Fred Brown, president of the Loraine Chamber of Commerce, headed a delegation of citizens from there who came to Colorado to attend the meeting. Others in the Loraine party were Dock Wimberley, Will Martin, and J. T. Ledbetter. All of these gentlemen delivered addresses on the plan as suggested by the highway commission and pledged to support the proposed bond issue to finance the county's share of the improvement expense, in the event they were definitely assured the highway would be improved through Loraine as it now runs.

Dr. P. C. Coleman, president of the Colorado Chamber of Commerce; A. A. Dorn, county commisioner of the Clorado precinct; Dr. T. J. Ratliff; Col. C. M. Adams, and others spoke on the subject and enthusiastically pled for the citizenship of the county to inaugurate a campaign to vote the bonds and settle the highway question in Mitchell county for all time to come.

"If the people of this county may secure 65 miles of permanently pav ed highway at a cost of only \$250,000 I can see no feasible reason for any man turning it down," Dr. Coleman stated, "It is by odds the best proposition ever submitted to the citizenship of this county."





Last year was one of the most successful years of the Baptist evangelistic work in Texas with 34,507 baptisms. In the last six years the baptisms in Texas have numbered 181, 206, or an average of 30,206 baptisms a year. About one-third of these were through the efforts of the missionaries and other workers who are assisted by the state mission fund.

In his last year as state evangelist, Dr. Pond baptised 800 persons and received in collections aside from the pledges and regular offerings in churches where he held meetings the sum of \$12,000, which is sufficient to pay the expenses of the whole department of evangelism for a full year. Dr. Blalock also has a record as an evangelist.

#### ORIENT TO PUT MOTOR CARS ON WEST TEXAS DIVISION

Passenger service on the Orient Railway is to be facilitated by three modern motor car trains which have been purchased from J. G. Grill Co. of Philadelphia for delivery during the early fall. This first group of trains is to be placed in service on the Texas Division. Two of the trains con sist of a combination baggage and express car and one passenger car. The other is a single car for passengers and baggage.

The two-car trains will replace steam trains Nos. 1 and 2 running between San Angelo and Ft. Stockton, Texas. These trains will continue from Ft. Stockton to Alpine, Texas, arriving there early in the evening and departing early in the morning. 





Continued from page one. formation as might be proper, and the further reason that it was the desire of those present to have a larger representation of the citizenship of the county express themselves on the subject, no action was taken at the meeting Friday. Another mass meeting was called to convene at noon Friday of this week to be attended by not less than 100 men, representing every comumnity of the county, at which time it is expected that petitions will be started requestng commissioners court to order the election.

The master of ceremonies at the parley Friday announced that every citizen of the county who was interested was extended an invitation to attend the meeting this week. Those proposing to be present, however, are requested to notify the chamber of commerce so that reservation for them be made at the luncheon.

Figures submitted by Tom Goss and Judge Thompson Friday indicated that a bond isue of \$250,000 would be required to finance construction of the proposed 65 miles of highway and build the necessary drainage structure. With supplement of State aid, this would bring the total improvement up to half million dollars. After this amount is expended, jointly by the State and county, the State would come in and place the paving material on the roadbed without a dime cost to the county.

DESERVING OF THE HONOR

F. M. Burns, pioneer merchant and banker of Colorado, holds a distinct honor, and one of which he may be pardonably proud. For the 42nd. consecutive year, Mr. Burns has been elected treasurer of the Masonic fraternity at Colorado, a record believed here to be without a precedent in the country. Only two other Masons, who were members of the lodge here when Mr. Burns was elected for the first time forty years ago, are now living in Colorado. The Record congratulates you, Mr. Burns upon the accomplishment of such a mark of honor and distinction. Your unanimous election to the place again and again for almost a half century speaks distinctly of the esteem and confidence reposed in you by Colorado Masons.

#### INJURIOUS PUBLICITY

Since publication of articles a few days ago in some of the large daily papers, in which the statement was made that the county judge of Mitchell county, the mayor of Colorado and a number of other prominent citizens of Colorado had petitioned the pardon of Jeff Brimberry, convicted for first degree murder in this county and given a term of 99 years in the pen, we have received much injurious publicity through some of the smaller newspapers and periodicals over the state. Editors of these publications, believing the published reports concerning the Brimbery pardon to be true, have proceeded to express themselves in terms severely calling the citizenship to task for a deed they had no part in.

After reviewing the case in an editorial last week, the Lynn County News, published at Tahoka, says:

"We cannot understand why any citizen of Mitchell county would sign a petition for the pardon of such a brute as Brimberry. We think his kind should be kept in the pen until Hades streets. Its main entrance was once freezes over."

An attorney of Ranger, who states that he represented Brimberry in obtaining the pardon, has addressed a communication to county judge Chas. C. Thompson in which he states that it was citizens of Mitchell county who signed petition begging for the restoration of ciitizenship of Brimbery. This, the attorney writes, occured during the Hobby administra-

But this does not correlate with advances made by Governor Ferguson. Thompson has received a communication from the private secretary of the governor in which it is stated that the petition was signed by citizens of Madison county and that in so far as records in the case are concerned, the people of Mitchell county had nothing to do with the Brimbery pardon.

The people of Mitchell county are not to be worried over this afair. They know they had nothing to do with the case and appreciate the truth of that old adage, "Truth crushed to earth shall rise again." Mitchell county officials and others fo our good citizens would not have signed the request for pardon, had they been requested to do so, owing to the fact they are familiar with the crime.

Colonial Memories Live Again in Carpenters' Hall Anniversary Celebration

There was undoubtedly some furtive brushing up on the data of our historical landmarks when the name of Carpenter's hall reappeared in the dispatches a short time ago, from the depths of a long Philadelphian oblivion, as the scene of a solemn ceremonial enacted on the occasion of the one hundred and fiftleth anniversary of the first Continental congress and the two hundredth anniversary of the founding of the company that built the hall, more than a century and a half ago. Familiar to every schoolboy are the names of Fancuil hall in Boston, the "Cradle of American Liberty," and Independence hall in Philadelphia, where the great Declaration was adopted But Carpenter's hall, for some reason or another, has been allowed to slip back into the suburbs of patriotic memories, although it is entitled to an equal place in the trinity of historic halls most sacred to the beginnings of American freedom and the crystallization of its doctrines. It was in Fancuil hall that the first keynotes of liberty found expression. It was at Independence hall that the Declaration of Independence was proclaimed to the world. But it was at Carpenter's hall that the initial movewas staged in the first Continental congress, in 1774, and it was there, too, 13 years later, that the representatives of the new republic met to fashlon the greatest document of modern times the Constitution of the United

Carpenter's hall was the guildhall of the Worthy and Honorable Association of Carpenters and Architects of pre-Revolutionary days. This association, known as the Carpenter's company, was founded in Philadelphia 50 years before the voices of protest against the misrule of the motherland began to find expression in the American colonies. It is still in existence. And the old hall, which had been completed a few years before the meeting of the first congress of the colonies, still stands a monument to the honest labor and the esthetic tastes of the artisans who constructed it. Thousands pass it daily, without a thought, perhaps, of the significance of Carpenter's hall in American history. It is hidden away among more pretentious modern structures at the end of a court that leads into Chestnut street, between Third and Fourth on Walnut street, but the buildings of a later date have blocked the way, so that today one approaches the venerable old building by way of the Chestnut street court, which really leads up to the back door,

States of America.

The building is said to be, for its time, an architectural gem. It is built of brick, in the form of a Greek cross, and all four sides present a perfect symmetry of design. Windows of the colonial period are topped by beautiful white marble keystones and the doors. surmounted by similar embellishments, are said to be of rare architectural beauty. Little patches of lawn abutting on the street preserve the Quaker-like simplicity of the exterior. Within the hall are preserved some of the chairs in which sat the delegates to that fateful first convention of the representatives of the embryonic republic and on its walls is the inscription: "Within these walls Henry, Hancock and Adams inspired the delegates of the colonies with nerve and sinew for the tolls of war, resulting in national independence." Fine colonial stairways lead to the upper story, and although the building has undergone some internal changes, the

old-time atil osphere redolent of the stirring memories of the fathers, still haunts the halls and corridors of the old place. It must have made a most harmonious setting for that group of modern delegates who met there recently, garbed in Continental costumes, each representing one of the statesmen of that ancient day, to re-enact by the dim light of tallow candles the historic scenes of 150 years ago.

were nurtured in Carpenter's hall. It was here that the first steps toward the establishment of absolute religious freedom, as one of the cornerstones of the new commonwealth, were taken. In the same years in which the first congress assembled within its walls | the Baptist association held a meeting in Carpenter's hall for the purpose of promoting a united movement among all religious denominations of the colonies directed toward formulating and disseminating the doctrines of universal religious freedom. To this convention all friends of religious freedom were invited, the Catholics from Maryand, the Episcopals from Virginia, the Friends from Pennsylvania, and representatives of the religious bodies of New England. Whether there was much accomplished is not known, but it was the first bugle note whose echoes were later to find fruition in the provision of the Constitution that guaranteed religious liberty in the United States of America.

While the congress was in session, there came the startling news that Boston had been fired upon by the British ships—a rumor that caused



"Cancer is the great human menace. It is increasing by leaps and bounds. If anything, it is increasing more rapidly in the United States than it is in the British Isles. Of those now living in the British Isles, 5,000, 900 are doomed to die of cancer if they do nothing to prevent it. In the Uniited States the doomed number is 10,000,000 and might easily rise to 15,000,000 or 20,000,000.

This remarkable statement is made by Sir W. Arbuthnot Lane, Bart., one of the world's most eminent surgeons and dietitians, in an article appearing in the June 2 issue of the Dearborn Independent.

According to Sir Arbuthnot, cancer is not caused by the baccillus that scientists have so long sought and not yet found, but rather by poisons created in the body by the food that is eaten. It is a filth disease, and its prevention is accomplished by keeping the digestive tract thoroughly drained of its accumulations.

Continuing, the Doctor says:

"What we should do then, if we would avoid cancer, is to eat whole wheat bread and raw fruits and vegetables, shunning all meat, first that we may be better nourished, second that we may more easily eliminate waste products and thus adequately will perform a great service for himself. It is deadly."




