be one of those that gains 700 pounds or more. Her calf weighed 931 pounds last Saturday afternoon. It had gained 626 pounds with 34 more days to go. If the calf continues to gain at the same rate he will put on 86 more pounds and have a total gain of 712 pounds.

Ty Earl Powell, who has been leading the contest since August, did not bring his calf in for the weighing last Saturday. Ty Earl has two calves and they were standing first and fourth in the contest at the December weigh day. Each of these calves could gain as much as 700 pounds or more. Dallas Powell also had two calves in the contest and his big calf was standing in second place at the December weigh day. That calf will be one of those that gains above 700 pounds even if he slows down to two pounds per day during the last two months.

Another calf that could possibly beat the 700 pound mark is a calf called George and is being fed by Chip Bennett. George will have to gain three pounds per day during the last 34 days in order to make it. There is always the possibility of a few calves putting on a fast spurt of growth during the latter part of the period and catching up with the leaders.

Twenty calves were weighed last Saturday afternoon but not all of them had been on feed since May. Most of these calves will gain between 75 and 85 pounds between the time they were weighed and the 23rd of February which is the day they will be shown and sold.

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
