County Funds Will Earn Interest; Election Officials Are Named

Eastland County money will earn interest for the first time as the result of a contract awarded this week by the Eastland County Commissioners Court to Eastland National Bank to serve as depository for county funds.

The Eastland bank bid was the only one submitted for commissioners consideration at their regular meeting Monday morning, when they also named general and special election judges and alternates for the coming year, and accepted the Hamilton-Duncan Road as a neighborhood road near Lake Leon.

County funds will earn three per cent interest, held in time deposits of 30 days, and commissioners are to work out a schedule of which funds will be placed in interest-earning accounts. A county depository is named every two years, and the Eastland bank has been chosen for several years, it was reported.

County funds include permanent improvements, school, county clerks, district clerk and other county funds.

A check for \$2,500 accompanied the bank's bid as security, and the agreement to be entered into is to be approved by the state comptroller's office. Motion was made by Buck Collins of Rising Star and seconded by C. B. (Runt) Dill of Cisco.

An application and bond from J. R. Bucy for independent weigher at Rising Star was approved by the court.

Seaberry, Frost, Hart Merging Law Firms

Browsing With Bev

Clothes cleaned in a coin-op drycleaning establishment may come out smelling of cleaning fluid. It's a good idea to air the clothes thoroughly before use or storage. Hang them outdoors or in a well-ventilated room — but do not use plastic hangers.

Sometimes enough solvent is left in heavy fabrics or shoulder pads to soften the plastic, even though the fabric does not feel damp. Then the hanger sticks to the fabric so that it is difficult to remove without damaging the garment. The same thing can happen if garments are hung on plastic hangers and exposed to fumes from moth preventives.

Don't buy just any extension cord. First look for the Underwriter's label. Then select a cord that's equipped for the use you intend to make of

it. Small lamp cords are for just that — lamps. If you're going to use the cord for appliances, buy a larger one. Remember — irons are appliances — don't use a lamp cord with your iron as an extension cord.

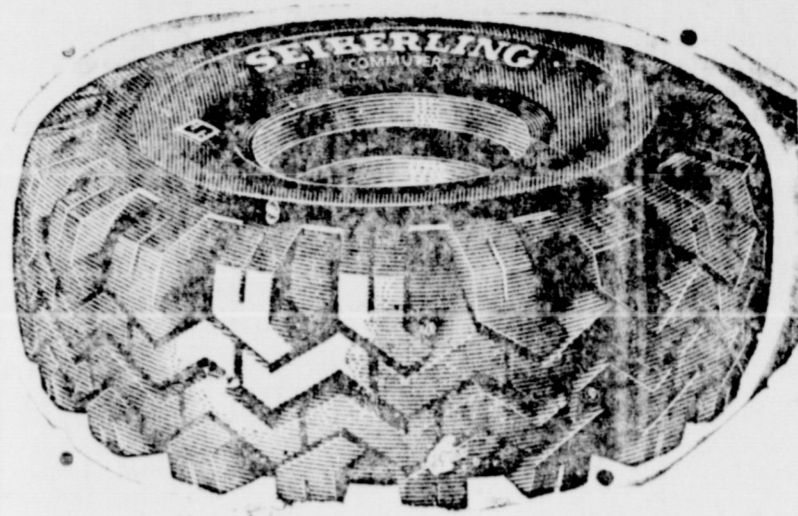

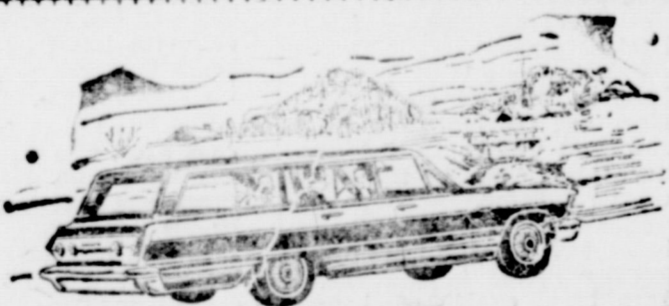

Years Peanut Yield For 1964

Eastland County's 1964 peanut crop totals 14,033,423 pounds for just less than a 20-bushel per acre yield, Gilbert Meredith, Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Committee manager, has announced.

A total of 23,585 acres, or 57 per cent, of the allotted acreage was planted in 1964, he said.

Average poundage is 597 in 1964, compared to an average of 520-pounds per acre, also just under 20 bushels to the acre, in 1963, he said.

This harvest came from 525 farms in the county, Meredith pointed out.

Peanut producers in the Southwest area have harvested and marketed a record high yield of peanuts, according to the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, with figures up through mid-January, showing a total of 125,174 tons in Texas. In 1962, yield was 613 pounds (over 20 bushels) per acre, from 29,402 acres.

Of that tonnage inspected in Texas, 3,537 tons or 2.7 per cent are segregated Two (3 and 4 per cent damaged kernels), and 2,455 tons graded segregation Three (over 4 per cent damaged kernels), the association reports, adding that acres planted to peanuts in the state in 1964 were 32,000 less than in 1963 because

of drouth.

Tonnage going under loan in the Southwest is the largest since 1955, the association reports, with the total about 46,200 tons through mid-January. Of this total, 15,987 is stored in Texas, 29,264 in Oklahoma, 707 in Arizona and 246 in New Mexico. Shellers in Texas and Oklahoma purchased about 165,000 tons direct from producers in Texas and Oklahoma.

One Leg of Interstate 20 Completed in This County

The six-mile stretch of Interstate 20 west of Cisco to the Callahan County line has been completed and accepted from the contractor and work is moving satisfactorily on other highway projects in the county, Resident Engineer R. P. Haun has announced.

Cecil Ruby Co., Inc., had the contract for grading, drainage, structures and hot mix asphaltic concrete paving on a bid of \$1,893,546.04 on the 6.212 miles beginning one mile west of Cisco and extending to the Callahan line. The highway department accepted the job Saturday, Feb. 6, Haun said.

Cooper & Woodruff, Inc. is 30 per cent complete on a project extending 5.660 miles from a point 1.5 miles east of Ranger to a point 3 miles west of the Erath County line, with IH 20 specifications and bid for \$1,036,119. Haun said. Base is presently being hauled for the south lane and traf-

fic will probably be turned onto that lane in the next few weeks, he said.

Right-of-way negotiations are moving ahead of schedule near Cisco for the five-mile stretch from State Highway 206 eastward, and are expected to be completed in time for a possible mid-July bid letting, he said. This IH 20 strip is a Unit One construction and will include sub-grading and bridges.

Right-of-way negotiations for the strip around Ranger are lagging, he said, and are from four to six months behind the Cisco strip, indicating a probable January bid letting for that section.

Third section to be undertaken will be the five-mile leg from mid-Eastland-Cisco to the Highway 6 junction south of Eastland.

Preliminary drawings are being completed at the local Highway offices for the section between Eastland and

Mrs Sessum Dies At Roby

Incident in Judge's Life Ideal for O. Henry Tale

Judge Frank Sparks, appointed this week by Gov. John Connally to the bench of the 91st District Court, recalls an incident that happened to him recently that could well be the "twist" for an O. Henry-type short story.

It happened about two years ago, when Attorney Sparks was visiting the old home place, about eight miles outside Belton.

Mr. Frank was examining the little old house, which then was vacant, and as empty places go, deteriorating. Of course, it brought memories of his youth — pulling cotton, warming before the fireplace, reading by coal-oil lamp and all the things that

go with being raised on a farm.

As he roamed through the now-bare rooms, he remembered '16 when his dad, J. E. was told by doctors to go to a dry, high climate because of his health. How they'd loaded him in a wagon with brothers, bound for New Mexico. They'd been told "Don't change climates too fast," but they didn't have to worry, in those days you couldn't change too fast riding behind a team of mules. Looking at the old place, Frank remembered that he was afraid he'd never see his Dad alive again, because he was so sick. But before the wagon got to

Clovis area where it was to stop, the elder Sparks was riding one of the mules himself, and went on to live many years in the dry, high climate of New Mexico, and to die in 1949 at Frank's home in Eastland at a ripe old age, and of an entirely different illness. Prowling through the old house near Belton, Frank remembered this and his brothers and sisters: Edgar, now of House, N.M.; S. E. of Fort Sumpter, N.M.; Crockett and Mrs. Arthur Milburn, both now of Clovis.

Frank had been in his senior year of law at the University of Texas in '16, and he didn't make the trip to New Mexico. He went on to finish, the war came, and things began to happen. Since then "a lot of water had gone under the bridge" as the saying goes.

And therein lies the "twist" because as Frank lingered in the old home place that day, a milestone was being reached for the home.

He doesn't remember the date exactly, but for the sake of the story, we'll say it was, say June 5, 1963.

As he wandered into one of the old rooms and saw the wall paper peeling from the walls and the debris that collects in a vacant house, he spotted a fresh, recently-attached "public notice" tacked to one of the walls.

It was an announcement by the U. S. Corps of Engineers stating that the old place had been condemned to make way for the new reservoir to be built near Belton, to be known as the Still House Hollow Reservoir. The farm place was to be covered in lake.

The notice said in part: "...this place will be sold at public auction at the Corps of Engineers office in Fort Worth on June 5, 1963, at 10 a.m."

"Why, that's today," Frank must have said to himself, remembering the date, and then as his gaze fell on the face of his watch, the little hand pointed to 10 and the big hand reached for 12.

The bare-foot, farm boy chapter was closing in Frank's life.

And now, at 70, he begins a new chapter, as presiding judge of the 91st District Court.

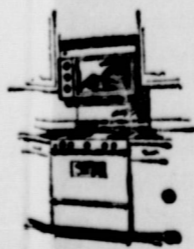
