Substitute Clerk **Position Open at Plains Post Office**

Applications are now being taken for the position of substitute clerk at the Plains post office, it was announced this week.

Examination for the appointment will be held at Seminole with applicants to be notified of exact time and place. Beginning salary is listed at \$1.82 per hour The application card form may be secured at the Plains post of fice or from the Regional Director, Eighth U.S. Civil Service Region, Room 103, 1114 Commerce Street, Dallas 2, Texas. The ap plication must be filed with the Office of the Eighth U.S. Civil Service Region not later than July 1st.

The work consists of handling heavy sacks of lettermail, parcel post and papermail weighing in some instances 100 pounds or more; sorting and distributing mail to railway post offices and related duties assigned. The work involves continuous standing, walking, throwing packages of mail, stretching to empty sacks and reaching to all parts of the distribution case in sorting. The duties of newly appointed clerks are at times interchangeable with the duties of substitute carriers and of mail handlers, mail handlers being appointed only to perform the heavy tasks.

All competitors will be required to take a written examination designed to test aptitude for learning and performing the duties of the position. The test subjects will be of the following the subjects will be of the following

If soil moisture is low as it often is during the summer months, the plant will be short on plant food and the root system will be reduced. As the root system

becomes smaller, the plant's ability to gather moisture and plant nutrients is reduced and regrowth will be even slower This process may continue until the grass is dead. Many grass plants will have the ability to survive following a period of heavy use but they will be in a

Suppose you ask another person to do something for you, that is, to act as your agent. You may pay him, or he may be doing it without compensation.

You may ask him to buy or sell property for you. Or, his responsibility may be to negotiate an agreement for you with a third person.







Protect Citizens From Excessive Radiation Dosages

Austin-Last month an Austin State Hospital physician called the State Health Department to report that a radium needle, being used to treat a patient with skin cancer, had been dislodged or lost.

Did the Department have radation detection equipment with which the needle might be located? The Department did, and the needle was subsequently found in a gauze bandage. This incident, one of many that take place every month, illustrates the manner in which the Department's Division of Occupational Health, working in cooperation with private physicians and other agencies, is quietly going about the task of protectng citizens from the dangers of excessive radiation exposures. A great deal has been said in recent months about the imminent peril the entire nation is facing from excessive radiation. Much of that information has been true in general, but some of it has been misconstrued to the point where people have cancelled much -n eeded x-ray
