ther during the growing season a preliminary spot check made this week reveals.

A total of 76 acres was planted in peanuts this year on the three test farms and average yield was 27 bushels per acre.

A representative three farms, located at various spots in the county was checked for the test and showed that average yield per acre is up about six bushels this year, even though fewer acres this year.

On the same three farms last year, 78 acres were planted and the average yield per acre was 21 bushels per acre.

Marketing reports are incomplete, Gilbert Meredith, office manager for the Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Committee in the County, said, but is expected to be rounded out about mid-January. The marketing cards have been coming in fast the past few weeks, he said, and will be tabulated by

his office soon.

There have been several reports of severely damaged crops by last week's freezing weather, he said, indicating that there will be a certain amount of loss due to the cold weather.

The county peanut crop is currently considered a \$2,000,000 a year economy, from an average of 22,500 acres on 1,180 county farms. This total number of planted acres is down this year because of extremely dry weather during May, June and July and then it started raining in August and continued almost through September. However, October and November had exceptionally good maturing weather—enough to have crops planted.

In 1962, 28,913 acres produced 9,400 tons of peanuts amounting to \$1,974,000 revenue.

U of T Scientist To Talk At 2nd County Seminar

Dr. W. L. Fisher, Research Scientist and Lecturer for the University of Texas, will be one of the featured speakers at the second EC-65 Training Seminar, according to an announcement by the Texas Industrial Commission. Dr. Fisher, a member of the faculty of the Bureau of Economic Geology, will discuss the "Mineral Resources of Eastland County." He is a graduate of Kansas University and has been associated with the University of Texas since 1960.

This will be the second in a series of five seminars sponsored by the Texas Industrial Commission in conjunction with EC65, the industrial development pilot project for Eastland County. The first seminar, held in Ranger in early December, covered the topic of "Community Betterment" one of the five steps

toward the industrialization of this area. The second seminar is called "Research and Analysis." Three other training sessions are scheduled in the coming months.

The meeting will be held January 6 in Eastland at the White Elephant Restaurant beginning at 9:00 a.m.

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — My \$5,000 U. S. Government Life Insurance is now paid up. However, my wife has just died. I have over a thousand dollars in bills, and twice as much insurance as I need. Can I change my insurance to meet this situation?

A — Yes. You may borrow against your insurance, or you may cash in part of it, retaining the amount of protection you consider necessary. Your beneficiary designation probably should be revised, too.

Q — What assistance can the VA give me in locating my husband who is receiving compensation?

A — The VA may forward mail to veterans. However, the VA is obligated to keep information concerning a veteran confidential and an address may not be revealed without the veteran's consent. Letters sent to the VA to be forwarded should be placed in an unsealed envelope and mailed to the VA Regional Office last known to have handled the veterans claim.

Q — I pay premiums on my GI insurance quarterly, and I am concerned because I have not received my premium due notice. I feel uneasy about waiting any longer to make this payment. Should I wait until I receive this notice?

A — By all means pay your premiums when they become
