A familiar character in the Colorado of other days passed away Monday morning in the death of Benjamin A. Barnett, 22, who back in those days when there were no paved streets operated the city's street sprinkler in downtown area through several years. The late citizen had made his home in Co!orado for 22 years.



After a test run last week the model irrigation plant on H. L. Lockhart farm twenty miles southwest from Colorado was placed in operation Tuesday of this week. The project is said to be one of the most elaborate and complete in detail to be found in this part of the State.

Water for the project is taken from lake formed a'ong channel o. Hackberry Creek. A large solid concrete dam backs water up the channel for more than a mile any affords adequate supply to irrigate, the 400 acres included in the pro-

Water is taken from the like by a centrifical pump capable of lifting 5,000 gallons per minute. The water is pumped into large concrete reservoir and from there turn d into two 121/2 inch and one five inch mains for distribution at centro' points about the farm. From the pipe lines water is conveyed in ditche where desired.

Mr. Lockhart returned here Saturday from his home at Dallas and during this week has been person ally directing operations at the farm. He expresses himself as wel pleased with the system in all respects.

Instal'ation of an electrical genrating plant, to be operated by turbine power is being considered by Mr. Lockhart. He stated the other day thit, water flowing over top of the dam would supply sufficient power to operate such a plant. Should this project be built, Lock-hart will string electric lights about the farm as an adjunct to night irrigation and also for lighting farm buildings, operating refrigerators small motors, etc.
