
**OBJECTIVES OF TEXAS GOOD ROADS ASS'N ARE OUTLINED BY SPEAKER**

In the red meat and bread we get an acid ash content, which is balanced by the alkali ash content of the vegtables and fruits. In the steak, also in some of the fruits and vegetables-especially spinach-we get sufficient iron for our blood. In this dinner there is a balanced protein, carbohydrate and fat; a balanced alkali ash and acid ash; a balanced concentrated food and bulky residue containing food; an adequate supply of all needed inorganic ele-
