DOMESTIC

Julian Sterling, 79, widely known newspaper correspondent and writer, is dead. He was one of F. T. Bar-num's first publicity agents.

Archibald Roosevelt, son of the former President, has sailed for Bermuda for a three weeks' vacation at the home of his cousin, George Roosevelt. He was accompanied by his wife.

Mrs. Blanche Tullock of Schenectady, N. Y., is in the Jefferson hospital in Philadelphia for an operation for the removal of a tooth which has been lodged in her right lung for three years.

A committee of 50 will control the price of corn in America if the National Farmers' Union succeeds in its plan outlined in Kankakee, Ill., at the convention of Corn Belt farmers by Paul B. Talbot of Des Moines, Iowa.

Mrs. Isaac Goldberg, widow of Highland park, sued for her dower right in her husband's \$125,000 estate. She admits signing away her dower claim before marriage, but asserts she was unable to read.

The 1924 Hand Book of Automobiles, issued by the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, shows illustrations of 212 models of cars. The total number of car models and truck chassis listed is 738.

Rabbi William Armhold, 95 years old, the oldest rabbi in the United States and reader emeritus of Keneth Israel Temple, Philadelphia, died in Atlantic City recently. His ministerial career stretched over a period of 63 years.

Lieutenant V. F. Grant, U. S. N., broke the American seaplane speed record recently when he won the Curtis marine trophy race, under National Aeronautic Association auspices, at an average speed of 116.1 miles an hour. The distance was 200 kilometers.

In addition to possessing possibly the largest poultry farm in the world, Bowie, Texas, is beginning to get ahead on the turkey industry. Though turkeys as a rule require an unusual range to make rapid propagation, Bowie during the past year shipped ten carloads of the Thanksgiving bird.

The Interchurch World Movement of North America, Inc., has wound up its affairs with all debts paid and a cash balance on hand of \$2,548.28, according to a report just made public. This was made possible, it was announced through the gift of \$1,403,000 by John D. Rockefeller Jr., and the redemption subscription pledges of thousands of small contributors.

Know Texas! Sixty miles northwest of Pecos stands the highest mountain peak in the south. It is Guadalupe peak—9,500 feet high. It stands out among its fellow as a giant among dwarfs. It has been ascended by few. Within a short distance of it are the Carlsbad Mammoth caves—the largest in the world—which the Federal Government has taken over. They will be nationalized and every gorgeous cavern explored and made easily accessible to the tourists.

WASHINGTON

Participation by the United States in two Latin-American conferences is provided under resolutions by Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee adopted by the Senate. The meetings are the seventh Pan-American Sanitary Conference at Havana, next November, and the Inter-American Committee on Electrical Communications at Mexico City, March 27.

The ship liquor treaty between the United States and Great Britain, disclosed here for the first time, declared a "firm intention to uphold the principle" of the three-mile territorial limit, but authorizes search of the British vessels suspected of carrying liquor anywhere within that distance from the coast of the United States which "can be traversed in one hour by the vessel suspected of endeavoring to commit an offense."

Prohibition Commissioner Haynes has been directed by President Coolidge to investigate charges of Rear Admiral Charles P. Plunkett, commandant of the Brooklyn Navy Yard, that Washington was "the wettest city in the United States." Commissioner Haynes was called to the White House and his attention directed to published statements by Admiral Plunkett at a police trial in New York, and asked to ascertain from the naval officer the basis of his information with a view to correcting any such condition as described.

The Chamber of Commerce of the United States was charged by Senator Brookhart (Rep.) Iowa, with "attempts to become the super-government of the United States."

President Coolidge will be guided by advice of the special oil council in acting on E. L. Doheny's offer to continue tank construction work at Pearl Harbor, it is said at the White House.

The House passed the Senate bill which would authorize coinage of 2,500,000 50c pieces to commemorate the beginning of work in 1918 of the carrying of a memorial to Southern soldiers on Stone Mountain, Ga.

The nomination of Ira K. Wells of Kansas to be an Assistant Attorney General, has been confirmed by the Senate. He will have charge of the public lands division of the Justice Department which will work with special Government counsel in the oil cases.

Absentee farm landlords are not an important factor in the agricultural situation in most parts of the United States, the Department of Agriculture has announced, citing figures which show not more than 10 per cent of rented farms in 1920 were thus owned.

Mrs. Woodrow Wilson has decided to avail herself of her legal rights to check publication of selections from her late husband's letters and manuscripts until she can determine in what manner the war President's papers will be given to the public as a whole and in an authorized way.

The Southern Division of the American Bankers' League, with headquarters here, issued a call for a conference at Asheville, N. C., on March 20, to "protest against Congress making a partisan issue out of tax legislation," through its chairman, Giles L. Wilson of Tampa, Fla.

Better homes demonstrations will be held all over the country, in cities, towns and rural communities during the week of May 11-13. For the third year. Better Homes in America is going forward with this work of helping American families better their homes in every way possible.

Continuing consideration of the Norbeck-Burtless bill, proposing appropriation of \$50,000,000 to finance diversification of crops in the spring wheat States, the Senate defeated 49 to 15 an amendment which would have added \$25,000,000 for the same purpose for loans to cotton farmers.

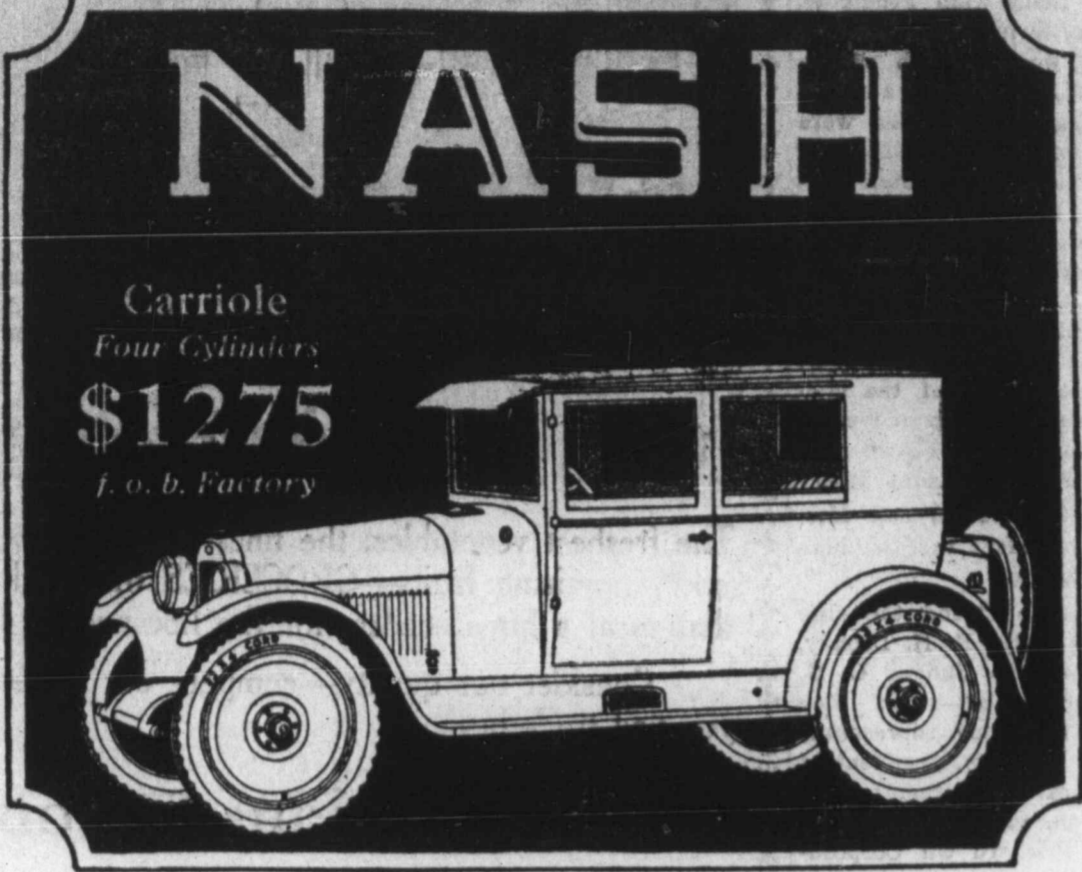

SAVES ROAD FUNDS SHOULD COME FROM GASOLINE TAX

Hon. D. K. Martin, member of the State Highway Commission, writing in the Texas Highway Bulletin, published by that body, says:

"The gasoline tax is fair, equitable and practicable road tax. This is a fact now recognized by a large majority of states and the road users are almost universally of this opinion. Thirty-five states of the Union now have a gasoline tax—sixteen of them having adopted it during 1923. Of the nineteen old states, thirteen increased the tax in 1923—five increased the tax from 1c to 3c—five from 1c to 2c—two from 2c to 3c and one from 1c to 4c. Only six states having a gasoline tax prior to 1923, have a rate of less than 2c per gallon and out of the thirty-five states having a gasoline tax, only nine have as low as 1c rate. Sixteen states have a 2c tax and ten have more than 2c. Reports from all states having a gasoline tax show that it is a popular tax and that there is practically no objection from the user of the road to this kind of road tax. The user of a road realizes that he is getting value received when he pays 1c, 2c or even a 3c tax to travel from 15 to 20 miles on a good road. He realizes, too, that only by paying this tax can he expect to see the road properly maintained or more miles of good roads constructed.

MUNICIPAL ELECTION TO BE HELD TUESDAY, APRIL 1

Voters within the corporate limits of the city will ballot for election of

two members of the aldermanic board Tuesday of next week. Since a recent order of the city council abolished the office of city marshal, there will be no election to fill this place. This office, which in the future is to be designated that of chief of police, will be appointive under supervision of the city government.

There will be two vacancies in the council to fill in the election Tuesday. They are the places now held by Joe H. Smoot, mayor pro-tem, and Logan Spalding.

BOND VOTE UNCHANGED BY CANVASS OFFICIAL RETURNS

Tabulation of returns from the road bond election Saturday when canvassed by Commissioners' Court here Tuesday afternoon disclosed no change in the vote, as tabulated Sunday morning by the Chamber of Commerce. The court found, according to tally sheets from the ten voting precincts, that a total of 518 votes were polled against the bonds and 1034 votes polled in favor of the bonds.

Judge J. C. Hall announced that the court found a total of 789 votes accounted for in tally sheets from the Colorado box, with the names of only 783 voters registered on the poll lists. It was presumed that the election officer failed to register the names of six voters who participated in the election and that the totals, both for and against the bonds, had been correctly registered by the election officials.

After finding that a discrepancy of six votes existed between totals registered on tally sheets and poll lists showing names of voters participating in the election at the Colorado box, Commissioners' Court requested R. H. Ratliff, county attorney, to telegraph Attorney General Walter A. Keeling for directions as to whether or not the court would be authorized to open the ballot box and canvass the ballots to determine which of the two totals was correct.

A ruling was received from the attorney general Wednesday afternoon which held that the Commissioners' Court had no authority to open the ballot box, and it was considered that the matter would be closed and the total votes, both for and against the bond issue at Colorado, as shown in tally sheets, accepted as official.

In his telegram to the county attorney, Attorney General Keeling outlined that no authority was granted under the law to open the ballot box for a recount, unless under order of a court of proper jurisdiction, and that this order would only come after protest had been filed. In so far as could be learned Wednesday afternoon no one had suggested filing of protest and the election result as already announced is considered final.

The telegram sent to Attorney General Walter A. Keeling Tuesday by R. H. Ratliff, county attorney, follows:

"Commissioners' Court of this county in canvassing the returns of a road bond election held March 22, find from one precinct in the county that the tally sheet does not correspond with the poll list. Talley sheet shows complete return of that box to be 789, while poll list shows complete return to be only 783.

"What procedure should the Commissioners' Court take to verify the returns of this box and find this discrepancy of six votes? Bond issue only lacked two thirds of one vote to carry. 1034 votes for issuance of bonds and 518 against. Would it be legal for the Commissioners' Court to open this box and count the votes

in order to verify the election returns?"

"Articles 3030 and 3031 Revised Civil Statutes are vague as to point in issue."

"HEART BREAKING"

The Fort Worth Record describes defeat of the road bonds in Mitchell County Saturday as having been lost "by the heart-breaking margin of a single vote." In an article carried in the Record Monday morning, under Colorado date line and written by Leonard Withington, editor of the Ft. Worth Record after having ascertained result of the election over long distance telephone, the following is said:

"By the heart-breaking margin of a single vote, Mitchell county good roads advocates lost the \$325,000 bond election which was to have provided funds for a concrete highway across the county on the Bankhead route. The vote was 1,034 for and 518 against. Two-thirds majority is required.

"The failure of the election became known today when a complete count was received in Colorado, the county seat. The election was held Saturday but so close was the fight the result was not settled until the last box was heard from today.

"Mitchell County is the only Texas county between Texarkana and El Paso which has not yet made provision for the permanent improvement of the Bankhead highway, which is the chief southern through route from coast to coast."

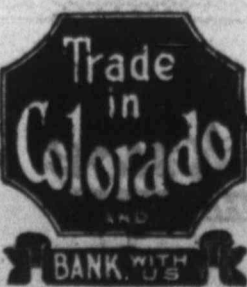

TRAVELING MAN "PUNCHED" CATTLE HERE YEARS AGO

J. B. Wheatley, traveling salesman who is now making his home in Florida, spent Wednesday and Thursday in Colorado. This was his first visit to Colorado since 1879 and the visitor admitted that many changes were to be noted, both in the country and on the banks of the Colorado river where the city now stands.

"I came to this county in 1878 with a large herd of cattle owned by the Anderson Cattle Company and for almost one year was employed on the ranch controlled by those people," Wheatley stated. "We came through Sweetwater with our herd and there was only one house, a small log cabin, there then. There were very few settlers here and the entire country was an open range."

Late Wednesday afternoon the visitor spent some time in South Colorado looking for the place where the old trail crossed the river and went around the hills south and west of where Colorado stands. In conversation with some of the "old timers" here they recalled several of the pioneer cow men of those days but Mr. Wheatley failed to meet any one whom he knew while here in 1878 and 1879.

The visitor left by automobile Thursday for El Paso. He hopes to return to Colorado while in this vicinity and visit the scene of his experience as a cowboy on the frontier.

ALLEGED I. W. W. ARRESTED

A young man, who stated his name was Robert Burns and his home in California, was placed under arrest late Monday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff R. C. Dale and lodged in the county jail. The man was placed under arrest after the officer had received information that the man was posing as an organizer for the I. W. W. and had solicited local citizens to join him in denunciation of the government and affiliate with his idea of Bolshevism.

The prisoner was released from custody Tuesday afternoon with directions to get out of town. Feeling was reported as running high here against the man, especially among several of the former service men. Another man who came into Colorado with the Red propagandist eluded local officers and had not been apprehended when Burns was released.

GOOD ROADS ENHANCE LOAN VALUE OF FARMS

There is nothing recognized as of greater importance to farm values than the building of good roads, according to John C. Cowan of Houston, chief land appraiser for the Federal Land Bank, who spent Wednesday and Thursday in Colorado. Mr. Cowan was here to confer with A. A. Dorn, secretary of the Mitchell County unit of the Federal Land Bank. The declaration of the Federal Land Bank official was made in reply to a question propounded by Mr. Dorn, who had heard the claims of some that the voting of bonds by counties was frowned upon by the bank. When asked if the voting of a large bond issue for improving the public thoroughfares in this county would handicap farmers in securing loans from the bank, Mr. Cowan replied:

"Vote your bonds and improve your roads, and I will loan your farmers more money than I am now loaning them."

Glen Aegan, of Dallas, supervising appraiser for the Federal Land Bank, accompanied Mr. Cowan to Colorado. Each of these officials gave their unqualified endorsement to the building of good roads as a factor in enhancing farm values and consequently making the loans more attractive as considered by the bank.

FOREIGN

King Victor Emmanuel, who recently suffered an attack of influenza, is entirely well again.

Frau Kathrina von Oheimb, who often is called the Lady Astor of the German reichstag, has announced that she will not be a candidate for reelection. She says she is "sick" of party politics and prefers to work outside the reichstag, rather than as one of its members.

Statistics just published show that Paris has the lowest birth rate of any large city of the world. Ever since the war, with the exception of the year 1920, births in Paris have been steadily diminishing. Nearly 1,600 children less were born in the capital in 1923 than in 1922.

The bill passed by the recent legislative session to make the mayorality of Manila an elective instead of an appointive office has been vetoed by Governor General Wood. It was announced at his office. Political students ascribed passage of the bill to a desire to limit the powers of the governor general.

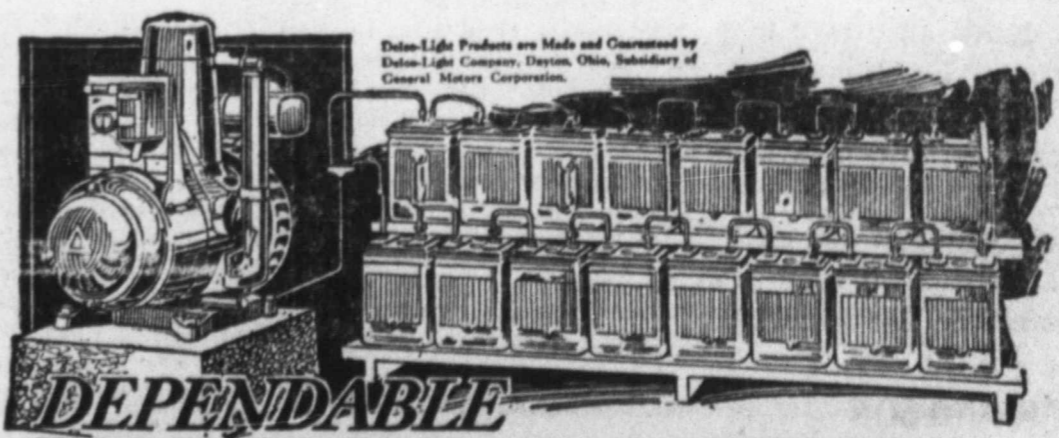
