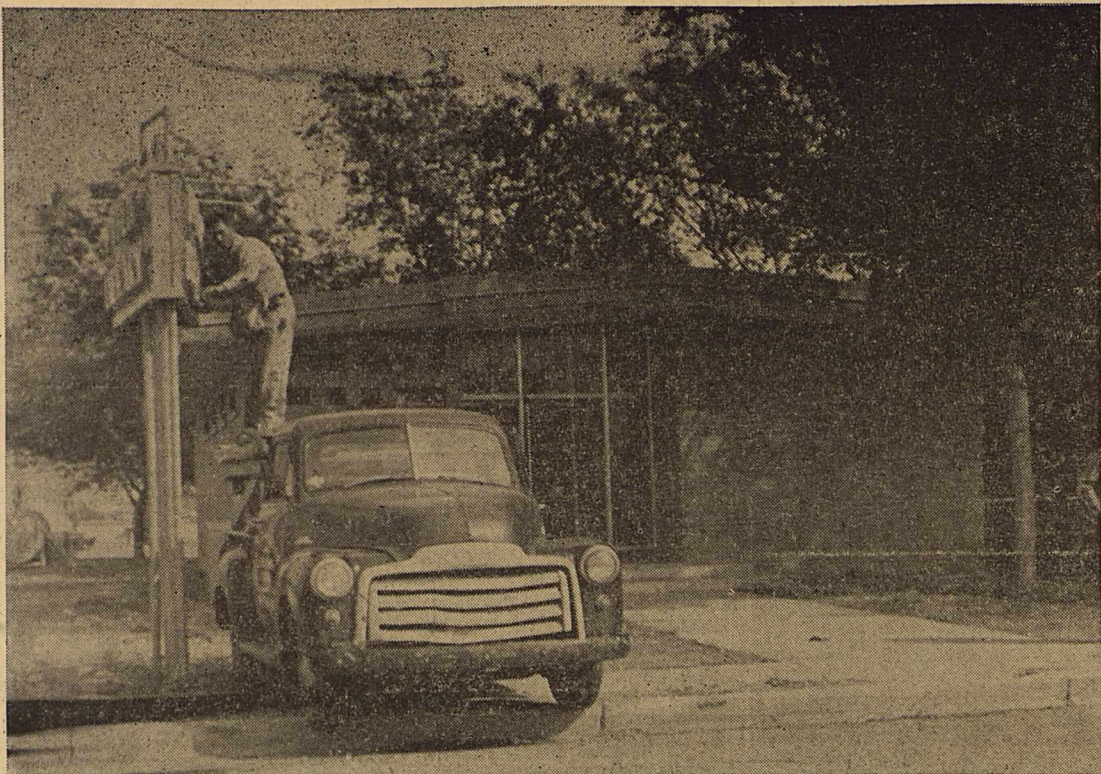

Brahaney Field of Central Yoakum Has New Oiler

F. T. Brahaney No. 2-368 Sherm is a new oiler in the Brahaney field of Central Yoakum County.

Operator reported a daily pumping potential of 88 barrels of 33 gravity oil, through perforations from 5,200 to 5,232 feet, after fracturing with 12,500 gallons of acid.

The new oiler is 660 feet from south and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 368, block D, John H. Gibson survey.

The Texas Company No. 1 NCT Walker is a new well in South Yoakum County.

On 24-hour potential test, the oiler flowed 197 barrels of 41.6 gravity oil, through a 25/64-inch choke and perforations from 8,550 to 8,592 feet, after 4,000 gallons of acid.

Location is 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of section 794, block D. J. H. Gibson survey.

Shell Oil Company No. 8-AC Wasson is a new project 2 1/2 miles south of Denver City in the Wasson (72) field.

Drillsite for the 7,800-foot test is 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of section 49, block AX, psl survey.

Continental Oil Company has completed No. 3-D-46 Moore in the Wasson (72) field.

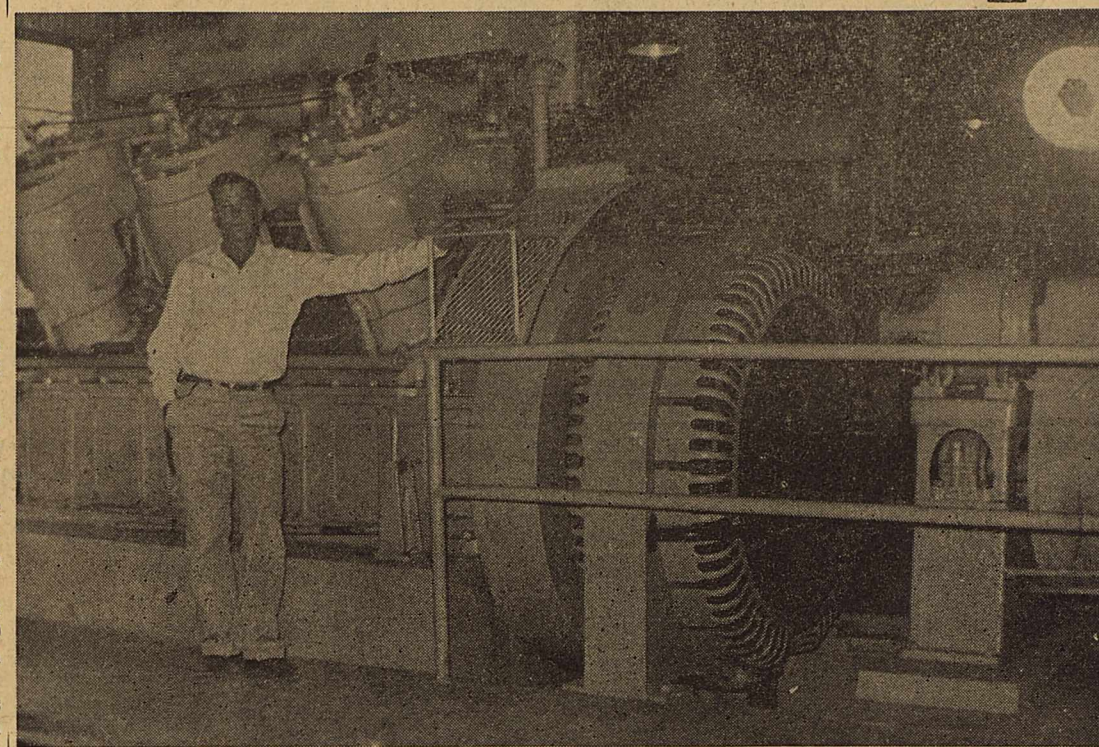
On 24-hour potential test, the well pumped 127 barrels of 34.3 gravity oil, plus seven per cent water, through perforations from 7,341 to 7,459 feet, after 2,000 gallons of acid.

Well site is 1,980 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of section 46, block AX, psl survey.

Dual production will be sought in the Wasson (66 and 72) field in North Gaines County, 2 1/2 miles south of Denver City.

It is Shell Oil Company No. 9 J. R. Sharp in section 47, block AX, psl survey. The test originally was drilled by Amon Carter, and quit at 7,750 feet. Shell will re-enter the hole in an attempt to complete the project as a dual producer.

Light Plant Completes First Month of Operation

The City of Plains has completed a month of operation of its light plant and work on the distribution lines is nearing completion, according to City Secretary Rod Duff. The City began tying on customers in the north part of town, and now that a few essential crossings have been made, is ready to take on new customers in other sections.

The plant has been carrying sufficient load to allow the operators to iron out any possible difficulties that might have arisen on the new operation. In the first phase of tying on customers, 47 had been connected to Wednesday morning. This included several business connections.

Few difficulties have been encountered in putting the plant into operation. The only trouble that has come up to date has been attributed to some faulty gas regulators which feed gas to the engines, and they are being changed out in order to prevent stopping on an engine.

City Secretary Duff said that the City Council has expressed their thanks to the citizens of the town for their assistance in working out the problems that have arisen in getting the light plant into operation. The manner in which the project has been received and the interest in the welfare and future of Plains has been gratifying, he said.

Anyone interested in the operation of the plant, or any other phase of the city's business is cordially invited to call by the city hall.

4-H Show at State Fair

Four Yoakum County 4-H Club Members are in Dallas this week attending the State Fair and each is exhibiting a steer in the Junior Livestock Show. Margaret Henard has a Hereford steer entered in the Fat Steer Show and Marsha White has an Angus steer competing in this division. The other two animals going to the fair from Yoakum County are entered in the Market Steer Show and they are owned by Kenneth McGinty and Harold Lee Swann. Kenneth has a Hereford and Harold Lee's calf is an Angus. The Market Steer Show is for dry lot fed calves only and they are graded into prime and choice groups. In the Fat Steer Show the calves may be milk fed animals and each class will be placed by the judge. The grand and reserve champions of the Dallas Show will come from the

Fat Steer Show and the calves in the Market Steer Show do not have a chance to compete for those honors.

The Junior Livestock at the State Fair is a big affair. They have beef calves, fat barrows, fat lambs and dairy cattle. There will be about 500 beef calves in the Market Steer Show and the Fat Steer Show. The Fat Steer Show is divided according to breeds and each breed group will be divided into three weight divisions. The market steers are also divided into breed and weight classes. Margaret Henard will compete in the light weight Hereford class where they will place 25 animals. Marsha White will compete in the middle weight Angus class and there they place only 10 animals. Kenneth McGinty has a big steer so he will show in the heavy Hereford divi-

sion of the Market Steer Show while Harold Lee Swann's steer is a small steer and will compete in the light weight Angus class.

Legion Auxiliary Installs Officers On Monday Night

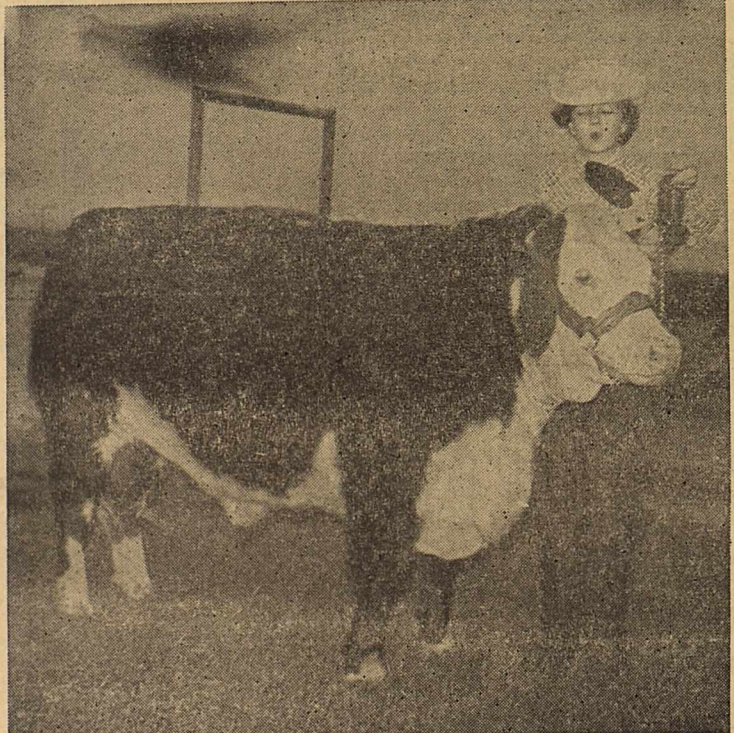
Members of the American Legion Auxiliary met at the Legion Hall Monday night for the purpose of installing their new officers for the coming year.

Preceding the installation, the group enjoyed a salad supper. The serving table, speaker's desk, and piano were decorated with lovely arrangements of fall flowers.

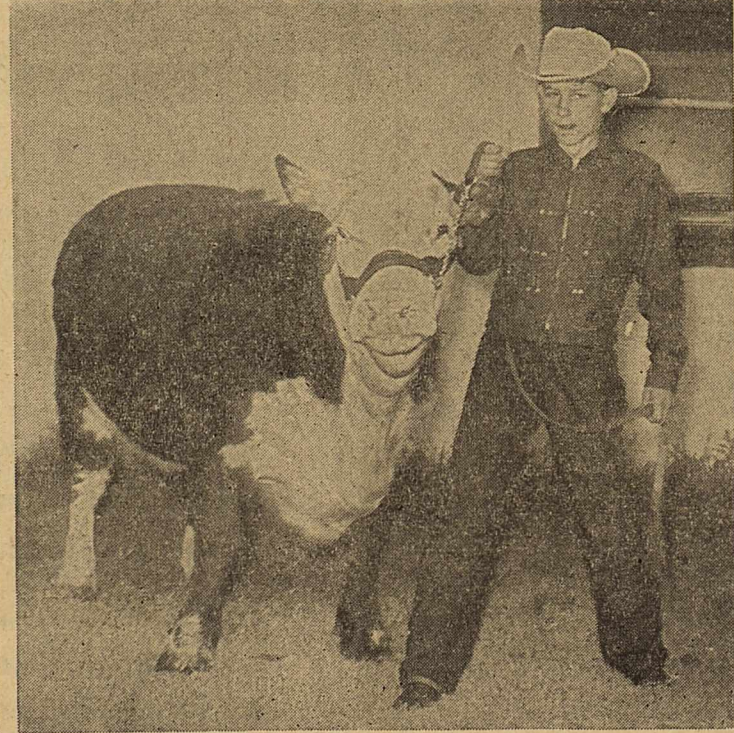

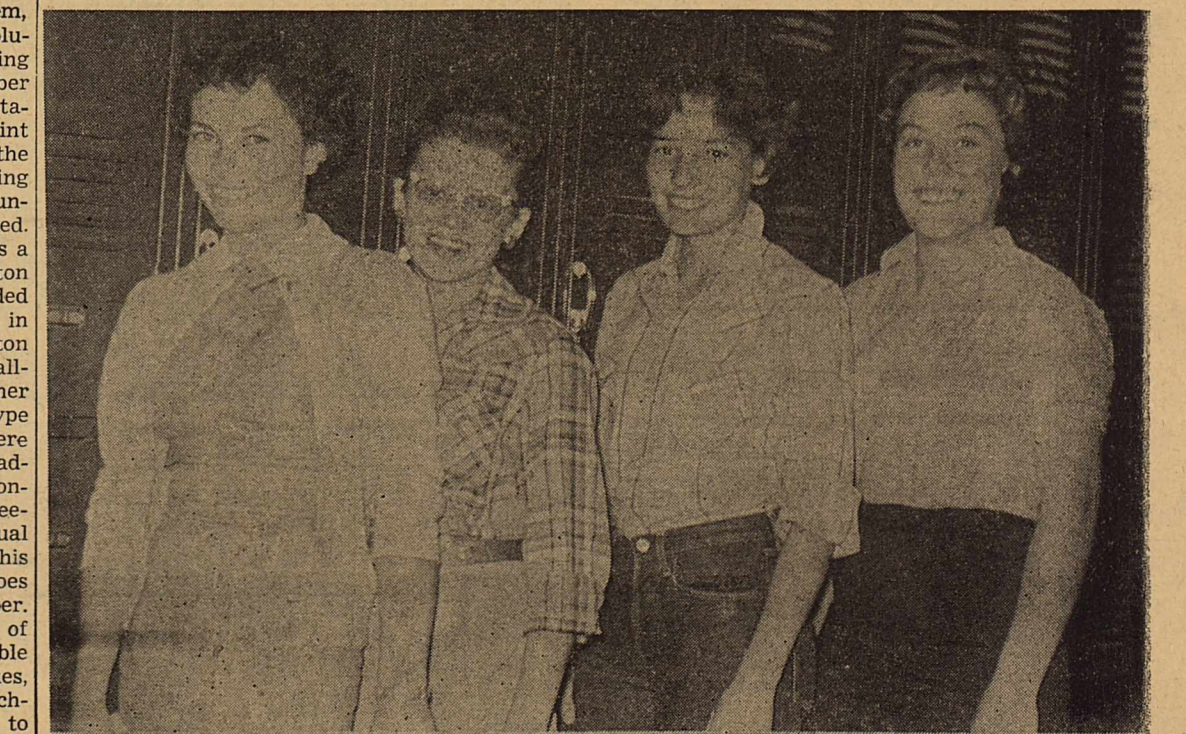

LUBBOCK MAN IS GUEST SPEAKER AT MEETING OF TSA MO GA CLUB

The Tsa Mo Ga Club met in regular session at the club house on October 14, 1957. A buffet supper was served to club members, their husbands and other guests. The tables carried out the Halloween motif and Mrs. A. B. Carpenter and Mrs. P. W. St. Romain were hostesses.

Lubbock, Texas and Mr. Tom Duggan, Attorney-at-law, Lubbock, Texas who spoke to the club on Estate Planning and Mineral Interest.

Mr. Duggan states that in these uncertain times of foreign aid appropriation bills, military spending and high income taxes that estate planning by a careful family lawyer is essential in order to be sure that responsibilities to ones family are carried out.

No estate is so small or so big that a will should not be made. A will is a document by which a person disposes of his property to take effect at his death. A person who dies leaving no will is said to die "intestate." In the absence of a will, property owner's lands and personal property pass by law to certain designated real estate and mineral interest next of kin. Personal property should be listed so that a legal representative knows exactly what you are willing your heirs.

Mr. Duggan states that home are hardest to dispose of and that life insurance is the most liquid asset. Extremely complex laws govern inheritances and competent legal advisors should be employed to protect the rights of heirs.

The legal philosophy under-

laying the inheritance tax is that there is no natural legal right on the part of an heir or legatee to succession to the property of a deceased person, and that since the right is conceded and protected by the state, the latter has the constitutional right to declare the terms upon which the estate shall desolve.

The average American pay one-third of his income for some kind of taxes. Inheritance tax is the government's biggest source of revenue. The average estate is not considered to be liquid, since most property is personal and real estate rather than in money. If settling to settle inheritances is involved, values on property are established often below their actual worth.

Mr. Duggan's personal philosophy is that one can leave no greater legacy to a family than having installed a strong moral character in his children.

Health is second desirable since one is able to pursue profitable occupations.
