Plane Crash Kills Two

Charles Gryder, 27, of Denver City, and Jim Youngblood, 20, of Lovington, New Mexico, were killed instantly early Wednesday night when their light plane crashed and burned in a field northwest of Brownfield, near the Johnson community.

Employed by Slimer Well Servicing Co., Gryder was well known here in Plains.

Gryder, who had purchased the Cessna 140 plane only last Friday, and Youngblood left from the local airport shortly after 2 p.m. Wednesday afternoon for Lubbock, to purchase paint to be used on the plane. They were en route home which the crash occurred.

Apparently, Gryder was attempting to attract the attention of L. V. Alexander, uncle of his wife, who farms in the Johnson Community about 11 miles west and one mile north of Brownfield. Alexander said the plane approached his farm from the north circled at low altitude over the farm house, then flew low over him as he was plowing with a tractor in the field.

After making the pass, Alexander said, the plane "started to pull up abruptly several hundred feet, then nosed down, made a quarter turn and crashed." The plane burst into flames immediately.

Alexander said he ran from his tractor to the plane, about 300 yards away, but it was burning so furiously that he couldn't get near it. Highway patrolmen and

Attempt to Develop Production in New Zone

George M. McGarr and G. T. Trusler of San Angelo No. 1 Mary D. Clayton is a re-entry project nine miles southwest of Denver City in Southwest Yoakum County.

Operators will attempt to develop commercial production from a new zone in the San Andres.

The project is 1,980 feet from section 660, block B, John H. south and 660 feet from east lines Gibson survey.

The well originally was drilled to 11,483 feet by Warren Petroleum Corporation and abandoned at that point in March, 1956.

Several months ago, C. S. Conrad, Jr., cleaned the hole out to 5,534 feet and set 5 1/2 inch casing. He perforated at 5,292-5,322 feet and completed the well as a San Andres discovery for a daily pumping potential of 23.4 barrels of 33 gravity oil, plus 30 per cent water, after a 15,000-gallon fracture.

It is understood that the production from that pay has practically been depleted and Conrad recently sold the well and the lease it holds to McGarr and Trusler.

The new owners propose to perforate and test above 5,200 feet in the Brahoney zone of the San Andres. The production at 5,292-5,322 feet is in the Janice section of that formation.

Guy Mabee of Midland has abandoned his No 1-A Cleveland, Southwest Yoakum County re-

entered wildcat at 5,500 feet.

He tested the section at 5,468-5,643 feet through perforations. No commercial petroleum resulted. The project originally was drilled by Joseph I. O'Neill, Jr., as No. 1-A Cleveland to 11,840 feet in barren Devonian and abandoned.

Mabee recently re-entered the hole in an effort to make a producer from the San Andres. It is nine miles southwest of Plains and 1,980 feet from north and 660 feet from east lines of section See OIL NEWS on Page 8

All dog owners are urged to remember that date and bring your dogs to the city hall for their rabies shots.

The Plains city council has voted to construct a dog pound and enforce an ordinance passed several years ago, whereby all dog not vaccinated and wearing a tag will be impounded. Such a dog will be kept impounded for three days and if not claimed during that time, will be destroyed. A dog owner who claims an impounded dog will be required to pay a fee of \$2.00 for its release and have the dog vaccinated.

Thomason Gets Paving Contract

The bid of \$32,083 from Thomason Construction Company for street and road improvements in Yoakum County was accepted at a special meeting of the commissioners' court, held Monday.

Work will include about 60 blocks of paving in Denver City and Plains, plus some road work in Precinct 4. The bid was the lowest of two received. A third bid, submitted earlier, was withdrawn.

1958 COTTON LOAN RATE IS GIVEN BY ASC

Loans on 1958 crop Upland Cotton will be available before August 1st to producers in early harvesting areas according to W. M. Overton, ASC Office Manager. The rate of the advance loan will be 30.75 cents per pound, gross weight, basis Middling 7/8 inch cotton at average location.

To be eligible for the price support loan the cotton must be produced in compliance with the individual farm acreage allotment. The loans will be available from banks and other agencies which have entered in agreements with CCC.

The loan rate of 30.75 cents per pound for Upland Cotton is a minimum average. It will not be reduced but may be increased if a higher minimum level of support is indicated by the supply percentage and the applicable parity price as of the beginning of the marketing year of August 1st. The basis loan rate represents 81 per cent of parity as of the time loan was announced.

Several of the Plains Home-making students entered the Pillsbury Bake-Off Contest during the month of February.

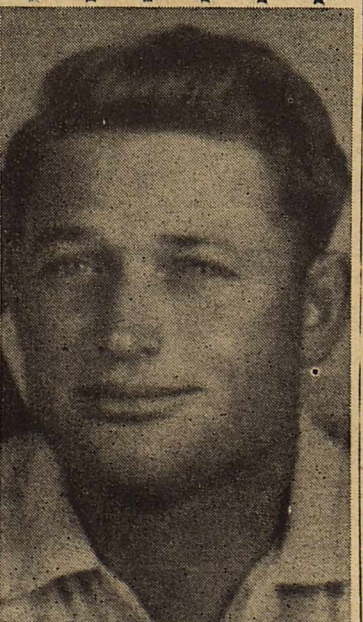

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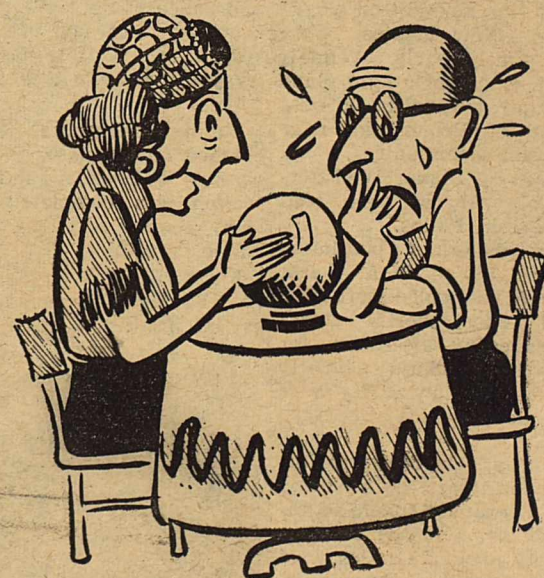

There is a good chance that the cattle barn will be filled to capacity next February when show time arrives. We got a pretty good estimate of the number of beef calves on feed in the county last Saturday afternoon when 46 calves were weighed in for the beginning of the gain contest. There were four calves that did not show up last Saturday and there will probably be two or three more started on feed that did not get entered in the gain contest.

The cattle barn has room for typing 80 head so with 45 or 50 steers tied in the barn there will be room for 30 to 35 head of breeding animals. That is a few more than is expected to show up at the first breeder show but if all goes well we could easily have that many in a few years.

The calves that came in last Saturday were a sight to behold. Some very promising individuals were in the bunch and the boys and girls seemed to have a very high interest in the program as a whole. Many of the calves were already trained to lead and showing signs of developing into a top animal. The smallest calf weighed in at 166 pounds and the heaviest calf was a 483 pounder owned by Oscar Henard. This is the second time in a row that he has weighed in the heaviest calf for the beginning of the gain contest.

July 1 Deadline For Applications On Wheat Acreage

Farmers on land on which no wheat was seeded for grain in any of the years 1956, 1957 and 1958 and for which a 1958 acreage allotment was not established, may apply for a 1959 wheat acreage allotment according to M. W. Luna, Chairman of the Yoakum Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee. The owner or operator of such a farm must apply in writing to his ASC county committee by July 1st, 1958. Mr. Luna stated otherwise, a 1959 wheat acreage allotment will not be established for the farm.

Mr. Luna further explained that 1958 wheat acreage on a farm which did not have a 1958 wheat acreage allotment does not qualify as wheat history acreage for the purpose of establishing acreage allotments. A 1959 old farm wheat acreage allotment will not be established for a farm without wheat in 1956 and 1957, and on which wheat was planted for grain in 1958 without a 1958 wheat acreage allotment unless an application is filed by July 1, 1958. Blank application forms are available at the ASC County office for use in filing requests for allotments.

Verlon Hilburn Starts Legume Plan on Farm

Verlon Hilburn, who farms 11 miles west of Denver City, is starting a program of using legumes in his crop rotation to add organic matter and nitrogen to his soil.

For several years he has been using alfalfa in longtime rotation with cotton and other row crops and feels that his extra production following the alfalfa makes this well worth while. Last fall he decided that he would try some vetch and see if this legume could be worked into his farming operations. He put in a small plot in front of his house last September. He said that he was rather disappointed with it as it did not make any lush growth during the winter. However as the weather warmed a little this spring it started to grow and now has a thick mat of vegetation on the ground.

In order to see what was going on down in the soil Verlon dug up some of the vetch and upon examining the soil found that it was a thick network of small roots. The soil is bound together with roots so that it takes some efforts to break it apart. He plans to either turn the top growth back into the soil for

more soil improvement or let it mature in order to produce seed for more seeding this fall. Verlon plans to use vetch in a rotation with other row crops. He will seed vetch in the fall and then let it stay on the ground until it makes a good growth in the spring and then will follow it with soybeans. Soybeans are to be used as they can be seeded later in the year. The soybeans will be followed by another vetch crop and then followed by cotton the following year. If these vetch crops make the root and top growth that the vetch he now has the results on the following crops should be very good.

Speed Continues To Be Top Factor For Fatal Accidents

Even though the average speed of Texas driving showed some improvement last year driving too fast for conditions continued to hold its number one position in the list of causative factors for rural fatal accidents.

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety, one or more traffic law violations are apparent in most every rural fatal accident. For all types of rural accidents those classified as fatal injury and non-injury—the Texas DPS said seven out of every eight involved at least one violation of our traffic laws.

Records for 1957 disclose that 2,539 persons died in traffic accidents in our state in 2,077 fatal accidents, and our economic loss was estimated at more than 277 million dollars. Even so our death rate dropped from 6.5 to six deaths per 100 million miles of driving. There were 67,886 injury accidents last year and 191,120 non-injury accidents, making a grand total of 261,083 accidents of all types.

With an eye on the accident and fatality record for 1958, Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS director or asked for greater public cooperation in traffic law observance. He said, "Records for the first third of this year indicate that with continued public cooperation some 250 fewer persons will be killed this year than in 1957. Garrison said each individual driver "is a deciding factor in determining whether or not this will become a reality."

"Each driver must use his own knowledge, judgment and decision in avoiding accident situations. We have laws that are designed to aid the driver in protecting himself and others on our streets and highways. Those laws will do only one-half the job, if only one-half of the drivers use them.

"Security in driving is the business of every driver. We hope that Texas motorists will continue to improve their knowledge of traffic laws and will become more disciplined in using them. This must be done if we are to make our streets and highways safer for ourselves and our families."

Homespun Hints

The 4-H plans for this summer include several types of activities. The older girls will have a workshop on leather belts and one on textile painting.

Prior to the county dress revue, there will be clothing workshops for girls of all ages. The fourth, fifth, and sixth grade girls will have a blouse workshop. The older girls will make a dress that could be entered in the district dress revue in event they win the county dress revue. The county dress revue will be sponsored by the Yoakum County Home Demonstration Council. Prizes will be awarded for winner in each age group.

After the groceries are on the kitchen table the problem is how to store each item. The non-perishable products are easily stored. The fresh vegetables are handled differently. Lettuce should not be washed until just before it is used in order to prevent the rust colored leaves. Cucumbers should be washed, dried but not peeled until they are used. Green beans and peas also should be washed only prior to shelling. This method will insure more vitamin retention.

Root vegetables, as potatoes, carrots, turnips, parsnips, beets require a cool place with some moist air. Carrots and beets usually need refrigeration in the summer.
