## MITCHELL ONLY GAP ON STATE HIGHWAY NO. ONE

As the result of the election held in Taylor and Nolan counties last week at which large bonds issues to finance permanent improvement to the Bankhead Highway, designated as State Highway No. 1, and other public thoroughfares in those counties, Mitchell is placed in the attitude of being the only county traversed by the route across the State in which no definite action has been undertaken to improve the highway. This fact was pointed out Tuesday by Chamber of Commerce officials who recalled the statement of Dr. P. C. Coleman, president of the chamber, recently, when he stated that Mitchell County would be made the goat and must under all conditions do something to improve its highway and public road system, in case Nolan and Taylor counties authorized the pending bond issue.

The election in Taylor county was held Tuesday of last week and carried eight to one in favor of a bond issue for \$350,000 to improve the Bankhead and other highways in that county. The Nolan election was held Saturday and at the rate of five to one the voters authorized a bond issue of \$600,000 for permanent road improvement. In Callahan county an issue of \$200,000 was authorized by an overwhelming majority a few weeks ago. In each of these three counties the State and Federal departments will participate at the rate of two dollars for every one authorized locally for improvement on designated highways.

Extending from Mitchell County both east and west, the Bankhead has either been permanently improved with paved roadbed or bond issues authorized for the same from one side of the State to the other. Over the distance of one thousand miles from Texarkana to El Paso, the only gap unprovided for lies within the borders of Mitchell county, it was claimed. Work is progressing on the roadbed through Palo Pinto County and this county is building one of the best roads in the Southwest. At a cost of \$35,000 per mile, a brick highway supported by limestone base will be built across the county. The highway over the distance of one hundred miles across the counties of Callahan, Taylor and Nolan is to be of the penetration paved type, the same as used in Parker and Tarrant counties.

Just what action will be taken to meet the road condition in Mitchell County is not known. It is pointed out by county and Chamber of Commerce officials and others, however, that something definite must be done

## MITCHELL COUNTY HAS PART IN WACO EXHIBIT

Agricultural products from Mitchell County are being shown at the Waco Cotton Palace by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Included in the selection obtained from this county by B. M. Whitaker, exhibit manager for the organization, are watermelons, kaffir corn, cotton and apples. Several other West Texas counties contributed specimens for the exhibit.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has shown an all-west Texas exhibit at the Cotton Palace during the past three years and has won first place each time, receiving a prize of \$1,000 in cash. This year West Texas has strong competition for this honor by Central Texas interests, who are showing a splendid exhibit collected from counties in the black land belt of the state.

Miss Georgia Laceywell, home demonstration agent of Mitchell County, visited the Cotton Palace on short time Saturday while en route from Hamilton to Dallas to take charge of the booth showing this county's exhibit and she was frank to state that "West Texas will again carry off the highest honors at Waco." Of course the conclusion of Miss Laceywell is not by any means official and the judges may find different, but here's hoping.

## WORK OF RED CROSS HERE PRAISED BY HOMER WADE

Speaking before a gathering of officials and workers associated with the American Red Cross at Ft. Worth recently, Homer D. Wade, assistant manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, spoke at length upon the disaster relief and rehabilitation work of the organization in Mitchell County, in illustrating the fact that the Red Cross should receive full co-operation and confidence of the people of the Southwest.

"The best evidence we have of the unchallenged merits of this great benevolent organization," Wade stated, "is shown in its records of service to humanity wherever disaster or want has stalked, or the appeal of the sick and injured has been heard. The character of service done in Mitchell County, following upon the heels of the cyclone there last spring, has its introductory and conclusion written, along the lines of the highest merit possible for human endeavor to attain.

"One of the outstanding policies of the Red Cross in its work among these storm victims was to do every task confronted well and efficiently, and in the spirit of a strong man lifting a fallen brother to his feet again with all the tenderness of the most devoted mother to ever preside over a household. Every task was well done and the people of Mitchell County who today love the name of American Red Cross most are those who fell before the attack of the storm and were placed upon their footing again by the Great Mother of Them All."

Among Red Cross officials to attend the meeting were Henry M. Baker of St. Louis, director disaster relief for the Southwestern division, and Mrs. Mitchell, who was in charge of the office maintained here during the relief and rehabilitation work. At the conclusion of the address of Mr. Wade, Mrs. Mitchell, with tears bursting from her eyes, clasped the hand of the speaker and thanked him for his reference to the work in Mitchell County, exclaiming that the people there were very near and dear to her heart.

Publication of final financial statement of receipts and disbursements of funds handled by the organization here as submitted by Henry M. Baker, director disaster relief appears in another column of the Record. The report is approved by an auditing committee composed of E. M. Baldwin, T. W. Stoneroad and Thos. R. Smith.

Announcement of election of two new members was made by Col. C. M. Adams, president. They are Judge J. C. Hall and R. B. Terrell. These two cubs are to receive their introduction into the den Friday.

Adams stated Tuesday that representatives of at least two different concerns interested in building an ice plant at Colorado would meet with the club Friday. Warner of Claude, nationally known author and lecturer; Dr. J. D. Sandefer of Abilene, president Simmons College; Dr. Morelock, president Sul Ross State Teachers Normal School at Alpine; Dr. J. W. Hunt, president of McMurry College, Abilene; Dr. Jesse P. Sewell, president Abilene Christian College and Hon. Morris Sheppard, senior Texas senator, are expected to attend and deliver addresses, but had not confirmed the promise to do so late Wednesday.

## MITCHELL FARM BOYS AT STATE FAIR LAST WEEK

Frank O'Neal and Noel Bedford, two of the three Mitchell County club boys receiving highest awards at the recent Mitchell County Fair, spent Tuesday and Wednesday of last week attending the State Fair at Dallas as guests of the management. The boys were accompanied by W. A. Dulin, county farm agent.

The young agriculturalists spent two strenuous days at the fair, according to Dulin, and each received a wonderful store of valued information as to crop selection, cultivation, etc., and as to the breeding and care of livestock. They participated in two judging events, that of judging grain sorghums and livestock.

Completing a visit to the most interesting departments on the fair grounds, the boys, together with more than three hundred other club boys from over the State were taken for a visit to some of the larger industrial concerns of Dallas. They were shown through the Dallas News building and watched the huge presses turning out papers, visited Butler Bros. and were carried to the top of the Magnolia Building, which towers high above Dallas' sky line. The boys were given the trips to Dallas by the Mitchell County Fair Association.

## MITCHELL CO CLUB GIRLS WIN HONORS AT STATE FAIR

Mitchell County club girls won a total of eight ribbons on entries in the Girls Home Demonstration department at the State Fair at Dallas and all of the other entries made by girls from this county were given mention of merit by the fair management and the judges. The specimens exhibited were collected and shipped to Dallas under personal direction of Miss Georgia Laceywell, home demonstration agent.

Elna Crabtree of several miles northwest of Colorado won especially commendable honors at the fair on a pen of poultry entered by her. With an entry of five birds Miss Crabtree carried off a complete sweepstake, winning five ribbons, two of them being first place awards. She won first on cockerel, first, second, third and fourth on pullets. Other club girls to win honors were: Nannie Robinson, first on fancy puke peas; Erin Hallman, second on one pint of chili sauce; Mallie Cornett, third on one pint of chili sauce.

The success of these girls in competition with other club girls from over the State, many of them in the work for several years, is indeed commendable, a representative of the Chamber of Commerce stated Thursday morning. The fact that these girls have only been in the work one year and were able to defeat competitors from the leading counties of Central and East Texas, where home demonstration work has been taught for years reflects the efficiency of the agent in this county.

## RETURNING FROM DALLAS MONDAY MORNING, W. S. COOPER, WHO ACCOMPANIED THE AGRICULTURAL EXHIBIT FROM MITCHELL COUNTY TO THE FAIR AND WAS IN CHARGE OF THE SAME THE FIRST WEEK, STATED HE WAS HIGHLY PLEASED WITH THE PLACE WON BY MITCHELL COUNTY UNDER THE CONDITIONS. A PART OF THE PRODUCTS TO BE SHOWN IN THE EXHIBIT WAS DELAYED IN TRANSIT AND WAS NOT DELIVERED UNTIL TUESDAY AFTERNOON, WHEN THE SCORE CARD REQUIRED ALL SPECIMENS TO BE ON THE BOARD BY 9:30 O'CLOCK SATURDAY MORNING BEFORE. BECAUSE OF THIS FACT, WE WERE UNABLE TO FILL THE SCORE CARD AND UNDER THE RULES WERE PENALIZED.

"The quality of Mitchell County products scored well," he said. "For instance, Mitchell county scored higher points on cotton, grain sorghums and peanuts than did Floyd county, and this county was awarded second place by the judges. Aside from the slight damage to the cotton and maize from rain, these products were considered at par with the best on exhibit in the agricultural department. Had we collected the products shown before the rains and again had all of the shipments reached Dallas in time, allowing us to fill out the score card, the award received by this county would have been considerably higher up in the line of awards than it was. Mitchell was given twenty-third place and in this we defeated some of the best counties of the State, among them Trinity, Colorado, Howard and Lynn."

Membership of the Lions club at Colorado and Abilene are to hold a joint meeting at the Hotel Wright in Sweetwater on the evening of November 16, according to plans being formulated by committees representing the two organizations. The committees held a conference in Sweetwater recently and after naming November 16 as the date for the joint meeting, named an additional committee to arrange a program for the evening. This committee is composed of M. S. Goldman and W. S. Cooper of Colorado and Dr. Maddox, president, and Secretary McCarty of the Abilene club. This committee is to meet at Sweetwater some time next week.

The program, in so far as local and Abilene Lions are concerned, will be short, Mr. Goldman stated Monday. Goldman explained this would be done in order to give most of the evening to Col. Louis C. Perry of Terrell, district governor of Lions clubs, who is to deliver an address before the assembly. Goldman stated that members of the Lions club at Snyder and forty citizens of Sweetwater would attend the meeting as guests. Selection of the guests at Sweetwater are to be made by Hon. Joe H. Boothe, mayor, and John McCurdy, secretary Board of City Development.

The joint meeting will be the direct result of a suggestion made by Col. Perry during an address delivered in Colorado recently at the last ladies night banquet of the local club. He suggested that the clubs should fraternize more than they do and acting upon this recommendation, Col. C. M. Adams, president Colorado club, and Dr. Maddox, president, Abilene club, appointed a joint committee to arrange for the Sweetwater meeting. It is estimated that 175 men will attend the banquet.

## FIRST STONE IN NEW COURT HOUSE IS PLACED MONDAY

The first stone to go into the base trim of the outside walls of Mitchell County's new \$115,000 court house was placed Monday morning. When this stone is placed around the building laying of brick and placing frames for the outside openings will be commenced. The last concrete for structural forms was poured last week and the wooden forms have been torn down.

## COLORADO GIN RECEIPTS NEAR 10,000 BALE MARK

Gin receipts at Colorado Thursday morning at nine o'clock were given a 9,408 bales for the season and at that time about 150 bales were on the yards at the six plants awaiting to be ginned. The total is expected to approximate 10,000 bales by the end of this week.

Seed were quoted at the gins Thursday morning at \$36.00 a ton. Staple was quoted by street buyers on Thursday morning at 29.30, middling basis and because of the good grades maintained by cotton marketed here and keen competition among local buyers, the price during Wednesday and Thursday morning was centered around 30 cents.

W. W. Porter, secretary of the Mitchell County Farm Bureau, stated Thursday morning that the association had pooled 3,500 bales of cotton from among members in this county. This is a material increase over the amount pooled by the association at this time last year. In speaking of the growth of the Bureau Cotton Association in Texas, Porter stated: "Cotton receipts by the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association through October 17th amounted to 120,890 bales, an increase of 65,609 over the amount of cotton received on the same date last year, at which time 55,287 bales had been received. The amount of cotton received so far this year exceeds by 41,190 bales the amount of cotton received during all of the 1922 season. Last year a total of 77,706 bales were handled cooperatively by the association."

## COLORADO-ABILENE LIONS TO MEET IN SWEETWATER

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## SLOAN AND UNDERWRITERS ADD TWO NEW PRODUCERS

O'Neal No 1 of the Sloan Oil Company and Morrison 4 of the Underwriters Producing and Refining Company are being drilled in this week and showing at each is reported favorable by the owners. The O'Neal well was drilling at 3040 feet Thursday after penetrating the Morrison sand 80 feet. The hole was standing 1000 feet in fluid. S. A. Sloan, president of the company, stated Thursday morning that he had every reason to believe the well would show up for good production. At Morrison Four, the crew was dilling in the sand with 1500 feet of oil in the hole. The showing here is also good and pumps for good commercial production are expected.

Bill Thompson's Budget No. 1, a material extension to the field on the northeast, continues to hold considerable attention among local oil men. The well is good for commercial production, although no test has yet been made. Tubing is being shipped to the field for this well and it will be placed on pump and connected with pipe line.

The California Company were planning to give the A. L. Miller One, a nitro shot Thursday. This well, offsetting Sloan Oil Company's Smartt One, is reported as being down 3011 feet well into the Morrison sand and is showing for the average pump production.

Sloan Oil Company are spudding their Smartt No. 2 in section 21, a test located well within proven territory. Good reports were given from all drilling and pumping wells in the field and pipe line run oil was placed at one of the highest figures in history of production here.

Judge C. H. Earnest, A. C. Gist, W. W. Watson and others are blocking acreage north of Colorado on which a test will be drilled. This will be the first test located in that vicinity and will be watched with keen interest by local oil men.

## FIRE KEY RATE DUE FOR 3 PER CENT REDUCTION

A course in fire prevention will be added to the course of study in the Colorado public schools, this department to be added within the immediate future, it was announced Monday by Mrs. Annie M. Poulson of Austin, inspector for the fire prevention department, State fire insurance commission. Mrs. Poulson spent the day here inspecting the public schools, other public buildings and in conference with local agents.

"This course will be started in the schools just as soon as the required books can be received from Austin," the inspector stated, "and plans are being worked out for enrolling children in all grades, from the third through the various grades to and including seniors." Mrs. Poulson stated that statistics compiled by her department showed that ninety per cent of the fires in Texas last year had their origin in unnecessary causes. "It is the determination of the State fire insurance commission to conduct an educational campaign among the school children of the state in the hope to eliminate much of this annual destruction of property."

The reduction in the key rate here is to become effective the date on which the special course is taken up in the schools.

## FORT WORTH MAN TAKES MAXWELL-CHALMERS AGENCY

W. J. Harris, until recently associated with the Fort Worth offices of the General Motors Company, has taken over the agency of Maxwell and Chalmers cars and trucks for Mitchell County and will maintain sales headquarters at Colorado. Harris arrived from Fort Worth Friday and for the present is located at the Dobbs Garage.

Dirt for a new brick, on Second street opposite the First Christian church, was broken Wednesday and this building will be occupied by Harris. The building is being erected by J. E. Stowe of Abilene.

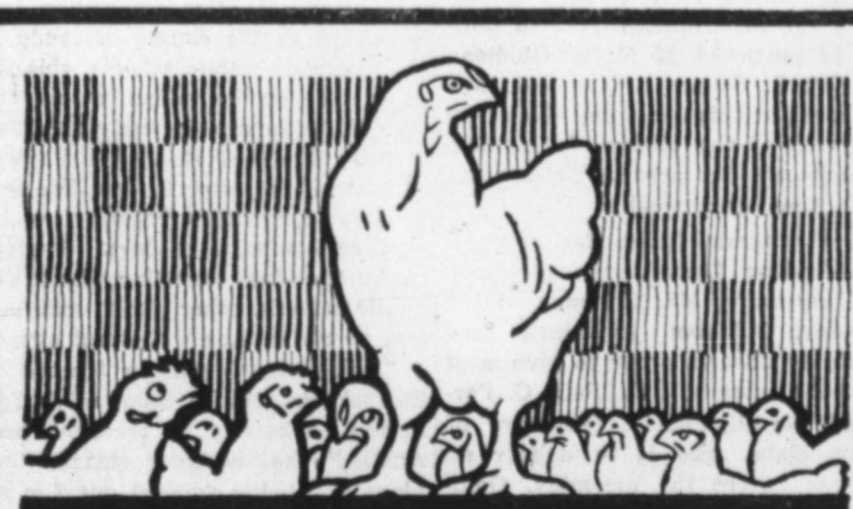

to remove the stigma of Iatan Flats and make permanent improvement to the principal cardinal roads of the county.

"The State Highway Commission, which is to take over maintenance of all designated highways in the State January first, will maintain them to only the standard in which they were received." County Judge J. C. Hall stated Tuesday, and Mitchell County cannot hope to receive any relief aside from the saving of maintenance cost through this change. It is certain the department will not make any improvements to the highway. The only course to pursue, if we would do as all other counties traversed by the Bankhead Highway have done and make permanent improvement possible over the route as suggested in a bond issue."

The fact that Mitchell County has the proffer of two dollars for every one voted should appeal to a great majority of citizens of the county, an official of the Chamber of Commerce stated. The State and Federal departments have pledged this ratio to the three counties east of us, and will do the same in this county when we get ready to finance building the Bankhead Highway, he continued. It was explained that the state and federal aid applied only to designated highways and that any improvement to other roads of the county must be met wholly by local finances.

"This fact by no means alters the necessity of incorporating all of the principal public roads of the county into any extensive road construction program we may inaugurate," the official continued. "To be sure the aid of our designated highway is an attractive inducement to the citizenship of Mitchell County to vote a bond issue, but there are other roads of like importance and which must be provided for in that every citizen have access to good roads to and from his trading and market center."

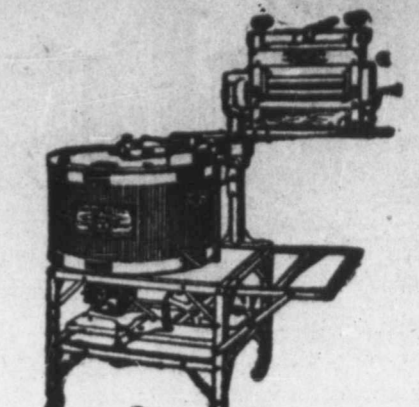

**Presbyterian Movement.**

Several cities have named dates in the statewide movement for Christian education now being conducted by the Presbyterians of Texas for \$1,350,000 for their schools and colleges. CHRISTMAS SEALS. AUSTIN, Oct. 23.—Six hundred and thirty-six miles of Tuberculosis Christmas Seals for the 16th Annual Seal sale in Texas have been received by the Texas Public Health Association and its local associations.

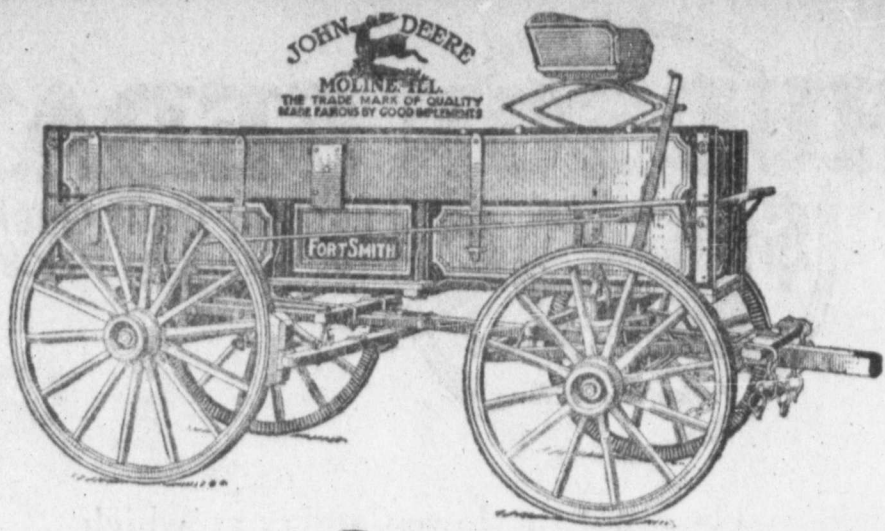

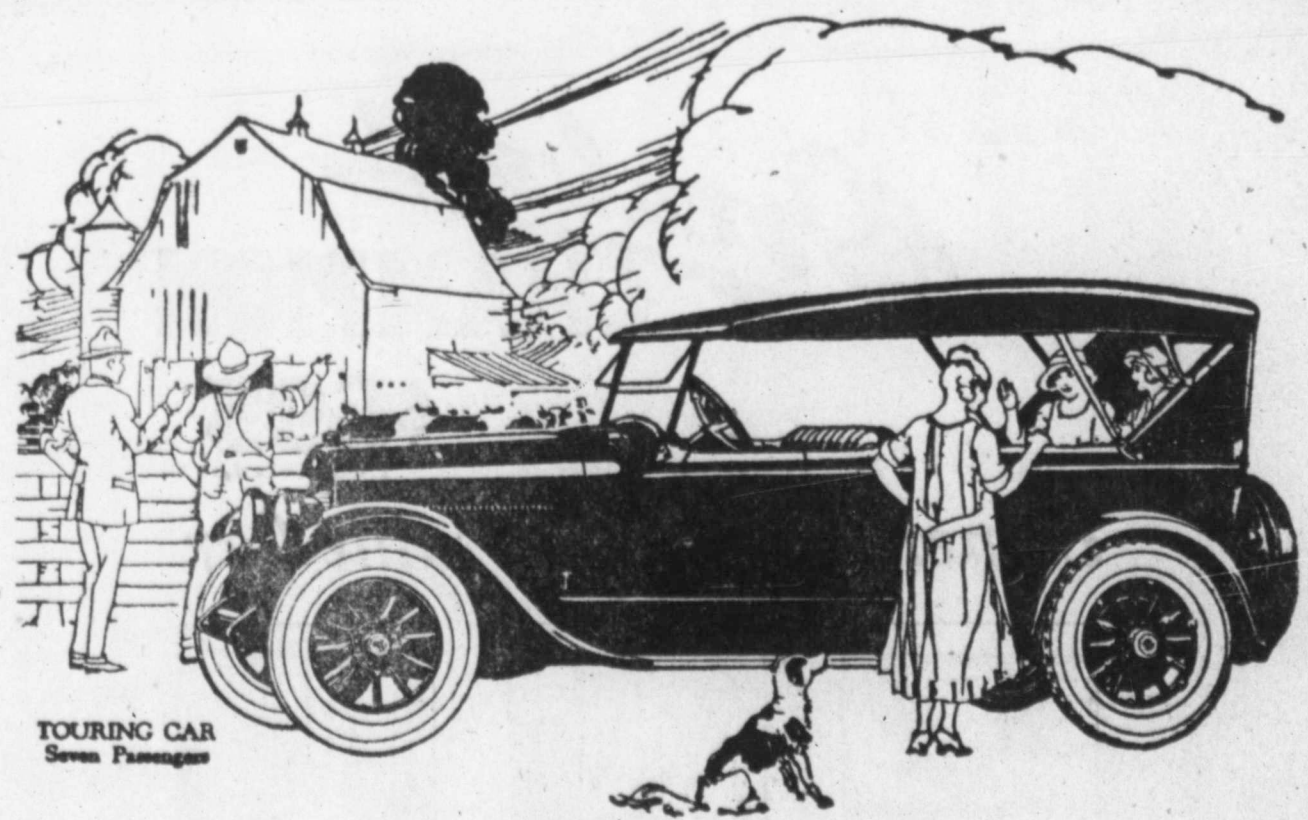
