






JUDGE RAY MOWERY, left, is shown with lamb, and Corky's dad, Loyd Coke.




G. W. CLEVELAND presents Jimmy Taylor with a loving cup for having the winning calf in the weight gaining contest.



Koenig, as executrix under the will of A. G. Koenig, deceased, and the said Mrs. A. G. Koenig, a widow, and Elizabeth Koenig, a feme sole, as the only heirs of A. G. Koenig, deceased; John T. Claybourne, Frank Demus, Mrs. C. W. Farley (and husband, C. W. Farley), Tom Walters, Leonard Ward, Bruno Brandt, W. B. Davis, and John W. Clark, individually and as constituting and representative of that class of five-year employees given cash legacies of \$500.00 each under the terms of such purported will of such decedent.

Said suit styled "Dolores Mooers, A Widow, vs. H. B. Fuqua, Independent Executor, et al." being numbered 1525 on the docket of such court and a brief statement of the nature of the suit being as follows:

Plaintiff seeking equitable review asks to set aside a settlement made with her husband, Clifford Mooers, late May 1st, 1956, and this Court's decree of approval entered the next day in cause No. 1464, styled "Ex-Parte: Clifford Mooers and Wife, Dolores Mooers," recorded in the minutes, Vol. 6, p. 636, and asks an accounting and a declaration fixing the identity of the residuary devisee under a purported will of such husband as admitted to probate December 10, 1956, in which suit it is claimed that plaintiff as the wife of such decedent for 27 years before his death was induced to consent to such property settlement and decree by the fraud of her husband and his agents, consisting of false representations and concealment of material facts as to the nature, extent and value of the community property and of plaintiff's true interest therein at such time, and because of further false promises to bequeath and on account of mistake induced by fraud of her said husband and coercion; and it is claimed that a fraud was also practiced by such decedent on this Court, and that the proceeding did not comply with Article 2624a.

It is further claimed in such suit that all or substantially all property in decedent's name at the time of such settlement and at the time of his death was community property, and that had the wife received those properties awarded to her in such settlement, such were greatly less than her share at such time, and such contract was grossly unjust and disadvantageous to her, but that there was further material fraud and deceit practiced on her as to those properties which it was recited she was to receive under such settlement because of failure of title and of consideration in material part and inability to deliver and failure to deliver personal property of the kind and value which it was represented such wife should receive.

Plaintiff offers to do equity and makes a continuing tender to restore that which she has received and asserts that due to her situation, inexperience, ignorance and deception she could not sooner have discovered such fraud and brought this action.

It is further claimed that since such husband's death the defendant H. B. Fuqua, acting as Independent Executor under the purported will of such husband, has come into possession of but not distributed all of those properties which the husband wrongfully took under such settlement and decree and in which plaintiff had a continuing equitable ownership and interest, and that the other defendants are claiming to own or have some interest in such properties and estate as the respective cash legatees and residuary devisee under such purported will; and that among such properties are lands and interests in lands within the State of Texas including those described, listed and identified in such petition, including the following:

Mrs. Gus Malmsten was program director for the evening. Mrs. Malmsten presented Mrs. Robert Henard who gave a very interesting report on the "Status of Women at Home and Abroad."

Briefly Mrs. Henard said every woman should concern herself with law, insurance, budgets, wills, inheritances and taxes.

One-third of the working force, or eighty million persons, are women, and in the last fifteen years, the number of women in executive positions has increased 150 percent. Women control most of the wealth and buying power, and one half the corporation stocks, and 65 per cent of the spending is done by women.

In the field of Education there are 14,000 club women teaching school, 10,000 club members serving on hospital and library boards. Nowhere in the world, other than America is there such a volunteer service.

Mrs. Henard quoted Frances Luwine, an associated Press writer, who says that if America is to forge ahead of the Russians, experts think we should stimulate more and make greater use of women in technology and teaching.

The United States has graduated fewer than one hundred women engineers each year while Russia has turned out 13,000 annually.

About 1,000,000 Russian women are getting technical training while our female enrollment in industrial technician institutes is practically nil.

Women in the USSR are being trained in great numbers as scientists, physicians, mathematicians, engineers and technologists of all kinds. Alan T. Waterman, director of the National Science Foundation suggests "Our own plans for meeting shortages in these fields should take full account of woman power as a resource that has too long been

D'Lois McGinty Shows Grand Champion Calf

The Sixth Annual Yoakum County Fat Stock Show got under way last Friday afternoon when Mr. Ray Mowrey of Texas Tech started the judging with the mutton type lambs. Sloppy weather did not hinder the operations inside the barns; however some people did have some difficulty getting to the show and back home during the two or three days that the animals were housed in the Exhibit Building.

The high point of the judging was Saturday morning when Judge Ollie Liner of Plainview made his selections in the beef calf classes. The Grand Champion Calf was exhibited this year by D'Lois McGinty, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rusty McGinty of Plains. D'Lois has been striving for that honor for six years and she has always had some good animals in the show. She exhibited the reserve champion calf there last year. The 838 pounds steer was bought last March from Mr. Terrill Christian of Claude, Texas and D'Lois named him "Champ" soon after he arrived at his new home. At least 500 people were on hand to see the calf judging.

Jay Bryson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Bryson of Tokio, was the exhibitor of the Reserve Champion Calf. His calf was an 815 pound steer bred by Mr. Francis Tracy of Carlsbad, New Mexico. Jay was also the exhibitor of the Grand Champion Barrow which made his second consecutive year to have the top pig of the show. Last year he won with a pig that was purchased from Mr. Carl Westbrook of Seagraves and because of his

Jimmy Taylor Wins Beef Calf Gain Contest

Jimmy Taylor, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Taylor, Route 1, Tokio, won the gain contest conducted with the Junior Fat Stock Show by a two pound margin. His calf, Buddy, gained 654 pounds between June 1st and February 21st for an average daily gain of 2.46 pounds. Jimmy bought Buddy from Earl Bryson of Tokio when he was about three months old. Buddy weighed 866 pounds last Saturday and he would have been one year old on March 4th.

Thirty calves finished the gain contest and all of them made a satisfactory gain. Exhibitors Coin \$789.50 in Prizes At Stock Show

The 54 exhibitors this year at the Stock Show received a total of \$789.50 in cash awards plus a number of valuable animals and trophies. The Plains State Bank and the First National Bank of Brownfield made a cash donation to every exhibitor. From these two banks each exhibitor received either \$5.00, \$3.00 or \$2.50. They paid \$5.00 for each calf, \$3.00 for each barrow and mutton lamb and \$2.50 for each fine wool lamb but each individual exhibitor was eligible for only one award. In case an exhibitor had more than one animal in the show, he was entitled to the award for the animal that paid the highest. The two banks paid a total of \$198.50 in cash premiums to the exhibitors.

Mr. Charley Kersh of the Kersh Implement Company of Brownfield gave \$100.00 which was divided among the first five exhibitors in each class. The remaining amount of premiums came from the Livestock Association.

In addition to cash prizes the exhibitors of the three grand champion animals each received an animal in return. D'Lois and D'Lynn McGinty were operating as McGinty Sisters when they gave a Hereford heifer to the exhibitor of the grand champion calf. D'Lois was the winner of the animal so it was a case of D'Lynn presenting her half of the calf to D'Lois. Mr. Earl Bryson gave a Hampshire gilt to the exhibitor of the grand champion barrow. His son, Jay, received the gilt so it also was kept in the family. Mr. Gene Bennett gave a registered South-down ewe to the exhibitor of the grand champion lamb and Corkey Coke won the ewe. The value of the three animals would be in the neighborhood of \$200.00.

The Grand Champion Calf, an 838 pound Hereford, was the first animal in the ring and it went to Investors Security Mutual Life Insurance Company of Lubbock for \$1.05 per pound. D'Lois McGinty, owner of the calf, received \$879.90 for her steer.

The Grand Champion Lamb was sold by Corkey Coke to J. D. Wrather, Jr. of Dallas for \$1.50 per pound. The 97 pound lamb brought a total of \$145.00.

TUESDAY IS LAST DAY TO FILE FOR SCHOOL ELECTION
Tuesday, March 4, 1958 is the last day for filing of applications of candidates for a place on the ballot for election of trustees for the Plains Independent School District. The election will be held on Saturday, April 5, 1958. This new deadline for filing applications of candidates was enacted by the 55th Legislature. Board members whose terms are expiring are Ty Field, Paul Cobb, T. J. Murphey and a vacancy created by the resignation of R. N. (Rusty) McGinty several months ago.

Soil in Our Soil Conservation District

This is another in a series of articles on the soils of the Yoakum Soil Conservation District, written by Bill Dittmore, Soil Scientist, Soil Conservation Service.

The Arch soil series occur in the Yoakum Soil Conservation District in the west central portion of the county. Based on color we have the reddish chestnut soils such as Brownfield, reddish brown soils such as Amarillo, the grayish brown soils such as Portales and Mansker, and the gray soils with Arch being an example. The gray soils occur most extensively in the Yoakum SCD in a finger-like area with the tip of the finger being at Plains and then broadens out to about six miles wide at Bronco and extends on into New Mexico.

The Arch soils are light gray, highly calcareous, fine textured, moderately permeable, deep soils. The surface is a strongly calcareous clay loam that ranges from 6 to 10 inches thick, and is underlain by a lighter colored more calcareous clay loam subsoil. The Arch soils contain a large amount of free lime.

The Arch soils occupy nearly level bench or bed positions of ancient lakes in broad shallow flats that may be several hundred acres in extent. The very high lime content is probably due to the leaving behind large amounts of high lime sediments from a fluctuating high water table during development of the soil several million years ago. These Arch soils occur in association with Portales, Zita, and Mansker soils. An example of Arch soil may be found just west of Murphy Luna's house, and south of the Bronco highway in a caliche pit. Arch soil in the native range produce such highly palatable grasses in abundance as sideoats and blue grama, and dropseeds. In some places yucca in as invader.

This high lime Arch soil may be farmed successfully by using proper conservation management. The soil problems include good management practices and a high wind erosion susceptibility, a tie up of plant food and a


The winner of that game will play the winner of the Big Lake-Gruver contest Saturday night at 7:30 to determine the region's representative in the state cage met at Austin next week.

moderate water storage capacity due to the very high lime content of the soil. Chlorosis or a yellowing of the leaves is also a problem most common on these soils especially when grain sorghums are grown. Chlorosis can reduce the yields of some crops grown on these soils to a very low level.

The reduced yields resulting from a plant food tie up and the yellowing of the leaves may be in part lessened by adding large amounts of organic matter to the soil every year. Green manure crops such as rye and other small grains add organic matter. Madrid clover and other legumes also add nitrogen to the soil and when turned under add organic matter.

To lessen the danger of wind erosion due to the high amount of lime a continuous cover either living or dead should be on the season each year. This cover crop turned under will increase and maintain a high amount of organic matter content to prevent the soil particles from becoming detached and blowing away.

The Arch soils may be irrigated by the level furrow or border method due to their level, smooth surface and moderate permeability. These soils will hold about 2 inches of water per foot of soil that is in good condition. The effective root zone depth for most crops is about 6 feet. The amount of water that can be stored in the Arch soils is relatively high. The green manure crops and legumes such as vetch and madrid sweet clover and the small grains put down many roots that later rot and the small channels left by these roots serve as water ways to allow deeper penetration of the water and the most efficient use is made of the irrigation water that might otherwise be lost to surface evaporation if it did not soak in deep.

This is another soil in the Yoakum district which can be highly productive if properly handled.

County Calls Bond Election

Vote March 15th On \$60,000 Issue For Plains Hospital

A county bond election in the amount of \$60,000 has been called for Saturday March 15, with the funds earmarked for the constructing and equipping of a county hospital at Plains.

The election was called at a special meeting of the county commissioners court Monday morning, the action resulting from the earlier presentation of a petition to the court signed by more than 10 per cent of the resident qualified property taxpaying voters of the county.

According to the election notice, which is printed in its entirety elsewhere in this issue, voters will be balloting on whether or not the county will be authorized to issue bonds in the amount of \$60,000 to mature serially within any given number of years not to exceed 10 years, and bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 3½ per cent per year.

The money will be used for the purpose of "establishing, constructing and equipping an additional county hospital building in the City of Plains, and for all necessary permanent improvements and buildings in connection therewith." Approval must also be given to authorize the


county to levy a tax upon all taxable property in the county sufficient to pay off the bonds.

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
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







WHEREAS, a petition has been duly presented to the Commissioners' Court of Yoakum County, Texas, wherein the petitioners, alleging themselves to represent more than ten per cent (10%) of the resident qualified property taxpayers of Yoakum County, Texas, who have duly rendered their property for taxation, and praying this Court to order that an election be held in said County to determine whether or not bonds of said County shall be issued to the total principal sum of SIXTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$60,000), for the purpose of establishing, constructing and equipping an additional county hospital building to be located in the City of Plains, Texas, and for all necessary permanent improvements in connection therewith, as authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 9, Article 8 of the Constitution, and Chapter 1, Title 22, and Chapter 5, Title 71, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, and whether or not a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity, shall be levied on all taxable property within said County; and
