## BETTER PHONE SERVICE IS PROMISED COLORADO

End of the fight fostered by the Colorado Chamber of Commerce and Lions Club during the past three years for better telephone service in the city and rural communities having connection with the Colorado exchange is in sight, according to an official of the Chamber of Commerce who spent Saturday in conference with officials of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company at Fort Worth.

The official was sent to Ft. Worth by the Chamber of Commerce to press demands of the city for improvement of the local system, which for several years has afforded service, both local and long distance, of an unsatisfactory nature. The matter has been taken up at numerous times during the past few years by both of the civic organizations interested but no definite relief was ever attained.

The city has sought to induce the telephone company to install a common battery exchange here to take place of the present magneto system. The unsatisfactory service is not charged to negligence nor inefficiency of the local operators, but rather the mechanical end of the service.

Officials of the company definitely agreed that the new plant as requested by the city would be installed, according to the Chamber of Commerce representative who conferred with them in Fort Worth.

Engineers from the general equipment division are drafting plans and cost estimates of the proposed plant now and definite announcement as to when extensive improvements will be promised within the next few days.

Dr. Coleman, president of the Chamber of Commerce, expressed satisfaction Monday in the belief that the goal long sought by the city for better phone service was soon to end, with realization of a victory for the city. A modern telephone system, will in addition to assuring patrons adequate service, fill an important place in further advancing the commercial and industrial interests of the city and county.

## PRIZES FOR LEAGUE EVENTS ON DISPLAY AT J. P. MAJORS

Prizes to be awarded contestants in the literary and field events of the Mitchell county interscholastic meet here March 27-28, were received this week by G. D. Foster, chairman of the league and are to be placed on display at the J. P. Majors jewelry store. Schools of the county to enter any of the events are invited to inspect the display of awards.

Foster stated Monday that he would be pleased to have every school in Mitchell county have some part in one or both of the events. The literary events are to take place the first day at the Colorado High school and the field and track events on Saturday at the ball park in South Colorado.

## LORAINIANS SEEK PROVISIONS FOR PAVING

Petitions requesting the city council to order an election to determine whether the General Paving Laws shall be adopted are being circulated by citizens of Loraine this week. It is planned to pave several blocks in the business district.

Since the Bankhead highway passes through the principal street of Loraine it is conceded that the city is able to obtain financial assistance from the State Highway Commission in paving this street.

## COLORADO MEN INVITED TO ATTEND ABILENE BANQUET

Judge R. H. Looney, mayor, and Dr. F. C. Coleman, president and W. S. Cooper, secretary, respectively, of the Chamber of Commerce, have been invited to attend the annual banquet of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce, at Abilene, Monday evening, March 23. One of the visitors from Colorado will deliver an address at the banquet.

## LOCATION 4 NEW TESTS MADE ON MILLER LEASE

Confirmation that four tests are to be drilled on the Miller lease of Smythe, Appling & Turner of Oklahoma City was received by the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday. The corporation owns fifty-five acres in southwest quarter of Section 22, Block 28, known as the Miller survey. Location for the four tests have already been made.

This acreage is considered among the best in the field. On this survey is located the Miller wells of the Sloan Oil Company and the California Company and some of the best producers in the county have been drilled in on this tract. The survey adjoins the Elder lease of the California Company, on which the Elder well, largest producer in the field, was recently completed.

Definite announcement as to when the tests are to be under drill has not been made.

## CONTRACT AWARDED \$10,000 HOME IN NORTH COLORADO

Contract for erection of a brick cottage in North Colorado was awarded Friday of last week by Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Greene to J. E. Pond, local building contractor. Pond began the work of assembling material last week and already excavations for the foundation have been started.

The new home, to be constructed of brick and of Spanish architecture, will be among the most attractive in the city. It is to become the permanent home of Mr. Greene and family. The contract specifies that building is to cost \$10,000.

## MATERIALS FOR LONGFELLOW PHONE LINE ARE PURCHASED

Poles and other materials for constructing a new telephone line from Colorado to the Longfellow community, seven miles northeast of Colorado, were ordered Monday and actual construction of the line is to be commenced within the immediate future. Citizens of the community who were in Colorado Monday stated that the materials were being purchased for them through the Colorado Chamber of Commerce.

The new line is to be modern and of permanent construction, thus assuring farmers of the Longfellow community good rural telephone service. Farmers of the Buford section, seven miles north, will also construct a new line from the city to Buford. The Chamber of Commerce is co-operating with citizens of both communities in financing the projects.

## ORGANIZATION DEMOLAY TO BE PERFECTED HERE SOON

Plans for completing organization of a chapter of DeMolay at Colorado are about complete, J. A. Buchanan, recorder of Colorado Chapter 175, Royal Arch Masons, stated Monday. Authorization of the chapter was received Monday from the Grand Council, Order De Molay for Boys, at St. Louis.

Buchanan stated that the required number of boys had been registered for charter membership and that the next step would be to formally organize the chapter, which will no doubt be done within the next few days. Formal institution of the chapter will be directed by an appointee of Sam P. Cochran of Dallas, member of the Grand Council for Texas.

The following Freemasons of Colorado have been appointed by the Grand Council at St. Louis to constitute the local DeMolay chapter advisory council:

Organization of the Colorado chapter of DeMolay has been considered for some time. A few months ago the local Royal Arch Chapter gave the matter its endorsement and has since sponsored preliminaries for completing the organization and obtaining charter.

## 20,000 CANS USED BY CLUB WOMEN SINCE SEPT. FIRST

Under personal direction of Miss Irma Sealy, home demonstration agent, housewives of Mitchell county have used 20,000 cans since Sept. 1 for preserving meats, vegetables, fruits and other perishable products. Mrs. Dora R. Barnes of College Station, clothing specialist of A. & M. College, declared in an address at the Lions Club Friday. Fifteen thousand of the number were filled with meats of varied kinds, the specialist stated.

Mrs. Barnes gave figures showing the comparison of the market value of a beef on foot and in tin. "There is a certain club woman in this county who tells me they recently sold four beeves on foot for \$15 per head. The family canned two other beeves at the same time and sold the meat products at the ratio of \$62.50 per head. Thus two beeves which were preserved in the tin sold for more than double the price received for the four animals sold on foot.

She spoke briefly of the splendid work being done by the four women's and 14 girl's demonstration clubs in county. The specialist stated that out of the 2,900 counties in America, 2,200 employed extension department agents, showing the rapidity with which this work has spread since its inception 15 years ago.

The specialist spent Friday in Colorado to conduct a demonstration in clothing and millinery making. The demonstration, which was conducted in basement of the First Methodist church, was attended by a number of club women from over the county.

Miss Helen H. Swift of College Station, district home demonstration agent, spent Tuesday in Colorado in Colorado conferring with Miss Sealy as to work of the extension department in Mitchell county. Miss Swift declared that she knew of few West Texas counties making more substantial development than Mitchell and attributed much of this progress to influences brought into the homes by workers of the extension department.

"I hear much about Colorado and the Mitchell county oil field," Miss Swift stated, "and of course these reports are all favorable. You people have done a commendable work here, in both the city and rural districts and everything indicates there is to be no letting up of your development programs.

"Yes, to be sure you have a good civic organization in your Lions Club—and Chamber of Commerce, too," the visitor stated. "My department appreciates very much the splendid co-operation always given us by these and the several other civic bodies of Colorado."

## HIGHWAY DESIGNATION MEANS MUCH THIS CITY

Colorado and Mitchell county attained a big asset last week in the form of the new State highway, crossing the county from north to south. This important thoroughfare, which is to now pass to jurisdiction of the State Highway Commission, to be maintained under its supervision and improved through its co-operation, has an actual and potential value to Colorado equaling, if not surpassing, another railroad. With the rapid development of a network of highways throughout America motor vehicular traffic is supplying a large and important factor in the nation's commerce. Everywhere the automobile and truck has entered into the very life of both the industrial and pleasure ends of traffic. Colorado is no exception to this rule.

Designation of the new highway means much to Colorado in a number of respects. To be sure every interest in this city and those touched by the highway from Snyder to Sterling are to profit directly from the improved road bed. Among the most important of all, however, is the development scheduled to come to Colorado through the city's commercial connection with oil development southwest of here. With a good highway connecting this city with development in Sterling and other counties to the southwest, there is no reason why we cannot hold the trade relations already established with the oil interests in those sections. Rather than hold them, we can establish here the base of operations covering a wide territory, extending as far to the southwest of Reagan county.

Two of the most important rural communities of the county are penetrated by the highway, and with improvement of lateral roads connecting the highway with other communities north and south of Colorado the city may reasonably expect a substantial growth of its commercial relations with those communities.

## SCHOOL TRUSTEE ELECTION BE HELD SATURDAY, APR. 4

An election of considerable importance to this city and community is scheduled to be held at Colorado Saturday, April 4, to name four members of the school board. Last year a total of 46 votes out of a total voting strength of almost 1,000, were polled in the trustee election. Patrons of the Colorado Independent District are urged to manifest more interest in their schools. In the event you fail to vote in this election, you will have no right to offer criticism, in the event the proper citizens are not selected to be at the helm of the schools during the ensuing two years.

Those whose terms in office are to expire are H. L. Hutchinson, president of the board; J. W. Watson, E. H. Winn and J. F. Morris.

The Record has no criticism to offer any of the present members of the school board nor any of those whose names may appear as candidates in the coming election, but we do believe the people should manifest more interest in their schools affairs than they do.

## FOUR NEW LOCATIONS BY EASTLAND OIL CO.

Joe W. Clark of Cooper, of the Clark Drilling Company, stated Monday that conditions in the field were most optimistic. He arrived last week to spend several days at Colorado on business in connection with his holdings in the field.

## ALLEGED BOOTLEGGER IS RETURNED TO FACE TRIAL

M. B. Harrison, under indictment by the Mitchell county grand jury on charges of violating the liquor laws, was returned to Colorado Tuesday by Sheriff I. W. Terry and will be held pending trial at the April term of district court. Harrison was apprehended at Sacramento, California, recently and held by police officials there for the Mitchell county sheriff.

Terry stated upon arrival in Colorado with his prisoner that he was forced to overcome a legal battle at Sacramento before obtaining Harrison. The prisoner fought extradition to Texas and it was not until Governor Richards of California had recognized extradition papers issued by Governor Ferguson of Texas that his man was delivered by authorities there.

Harrison was arrested here in 1922 by Deputy Sheriff R. C. Dale, who captured him and J. L. Trammell with a quantity of booze which they were transporting in an automobile. Following a preliminary trial the men were released under bond of \$1,500 each, pending their appearance before the next term of district court. Neither of the men appeared and their bonds were forfeited. Trammell was later apprehended and at the October term of court was convicted and given three years in the penitentiary. Harrison had made good his escape until placed under arrest a short time ago at Sacramento.

Harrison is 39, stands 6 feet, 4 inches in height and tips the beam at 240 pounds. He was reared in the vicinity of Dallas and at the time of his arrest here in 1922 is alleged to have been identified with a bootlegging organization operating between El Paso and Fort Worth.

## PRIZE WINNING HERD BULLS SHIPPED TO SPADE RANCH

Three registered Hereford bulls, among the top winners at the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show last week, were added to registered Hereford herd of W. L. Ellwood on the Spade ranch Monday. The bulls were purchased at Ft. Worth by Mr. Ellwood and shipped to Colorado.

Two of the bulls are two years old and were purchased at \$1,000 each. One of them came from the Gist show pen and the other from the top pen of Cauble. Gist is breeding prize winning Herefords at Midland and the Cauble animals are from Big Spring. The third bull purchased by Mr. Ellwood is a yearling and came from Aledo. One of the two's weighs 2,040 pounds and the other 2,030 pounds.

O. F. Jones, manager of the Spade ranch, stated Monday that he had 175 registered Hereford cows and 150 registered heifer calves on the ranch. This herd, in his opinion, will equal the best pedigreed animals to be found in this part of the State.

## FOUNDATION COLD STORAGE PLANT COMPLETED FRIDAY

S. H. Sisk, contractor, completed the concrete foundations Friday of last week for the cold storage unit of the West Texas Electric utilities plant here. Much of the equipment for installation of the plant is on the ground.

## SWEETWATER MEN TO BE HERE INTERESTS REVIVAL

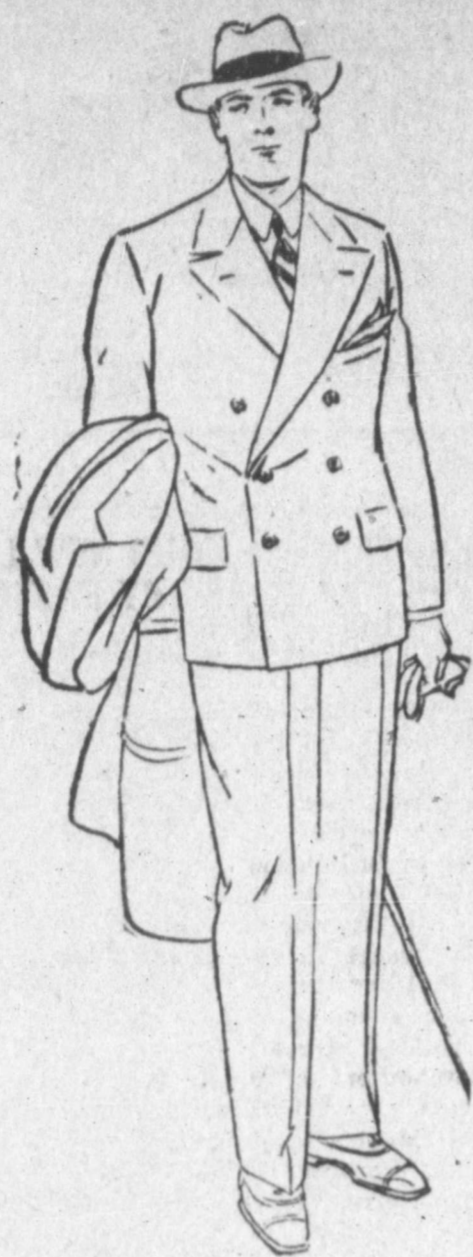

**HERRINGTON SAYS FORD BUSINESS OPENING UP FINE**

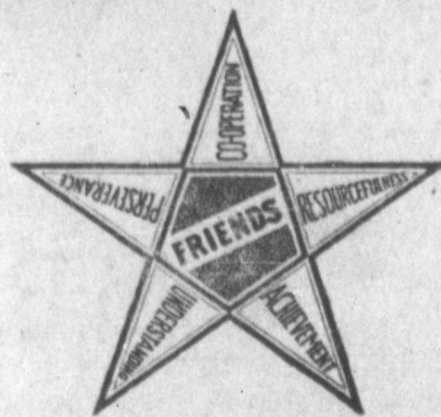

**THREE TEST WELLS TO BE DRILLED ON SPADE RANCH**

### The Passing Through

A Weekly Column of Personal Comment by

A bill for the sterilization of the chronic insane and habitual criminal has passed the New Jersey Senate by a very large majority. That is splendid as far as it goes, but apparently the lawmakers have forgotten the street-corner sheik.

Count Romain de Tiroff shudders when he speaks of the "horrible black clothes" which men wear at formal functions. He would like to see them go back to satin breeches, silk stockings and shoes with silver buckles. I also shudder. I can't help but visualize Chief Justice Taft attending an inaugural ball, or other formal affair attired in the garb suggested.

While a crowd of morbidly curious stood by, eighteen-year-old Tillie Jajke of Chicago, directed the efforts of men attempting to release her from beneath the heavy Chicago & Northwestern engine which had struck her at a crossing. It took nearly an hour to jack up the locomotive and remove her, but during that time she bit her lips to stifle her screams and kept her wits about her. Later she died from her injuries. It is difficult to think of Tillie Jajke and then refer to women as the weaker sex.

Roger Strode was indicted by an Ashland, Ky., grand jury and charged with shooting with intent to kill. The foreman failed to sign the bill and the charge was automatically nullified. It is said that Strode cannot be reindicted because a jury to try him had been accepted and a retrial would be placing him in jeopardy twice for the same offense. I am not familiar with the Strode case. I do know, however, that this country is full of gun-toters, and it

does not help to control the gun-toting nuisance to release on technicalities those who shoot in violation of the law.

Inspired by stories of medieval cavaliers, it is reported, two students of the University of California last week, fought a duel at sunrise over a coach's favor. Swords were used but there were no injuries. I suspect that if either of the youngsters had drawn a drop of blood, he would have fainted. But not so with George and Lloyd Johnson, brothers of Greenville, Tennessee. They also fought a duel last week. Too old to be swayed by the sentimental dreams of adolescence, they fought for blood. They chose a Tennessee forest for their dueling ground and axes for their weapons. They are both in a Greenville hospital now. In German universities, it is considered an honor to possess a rapier-scar on one's face. I suspect, however, that if a student had to win his laurels in a gloomy forest with an axe for a weapon, his interest in dueling would soon vanish.

During a recent speech in Dunbarton, Scotland, David Kirkwood, suspended member of the House of Commons, charged the Prince of Wales with being a "nincompoop." Kirkwood's ire was aroused by the amount of public money which has been spent on the Prince's world-tours and the large sum it is proposed to spend on certain tours yet to be made. I think there is reasonable doubt as to which of the two is the nincompoop. The Prince of Wales is described as being an intelligent, democratic and thoroughly pleasing young fellow. He is preparing himself now for the important responsibilities which he must assume some time in the future. He has already visited many British dominions and several adjacent countries. He desires, while he is free to do so, to continue his travels and study. Most of our troubles with rulers have been caused by their ignorance of the customs and thoughts of others. The Prince of Wales will make a better king, as a result of these contacts, than he would were he to pen himself up in England and remain aloof from other men. Money used in financing his travels is an investment

in future peace, and it will pay large dividends both to Great Britain and the rest of the world.

When circumstances demand rare physical courage, it is fortunate that some one possessing unusual valor is generally available. Andrew Young, an ordinary citizen who probably has never had his name in print before, recently saved the town of Turlock, California, from disaster. At the risk of his life, he plunged time after time into a burning building and carried out of the reach of flames many boxes of dynamite. After having taken all of the dynamite from the flame-swept building, he went into it once more to remove a can of gasoline. He got it, but it exploded while he was carrying it to the open. Luckily, he will recover from his burns. And then there was Bruce White, a young English bacteriologist, who, at the risk of his life, swallowed the contents of a test tube filled with germs in order to study the effect of certain poisons on the human stomach. During the late war I heard an American officer declare that men were all alike. "Under certain circumstances," he said, "all men would be heroic, and under other conditions, cowardly." His theory may be true when one limits it to mass heroism, but it does not apply to the individual acting on his own initiative. Valor is the result of a mental stability that is peculiar to the individual, plus unselfish devotion to duty.

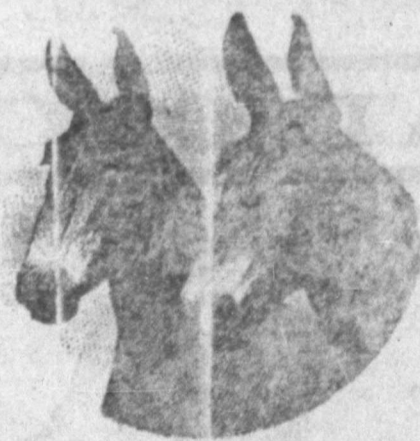

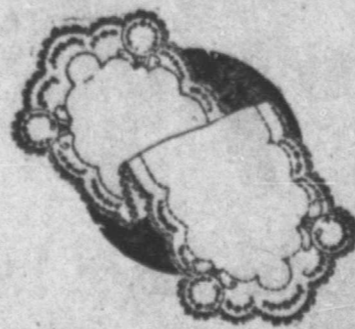

**RURAL AID SUPERVISOR IS PLEASED WITH SCHOOLS**

Lee Hensley of Austin, representing the State Department of Education, made an official visit to the rural schools of Mitchell county last week, in company with G. D. Foster, superintendent of public instruction. In speaking of the visit of the supervisor here, Mr. Foster said: "Receipt of treasury warrant for \$5995 marks the end of this year's supervision. It is all over now except at the Palace Theatre, three days, putting the money to good use in paying teachers salaries and releasing local school funds for additional improvements.  
There are twenty-four rural schools in Mitchell county. Of this

**number seventeen had met the requirements of the department and were eligible to receive State aid.**

Of this number there were only two which did not need aid; in other words there were fifteen schools which will receive aid this year. The seven schools which were not eligible for aid only have a local maintenance tax of fifty cents, whereas the requirement of the rural aid law is that a district must have at least a seventy-five cent tax to get aid from the State. Three of these seven districts will vote on the proposition of raising their tax rate the 4th of April and all of the others have made definite steps toward meeting the State aid requirements for another year. The amount of State aid granted Mitchell county schools for the year 1925-26 should therefore be larger than this year and the schools should be able to make needed improvements and at the same time have a longer term.

"The Rural aid supervisor, Mr. Lee Hensley expressed himself as being well pleased with conditions as a whole over the county and praised the general spirit of cooperation that seemed evident between the schools and the community as a whole. Mr. Hensley's suggestions point to better equipment, permanent improvements and a longer term for the rural schools, and he showed that his department is anxious to grant additional aid to any school that is trying to help itself."
