Farm Activity Due As Result Of Good Rains

Activity on Eastland County farms was due to move into high gear soon as the result of a general rain that left from 2.3 to 4 inches of moisture over this region last Sunday and Monday.

Preparation of land for planting row crops was to start as soon as fields are dry enough for equipment to move in. Pastures and spring grains benefited materially by the good rains.

Rain gauges in this region

showed measurements as follows: Cisco 2.7 inches, Eastland 2.9 inches, Ranger 2.6 inches, Olden 3.4 inches, Rising Star 2.6 inches, Gorman 2.3 inches, Lake Cisco 3.9 inches, and Scranton 2.5 inches.

Lake Leon was near spillway level after the new water came in via the Leon River. Lake Cisco gained a foot of new water. Other small lakes and stock tanks were in excellent condition. No hail or damage was reported in the county.

Nancy Justice Receives FHA Honor at State Meet

Miss Nancy Justice, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Justice of Carbon, received her State Homemakers Degree of Achievement at the State Future Homemakers meeting held April 22-24 in Dallas. The ceremony was held at the Music Hall, State Fair Park, April 23.

Receiving her Junior Degree of Achievement her freshman year, 1963, and her Chapter Degree in 1964, she has held the office of fourth vice-president of the Carbon chapter, and presently holds the office of second vice president; also, she has been elected president for the coming year. At the state meeting, she served as one of the song leaders.

Aside from her FHA activities, Nancy is active in sports, serves as assistant editor of the annual, secretary-treasurer of the junior class and serves as Sunday School pianist for the Methodist Church.

Nancy was one of 311 girls from over the state to receive her degree of achievement. Each girl was presented a torch, a certificate and a rose.

Closing the ceremony was a reading given by Mrs. Lexie Dean Robinson of Rising Star, who was later chosen as Poet Laureate of the State of Texas.

Courthouse Dedication Is Remembered

The dedication of Eastland County Court House was recalled recently by H. J. Tanner from one of the programs distributed that day, May 30, 1929, when the new building was dedicated to soldiers of Eastland County who served and were killed during World War I.

Today, in the court house, remains a memorial tablet some ten feet by six feet in size, containing the names of those soldiers, according to Mr. Tanner.

Construction of the court house began Jan. 1, 1928, and was completed Dec. 1, 1928, at the cost of \$312,000. Present the day of its dedication were the late Judge Hickman, chief justice of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals; and W. P. Leslie and O. C. Funderburk, both members of the Appeals Court.

The program was introduced by the late Judge Clyde Garrett and memorial services were conducted by the American Legion.

Browsing With Bev

This article will begin a series of articles on identifying fabrics and working with and caring for fabrics.

One of the easiest ways to classify fabrics is by families — learn the family name and the trade-names in that particular family: Example: Polyester — Family or Generic Name

Trade-Mark Names — Dacron, Fortel, Kodol, Vycron.

Trade-names for man-made fibers designate the producer. There may be several trade names in one family of fibers. Natural fibers are sold only by their family names — Cotton, Linen, Silk, and Wool — they have no trade-names.

You can learn the characteristics for each family and the care instructions and use these in buying and caring for any of the trade-mark names (or members) of the family.

Example: The fabrics in the Polyester family are easily

washable, need little ironing or pressing. Oily stains should be removed, before washing.

By keeping this in mind you would know that any member of the Polyester family, whether it be Dacron, Fortel, Kodol or Vycron, is washable and will need little ironing, etc.

This information is good to learn and keep in mind, as it will help you in buying ready made garments, as well as fabrics from the bolt.

Next week we'll take a look at the natural fibers and study their characteristics and how to care for them.

May I suggest you clip these articles and save the whole series so you can refer back to them from time to time.

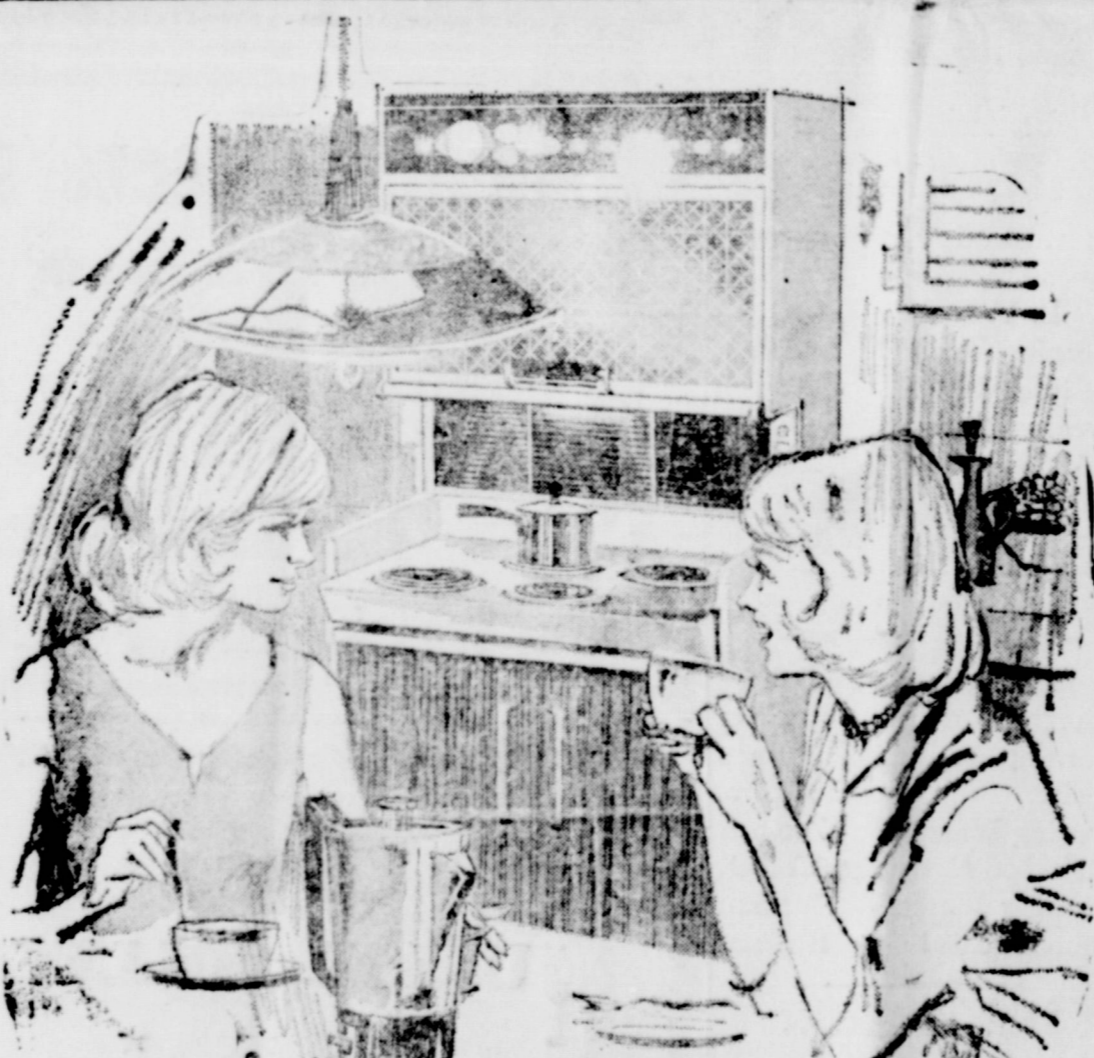
