

BRONTE-Engineers who complete the survey for the irrigation district will be in Bronte and Robert Lee this week. Word was received from the Fort Worth firm that is to complete the work done by Ulen & Co., and the first irrigation project between Robert Lee and Bronte, that some of their men would be out during the week.

The Coke County project is befieved to be in such shape as to make it especially attractive to the Public Works Administrator. For ten years the people of Coke County have been working on the project. and have all the engineering work. completed but a few canal contours.

Robert Knierin of Bronte, who has een one of the leaders for irrigation n Coke county all through the years, says that the Board of Water Engineers at Austin told him two weeks ago that contracts could be let on the project within 45 days after the financing was arranged.

It is believed that it will not be necessary to hold an election to ratify the project as in recent years irrigation projects have been organized as ordinary cooperations and stock issued to landowners in proportion to the number of acres they put into the district. The returns from the water taken by the landowners retires the bonds issued are retired the interest becomes less and the water charge is reduced.

Irrigation districts in the state show a water cost of about \$3 an acre per year. But with the government making a donation of 30 per ent of the cost, and the dam site being located in a region where the land inundated is not agricultural and and reasonable in price the investment cost to start with should be lower than the average of the state.

Colorado business is mobilizing as rapidly as it can under the Blue Eagle. This emblem of co-operation is displayed in many places of business as a sign to the public that an employer has agreed to comply with President Roosevelt's emergency code affecting wages and hours of employment. Public opinion is being marshaled behind the re-employment program. even as in war time, and woe to the slackers who do not fall in line.

This is a time for action. But is alsogis a time for caution and sober judgment. It is unfortunate that in time of stress and excitement, when public opinion is easily swayed, there always are rumors and rumors of rumors that spread with the wind, gaining momentum as they go. Rumors and baseless reports, without the semblance of a fact to back them up, sometimes involve reputable businesses and honorable citizens whose uprightness is unquestioned.

Citizens of Colorado should beware of such rumors. They should not be believed and above all they should not be repeated. The President has given business until Sept. 1 to conform to the emergency code or for the various indus. tries to adopt their own code of fair competition. In the meantime the public should not give credence to wild rumors nor should they apply the powerful weapon which the President has suggested as to means of forcing business firms to comply with the code, the boycott. A sense of fair play should govern.
