The attempted assassination was enacted in a Miami park just after Mr. Roosevelt had concluded an address. Thousands of people were present to greet the Democratic nominee after his return from a yacht cruise of ten days.

Mayor Anton Cermack of Chicago, close personal friend of Mr. Roosecelt, and Mrs. Joseph Gill of Miami, formerly of Dallas, were seriously wounded by bullets fired in quick succession by the would-be killer. Mayor Cermack was walking toward an automobile in which Roosevelt had just entered when the shooting
