### \$1,750,000 DEPOSITS IN COLORADO'S TWO BANKS

A half-dozen four-cylinder cars of different makes had been given acceleration tests in a 100-yard dash. The best time was made by a Chevrolet. Each car ran eight sprints over the distance and the results were averaged. The average time made by the Chevrolet was 10.73 seconds.

The other averages were: 11.13 seconds 11.19 seconds; 11.28 seconds 11.58 seconds and 12.54 secends. The cars which ran second and third were considerably higher in price than the Chevrolet.

A contest was arranged in the Coliseum between a Chevrolet and Keith Lloyd, cousin of Harold Lloyd. Keith Lloyd is the champion sprinter of the University of Southern California. The Chevrolet was driven by Dick Champion, former Bucknell University track star. The stop watch was held by Dean Cromwell, Lloyd's

The region is busy with the late harvest and fall work. Winter grain has been planted under favorable conditions. The hog and cattle situation generally favor optimism.

"The wheat belt has winter wheat seeding about finished. Local estimates of acreage vary but general indications are of some increase over last fall. Spring wheat yields are only fair but grain is excellent quality and prices are stimulating. Threshing is practically finished. The general result of the season is favorable to the region as a whole-

"The range country has the cattle and sheep movement to market well along. Stock is moving down from the hgh range to winter pastures-There is a heavy demand for ewes. 



#### 12,000 PICKERS WANTED BY WEST TEXAS FARMERS

West Texas cotton farmers are in need of 12,000 pickers and the demand will be hard to supply; according to C. W. Woodman, assistant director of the United States Employment Service, with offices in Fort Worth. Woodman states that not less than 35,000 pickers from Central and East Texas have been carried into Louisiana, Mississippi and Arkan-

In an interview published in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram Monday morning, Woodward substantiates the claims of H. L. Atkins, county farm agent, County Judge Chas. C. Thompson, the Chamber of Commerce and other local sources that pickers are difficult to obtain. The article follows:

Orders for 12,000 cotton pickers for West Texas are on file at the office of C. W. Woodman, assistant director of the United States Employment Service. This does not represent the present actual needs of that section, as many pickers have gone into West Texas in the last two weeks of whom Woodman has no re-


