The following rules for the new club room were compiled after conferences with representatives of the Brownfield and Denver City Community Buildings, Plains High School Student Council, Teenagers 4-H Club, various individuals, and have been approved by the Commissioners Court and the Yoakum County Council of Home Demonstration Clubs.

1. Civic and social organizations regularly using the building may schedule such use six months in advance. Others may schedule use a minimum of 30 days in advance.
2. No decorations are to be placed on walls, ceiling, woodwork, light fixtures, stoves or in any other manner that will mar the building.
3. No activity will be permitted in the rooms that will permanently mar floors, wall, ceiling, furniture or any other part of the room.
4. Any damage must be reported to the proper authorities at the time the key is returned.
5. All young people's groups must be sponsored by adults at all times. A panel of lights must be left on at all times during an activity at night. No one is to leave the building only in case of necessity or with permission of the sponsors in charge.
6. The building is not to be used for personal gain.
7. The building is not to be used on Sunday except on special occasions after approval of the committee in charge.
8. Under no circumstances is intoxicating liquor or narcotics to be used in this building or brought on the premises or any one permitted inside the building who is using such. Law officers will be called at the first sign of disturbances.

## Honolulu Attempts New Project in Prentice Area

Honolulu Oil Corporation will attempt to complete a new project, No. 3-D Alexander, from the Prentice Clear Fork and Glorieta pays in the Prentice (multipay) area of Northeast Yoakum County.

Drill site for the 6,800-foot test is 1,980 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of section 323, block D, J. H. Gibson survey, Lario Oil & Gas Company No. 5 Jones has been added as a new project to the Brahoney field

area of Central Yoakum County. Operator staked location for the 5,500-foot project 1,980 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of section 391, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

The Wasson 66 and 72 field area in North Gaines County, three miles southwest of Denver City, drew another project with the staking of Continental Oil Company No. 9-D-48 A. L. Wasson.

Drill site is 1,980 feet from north and west lines of section 48, block AX, psl survey.

It is scheduled for a 7,600-foot bottom.

Amerada Petroleum Corporation No. 1 M. W. Luna is to be dug as a 5,300-foot project to test for production in the regular pay of the Brahoney field.

It is 660 feet from south and east lines of section 369, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

James G. Brown and Associates of Midland announced location for a 6,000-foot wildcat four miles northwest of Seagraves in North Gaines County.

It is No. 1 A. M. Brownfield, 660 feet from south and east lines of the northwest quarter of section 52, block OB, J. H. Gibson survey.

McCulloch Oil Exploration Company of California No. 1 Denbo is a 5,423-foot San Andres failure in Central Yoakum County.

It was drilled 1,980 feet from north and 660 feet from east lines of section 330, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

BBM Drilling Company of Midland spotted location for a west offset to the discovery well and lone producer in the recently opened Tex-Pac (Clear Fork) field of Northwest Gaines County.

It is No. 2-25 E. H. Jones, 2F miles northwest of Seminole, 1,980 feet from south and 1,880 feet from west lines of section 25, block AO7, psl survey. It is slated for an 8,700-foot bottom.

One mile northeast of Denver City, Shell Oil Company staked location for No. 17-E Baumgart, scheduled 7,600-foot project in the Wass 66 and 72 field.

Location is 330 feet from south and 2,310 feet from east lines of section 827, block D, John H. Gibson survey.

## No Action Yet on Naming Judge

The Commissioners' Court was still at an impasse this week on the appointment of a county judge, with no agreement being reached during Monday morning's meeting.

In a surprise action, Commissioner Gene Payne of Precinct 3 presented a motion that Olan Cox of Denver City be appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Judge H. K. Benton. On it being brought to a vote, Payne and Clyde Trout, commissioner of Precinct 4, voted yes, with Commissioners Brown and Cotton of Precincts 1 and 2, respectively, voting no, thus killing the motion.

A motion was then presented by Cotton that a "straw vote" election be held, but it also failed to carry. The vote was Brown and Cotton "yes" and Payne and Trout "no".

The motion for the election, as placed in the minutes of the meeting, was as follows: "Motion was made by Cotton

and seconded by Brown to order a special election on Tuesday, April 2, 1957, to determine the desires of the majority of the qualified voters in Yoakum County as to who shall represent them as County Judge of the said county for the remainder of the unexpired term of Honorable Judge H. K. Benton.

"Said motion is made to also set out that all laws pertaining to any special election in the State of Texas shall apply except that person does not have to hold a property rendition sheet to vote in said election. "Motion also sets forth that the Commissioners' Court hereby agrees to appoint the person receiving the majority vote in the special election. If no person receives a majority in the election, a special run-off election will be held Saturday, April 20, at the same polling locations, with the same election judges presiding, and again using Texas election laws as mandatory and at the

## Willie Mae Addison Named State Homemaking Winner

### Plains State Bank Is Expected To Open Here For Business By April 6

Present plans for the new bank in Plains, indicate that it will open for business about April 6. It was learned this week. The bank will be called The Plains State Bank.

The charter, which was granted last Thursday in Austin, was for \$150,000 of which \$75,000 is capital, \$50,000 surplus and \$25,000 undivided profits. All shares to the bank have already been subscribed, it was reported.

This is the third bank that has been in Plains, a check revealed, although most residents won't remember the other two.

The first bank in Plains was organized in 1910 and was known as The First State Bank of Plains. The bank was voluntarily liquidated in 1924. The other was called The Stockman Exchange and from all reports was only in operation a year or so. It was an unincorporated bank and was liquidated around 1921.

An interesting feature of the new bank is that two of its directors are second generation of relatives who also were on the board of directors of the first bank. They are J. J. Kendrick, son of the long time president

Score in the original test and personal observation on this tour will be the basis for selection of the All-American Homemaking of Tomorrow, to be announced May 2 at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York. Her scholarship will be increased to \$5,000.

Mary Roberts of Moody High School, Moody, rated second in Texas and will receive a \$500 scholarship.

Miss Addison, the state winner, has participated in a great many extracurricular activities during her high school course. She has been editor of the school paper, was secretary of the Student Council for two years, secretary of the Pep Squad and of the Future Homemakers of America. She also sings in the chorus, is active in dramatics, and has been an officer of her class for three of her four years.

In addition, she finds time to help her mother with the home responsibilities. "I do the cleaning," she says, "and most of the cooking on week-ends when I'm home."

She loves to travel, and she and her parents start out almost every summer to see some new part of the country. "We've been to California, to Yellowstone Park, and to Florida," she says. "But one of the most enjoyable trips I've had was last summer when I was chosen as one of the Texas delegates to the national convention of the Future Homemakers of America in Chicago. I had never been north before, and though it rained most of the time we were there, I had a very good time. It was a wonderful experience seeing a part of the country that was entirely new to me, and meeting girls from other places."

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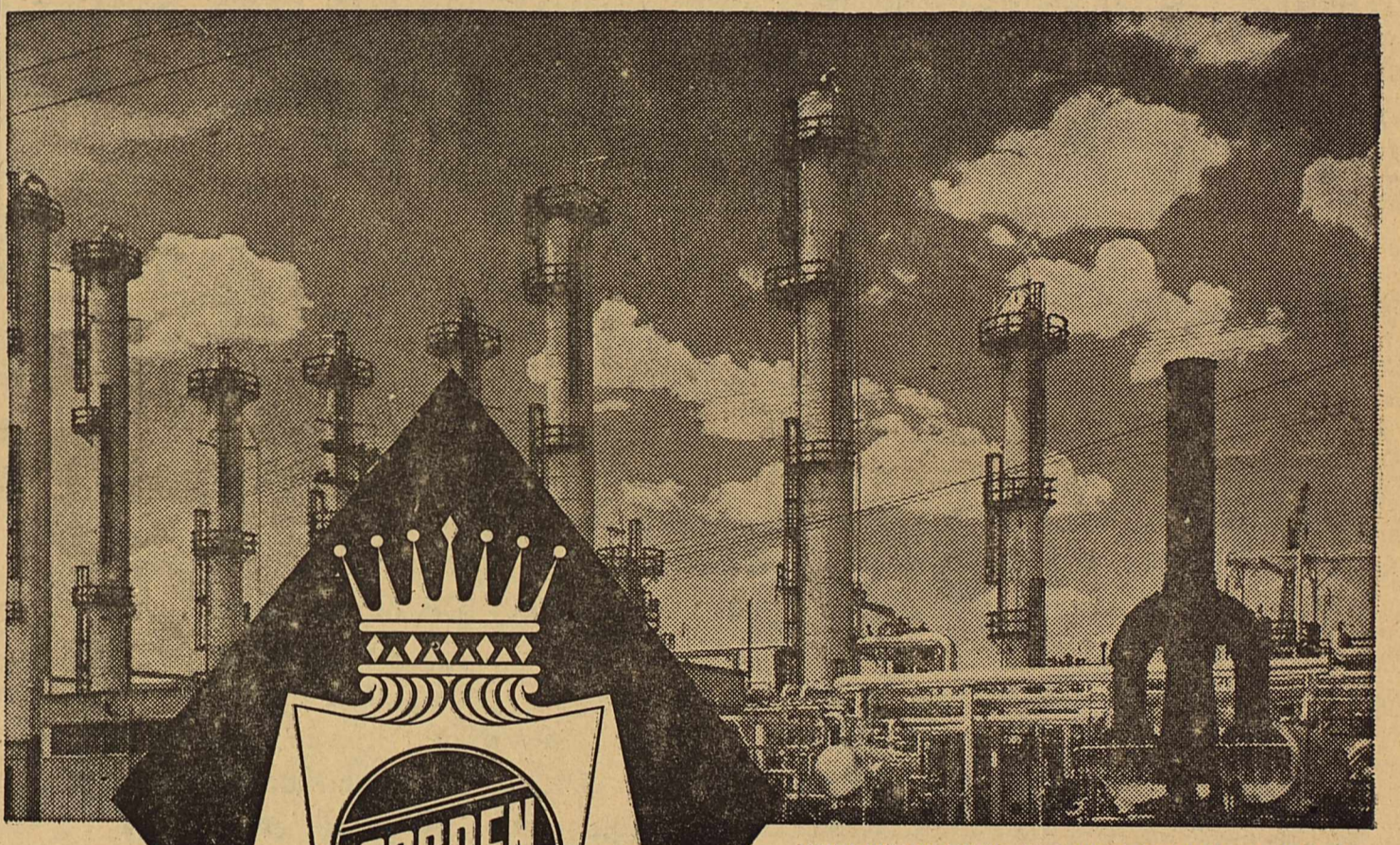
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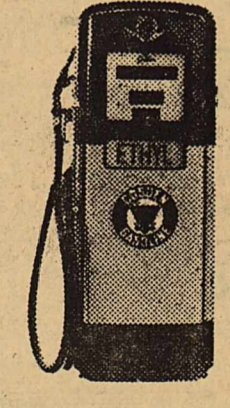
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**ACROSS THE Cattle Guard**

County Agent

I was wrong. I thought for sure that there would be at least four of the beef calves entered in the gain contest that would put on as much as 700 pounds during the 279 day period. The highest gaining calf missed the mark by two pounds. Three other calves missed it less than fifty pounds. I believe that we should have ten percent of our calves doing better than any of the calves did this year. Maybe G. W. Cleveland will sponsor the contest again next year and all the beef calf feeders will have an opportunity to try again.

D'Lynn McGinty won the contest this year with her dry-lot fed calf. She got her calf from her grandfather, Mr. J. V. Been. This particular calf had never been picked to win the contest because of a mistake in reading the scales. It was running in sixth or seventh place at the December weigh day and then it was running in sixth or seventh place at the December weigh day and then it was weighed again in January. This was the day that someone must have misread the scales a hundred pounds and it was probably me. The records showed that the calf gained four pounds during the six weeks while several other calves gained from 80 to 106 pounds during the same period. I am sure that there was a hundred pound mistake made in January and the gain should have been 104 pounds instead of four.

The calf that wound up in second place in the gain contest was the milk-fed calf of Linda Fitzgerald. Her calf gained 680 pounds during the time of the contest and he was very consistent in his gain until the last five weeks. Eddie Tingle fed the calf that placed third which was also a milk-fed calf. The calf that placed fourth in the contest was the one that most of us had picked to win because he had done so well during the early part of the period. Ty Earl Powell had him gaining almost three pounds a day for a long time but he fell off sharply during the last ten weeks.

Thirty-seven calves started the contest on May 19 and thirty-four of them finished the feeding period. Tommy Payne got rid of his calf because he was bloating, Sylvia McGinty lost one of her calves just a few weeks before the show and Margaret Henard had one calf that did not weigh the necessary 700 pounds at show time so it was not considered in the final weights. Of the thirty-four calves that finished the race, there was only one that had an average daily gain of more than two and half pounds. Three calves gained between two and one-fourth and two and a half pounds daily. Fifteen calves gained over two pound a day and less than two and one fourth. Another fifteen calves gained less than two pounds and only four of these had a daily gain of less than one and three fourths pounds.

After the results of the gain contest are tabulated and you look back to see which calf placed where, you find that body type has very little to do with the way the animal gained. Some of the large type calves were near the bottom of the list and some of the short, blocky animals were well above the average in their ability to gain. It is beginning to look like the ability of the feeder has a great deal to do with the way the calf gains. At any rate, the gain contest and the monthly weight days have done a great deal to improve the beef calf feeding program.

There is always a great deal of interest in the beef calf feeding program just after the show. It appears that there will be more calves in the show next year than we have ever had. The

Whitten has been on opposite sides of the fence with Secretary of Agriculture Benson as he believes Benson's policy of lower prices has not increased the domestic consumption market in this country.

In addition to Whitten's address at the Monday annual meeting, W. D. Fortenberry, President of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., will make his annual report, a financial report of the organization will be made, and George W. Pfeifferberger, Executive Vice-President, will tell the membership of 1957 plans of the organization.

Directors of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. met last Wednesday and completed final plans for the annual building. The meeting place was changed to the Fair Park Coliseum, East of Lubbock, in order to serve a free barbecue lunch at noon.

Directors said after their Wednesday meeting that the first year for the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. could be considered nothing but a successful year and reports to be made to the general membership Monday will show the tremendous progress made by the organization during its first year.

All members who can possibly attend are urged to be at the first annual meeting, Monday.

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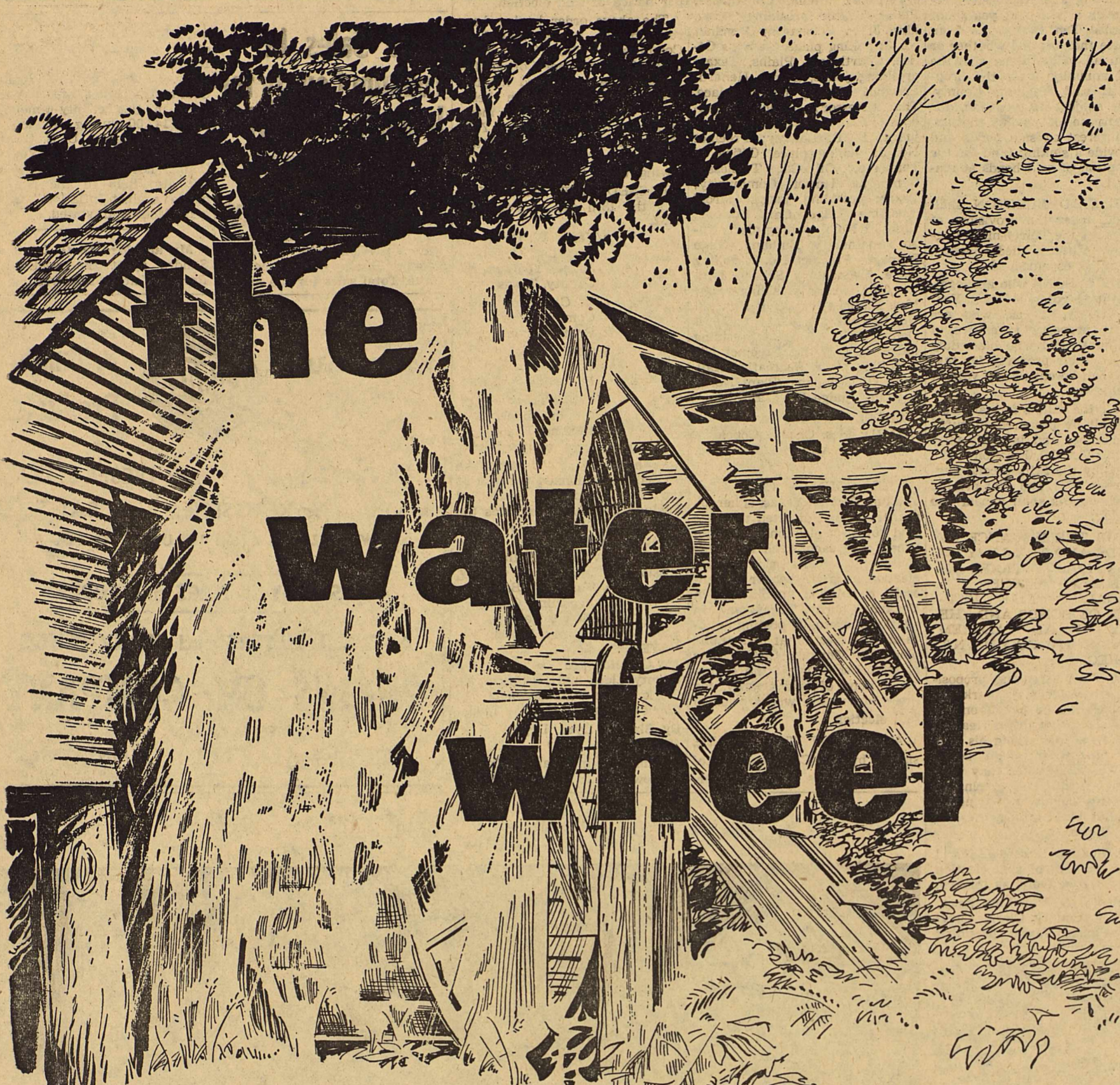

### Program Planning Clinic to be Held in Brownfield Mar. 20

Newly-elected officers and program chairmen of PTA's, study clubs, mental health groups, civic and service clubs and church groups are invited to participate in a Program Planning Clinic sponsored by Brownfield in co-operation with the Adult Education Program at Texas Tech.

The meeting will be held from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on March 20, 1957 in the Brownfield High School Auditorium.

One of a dozen such clinics being conducted around the West Texas region, the local area meet will also bring together new leaders of community groups from Brownfield, Plains, Levelland, Seagraves and Tahoka.

A program planning clinic, like a health clinic, is designed to meet the specific problems and needs of the people coming to it, according to G. H. Peters, field representative for the Adult Education Program.

He pointed out that, "Newly-elected officers and program chairmen always have certain problems. How do we plan ahead for the coming year? What subjects shall we deal with? How can we present the programs so that the members will be interested and attend regularly?"

The program planning clinic deals with both techniques of effective presentation and suggests program ideals and sources of materials, Peters stated.

"Every group has its own particular interests. Often the nature of the club determines the general areas of programming," he continued. "As in the building of a house, members of each family must determine how many rooms they need, the activities which are to be accommodated, the general style they desire, and how much they are able to pay for it."

"Then the architect and contractor can go to work. Officers and program chairmen are elected to help draw up these plans and carry them out for their groups."

### Four Cases Filed IN District Court

Four cases have been filed in district court, two for collection of debt, one for compensation and one foreclosure and labor lien.

Joel Burns of Lovington has filed suit for collection against Raymond Palmer of Yoakum County for alleged non-payment of a promissory note. According to the plaintiff, Palmer gave a promissory note for \$637.19 in 1955, and paid only \$150 cash in November of 1956. The plaintiff is asking payment in the amount of \$616.40, including interest and attorney fees.

William Sumpter has filed suit against Texas Employers Insurance Association for compensation of injuries received in October of 1956 while in the employ of Rhea & Reynolds Drilling Co. The plaintiff says he suffered back injuries while prying drill collars with a steel bar. He is asking for maximum compensation of \$10,025, alleging he has been permanently disabled from the injuries. A claim filed with the Industrial Accident Board was denied due to "failure to establish by proof that he suffered a compensable injury in the course of employment."

Jack Burt has filed suit against L. W. Ward, Warner Hayhurst and Johnny Jones, asking for a judgement of \$424, including interest and cost, which he alleges is due him for labor, improvements and repairs, also remodeling on a service station in Plains. The case states that the plaintiff filed a labor lien for the principal amount of \$300 in April

of 1956 and that no payment has been made to date of filing.

Ray Baker, et al, has filed a suit for collection against O. W. Henderson and H. L. Leach for \$9,605.45, which the plaintiffs alleges is due. Names of parties in said suit, filing as plaintiffs, in addition to Baker are H. M. Suttle, Jr., H. M. Suttle, Sr., L. J. Hires, Coy Black, James Watkins, Lonnie Arnold, R. G. Zacharias, Stanley Duvall, J. H. Curtis, E. E. Slater and Ralph Bufington.

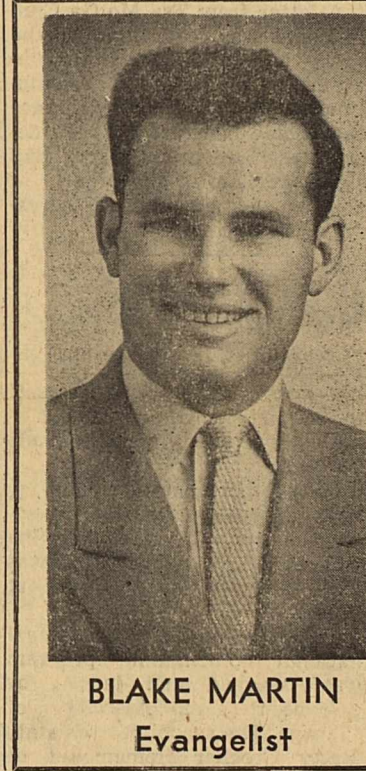

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

Machinery Co. of Lubbock as low bidder with \$12,500. Others submitting bids were West Texas Equipment Co., \$14,998; Patton Equipment Co., \$13,600; and Texas Machinery Co., \$14,150.

A bid was also received from Cogburn-Young of Plains on furniture for the Club Room in the old court house. No other bids were received, and the court voted to accept the Cogburn-Young bid of \$1,610.89. Furniture to be purchased includes three dozen steel folding chairs; one three-cushion divan and two chairs; one two-cushion divan and two chairs; four rectangular step tables; two dozen plastic pink dishes; two dozen stainless steel silverware; six card tables, and nine folding mesh tables.

Bryant Sisco was hired by the court to connect the courtrooms to the city sewer line at a cost of \$75. Right of way was given to Phillips Petroleum Co., for the laying of a pipeline under the road on Sections 15 and 20 in Blocks D and K.

The court also voted to pay Estimate No. 1 of \$9,454.50 on the two library buildings. Monthly bills were approved, including the bills of the hospital as previously approved by the hospital board. Approval was granted to reimburse the county attorney in the amount of \$106.80 for business expense of a trip to Austin.

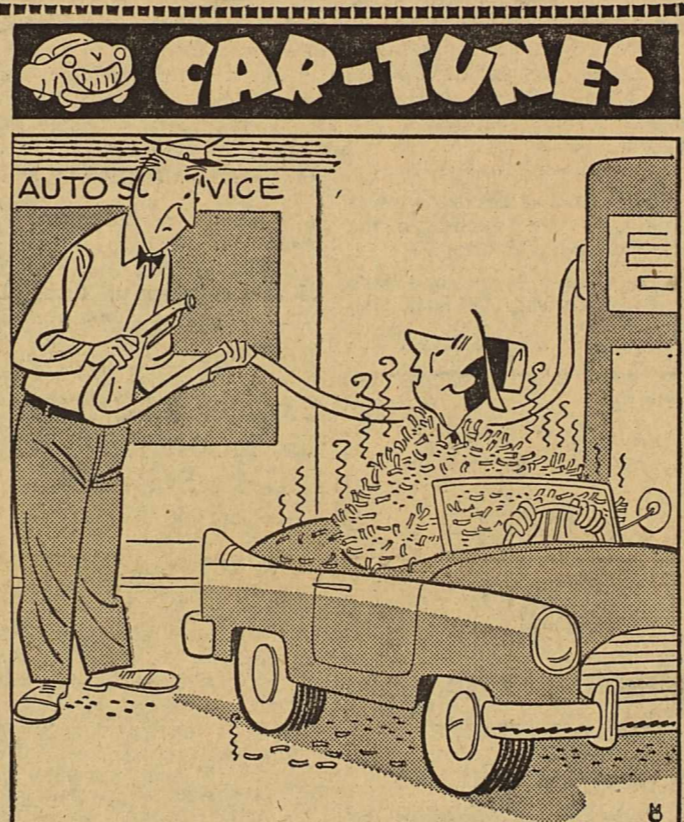
