Browsing With Bev

Recent studies indicate an increase by consumers in mail order buying. Apparel buying tops the list of mail order purchases. Sales of 10 per cent or more above a year ago have been reported by the "big four" mail order houses.

Appeals are in the terms of price — with a net saving of 7 per cent over its store price estimated by one mail order house. Other factors are the convenience of home shopping, quick delivery, telephone orders, and fashion merchandise — including creations of leading designers.

Catalogues of the mail order firms have been tailored for more sophisticated audiences. The catalogues are larger and more attractive, and there are more color illustrations. The current trend is for an increase in the number of catalogue order stores.

Other trends in apparel buying reported by trade repre-

sentatives are an expansion of door-to-door selling, emphasizing the convenience it offers the suburban homemaker with young children. Expansion in the clothing and textiles field includes door-to-door selling of fabrics, rugs and draperies.

Discounters are expanding again, with an average of seven new discount stores a week estimated by the trade. Discounters tend to operate their own stores, and they do not seem eager to take over the shoe departments or the millinery departments, according to studies.

The kind of cleanser you use on your bathroom fixtures can have a decided bearing on how well the finish lasts. A harsh, gritty cleanser will soon scratch and mar the surface.

Try this test to check the abrasiveness of a cleanser: Put a small amount of cleanser between two pieces of glass. Rub them together. If the glass is scratched, the cleanser is too harsh to use on the bathroom fixtures.

Notary Public Requirements Spelled Out by State Official

Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1967, must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between May 1, 1965 and May 15, 1965, inclusive.

Martin emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk before May 20, 1965. Application during this period will assure that the appointment will be made in sufficient time for the appli-

cant to qualify at the beginning of the new term.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.

Farm Bureau Opposed To Allotted Acre Transfer

A resolution against transferring peanut allotments was approved by the board of directors of the Eastland County Farm Bureau at their regular monthly meeting May 3rd at the office in Eastland. Eighteen directors were present with President Jack Cozart presiding.

The national administration's farm program as introduced in HR-7097 was opposed by the board. The county directors would like to freeze peanut allotments within the county, opposing the selling of

allotted acreage.

"If HR-7097 passes, the secretary of agriculture will have authority to permit the sale, lease or transfer of acreage allotments, according to Chairman Mitchell Campbell of the policy development committee.

The Farm Bureau will sponsor one volunteer fireman from each town of the county to the Fireman's Training School at Texas A&M University next July 25-30, it was decided. The Texas Farm Bureau helped send 110 firemen to the school last year, President Cozart reported.

Mr. Horton died at 2:30 a. m. Monday in the Eastland Hospital of a heart attack after entering the hospital shortly before midnight.

A wholesale tire dealer, he represented Seiberling Tire Co. and was one of the oldest Seiberling dealers in the nation having started in 1919.
