LOCAL BAKER LOSES ARM IN TRAFFIC MISHAP NEAR TOWN SUNDAY AFTERNOON

J. D. Hardigree, With Badly Mangled Member, Drives Car To Hospital

With his left arm badly mangled and suffering from shock and loss of blood. J. D. Hardigree, Colorado baker, late Sunday afternoon drove his car from east of the Odd Fellows cemetery to the C. L. Root Hospital, a distance of about four miles. The injured member was amputated shortly after Hardigree arrived at the hospital.

Hardigree was injured when hi motor car and a Sweetwater truck side-swiped on Highway One. Hardigree, driving alone, was goint eas and the truck, operated by Haskell Scott and Henry Harbin of Sweet water, was being driven west. Both machines were moving under considerable speed, according to information obtained by the authorities.



BALLOT FORMS FOR STATE Aid, Holt Says For ELECTION RECEIVED HERE Equalization Board MONDAY BY COUNTY CLERK

Five Amendments Be Voted On In Special Election Set For Aug. 26

Certified ballot form for the special election August 26 was received Monday morning by B. L. Templeton, county clerk from the Secretary of State at Austin. Mr. Templeton has delivered the form to Whipkey Printing Company as "copy" from which the ballots are to be printed.

The federal question is ratification of the proposed amendment to repeal the eighteenth amendment. Among the state propositions is one that, if adopted, would legalize the nanufacture and sale of 3.2 per cent lcoholic beverages.

Repeal of the eighteenth amendent will appear on a separate balt. The four state questions will grouped on one ballot.

Prohibitionists and anti-prohibiionists recently selected 31 delegates and 31 alternates to appear on the ballot. The group for repeal of the eighteenth amendment was given first place on the ballot under heading "for ratification." The inti-repealists were placed opposite nder "against ratification."

Other state constitutional quesons to be submitted include: counhome rule for counties having a opulation in excess of 62,000; is uance of \$20,000,000 in state bonds o aid unemployment relief; extension of the \$3,000 homestead exemption to counties where the state tax kas been remitted.

Under terms of the federal act, not more than 50 per cent of the fund may be applied on the cost of federal designated highways, not more than 25 per cent on secondary roads and not less than 25 per cent on highways traversing municipali-

The money must be spent in not less than 75 per cent of the coun ties of Texas.

New highways will not be des ignated unless in emergency cases or where the new highway would link major traffic arteries.
