County Is Given \$3100 Quota In Worm Project

Eastland County has been assigned a quota of \$3,100 in the state-wide drive to raise \$300,000 to carry on the screw worm eradication campaign until July 1, according to Chairman Oscar Schaefer.

Plans for raising the money were worked out at a meeting of cattlemen and civic leaders last Saturday, Mr. Schaefer said. The county's five banks have agreed to accept donations from the general public, he added.

Agriculture teachers of the various county schools will be in charge of the drive, according to Mr. Schaefer.

Mr. Schaefer plans to attend a meeting of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation in Austin on Friday, March 26, to hear full details of the program.

It was understood that the federal government will take over the program after July 1, leaving the financing for the months until that time up to the state and to the counties.

"This is an important matter to our region where cattle raising is a big industry," Mr. Schaefer said. "The general public can have a part in this program by leaving a check at their local bank."

Crop Believed Seriously Hit

Hope exists for Eastland County's fruit crop after the temperature dropped into the low 20s Thursday night and Friday morning.

Naturally, there are reports of scattered individual fruit damage where single trees had blossomed out, it is reported, but the larger orchards aren't believed far enough out to have been damaged.

The mercury dipped to 21 in Eastland and Cisco, and was recorded at 20 in Rangers and Gorman had a 23-degree low.

Earliest bloomer traditionally is the apricot and not many of these trees had put out, it is believed.

As temperature climbed Friday to above freezing by noon, thoughts were whether another sudden drop, say about April 2, which could be disastrous to the "Easter crop," would in deed, damage the county's fruit potential.

Consensus appears to be that enough trees hadn't blossomed out yet to have been seriously damaged. A county disastrous to fruit, although many individual trees undoubtedly bore black, black blossoms.

Temperatures dropped to 18 degrees early Saturday morning for the lowest reading of the present season.

Commissioners Get Petition; Deposit Money

A petition asking the opening of a road to the Providence Cemetery near Lake Leon was presented to the County Commissioners Court this week, but no action was taken.

The petition brought by Mr. W. E. Hallenback carried several signatures. The road at the lake has been a matter of concern to many involved there for quite some time.

The commissioners also heard a recommendation from County Auditor C. H. O'Brien that \$50,000 in county funds be deposited in Eastland National Bank on time deposit to draw interest.

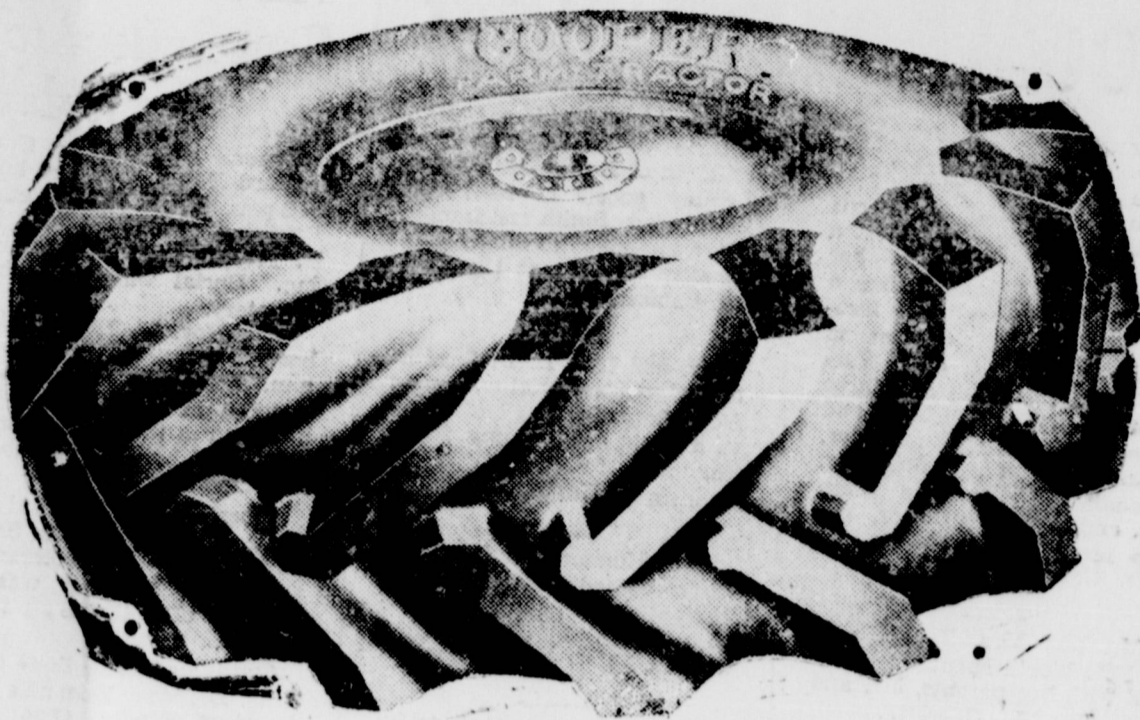
The bank recently offered the county an interest-bearing arrangement in their depository bid. It will mark the first time, at least in recent history, that county funds have drawn interest on deposit.

Annual Reports Due From Many Claimants Of SS

Early each year, many people who get social security payments must file an annual report of their earnings for the prior year.

This report in 1965 must be filed by every social security beneficiary who was under age 72 during any part of 1964 and had income of over \$1200 in wages or in profit from his own business. One of the questions on this report is: "Do you expect to earn over \$1200 in 1965?" If so, you show your expected total earnings for 1965.

Many times the estimate shown in January or February is not high enough when a second look is taken in mid-year. If you then think your actual earnings will be more than you at first anticipated, you should get in touch with your social security office. Someone there will be glad

Bray Store To Open Soon In Eastland

Bray Department Store is tentatively set to open on the West Side of the square in Eastland April 29, according to an announcement by Clint Bray.

Mr. Bray, manager of the J. C. Penney store in Cisco for the past several years, has resigned that position effective March 31, and will join in partnership with his brother Dayton Bray, formerly of Houston and now of Eastland, in the operation of the new family department store in Eastland.

The Houston brother has been associated with the Sears Co. for many years.

New manager for the Cisco Penney store is expected to be announced momentarily, it was said.

Formal announcements regarding the opening of the new Eastland County firm will be made in this newspaper soon. Location of the new store will be in the building formerly occupied by The Men's Shop, and the adjoining building. Dividing walls have been opened to provide an expanded interior.

RAILROAD PASSENGER service out of Eastland County is almost non-existent. You can't board a train westbound anymore — unless you're willing to commute to Baird to do it. Effective last Sunday, the Texas & Pacific curtailed all passenger boarding in the county except one train. You can go East, if you catch your train at 10:45 a.m. in Eastland, or 10:35 in Cisco or 11:01 in Ranger. (Arrives Ft. Worth 1 p.m.) The westbound 12:54 p.m. "doesn't stop here" anymore. It goes through Ranger non-stop at 11:42 a.m., Eastland at 11:55 a.m., and Cisco at 12:02 p.m., arriving in El Paso an hour earlier — if that's any consolation to anybody.

Ward's Reports Store Break - In Early Saturday

Montgomery Ward & Company's retail store in Ranger was broken into sometime after 2 a.m. Police Chief Ogden reported Saturday.

The entry wasn't discovered, however, until Harold Turnipseed, manager of the firm, arrived about 8:30 a.m. to open the store.

At mid-morning Saturday no merchandise or money appeared to have been taken, the manager said.

Ranger police were joined by Sheriff Lefty Sublett in an investigation of the break-in Saturday morning.

Chief Ogden said he didn't believe the break-in was made by the same person or persons who burglarized the office at Ranger Airport a week ago.

County Tax Payments Are Reported Good

Eastland County tax collections are good and averaged 91.25 per cent through the first month of this year, County Tax Assessor - Collector Edgar Altom has announced.

Through January, \$258,054.23 had been collected, he said, with tabulations incomplete for February.

The majority of the tax payers choose to take advantage of the three per cent discount offered during October, when \$214,322.57 was paid. In November, \$10,996.62 was collected; \$11,379.20 in December; and \$21,355.84 in January.

Total anticipated is \$282,825.12 and the four-months total left but \$24,770.09 beginning February 1, Altom said. Payments in February and early March have been heavy, he said.
