









DR. COLEMAN GIVES INFORMATION TO HELP CITIZENS AVOID LURKING DANGER OF HYDROPHOBIA IN PETS

A lurking danger will always tinge the relationship of man and animal, according to Dr. P. C. Coleman, county and city health officer, as long as rabies exist and no precautionary measures are taken to prevent its appearance and spread.

Dr. Coleman stated, "They become restless, eat little, and then things out of their ordinary diet, such as wood, grass, etc.; following this state the dog is irritable and snaps at and bites anything that crosses its path—this latter being known as the furious stage.

"There is no truth to the fable that a mad dog fears and avoids water. He slobbers profusely, probably because he cannot swallow his normal flow of saliva. The last stage of the afflicted animal is paralysis of the jaws and hind part, accompanied by convulsions, death soon ensuing.

5,000 Attend Short Course At A. & M.

COLLEGE STATION, July 29.—Faced by a week of intensive study of the newest angles of farming and farm practices, what officials have estimated as a record crowd, thronged the A. & M. College of Texas campus Monday for the opening of the twentieth annual farmers' short course.

More than 3,100 visitors had been housed in college dormitories by Monday morning and a host of others occupied quarters at the college camp ground, in the hotel and at campus residences. Many came for the day by automobile. Total attendance was estimated at 5,000 and of this number more than 1,600 are farm boys and girls.

"It is upon the application to farming of modern farm practices by such leaders in this great industry as are represented here at this gathering that the future of agriculture in this State and the Nation depends," said President T. O. Walton of the college in welcoming the visitors to the short course.

President Walton added that the real application of agricultural economics must begin upon the farm itself.

ST. LOUIS PLANE LANDS AFTER 420 HOURS IN THE AIR

Told To Come Down After Near 3 Weeks; Plane Good Condition

ST. LOUIS, July 30.—The monoplane "St. Louis Robin" piloted by Dale (Red) Jackson and Forest O'Brine, glided to a safe landing at Lambert-St. Louis field at 7:38:30 p. m. (C. S. T.) tonight, ending a record breaking endurance flight of 420 hours, 21 minutes and 30 seconds.

The plane made a perfect landing in the middle of the field with about 15,000 spectators watching them.

Told to Come Down

Earlier in the day Major William B. Robertson, sponsor of the flight, sent aloft a note requesting the flyers to land some time during the day, and it was considered that in landing they would be acceding to his wishes.

Jackson and O'Brine presumably debated all day over the note calling them down. The text of the note was not made public, but Major Robertson explained in a memorandum that the reason for his decision was that the objects of the test flight had been fully accomplished, as the motor has more than proved itself and that the technical data desired has been obtained.

Pass Angeleno 173 Hours

The fliers had been in the air almost eighteen days and had exceeded the old endurance record of the Angeleno by 173 hours, 37 minutes and 58 seconds when, with Jackson at the controls, the plane swooped gracefully over the field and settled to earth.

The landing was made in a glare of field lights as a crowd estimated at more than 25,000, many of whom had stood in the rain during the afternoon, burst forth with the greatest ovation witnessed at the field since the homecoming of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh from his New York-to-Paris flight.

Excellent Condition

Both men were pronounced in excellent physical condition. O'Brine had gained two pounds since he and Jackson went up July 13, scaling 140 pounds tonight as against 138 pounds when the flight began. Jackson's weight was the same as it was when he went aloft 154 pounds.

The heart action of both men was pronounced normal and physicians said their hearing was normal. They conversed easily with reporters and friends in the hangar.

Statistics on Flight

ST. LOUIS, July 30.—Dale "Red" Jackson and Forest O'Brine earned \$31,256 jointly or \$15,672.50 each in the record breaking flight of the St. Louis Robin, which ended here tonight.

This did not include \$2,756 in cash sums given them for checks and cash which had been sent to the chamber of commerce. Eighteen days' pay as commercial pilots must also be figured into the total. The Curtis-Robertson company, their employer, has declined to reveal their regular salaries.

The mileage of the Robin was estimated at 25,200 miles on a consumption of approximately 3,500 gallons of high test fuel, oil totaled 158 gallons and 48 contacts were made for refueling. The propeller revolutions, counted at 1,300 per minute, approximated 32,000,000.
