SENSATIONAL SHALLOW OIL STRIKE IN WELL NEAR SIMMS GASSER

Gets Good Sand At 565 Feet

The biggest sensation in the Mitchell-Howard county area this week is the shallow oil strike in the Atlantic company's Ellwood No. 1, a short distance southeast of the Simms gas wells, on the Spade ranch south of Colorado.

This well struck a good oil sand at 565 feet and covered the slush pit with crude immediately. It is said the oil sand was 20 feet thick. The well immediately cemented casing and will be drilled in Friday, we are told. The gas production is expected at about 610

This well is in southwest quarter of section 30, block 29, S. P. lands in Mitchell county, and is 2,000 feet southeast of the Simms Oil Company's two gas wells.

Local oil men say that should a shallow oid field be developed at a depth of less than 600 feet, it would mean one of the biggest development campaigns ever put on in a shallow field. Speculation as to the outcome of the oil strike is rife. Many citizens evidenced excitement and no doubt all oil men are watching the well with deep interest. It would most certainly eclipse anything in this vicinity should the well be a good producer at this depth.

SENSATION OF WEEK Well Shut Down For Further

On Foster Lease

Close on the heels of the developments occurring early in the week in the Atlantic Company's test, Ellwood No. 1, southeast of town, came the second sensational oil episode of the week in Mitchell county when pay showing was encountered at a depth of 2735 feet in Magnolia's Foster No. 6 on the Foster lease, near latan. The test is in Section 17, block 29, Township 1 South, T. & P. Ry. survey, 330 feet from south line of section and 2310 feet from east line.

Results encountered so far in this test are causing considerable stir in oil circles of the county, as are developments in the field southeast of Colorado. It was reported to be looking far better than any well drilled so far on the Foster lease.

It was shut down late Wednesday at a depth of 2875 feet to await further orders from the company to determine whether to stop drilling and start production at the present depth, or to drill deeper. The well was standing full of oil hen shut down, and will probably produce over 100 barrels daily as it stands at present, according to opinions expressed by several oil







LORAINE FARMER AND WIFE MAKING PROFIT ON WHITE LEGHORNS

Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Kirkpatrick Feed Egg-Yaying Mash To Flock

A flock of 88 White Leghorn hens properly cared for is making a net profit of \$25 to \$30 a month for Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Kirkpatrick of Loraine. No hatching eggs have been sold and lately the price has been only 18 cents a dozen, but the high spring production has kept the mcome up to the average of the preceding months.

The flock was started on a masn feed last fall and with the exception of one week during a severe cold spell, production has been over fifty eggs per day for the last four months. Last fall they had about 60 Reds but they were only laying six eggs per day on the same feed the other hens had, so they were disposed of.

During January they sold 123 dozen eggs at 30 and 40 cents per dozen for a total of \$41.20. Feed cost was \$14, leaving a profit of \$27.20. In February they sold 146 dozen at 25 and 30 cents for \$43.15. Feed cost was \$11.50 and the profit was \$31.65. In March they laid 191 dozen, which sold for \$40.60. The feed cost was \$14, and profit \$26.60.

"These hens are paying for their feed, our groceries and gas, and I don't see how we ever got along without them," Mrs. Kirkpatrick says.

They have 500 baby chicks that are a month old and coming along nicely. An interesting comparison of value of the old and the new methods of brooding chicks may be seen in this bunch of baby chicks. They have one hen caring for a bunch chicks that are with the hen.



WILL BE AT CARLSBAD

It is reported from Carlsbad that at Abilene in the management of the Snowden & McSweeney have purchased a 27 1/2 acre tract in the La Huerta district, across the river and northeast of that city, on which they CARS IS OAKLAND PLAN will erect a refinery to treat the potash which they expect to take from their mines 25 miles east of

For some time it has been known that vast deposits of potash are to be found in this section of the country and numerous tests have been made by the Federal government in both New Mexico and in Texas.

Attention was called to the area the Lovington-Carlsbad highway about 25 miles east of Carlsbad when the Snowden-McSweeney company, in drilling for oil, found promising indications of potash. A log of the well was furnished the geological survey of the U. S. Government and as a result several tests were made that area, in all of which large osits of potash were found at in-Since that time the Snowden-Mc-

Sweeney company has carried on an extensive and intensive core drilling campaign. A series of tests were made surrounding the first test in every direction. Considerable secrecy has been observed in this drilling. No information of any character has been given out. But that these tests were favorable was indicated by the fact that the work was continued and that a potash lease from the State was obtained upon 5,000 acres in that

The recent announcement from Carlsbad confirms the belief that potash in paying quantities is to be found in this section and that the time will come when the potash deposits of Southeastern New Mexico will enable this country to be free from Germany for this useful article.

Work by the Government geological survey during the last few years revealed the crater of an old lake east of Carlsbad that was one time a body of water without an outlet and the streams flowing into it for hundreds of years accumulated a bed of potassium salts which is several hundred feet thick. There are a large number of rich deposits of potash in Southeastern New Mexico, but most of them are in such a formation that the process for removing the mineral would not be practical. However, this particular deposit east of Carlsbad, which is said to be 50 miles wide and 150 miles long, contains a kind of ore that can be refined much easier than any other yet found .-Midland Reporter.



As oon as the desired purpose has been definitely achieved, another section can be put through the course and so on until a dependable record has been made for every hen in the flock. This record not only serves to indicate the best layers, but is an invaluable guide for the selection of breeding

> A flock should be trap-nested for twelve (12) months to tell accuratey just what each individual hen is capable of doing in egg production. To trap-nest for three months and multiply by four does not give an

accurate yearly record. And now, just a word about the mechanics of trap-nesting. A trap nest, as everyone knows, is one equipped to hold a hen captive when she enters it to lay. Each hen in the flock has a numbered leg band on one of her legs, and before she is released, if she has layed, her number is put down on a daily record sheet, indicating that she layed that day. After a hen lays in a nest, she has to be released by an attendant and the nest left upon ready for another hen. Home-made nests of this kind are easily constructed, although space is lacking in this article for giving definite instructions as to how it is done. There are many ready-made forms of trap-nests that give satisfaction and are reasonably priced. Some manufacturers simply furnish a front with the trap mechanism attached. It can easily be fitted to a suitable form of home-made nest. Numbered leg bands for identifying the hens are purchased in series at comparatively
