The other amendment would give s a supreme court with a chief jusice and eight associate justices intend of one chief justice and two ssociate justices, placing six additional men on the pay roll of the

The two amendments, carrying appropopritions for their submission and inviting more outlay of money if successful, make a little book we have in this office very interesting. It, contains a list of state represenatives with, what is said to be, the mount of tax paid by each. The figures, it is said, were taken from the comptrollers office and ought to correct. Just two men in the house pay more taxes than the representative from Brown and Coleman counties, according to the book. Pearce pays \$745.19; John H. Kirby of Houston pays \$10,160.61 and J. F. Renfro of Huntington pays \$1,294 .-97. Eliminate these three and no member of the House of Representatives will be financially inconvenienced if every salary in Texas is doubled and the personnel of every bureau increased. 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


