Few Old Timers Remember Storm That Wrecked City In Year 1893

The devastation and horror of the cyclone which swept the small town of Cisco 72 years ago is still recalled by a few old timers here, and each April 23, the anniversary sary of the storm, the story is told again.

Longtime residents of Cisco, even though not living at that time, are familiar with details of the story, gleaned from a variety of sources but all describing the anxiety and fear that gripped the town on that unforgotten day.

The weather was clear and warm with a strong southerly wind which subsided in the afternoon. Business was conducted as usual in the bank, four dry goods stores, three grocery stores, two drug stores, the cotton gin, and even in the saloon. The usual discussions went on at the livery stable and two wagon yards, and the two weekly newspapers were busily competing for the latest news. Other buildings in the little town included four churches, two public school

Former Carbon Resident Dies In California

Friends here have received word of the death of Mrs. W. F. Jenne who died at the home of her son, Billy T. Jenne, of 1010 West Q. St. in Wilmington, Calif., on April 6, at the age of 98.

Mrs. Jenne resided in the Carbon area for more than 40 years before going to make her home with her son and daughter-in-law, the former Jewel Haynes, in 1941. She became a school teacher early in life and served in Texas public schools both before and after her marriage more than 25 years.

She was married to William F. Jenne May 17, 1899 and both taught near Carbon until the early 1900's and lived on a farm south of town. Both were members of the Carbon Baptist Church where Mrs. Jenne had kept her membership. Mr. Jenne died in 1917 and is buried in the Carbon Cemetery.

Mrs. Jenne was employed by the Carbon Messenger for many years by the late J. S. Davis, former owner, and by W. M. Dunn, present owner.

Survivors are the son and one daughter, Mrs. Leo T. Murray (Zoe Ellen) of Holland, Michigan, two sisters, three grandchildren and foor great grandchildren.

buildings, an opera house, city water system office, and one Chinese laundry.

There were no telephones, electricity, gas, automobiles, or hospital, but outside means of communication included a telegraph and mail once daily from each direction.

About 6 p.m. a warning of the impending storm appeared in the form of two thunderheads, one in the west and one in the north. These were accompanied by an awsome display of lightening, thunder and blowing rain and hail, followed by a period of calm as darkness closed over the town. The cyclone arrived with terrifying force and deafening sound as it dipped and tore through the town, leaving death and destruction in its wake, revealed almost immediately by

radiant moonlight.

Twenty persons were dead, including five children in one family, and many were seriously injured. Recollections of those who tell the story are that four physicians worked through the night attending the injured; friends and neighbors of those who lost everything responded with what help they could offer; and others searched the debrisstrewn streets for missing persons and answered the calls of the injured for help.

Stunned by the catastrophe and awed by the display of the mighty forces of nature, those who were witnesses that night had the scene indelibly imprinted in their memories. And so the events of April 23, 1893, became an inseparable tale in the archive of Cisco's history.

Fund Still Short In County Screw Worm Program

Two thirds of the \$3,100 quota in the current screw worm eradication fund drive has been collected from Eastland County ranchers and live-stock men, according to Oscar Schaefer, Cook, chairman of the animal health committee.

Glyn Gilliam, Ranger banker and treasurer for the committee, recently informed Schaefer that he had sent a check for \$1,921.87 to the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, Dallas, sponsor for the screw worm elimination program in the state.

"We are grateful for the many contributions on this program," Schaefer said.

"This is one of the finest programs that we have ever had in the livestock business and I am confident that we will go over the top in the fund raising campaign," he continued.

Many ranchers have said that the savings in time, labor, wear and tear on the cars and pickup trucks, gas, oil and medications as well as freedom from the frustrations of looking for, catching and doctoring wormy animals has been tremendous in Eastland and all other counties in the state.

Reports from the various banks indicate that Eastland has reported a total of \$271.15 collected for the fund. Others are Cisco \$372.37; Gorman with \$629.20; Rising Star \$435.-24 and Ranger \$426.66.

Schaefer gave thanks to all committees who have worked to make the drive successful. He urged those who have not been contacted for their contribution to take it to their bank in the next several days. Any bank in the county will accept the contribution he said.

EASTLAND COUNTY has 23,200 acres of wheat and small grain planted according to a report issued by the Texas Employment Commission. Of the total, 4,200 acres is in wheat; 15,000 acres in cats; 1,000 in barley; and 3,000 in rye. There are 4,490,811 acres of wheat and small grain seeded in the state, the report shows.

Homemakers who are planning to paper a room this spring may be doing some fancy figuring to determine how much to buy. This information can help persons figure the needs for a given

A single roll of wallpaper covers 36 square feet, and a double roll, 72.

Figure the area of each wall - the height times the width - and add these together. Subtract the area of each window and door opening. Multiply by 1.1 - to take care of waste and matching.

You now have the area to be covered. So divide this by 72 or 36, depending on which size roll you wish to buy single or double.

Ironing will go much faster and the results will look smoother if an ironing board is well-padded. Use two or three thin sheets of cotton padding instead of one, and see how much faster the ironing goes.

Treat a good egg right. Keep it clean, covered and cold. Study the label on the carton before you buy eggs.

A basic rule, whether you're cooking eggs in water, frying pan or oven: Cook them with low to moderate, even heat. Like all protein foods, eggs cooked at too high a heat become tough and leathery.

However you serve it—with shortcake, on ice cream or all by itself in a sauce dish—frozen fruit tastes best if it's thawed in its sealed container. It also has better color. Texture is best if you leave a few ice crystals in the fruit.

You can thaw frozen fruit any of three ways — in the refrigerator, at room temperature, or in a pan of cool water. How long it takes depends on the method you choose.

A 1-pound package of fruit packed in syrup will take 6 to 8 hours to thaw in a refrigerator. You can shorten the time to 2 to 4 hours if you leave the package at room temperature on your counter top. And for hurry-up thawing — ½ to 1 hour — place the container in a pan of cool water. One thing to remember, though. Unsweetened fruit takes a little longer to thaw than sirup or sugarsweetened fruit.

Zachery Co., from the local crushing plant near the Power Plant Lake, and to be used in experiments of treating peanut soil. The Zachery company is turning out abut 95 per cent pure Imiestone from the rocks being crushed here, the agent reports.
