the Republican party in 1924 may turn largely on the general business conditions obtaining during the next nineteen months.

Southern Senators and Congressmen are opposed to the suggestion that the rocking-horse statue of Andrew Jackson which stands in Lafayette Square opposite the White House be removed and one of George Washington placed in its stead. Colonel C. C. Sherrill, superintendent of buildings and grounds, favors the change inasmuch as all other statues in Lafayette Square are of revolutionary heroes.

Turks to Deal With U. S. Constantinople.—The Akhram says it learns the Turkish Government expects soon to enter into negotiations with the United States for a treaty. The Turks will approach the Americans at the Lausanne conference, the paper adds. It also intimates that tentative parleys with Rear Admiral Mark Bristol, the American high commissioner in Constantinople, already have taken place.

Texas News

The farmers of Navarro County report wheat and oats are doing well, corn coming up to a good stand, and cotton planting well under way.

Water works bonds totaling \$54,000 for the city of Rule, Haskell County, were approved by the attorney general's department this week.

There are 1,265 school children in Cameron, divided as follows: Whites 722, colored 543, according to a census report.

The state fire insurance commission has awarded good fire record credits to three towns, the maximum of 15 per cent being given Mesquite, Harrisburg and Crosbyton.

The commissioners of Jackson County have ordered a tractor and a one-man grader, which will be used on state highway No. 12, the main public road through Jackson County.

Production of lignite coal in Texas during the past year was estimated at 893,000 tons, and bituminous output at 361,000 tons, in the annual report of State Mine Inspector Bruce Gentry.

Approval of Cass County road district bonds totalling \$20,000 has been made by the attorney general. These bonds mature in 20 years, are redeemable in 20 and bear 5 1/2 per cent interest.

Houston taxpayers will be asked to increase their taxes on May 7 when an increase of 25c in the school tax will be submitted at a special election along with the projected \$3,000,000 bond issue for building schools.

Work on the highway, east to west, through Liberty County is to begin within a few days. Several carloads of material and equipment have reached Shecks, a small station near the boundary line of Harris and Liberty Counties.

Permit to do business in Texas has been granted to the Parks Producing Company, a West Virginia corporation, to operate a plant at Parks, Stephens County, to manufacture hydro-carbon gas, carbon black and byproducts from waste casinghead gas. Capitalization \$500,000.

Citizens of Vernon, Wilbarger County, which is an applicant for the location of the Texas Technological College, in a brief filed with the locating committee, offer a tract of 2,000 acres of land at a price not exceeding \$150,000. This land lies a half mile south of Vernon.

The Bryan-College Interurban Railway, an electric road between Bryan and the A. and M. College, was sold at auction a few days ago. The S. S. Hunter estate of Shreveport, La., bought the property for \$40,000. The Hunter estate was the largest original bond holder connected with the road.

A bond election has been called by the city council at El Campo to vote on the issuing of \$15,000 worth of bonds, \$10,000 for the purpose of building a city hall and fire station, \$3000 for street improvements and \$2000 for improvements in the city auditorium. The election has been called for May 15.

Approving bonds of depository banks for state funds approximating \$5,000,000 has been completed by the state depository board, Treasurer Terrell has announced. Terrell said that no further bonds of applicant banks will be considered by the board, the time for receiving bonds having expired on April 5.

At the instance of the controller, the attorney general is preparing forms for the collection of the 1c tax on gasoline. This tax began to run on April 1, and the controller expects to have the blanks for its collection by the end of the month. It is payable by the wholesalers. When the tax became effective on April 1 the price of gasoline advanced in varying amounts in different cities.

The state treasury has just paid the second \$100,000 warrant for the maintenance of the state prison system, leaving \$400,000 of the \$600,000 appropriation yet to be paid. It was said in the treasury that it would be some days before sufficient funds will accumulate to pay the third \$100,000 installment.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Marrs says that it is probable that an additional \$1 of the scholastic apportionment can be paid next month out of the state school taxes. The transfer will be made on Tuesday, May 1. Of the \$12, the schools have received \$10.50 of the apportionment. With \$1 paid in May only \$1.50 will remain unpaid.

The San Antonio, Medina Lake and Western railroad was granted a charter recently by the secretary of state following approval of incorporation papers by the attorney general. The new road is capitalized at \$150,000 and will run from San Antonio to San Angelo, connecting with the Orient at Sonora. The new road will complete a distance of 190 miles, giving San Antonio an outlet to the plains country not heretofore enjoyed.

The attorney general's department has ruled that the statutes passed by the thirty-eighth legislature require county judges, county commissioners, sheriffs and county clerks to execute new and different bonds within thirty days after the new acts take effect, even though such officers have already executed bonds and qualified for the present term of office. It was further held that such acts do not purport to operate on past conduct and are not retroactive legislation within the meaning of the constitution.



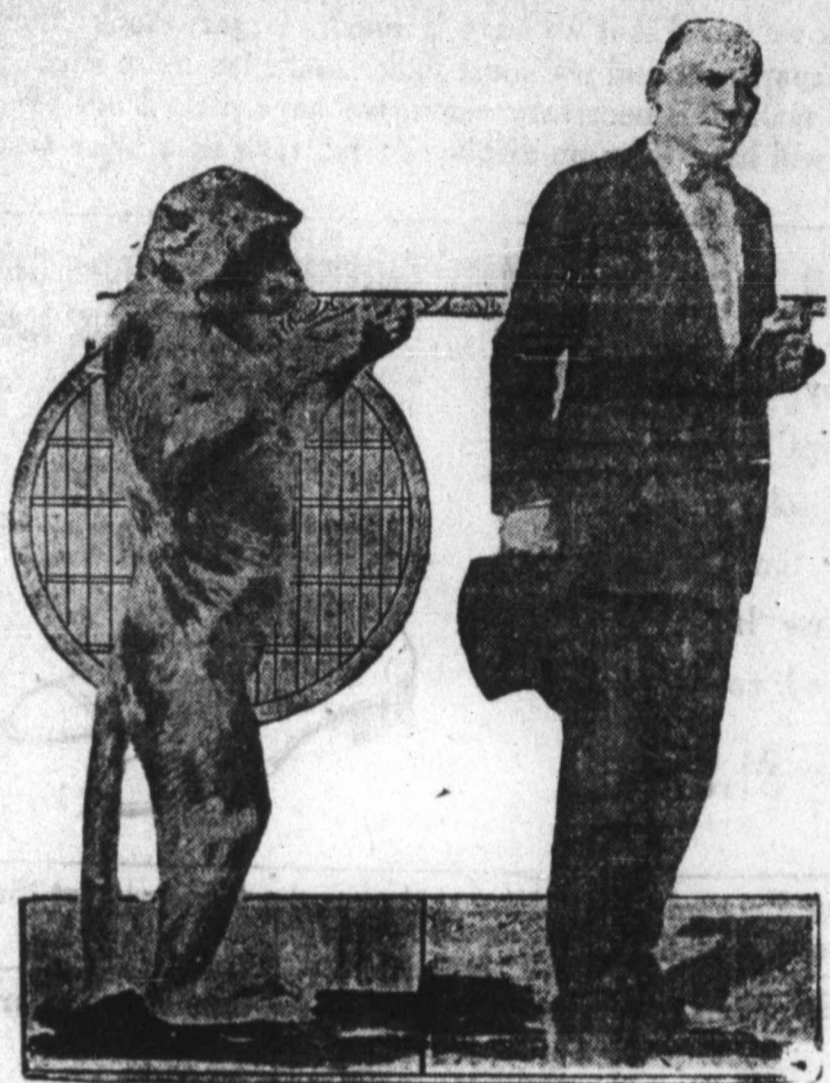

HOW TO SUCCEED WITH THE FARM FLOCK POULTRY

Many persons suddenly acquire the "poultry fever" and go into poultry production without learning how to do the work. They make large investments without proper knowledge and attention to the minute details,

and failure is the result. We must follow a few fundamental rules if we are to succeed.

Poultry authorities do not advise farmers and others to go extensively into poultry production work till they have learned how to select, cull breed and house and properly feed and care for their poultry. If one has not the time to go and take a ten-day poultry short course, or to learn in other ways how to do the work, he should not venture into poultry raising.

It is best for the farmer to put his small farm flock of 50 to 100 birds on a paying basis. Then later after succeeding with the small flock the poultry department of the farm can be increased and made larger. Commercial work on a large scale can then be gone into.

The poultry department of the farm can be made the best paying of all the departments. The money turnover is quick. Cockerels are sold as fryers at 8 to 10 weeks old. Pullets from high producing stock will

begin laying at 5 to 6 months of age. Poultry products, either eggs or table fowls, can be sold every week in the year.

Persons desiring more information about poultry work can secure it from many sources as follows:

At poultry short courses, the student handles trapped birds and learns how to cull his flock; helps build a poultry house, candles, grades and packs eggs for market, caponizes, mixes feeds, and many other things.

Through correspondence and bulletins from the Poultry Department of his Experiment Station and Agricultural College.

Through extension workers, such as poultry associations, county and home demonstration agents.

Through text books on poultry as used by the agricultural colleges and high schools.

From farm and poultry papers. Through correspondence courses—The Progressive Farmer.

HOW LONG TO STAY

AN INVITATION to have luncheon with a friend or to attend a formal luncheon is not an invitation to spend the entire afternoon. At least, in smart society nowadays, it is not considered necessary to remain more than a quarter of an hour after the meal has been concluded, nor is it courteous to remain more than three-quarters of an hour unless the hostess has especially requested her guests to do so. It may be that the hostess has some other social engagement for the afternoon. She may have calls to make or a tea to attend. If she is a busy woman, with professional or household duties to attend to, she certainly will not want you to linger. In fact, sometimes busy folk invite their acquaintances to luncheon because, since they must take time to lunch anyway, they lose no time that way. So usually, unless the hostess expects you to leave shortly after luncheon, she indicates this in her invitation. If she is giving a formal luncheon she indicates that there will be music or cards or something of that sort after luncheon. Otherwise it is best to linger not over three-quarters of an hour.

But except among persons with very crowded engagement books a dinner invitation means the entire evening. That is, in fashionable society dinner guests usually remain until nearly eleven o'clock or later. It certainly is not very flattering to any one to hurry away from a dinner engagement to the theater or a dance when the meal has just been concluded. If a dance occurs the same evening it is possible to "drop in" following the dinner but it would be far better to be late to the dance than to be too abrupt in leaving the dinner party.

Now, for folks who are not in so-called fashionable society a lot depends on the habits and mode of living of the persons entertained and the persons who entertain. In certain suburban sections where it is taken for granted that most of the men have to catch early trains in the morning it is customary and in good form to leave after a dinner party fairly early. Ten o'clock is late enough. One should always try to learn the custom in this matter as it is extremely inconsiderate to remain after the usual bedtime of the persons who are entertaining you. Casual evening callers ought to be especially careful to leave in good time.


