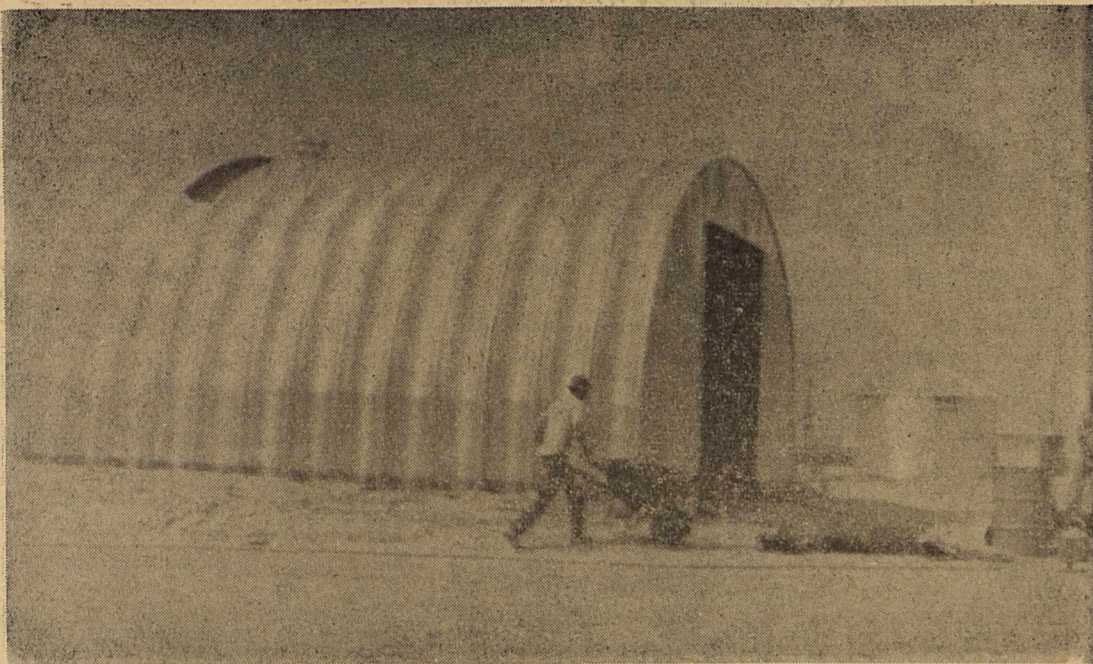

Low Land Co. To Drill Project Mile North of Here

Low Land Company of Lubbock will drill a 5,500 foot project in the Brahaney field in Yoakum County. It will be known as the No. 1 F. L. Boyd. Drillsite is 660 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of southwest quarter of section 390, block D, J. H. Gibson survey, one mile north of Plains.

Honolulu Oil Corporation of Midland No. 8, Paul Cobb and others has been staked as a new location in the Prentice (6700) field of Yoakum County.

Location is 1,980 feet from north and west lines of section 381, block D, J. H. Gibson survey, 6 miles northwest of Tokio.

Tucker Drilling Company No. 5 Carr-Northrup has been completed in the Brahaney field of Yoakum County Drillsite is 660 feet from west and 1,980 feet from south lines of section 447, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

The well flowed 107.67 barrels of 31 gravity oil with 7 per cent water through a 24/64 inch choke from perforations of 5,225-5,267 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1370-1.

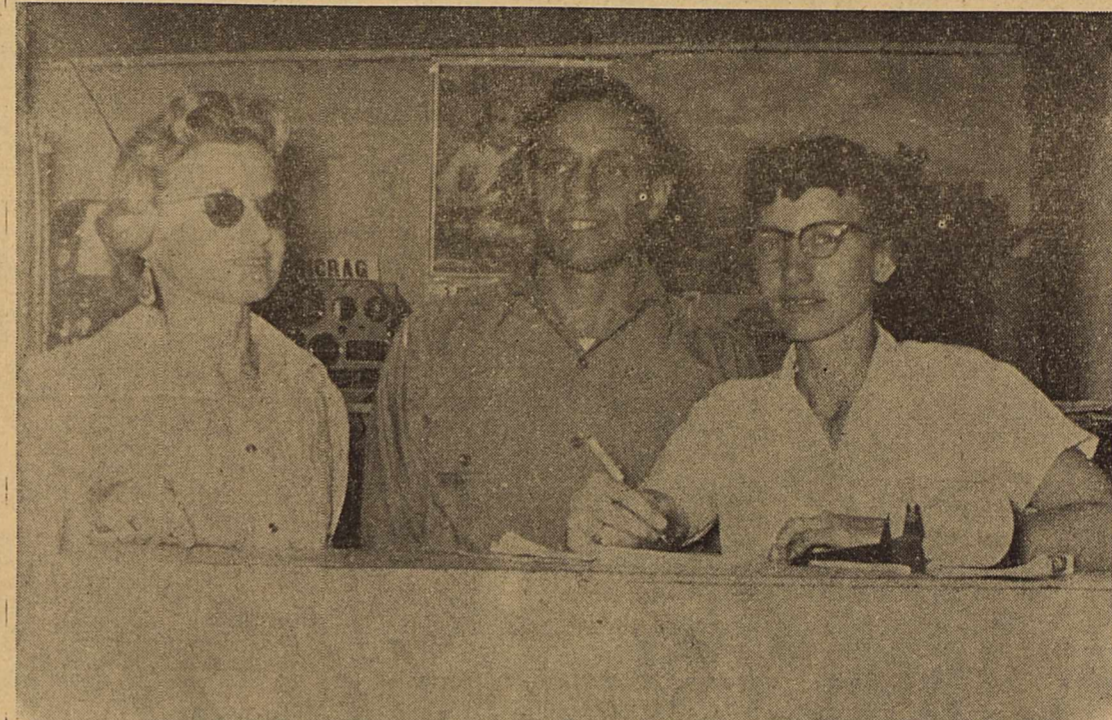

County Budget Is Approved; Allocate Monies To Funds

Approval of the 1958 budget for Yoakum County, with estimated expenditures of \$728,680.13, has been given by the county commissioners' court, and the apportionment of the tax monies into the various funds allocated.

Basic county tax rate will remain the same as it was this year, \$1.10 per \$100 of assessed valuation. In addition, those property owners residing in Road District 1-A will be assessed 25 cents more due to an increase in the schedule of payment to re-

After losing their first two outings the Plains Cowboys broke into the win column Friday night as they stampeaded over the Cooper Pirates, 32-7, on the Pirates' field.

In the first period, Cordell Huddleston passed to Jimmy Williams for an 80 yard touchdown. Jackie Bass scored the second touchdown when he made a 32 yard run. The third touchdown was made in the second period when Bobby Kinder intercepted a pass and ran 40 yards. Vennum Fitzgerald scored the fourth touchdown when he made a 30 yard run.

Dwain Rowland made the two extra points for the Cowboys.

Cooper's touchdown came when Tackle Kelly Thomas fell on a fumble over the goal line for a score. Don Verette ran the extra point.

Cooper made 111 yards rushing and 41 passing and 11 first downs.

The Cowboys will meet the Morton Indians on the Cowboy field Friday night for the homecoming game.

Probably the greatest asset the Morton Indians will bring to Plains is a team which features eight returning regulars from last year's eleven. The Morton team has beaten two tough teams this year, Seagraves went down 13-12 and Muleshoe 20-14.

New Feed Wheat Law In Effect

The feed wheat law, signed by the president into law on August 23, provides that all producers on the farm must sign agreements if the farm is eligible for feed wheat, it was explained by W. M. Overton, ASC office manager, this week.

Operators must sign agreements prior to wheat seeding on the farm, with October 15, 1957 being the last day to sign the agreement. Not more than 30 acres may be grown on the farm and all of the wheat must be produced. None of the wheat crop may be sold, bartered, or exchanged and none of such wheat will be eligible for price support.

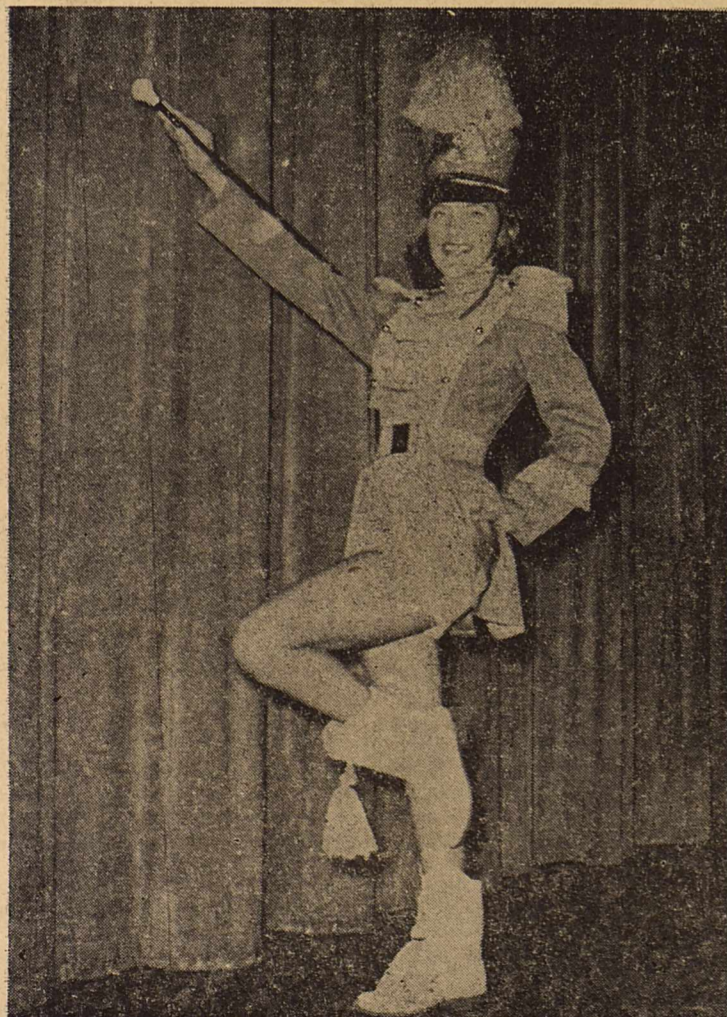

The Roping Club wishes to express its appreciation to the citizens of the county for their support of its program.

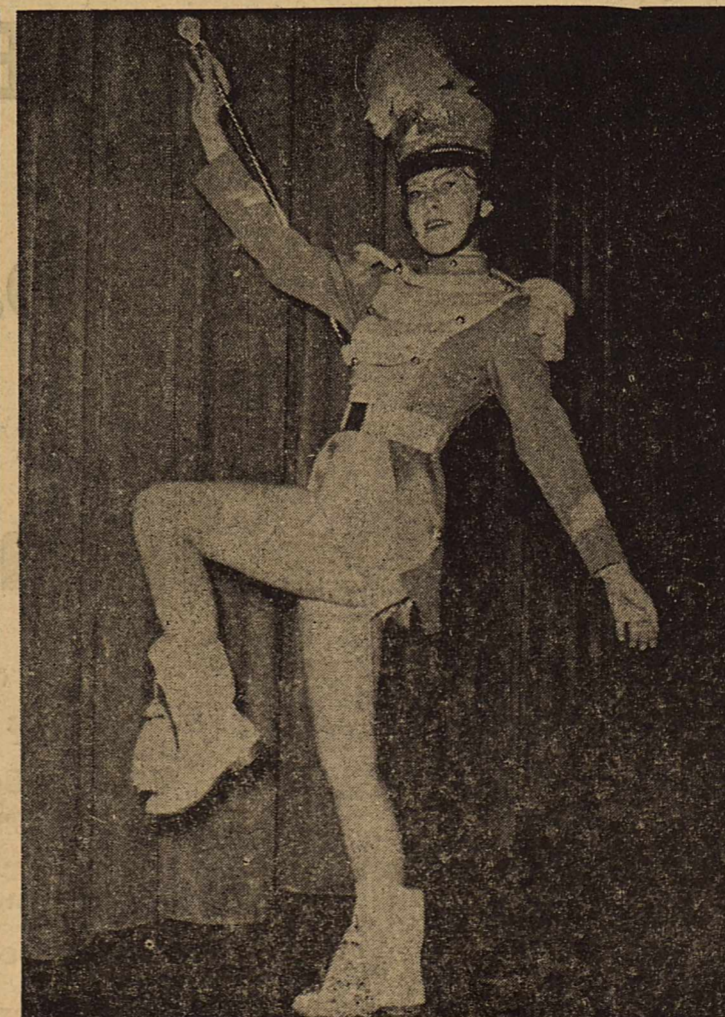

ACROSS THE CATTLE GUARD

The beef cattle weigh day on last Saturday afternoon proved to be very interesting. Twenty-seven steers were weighed during the afternoon and 22 of them were calves that are in the gain contest which ends next February at the beginning of the Yoakum County Junior Fat Stock Show. The highest gaining calf for the first 112 days of the gain period is the big calf owned by Oscar Henard. Oscar named his calf Poor Boy because he was so thin last spring when he was started on feed. Poor Boy has gained 342 pounds since the first day of June and he is the only calf in the group that has been weighed to maintain an average daily gain of three pounds or more.

Kenneth McGinty is apparently doing a good job with his calves because they have really put on the gain during the past two months. Kenneth has two calves named Peanuts and Popcorn. Peanuts is a dry lot calf that he got from Rusty McGinty and Popcorn is a milk fed calf that came from Terrell Christians' ranch at Claude, Texas. Peanuts is now standing in second place in the gain contest with a gain of 318 pounds and about 150 days yet to go. Popcorn is in fourth place and his total gain 307 pounds. These two calves each weighed 588 pounds so they are about right size to be able to continue to gain well for some time yet.

The calf standing in 3rd place in the gain contest is a milk fed calf owned by Frances Henard. Frances named her calf Slow Poke and he is a half brother to the calf that is leading this contest. Slow Poke has gained 315 pounds and moved from second place down to 3rd by only three pounds. In fifth place is a calf named Whacky owned by Tommy Payne. The calf has put on a gain of 303 which is only 39 pounds behind the lead calf. In sixth place is Margaret Henard with a calf named Jackie. Jackie is also a half brother to Slow Poke and Poor Boy and his gain is 301 pounds.

There are several calves owned by 4-H club boys and girls that have not been weighed since the initial weigh day on June 1st and some of these may have a higher gain than some of these that appear to be in the lead because they have been attending the monthly weigh days. With 150 days remaining in the feeding period some of the calves that have a gain of 250 to 300 pounds would easily come out and pass any or all of the calves who have gained well up to now.

Four of the steers that were weighed last Saturday are entered in the steer show at the Dallas Fair in October. These calves have to go to Dallas in less than three weeks so they are pretty well finished. Margaret Henard has a Hereford steer entered in the Fat Stock Show at the Fair. Her animal weighed 865 pounds last Saturday and he is one of the fattest steers ever to go to State Fair from this county. Marsha White is taking an Angus steer to the fair again this year and her calf weighed in last Saturday at 932 pounds. Her calf will also compete in the Fat Steer show. Kenneth McGinty has a 1,935 pound Hereford and Harold Lee Swann has an 828 pound Angus to take to Dallas. These calves will compete in the Market Steer Show at the fair.
