## Winter Cover Crop Funds Still Available

Funds are still available for the winter cover crop practices in Eastland County, according to the ASCS county office manager, Jesse G. Meredith.

The rye cover crop practice is available to the farm effective 1964 peanut allotment, even though peanuts were not planted, he said. The vetch and winter pea practice is available to all farms, with a 100 acre limit per farm. Dec. 20 is the final date for seeding either practice.

The emergency grazing of Soil Bank has been extended to Dec. 31. To be eligible to graze this area, prior approval must be obtained and the grazing charge paid.

Peanut marketing cards are now ready for issuance upon request. Mr. Meredith issued a reminder that farms with excess peanuts may not receive cards until the excess is disposed of or a Form MQ-92 is filed.

## Amendments Get O. K. In County

Eastland County voters joined the state in approving the three proposed constitutional amendments.

Incomplete statewide returns showed the school fund amendment carried with 204,705 for and 102,964 against. Eastland County voted 2,762 for and 1,295 against.

The conservation district amendment carried 183,324 for and 95,156 against statewide, and Eastland County voted 2,605 for and 1,346 against.

The medical care amendment carried 230,877 for, 89,403 against in the state. Eastland Countians voted 3,332 for and 987 against — giving it the most decisive endorsement of the three.

## Nursing School Applications Being Accepted

The Ranger General Hospital is stepping up its drive to get in qualified applicants for the February 1965 Class of the Vocational Nursing School.

Anyone between the ages of 18 and 55 with at least two years of high school or its equivalent (a pre-entrance test is given) and in good physical and mental health is eligible for enrollment.

## Texas Water Commission Checking County Resources

The Texas Water Commission recently launched a regional study of the ground-water resources in Central Texas, including Eastland County. The study will be conducted from a field office established in Waco.

The study is designed to determine the quantity and quality of underground water available in the region with initial emphasis on the prolific Lower Cretaceous Trinity Sands. Personnel of the Commission's Ground Water Division will conduct intensive field investigations of the area including the collection of information on municipal, industrial, irrigation and selected domestic wells.

A major goal of the study will be the construction of a model of the aquifer system from the data collected in the field. The model will enable estimates to be made of the potential amounts of ground water available to communities and cities in the study area.

This detailed study will require at least three years of field investigation for com-

pletion. It will provide valuable information to all cities, industries, and other water users in this important area. Shortly after the study is completed, the Commission will publish a report of the findings which will be available to the general public.

In making this announcement, County Judge Scott Bailey emphasized that this ground-water study will furnish valuable information concerning our water supply and added that this study will be of real interest in determining the possibility of further agricultural and industrial development of our county.

## Road Work Seen As Benefit For Deer Hunters

AUSTIN — Texas hunters, poised for what could be the greatest deer harvest, were admonished by J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator for the Parks and Wildlife Department "to begin getting in their road work."

He cautioned that "all too many" nimrods spoil the sport of going afield for lack of condition.

"Each year," he advised, "our snowballing soft way of life sends more people after their favorite target in increasingly poor physical condition."

"Of course, it's too late now, what with the regular season opening at mid-November, to get all muscled up. But as your physician will agree, you can work off some of the rough edges."

"I am told that plain, old-fashioned walking may do the job. At least, it can ease the transition from routine chair calisthenics to the rigors of

the hunt."

Phillips said nowadays, with more and more people having year-round air conditioning at home as well as at offices, the mere "exposure" to fresh air can be a trial for some hunters. "Then," he said, "if you blend in a wet Texas norther, the average inactive person really gets the crucial test."

He added statistics show that heart attacks are a major cause of hunter ailments in the field.

"Our best advice then is," he said, "for the hunter to begin as early as possible in pre-acclimation routine. And we are told if he does nothing better than 'get his legs in shape' he will have automatically enhanced his own physical welfare for the big hunt. Of course, simple deep breathing exercises will help."

Phillips continued the best counsel is to have a checkup before the annual field invasion particularly for those over-weight and past middle age.

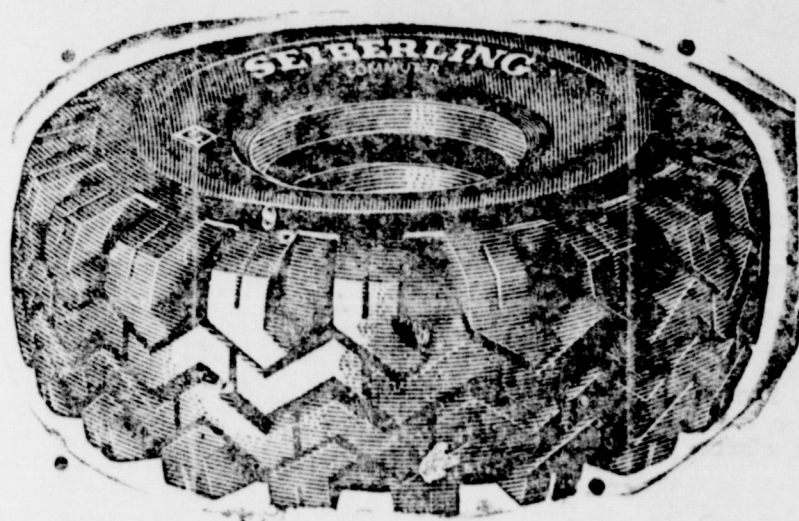

## Per Capita Pay Checks Up For Texas Workers

DALLAS--Personal income for the State of Texas rose \$1,782 millions of dollars from 1961 to 1963, from a total of \$19,569 millions in 1961 to \$21,351 millions of dollars in 1963.

Major sources of income in 1963 were from Wage and Salary Disbursement \$13,934 millions, Manufacturing \$2,314 millions, Wholesale and Retail Trade \$2,773 millions, Services \$1,489 millions, Government \$2,993 millions, with State and Local Governments accounting for \$1,433 millions, while the Federal Civilian total was \$774 millions. Farm income totalled \$863 millions while Non-farm totalled \$2,077 millions.

Per capita income in Texas

rose from \$1,973.00 dollars in 1961 to \$2,068.00 dollars in 1963, according to Harry C. Mayers, Director, Dallas Field Office, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The August 1964 issue of Survey of Current Business published by the Commerce Department's Office of Business Economics, he said, presents data on Personal and Per Capita income by states for 1961, 1962 and 1963.

### One From County To Be Inducted

The state draft quota for November calls for 307 men, compared to 236 for October, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state selective service director, said Wednesday.

The state quota of 307 for November is the Texas share of a national call for 8,600 men, all for the Army. One only from the local board will be inducted and ten 18-year-olds examined, the local board reports.

The state selective service director also announced that state draft boards will forward around 2,900 males for Army mental-physical examinations in November, all of whom will be 18 year-olds.

These tests for 18 year-olds are the result of President Johnson's action early this year which ordered the director of selective service and the secretary of defense to examine all newly-registered men who are out of school and available for service. Males married at age 18 and those known to be in school at that age will not be examined.

Colonel Schwartz stressed that these youths will not be considered for armed forces at this time. Normally, draft for service is about age 22.

The 18-year olds who fail the Army's mental examination will be referred by draft board letters to local offices of the Texas Employment Commission.

Youths who get the letters are under no compulsion to visit the TEC offices, but may go if they feel the government can benefit them.
