May 15 Deadline To Sign Up For Wheat Program

The deadline for signing up for the 1964 voluntary wheat program is May 15, according to Emmett E. Powell, county office manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in Eastland.

Mr. Powell announced that since the program is voluntary, those wishing to participate will need to sign an application. The following benefits under the new program were outlined by Mr. Powell to wheat producers who participate:

Payments for diverting wheat acres.

Price support through loans and purchases.

Cashable certificates for planted wheat. Part of the certificates will have a cash value of 70 cents per bushel and part at 25 cents per bushel, payable at the County ASCS office. These certificates will not accompany wheat to the market. This payment is based on normal yield and not on production. Farmers do not have to harvest planted wheat in order to be eligible for the certificates.

Helen Hailey In Special Nurses Training

Helen Hailey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Hailey of Rt. 1, Gorman, is receiving special training in psychiatric nursing at Austin State Hospital, according to Dr. Sam A. Hoerster Jr., superintendent.

She is a 1962 graduate of Gorman High School, attended Ranger Junior College, summer 1962, and Midwestern University in 1962-1963. She currently is living in Wichita Falls.

The psychiatric nursing program at Austin State Hospital is designed to train nurses in the recognition of psychiatric disorders, techniques useful in caring for emotionally ill patients and of community agencies established for dealing with social problems arising out of mental illness, Dr. Hoerster said.

Students spend three months in ward training and classroom instruction under psychiatric nurses, social workers, psychologists, rehabilitation therapists, dietitians and chaplains.

Browsing with Bev

For her tenth birthday, the young lady of the house announced she wanted a blue angel food cake. It was her birthday, so she got it. But when the cake was served at the party, few people ate it. The reason: A blue cake isn't very appetizing.

Food not only has to taste good, it has to look good. Blues, blacks, and purples are usually not too tempting food colors. For example, orange juice served in a blue glass has much less appeal than in a clear glass. Black is associated with burnt flavors.

Unusual colors arouse suspicion. Green bread suggests mold; red chicken loaf is alarming. So go easy on artificial food coloring. And when you do use it, keep within a reasonable color range. Also avoid serving foods of clashing colors. Purple-red beets, red cabbage, pick-red radishes, and orange-red tomatoes and pimentos are not attractive together. Neither are mono-colored

foods. A menu of mashed potatoes, creamed onions, fried liver, celery, white bread, and rice pudding lacks character. It needs perking up — with buttered peas substituted for the onions, pickled beets instead of celery, and some brown-crust rolls in place of the white bread. A spoonful of red jelly will enliven the rice pudding.

You can also bring color to a meal with gay dishes, flowers, and table linen. Just see that the colors are compatible.

Only 50 percent of the green portion of a blade of grass should be removed each time you mow. The green blades of grass manufacture food for the plant. If 90 per cent of the blade is removed, root growth stops for several days or even weeks.

An easy rule for homeowners to remember is: Mow whenever the grass doubles in height. Set your mower at 1/2 to 1 inch for creeping grasses-Bermuda and Zoysia; 2 to 3 inches for Bluegrass and Fescue.

ANNUAL PECAN FIELD DAY PLANNED IN COUNTY MAY 20

New hybrid pecan varieties will be a feature on the program at the annual pecan field day of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association at Rising Star, Wednesday May 20th, according to C. E. Smith president of the organization.

L. D. Romberg, U. S. Pecan Field Station, Brownwood, originator of several hybrid varieties in recent years has been invited to appear on the program to discuss growth habits and characteristics of some of the latest hybrids that have not as yet been released by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, according to Smith, prominent grower in the Rising Star area.

T. E. Denman, Horticulturist of the Agric. Experiment Station, Stephenville, has been invited to discuss the importance of cross pollination in pecan varieties. B. G. Han-

cock, A&M Extension Service Horticulturist, will talk on various phases of pecan orchard management at the morning session of the all day program.

Smith and B. B. Freeman, Cheaney, will discuss squirrel and crow control in pecan orchards.

After lunch and a business session of the organization in a Rising Star Cafe, the group will make a survey of the stage of the pecan nut case bearer, troublesome pecan insect, in the Smith orchard. Fertilizers will also be discussed during the afternoon session.

The meeting will begin at 9:30 a. m. in the agricultural building, across the street from the high school, according to Ben McKinnis, Eastland Secretary-Treasurer of the growers association.
