

(Continued From Page One) would have required a two-thirds affirmative vote to breach it and then only should the house concur by a like majority.

The legislature convened on Jan uary 10 last, one week before Mrs. Miriam . Ferguson was inaugurated governor. It was the second time she had taken over the reins of state, having occupied the executive office for a single term in 1925-26. Her husband, former Governor James E. Ferguson, also had been elected governor twice before that. He was impeached and removed from office in 1917 and barred from ever again holding state office in his own

The Fergusons had little luck this time with the legislature, their recommendations, in the most part, having been rejected.

They proposed a sales tax -as a means of relieving home and land owners of the burden of taxation, an elective highway commission and a separate oil and gas commission to relieve the Texas railroad commission of its duties in administering conservation laws. All of these were defeated by the legislature.

Also, the senate refused to approve the appointment by Governor Ferguson of Frank L. Denison of Temple to be chairman of the highway commission.

This legislature, however, was the most frugal in decades, as well as he most liberal minded.

Appropriations to support the government the next biennium were reduced from nearly \$46,000,000 to nearly \$33,000,000. In addition, appropriations for rural school aid and other incidentals, including cost of the session, approximated \$10,000,000. All appropriations were reduced by about 25 per cent under the expenditures authorized by the last legislature.

This legislature surprised all factions when it legalized betting on horse races, voted to make prize fighting lawful, submitted a constitutional amendment proposing to permit the manufacture and sale of 3.2 per cent beer and paved the way for the state to say whether it want ed to ratify repeal of the national prohibition amendment.

When the 48-hour rule was invoked much important legislation was definitely killed, including a proposed tax on chain stores, an appropriation of \$500,600 to reimburse West Texas farmers for losses incurred during the state's quarantine against the pink bol! worm, a bill requiring the printing of school textbooks in Texas, a bill to regulate the ready-to-serve charges, of gas utilities and a bill proposing reorganization of the state governmental departments. The reorganization proposal had been recommended by a joint legislative com mittee after it worked on the plan more than eighteen months and spent more than \$60,000 in employing experts and in other incidenta' expenses.
