The legislative wheels virtually stopped revolving Wednesday noon when the 24-hour rule, providing for consideration of only conference reports and proposals to correct bills already passed within that time limit, before final adjournment, became effective.

Under The Dome At Austin

AUSTIN, Tex., (UP)—The unwillingness of the House of Representatives to fix a certain day for adjournment of the 43d legislature was not, as some thought, a desire to stay on at \$5 a day. It was born of past sad experiences.

Experience has been that when a definite time to quit is set, the senate sits tight and forces the house to accept higher appropriations, or force a special session.

The explanation for higher senate appropriations is simple. Practically every senatorial district has some state college or other institution situated in it. If Senator Smith wants a good appropriation for his institution it is imperative he be liberal with Senator Brown's institution.

This happened during Gov. Dan Moody's administration. The house agreed on adjournment date. Then the battle over the last appropriation bill was fought out. At midnight of adjournment day neither side had given in. Clocks were turned back. Finally at 2 a. m. a bill was agreed upon and sent to the governor.

Governor Moody signed the bill and discovered that although the legislature had voted against moving the state prison near Austin, the appropriation measure empowered the governor to do that.

Governor Moody announced he would not take advantage of the provision, which was clearly against the wishes of the house. The house learned a lesson and its new policy is to finish the appropriations and then fix adjournment date.

The First and Last Shots

The question of who fired the first and last shots in any of our wars and when and where they were fired has always been a subject for much dispute. So the World War will probably be no exception and future years probably will see various claimants to these titles arising. Already members of the crew of the U. S. S. Kenners are claiming the honor of firing the first shot in the World War for Quartermaster Holman of that ship.

On Good Friday, April 6, 1917, the day that the United States declared war on Germany, the Kenners was at the Charleston, Miss., navy yard. A detail was sent in the usual way to sea the German merchant ships in East Boston at Long wharf. They left at 3:30 a. m., crossed the river, forced the high gate on the dock and took possession of the ships. From the deck of the Kenners, Quartermaster Holman fired into the air as a signal to the navy yard that the job had arrived and had the situation in hand. And, that the Kenners crew asserts, was "the first American shot fired in the World War."

As for the last shot, Lieut. F. W. X. Greene, U. S. N. R. claims that honor for a United States naval mine-battery of 14-inch rifles and quonns from the leg as follows:

November 11, 1918. Battery No. 46. Was ready to load at 9 a. m. Between 10:15 a. m. and 10:35 a. m. fired through the air railway gunnery. Long shot fired by J. A. Hoffman, U. S. N. R. Spunged out and missed. One-third of men given liberty at afternoon.

Tax Remission Bill Becomes Law Upon Okey By Governor

Taxpayers were assured relief from penalties and interest on State and county taxes delinquent Feb. 1, 1933, when Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson signed and filed the Oneal Senate bill Friday.

Under the bill, the taxes may be paid up to Sept. 30, 1933, with 1 per cent penalty; before Dec. 31, 1933, with 2 per cent penalty; before March 31, 1934, with 4 per cent penalty, and before June 30, 1934, with 6 per cent penalty.

Towns, cities, villages, special school districts and independent school districts may adopt the penalties provided in the bill, but it is not mandatory.

An alternative plan is given for common school districts, road districts, levee improvement districts, water improvement districts and other self-governing defined subdivisions of the State except counties. If the subdivisions decide to adopt the plan, in this plan, the penalty and interest on ad valorem and poll taxes delinquent Feb. 1, 1933, are remitted, provided the taxes are paid before Sept. 30, 1933, with 1 per cent penalty, or if any one not financially able to pay all by Sept. 30, files an affidavit of his financial inability and at the same time tenders 20 per cent of the amount.

In that event he has the right to pay another 20 per cent by June 30, 1934, a third by Dec. 31, 1934, and a fourth by Dec. 31, 1935. However, the taxpayer is required to pay 5 per cent interest on these installments from Sept. 30, 1933, at the time of the payment of each install-
