Ranger College **Art Department Ends Busy Term**


The Art Department at RJC. under the direction of Mrs. L. R. Pearson, Jr., has rounded out a successful, busy term.

Another potential new food product from research — powdered grapefruit juice — is ready for market testing to determine consumer accept ance, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reports.

This new powder dissolves in cold water to make a nutritious grapefruit juice with a remarkable fresh flavor, according to scientists of the USDA's Agricultural Research Service and Florida Citrus Commission, who developed the powder.

Like other dehydrated foods, the new grapefruit powder offers substantial savings in shipping and storage costs. Although storage temperatures needed to preserve its quality have not been determined, scientists believe the product will need little or no refrigeration.

To make the powder, specially prepared concentrated grapefruit juice is whipped into a stable foam, which is forced through a press in spaghetti-like strips onto a moving belt and dried in a stream. of heated air. The dried strips are then ground into powder. Approximately 200 pounds of the powder have been made in a small pilot-plant at the Winter Haven laboratory for consumer evaluation in the United Kingdom and West Germany. The consumer tests will be conducted by the Florida Citrus Commission and the

USDA's Statistical Reporting Service.

Suicide Is 10th Leading Cause Of **Death In Texas**

COLLEGE STATION - The tenth leading cause of death in Texas last year was suicide.

This grim reminder comes from Patsy Reynolds, Extension family life education specialist at Texas A&M University.

"It's ironic in a time when we spend so much money and have made so much progress against dread diseases such as tuberculosis that suicides should outrank deaths from many of these diseases," the specialist said.

Records of the Texas State Department of Health show that men took their lives three times as frequently as women. Ninety-six per cent of the suicides were of the white race, and the period from 45 to 55 years of age produced the most deaths.

These facts support national research on the subject, Miss Reynolds explains. The typical suicide appears to be a white male between 45 and 55 and the time of suicide appears to be between seven and 11 o'clock on a bright sunny

Most people are not prepared to counsel with a mentally disturbed person who may be contemplating suicide. "Yet we can take anyone seriously who mentions suicide, and try to see that they talk to a physician, social worker, or minister. We can take time to talk to the person who doesn't seem to have a great many friends, and we can listen to their problems," the specialist said.
