# BANK FOR PLAINS!

## Confirmation Is Received Thursday In Austin

Word received just as The Review was going to press, is that the State Banking Commission in Austin had granted a charter for a bank at Plains.

Complete details are unavailable at this writing. Confirmation of the bank project climaxes some two months of untiring effort on the part of interested parties.

About twenty citizens and most of the banking committee left Plains Wednesday morning to attend the hearing in Austin this morning. Appearing to protest the granting of the charter, according to reports, was J. O. Gillham, who is associated with the Brownfield State Bank and Yoakum County State Bank.

Just how soon the bank will be in operation is not known; however, it is fairly certain that it will be in the near future. A building owned by Clyde Hardwick has been rented by the banking committee for temporary use until land can be obtained for the construction of a new building. The temporary headquarters will be located on Main Street, next door to Glover's Cleaners.

Bill Loyd, who is now associated with the Citizens' Bank in Roby, Texas, will serve as president of the local bank. Loyd will move his family to Plains soon. He and his wife are parents of one daughter.

The bank board of directors will include: A. B. Carpenter, Plains farmer; Glenn Cleveland, local rancher; Robert K. Field, rancher near Bronco; Roy Fitzgerald, Plains rancher; John J. Kendrick, associated with the First National Bank of Brownfield; M. W. Luna, local rancher; R. N. (Rusty) McGinty, rancher; W. B. (Red) Tudor, banker and Buick dealer at Brownfield; and Lee F. York, associated with the First National Bank of Lubbock.

Granting of the charter is certainly a major step toward progress and the growth of Plains, in addition to being of convenience to all citizens and business people, who are now having to do their banking in outlying towns.

Much credit for the bank should go to the banking committee, who have worked so untiringly for the last two months.

### PLAINS BUILDING BOOM UNDERWAY

"And who are you?" sneered the man, with a grin. Said the Spirit, "The man that you might have been."

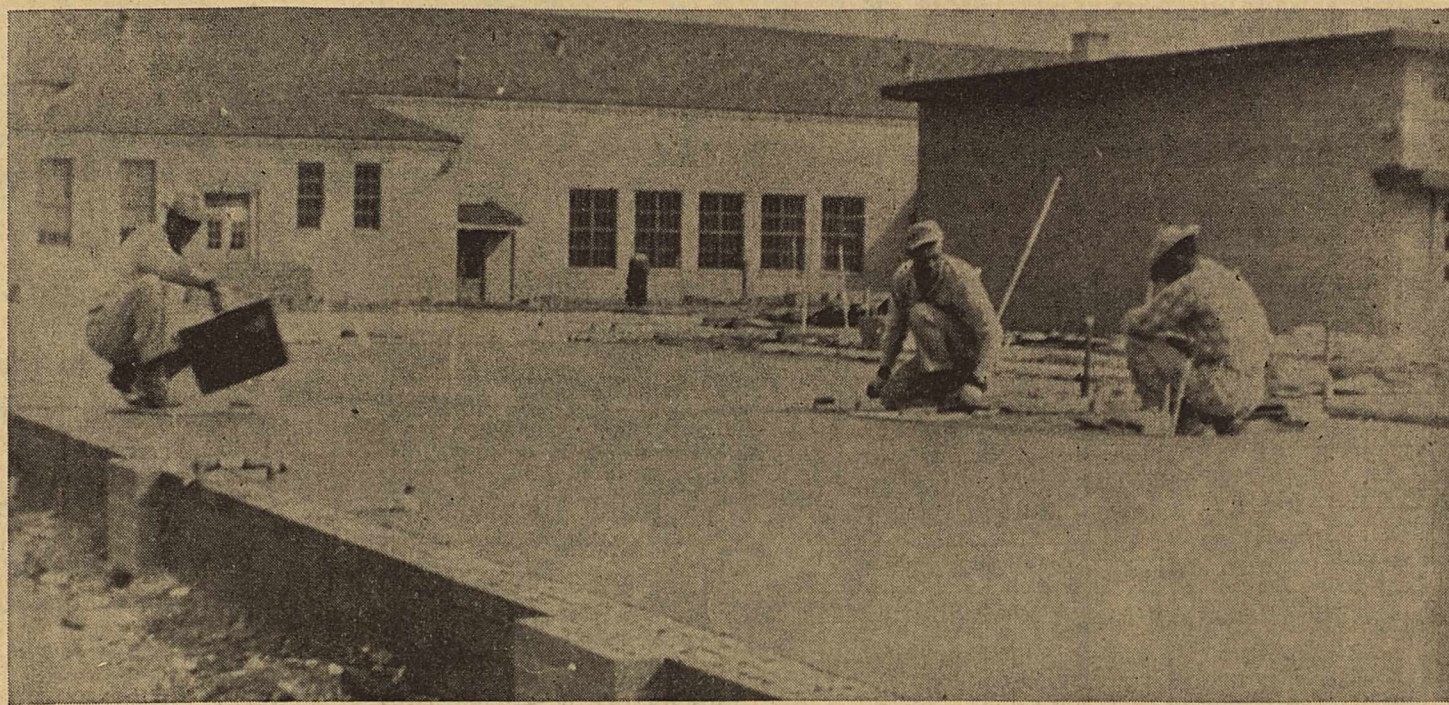

### Lario Oil, D&D Final Wells In Brahaney Field In Central Yoakum

Shell Oil Company No. 13 Roberts, project in South Yoakum County, eight miles northwest of Denver City, which is attempting to confirm production in the Wasson (Wolfcamp) field, is shut in for fluid build up.

Operator has perforated casing opposite the Wolfcamp from 8,557 to 8,613 feet. Several swabbing tests have been made on the perforated section, with no commercial production developed.

Location is 1,900 feet from south and 2,500 feet from west lines of section 793, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

Anderson-Prichard Oil Corporation No. 1 Holt, scheduled 13,350-foot Devonian wildcat 8 1/2 miles northwest of Seagraves in Southeast Yoakum County, was drilling water wells on last report, preparatory to spudding.

Location is 660 feet from east and 1,980 feet from north lines of section 875, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

F. Howard Walch and M. E. McCullough have completed No. 1 Selma Andres as a new well

in the Russell (7,000-foot) Clear Fork field. It completed for a daily pumping potential of 44 barrels of 33.4 gravity oil, through perforations from 7382 to 7722 feet, after 40,000 gallons of acid and 25,000 gallons of fracture fluid.

Location is 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 417, block G, CCSD & RGNG survey.

A pair of projects have been staked in the Russell (7,000-foot Clear Fork) field of Northwest Gaines County.

El Cinco Oil Company, Ltd., of Midland, will drill No. 1 Shell-Jones, 660 feet from north and 330 feet from east lines of section 498, block G, CCSD & RGNG survey.

No. 2 Shell-Jones is 1,980 feet from north and 330 feet from east lines of the same section.

The projects are scheduled for 7,700 and 7,900 foot bottoms.

Lario Oil & Gas Company has completed No. 3 Jones as a San Andres well in the Brahaney field of Central Yoakum County for a daily pumping potential of 122 barrels of oil, em 32.8 gravity, through perforations from 5,243 to 5,300 feet.

Location is 660 feet from north and west lines of section 391, block B, John H. Gibson survey.

In addition to the oil, the producer made five per cent water. D&D Oil Company and E. J. Dunnigan, Jr., have completed No. 2 Henard in the same field.

It made 192.56 barrels of oil on pump from perforations at 5,218-5,258 feet. Gravity of the oil was 32. It also made 10 per cent water. Pay was acidized with 8,000 gallons.

Well site is 1,980 feet from north and east lines of section 392, block D, Gibson survey.

D&D Oil Company and E. J. Dunnigan also completed No. 3 Henard in the Brahaney field for a daily pumping potential of 104.40 barrels of 32 gravity oil, no water, through perforations from 5,210-5,256 feet, after 8,000 gallons of acid.

Location is 660 feet from north and 1,970 feet from west lines of section 392, block D, John H. Gibson survey.

### Three Names Filed For City Alderman

Three names were entered in the race for City Councilmen before the filing deadline last Saturday. They were W. B. Scott, who is up for re-election; James Warren and J. S. Wagley. Bud Brian, whose term expires, did not ask re-election.

Mr. E. B. Teague was the only person who filed for the position of city judge.

Although there is still some time left to file for the special election, only one name appeared on the list Tuesday, and that was Pete Sampson. The special election is for an alderman to take the place left vacant by Rod Duff when he resigned to take the job as city secretary. Mr. Duff's term still had a year to go.

### Three Members To Be Named In School Board Election

Three new members will be elected to the school board at an election to be held April 6.

Terms expiring this year are Garland Swann, Morris Lowe, and Olen Edwards.

Olen Edwards has been appointed to fill the unexpired term of W. L. Ham, who moved to Farmington, N.M.

Edwards has three children in the Plains school. They are Teresa Sue in the fifth grade, Lynn Dale in the eighth grade, and Don, a sophomore.

### Paquin Named As Special Judge

Jerry Paquin, local attorney, was elected as special judge of county court for a three month period at a special meeting of practicing attorneys in the county Monday afternoon.

Paquin was immediately administered the oath of office, and will preside during the February term of county court, which continues through April.

The action was taken according to law, to provide a special judge to take care of the court docket.

### Commissioners Are Still Stalemated On Appointing Judge

Decision on the appointment of a county judge to fill the vacancy created by the death of Judge H. K. Benton appeared to still be stalemated this week, after two weeks of discussion.

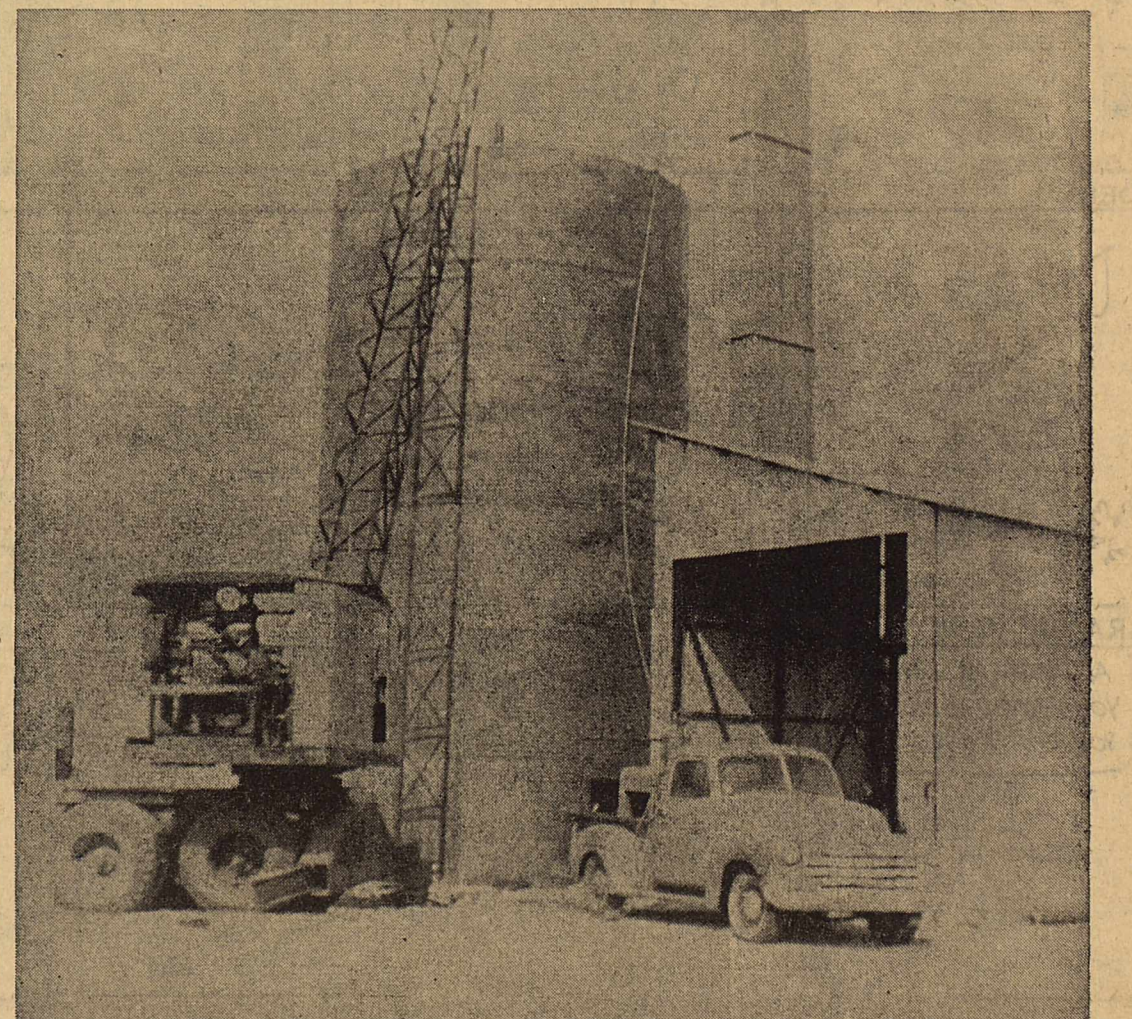
Members of the commissioners' court, who alone have the authority by law to make the appointment, met Monday morning in a regular session. However, very little mention of the appointment was made.

Fourteen applicants for the appointment have been listed, but to date the four commissioners have failed to reach an agreement. The vote appears to be deadlocked two and two, with Commissioners Vance Brown and H. C. Cotton voting on the same candidate, and Commissioners Clyde Trout and Gene Payne expressing preference for another.

During Monday's meeting, Mrs. Alton Elmore presented rules and regulations to govern the new club room established in the old court house building at Plains, as prepared by a committee from the home demonstration club there. The commissioners commended Mrs. Elmore on the rules, and expressed their approval.

The commissioners also sought information as to the acceptance of home demonstration club women on the possible hiring of Mrs. Bert Bartlett of Plains as county home demonstration agent. The county has been without an HDA for several months. Mrs. Elmore reported that all women she had contacted had expressed pleasure at such action. Members of the court were in accord that they would seek approval from the state extension service on the hiring of Mrs. Bartlett.

Vernon Townes, county attorney, met with the court, calling attention to the fact that there were a number of cases which needed to be disposed of in county court. The court instructed Townes to take necessary steps

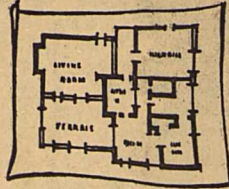

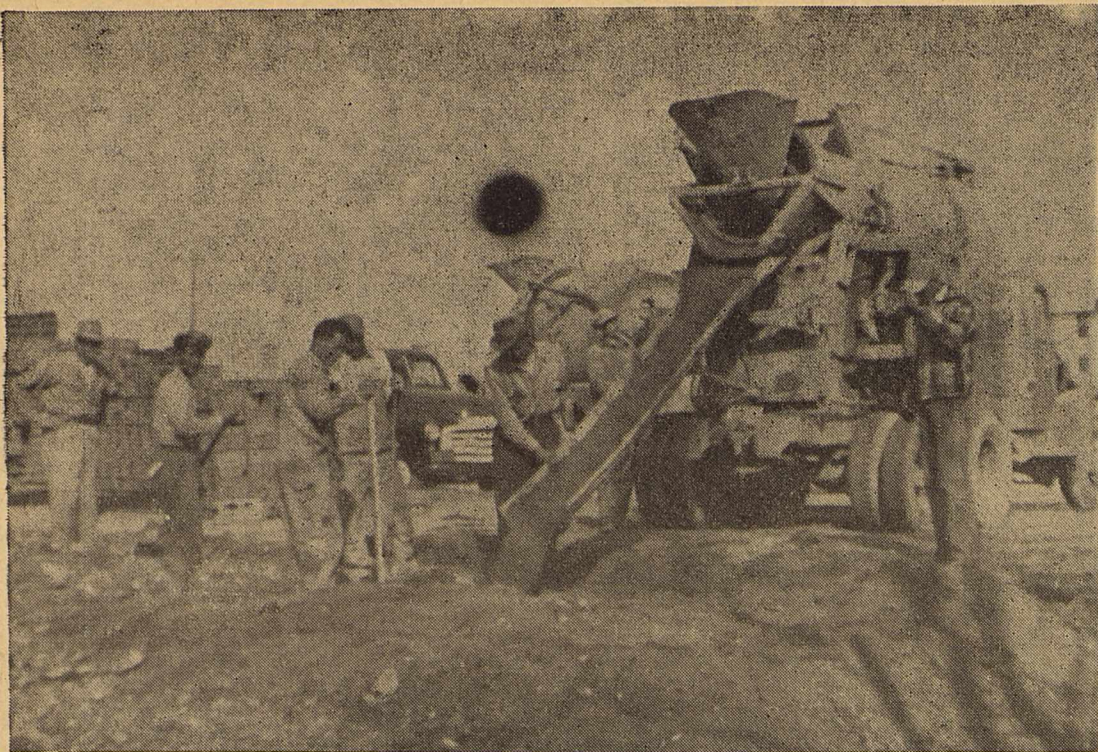

### Turner HD Club Meets Thursday

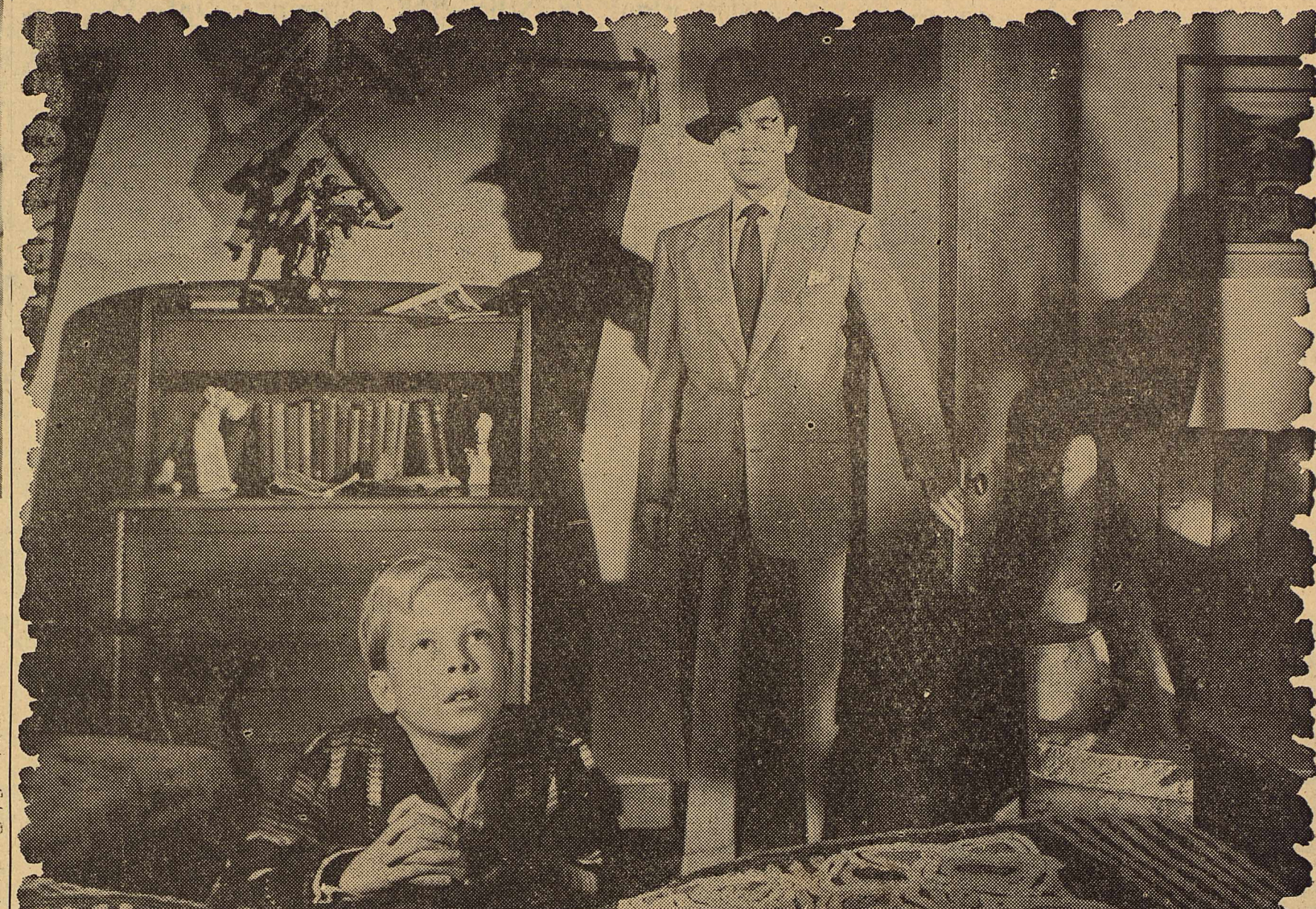

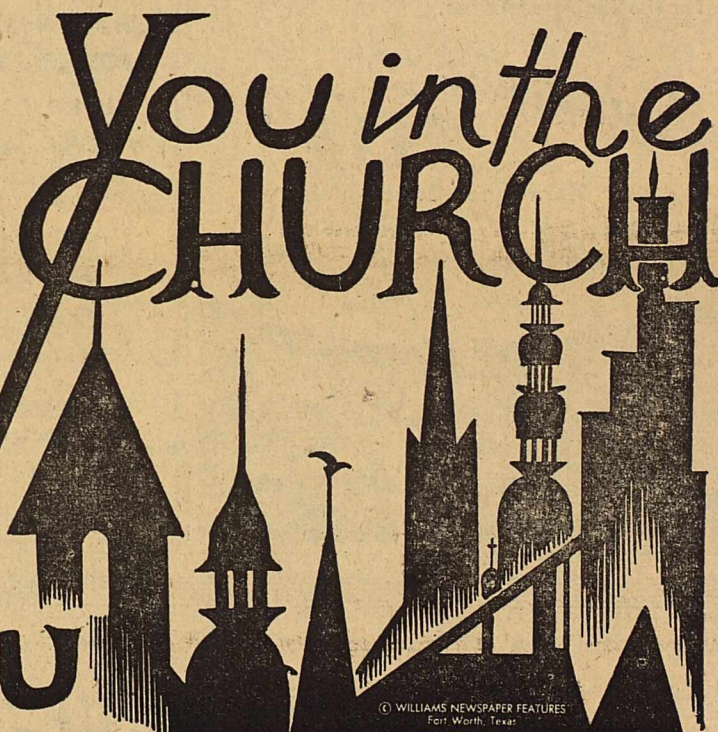
### Alcohol Education Week Said Well Supported Here

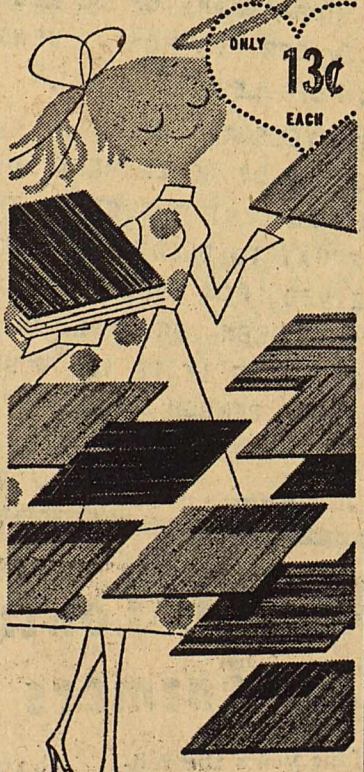

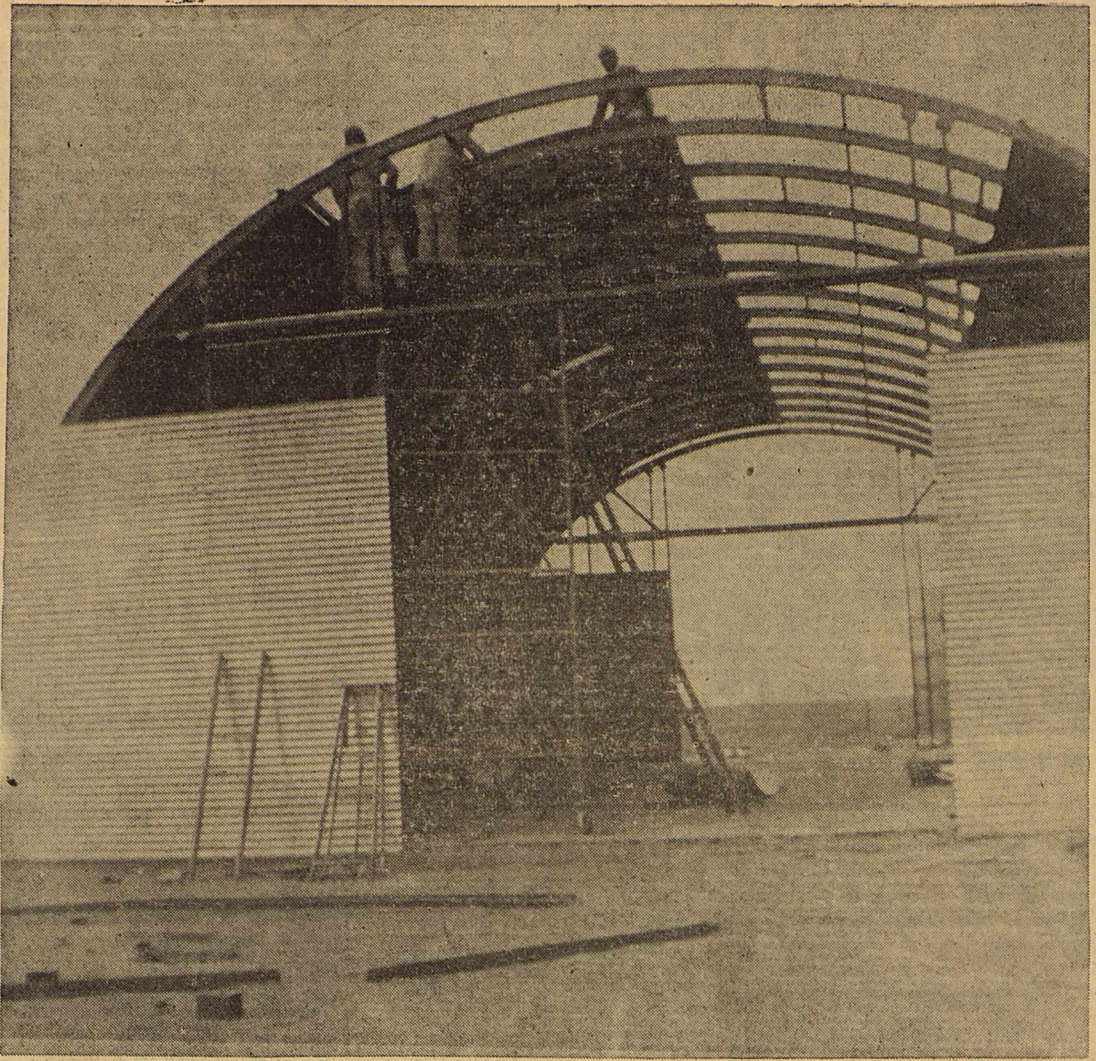
The Cowgirls were defeated in the first game by a score of 15-11 but the last two games were won by the Cowgirls by the scores of 15-11, and 15-8.

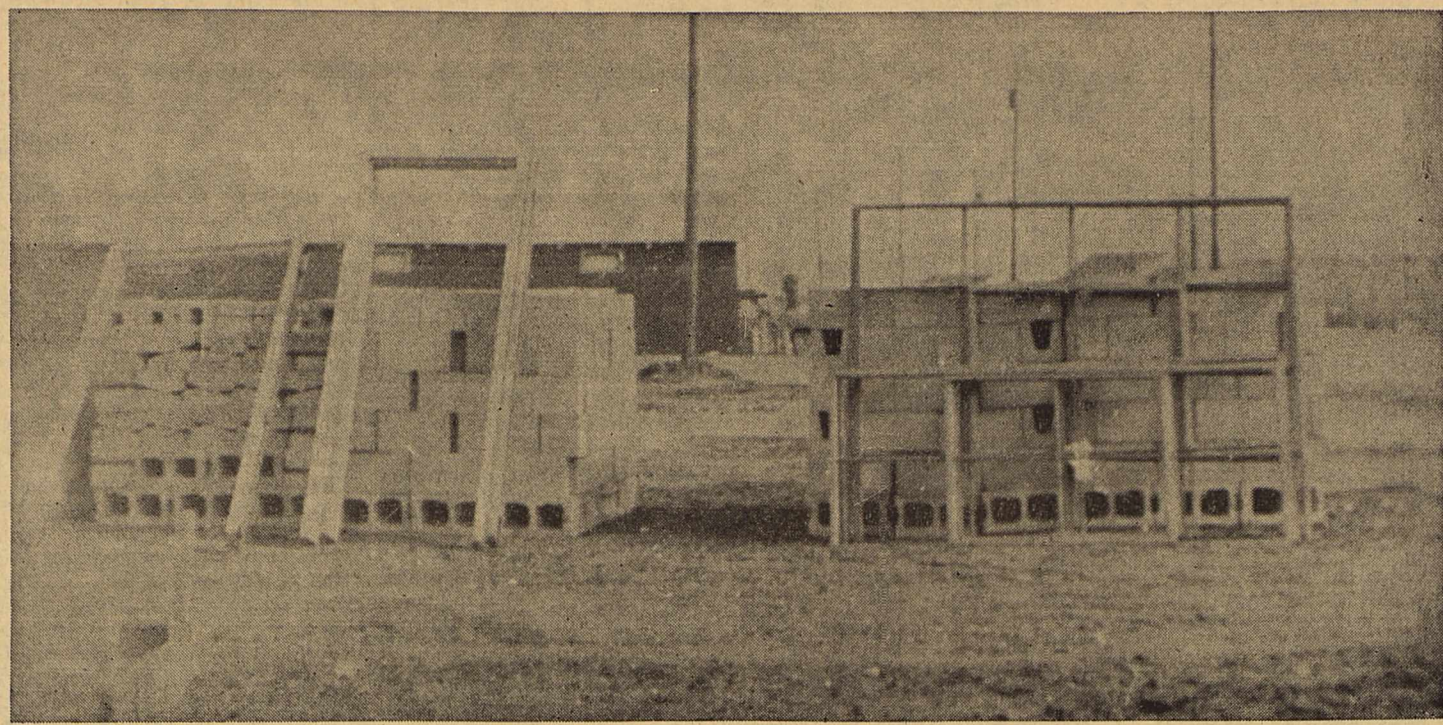

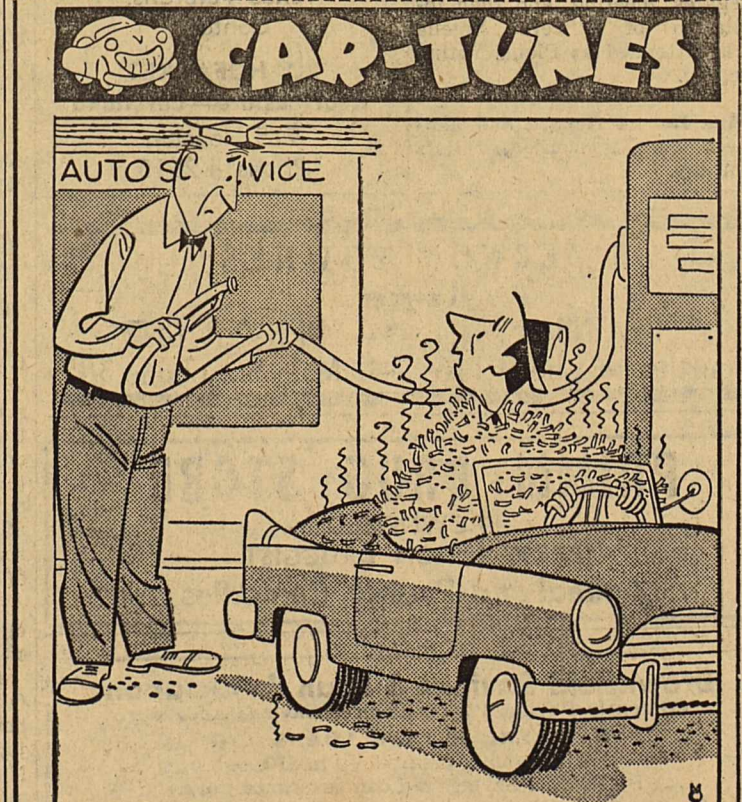
