## Showers Slow Down Damage By Thrips to Cotton

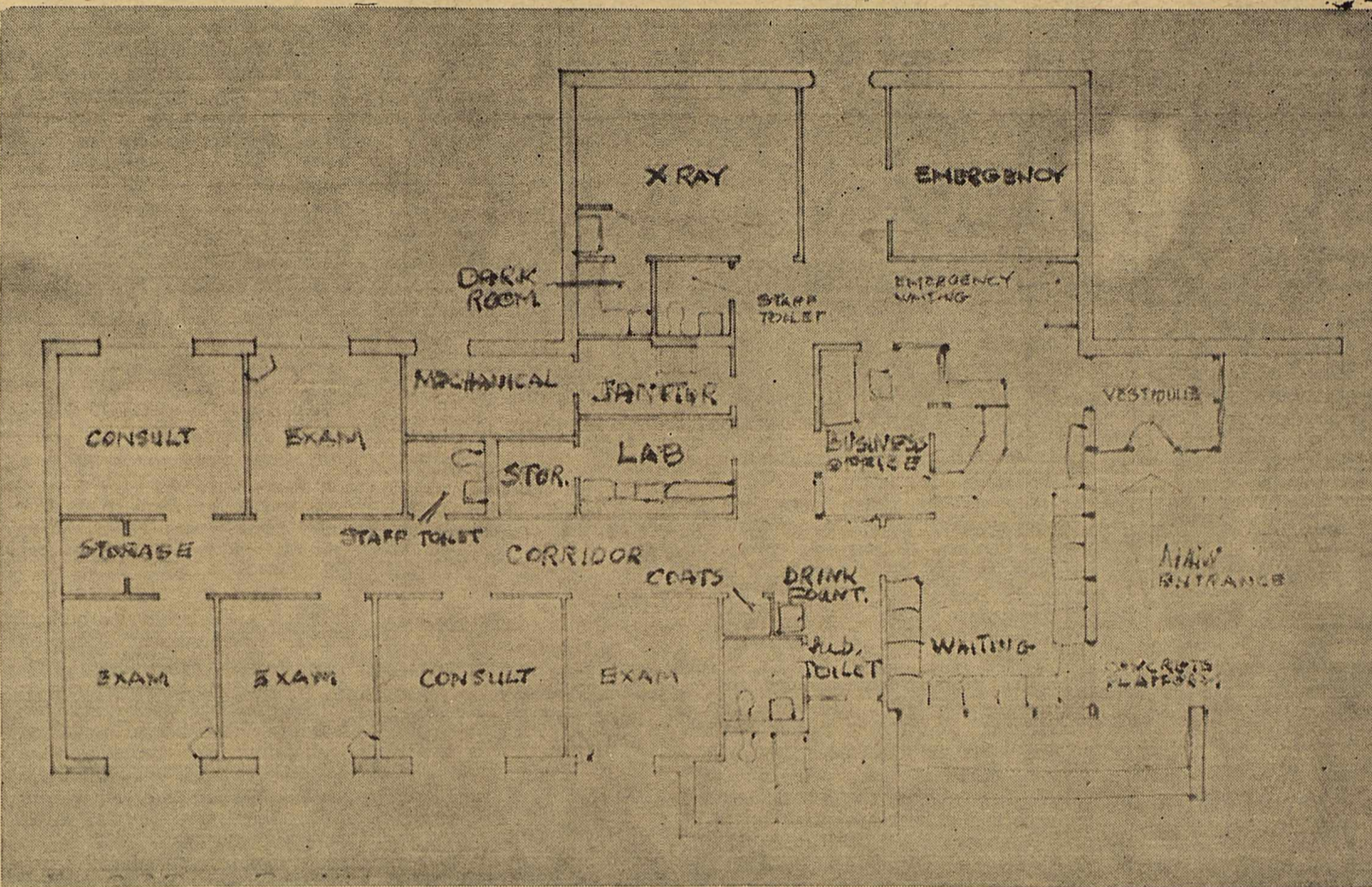
The showers during the early part of this week have been very beneficial to the cotton farmers in that it will slow down the damage caused by thrips. These little bugs have stunted the cotton to some extent but according to John Thomas, Extension Service Entomologist, Yoakum County has very light damage in comparison with some of the other counties on the South Plains. Mr. Thomas inspected several fields when he was in Yoakum County last Monday and he reported that farmers were doing a very good job of insect control.

The cotton fields are a little out of the ordinary this year as far as insects are concerned. During the early part of the season the main insect was the thrip. Now that insect has slowed down, a large number of other insects are coming in. There are fleahoppers, grasshoppers and stink bugs along with a number of harmless insects and some beneficial insects. Hooded beetles are building up in some fields to the extent that they will almost control the lice problem. Lady beetles are moving out of the harvested wheat fields and locating in the cotton. It is likely that the beneficial insects will keep the harmful bugs under control until about the time that the first white blooms appear. At that time there will be a need for boll worm control.

Cabbage loopers appeared early last year but they are even earlier this year. Loopers cause very little damage in fields where boll worms are controlled. Early and regular boll worm control will catch most of the loopers at a stage when they are not too difficult to kill. Most of the fields will have some boll worms by the second week in July.

# Bids for Plains Clinic to be Let at Meeting on July 14th



Floor Plan for Plains Clinic, Bids for Which Are to Be Let July 14

Bids for the construction of the Clinic at Plains, funds for which were voted in a county-wide election in March, will be received and opened at a meeting of the county commissioners on Monday, July 14, it was announced this week.

The entire construction, including general, plumbing, heating and air conditioning, ventilating and electrical work, will be let under one contract.

Plans and specifications have been prepared by the firm of Stiles, Roberts, Gee and Messersmith, architects and engineer, of Lubbock.

The Clinic, as planned, will contain 2,478 square feet, and will include an x-ray room, emergency room, waiting room, business office, three examining rooms and two consulting rooms in addition to a laboratory, rest rooms, storage rooms, etc. It has been planned to allow for expansion in three directions, if and when necessary.

The bond issue for the Clinic, which was for \$60,000, passed by the small margin of 11 votes in an election which saw only 801 ballots cast. The funds are to be used to build, equip and secure a site for the Clinic.

Announcement of the date for the letting of the bid was made at the meeting Monday of the commissioners.

Other action by the court included the awarding of \$455.35 in damages to A. W. Middleton for damages to a 1957 Chevrolet as a result of the collision last week between the car and a county loader, and the releasing of \$100,000 in US Treasury Certificates to the Yoakum County State Bank.

Murphy H. Baxter No. 1, S. E. Cone, slated 12,500-foot wildcat 14 miles north of Denver City in Central Yoakum County, was progressing below 5,220 feet in lime and shale on last report.

Drill site is 660 feet from north and east lines of section 612, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

Empire Drilling Company and Wiseman and Jackson No. 1 Nystle, wildcat in Northeast Yoakum County, was digging below 2,400 feet in lime and shale.

Drill site is 660 feet from south and east lines of section 21, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

Honolulu Oil Corporation No. 12 Paul Cobbs and others is a 6,900-foot project in the Prentice (6,700) field in Northeast Yoakum County.

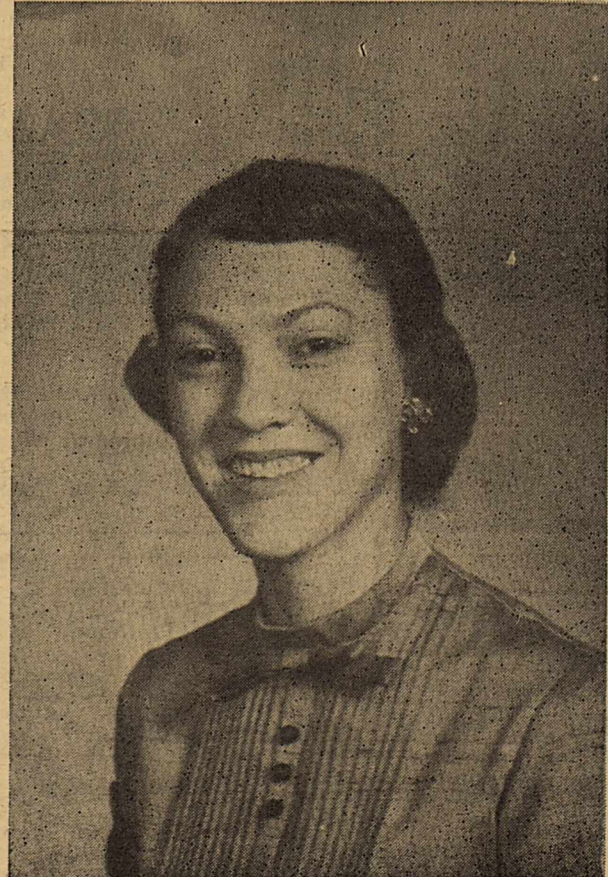

A total of 700 students, all sponsored by the Odd Fellows and Rebekah, will make the "United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth."

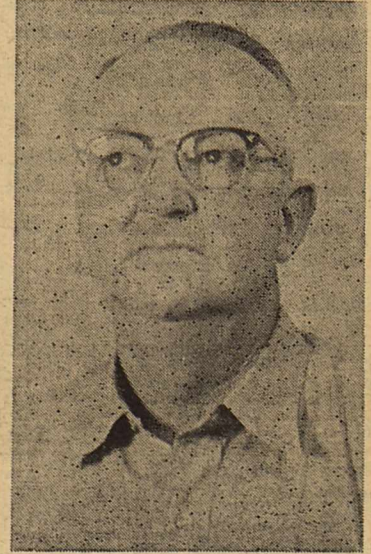
The group will be guests at a banquet sponsored by the Denton Lodge June 19th.
