

Rev. James Todd, of Claude, Texas, former Methodist minister in Plains was a visitor.


## Measurements of Cotton Acreages Will Begin Soon

According to W. M. Overton, Yoakum County ASC office manager, crop reporters will start measuring the 1958 cotton acreage within a few days. Farm operators are urged to assist the crop reporters in measuring the cotton acreage and to compare measurements made by the reporter with any measurements they may have made. By doing this, it is expected that some errors may be found in the field and corrected on the spot.

After cotton measurements have been made by reporters in the field they will turn in the maps and the acreage will be computed in the office and notices mailed to farm operators. If a farm has excess acreage, the operator will be given 15 days in which to dispose of the excess. The rate for checking destroyed excess cotton will be \$2.00 per plot plus \$1.00 for each additional plot over one.

Farmers that believe that the original cotton measurement is incorrect may have the cotton remeasured by paying \$7.00 per farm plus \$2.00 for each additional plot over one. However, if operators will go with reporters when they make the measurements in the field as stated above, the office manager and county committee does not believe there will be any request for cotton remeasurements. After a farm operator has received his official cotton planted notice and he is not completely satisfied, the office manager urges him to come by the office and some one will go over with him the measurements made by the reporter. It is expected that some errors will be made both in the field and office.

# Launch Campaign Here To Curb Hub-Cap Theft

The most likely crime risk faced by Plains area residents is the loss of the hub caps from their cars.

A successful campaign against the theft of automobile accessories, mainly hub caps could save Plains automobile owners and the insurance companies some \$1,500 a month, it was estimated here today.

In an effort to cut down on this crime, Virgil Short, owner of Plains Motor Co., has agreed to engrave the serial number on hub caps and other detachable items on your car as a free service to the public.

With a vibrating electric needle your serial number will be etched on hub caps and other items in an effort to remove a primary temptation to steal. This plan is advocated by Police authorities as a real help to the automobile owners and to the police in eliminating auto accessory theft. Oftentimes when someone is successful in this theft they move up to a more serious theft.

Sheriff Robert Chambliss stated that he endorses this plan and desires to give all possible assistance.

The simple device of engraving an automobile's serial number on each hub cap makes them easily identifiable as belonging to a particular car and leaves no question that they were stolen when they turn up anywhere other than on the proper automobile.

The Texas Automobile Dealers Association, all police organizations and the National Automobile Theft Bureau, an organization maintained by automobile insurance companies to combat the ever increasing rate of crime against cars, advise that if more car owners would have the serial number engraved on everything that can be detached from their cars, it would cut down on the theft of auto accessories, chances of having a stolen article returned would be brighter, auto insurance rates could be reduced and the most prevalent of teenage crimes would be discouraged.

Gerald L. Anderson, airman apprentice, USN, son of Mrs. Alma Anderson, departed Norfolk, Va., June 9th with Aappa Squadron 42 aboard the attack carrier USS Intrepid for a two month Midshipman training cruise to Northern Europe.

During the voyage crew members will train Midshipmen in



shipboard duties and responsibilities they will be expected to assume upon receiving their commissions.

Between training exercises the Intrepid is scheduled to visit Oslo, Norway; Rotterdam, Netherlands and Lisbon, Portugal.

The Intrepid is expected to return to Norfolk early in August.

Gerald was a member of the 1957 graduating class in Plains. He entered boot training July 31st at San Diego, California.

## Burke to Meeting on New FHA Program

George Burke attended a Federal Housing Administration luncheon in Lubbock Wednesday at the Chicken Shack.

Approximately 200 men from the surrounding small towns were present to learn about the change in the FHA program especially for small towns. A program, under the direction of S. S. Forrest was presented. Jim Ashley, main speaker, explained to the lenders and builders the entirely new program under the

heading of Certified Agency Program.

The FHA loan has previously been a long drawn out process taking from 60 and 90 days. Under the new program it should take only 4 or 5 days to obtain a commitment. Because of the new low down payment and the long terms the building program should increase in all small towns.

The CAP, a dynamic new approach to the problems of home financing in small towns and rural areas has been in the experimental stage the past eight months and has been proven.

The National Housing Act gives the Federal Housing Administration the responsibility of improving American housing standards.

# Weigh Day Held by 4-H

The 4-H club boys and girls met at the Livestock barn Saturday, June 21st for their regular weigh day.

This was the first beef calf weigh day since the initial weigh-in five weeks earlier. Thirty seven calves were weighed across the scales and 30 of them are in the gain contest. Five of the calves were larger calves that are being fed for the Dallas Fair in October and Pharon Pharr was there with two calves that did not get weighed in last month.

According to Leo White County agent, out of the thirty calves in the gain contest, Loretta Taylor had the highest gaining animal with 111 pounds gain in five weeks. Oscar Henard was running a close second with 110 pounds. Jack Sprawls and D'Lynn McGinty tied for third with 104 pounds each. Only four calves had put on less than two pounds a day during the first

35 days. All the others were putting on satisfactory gains and the calves looked good.

Several of the on-lookers stated that the calves as a whole looked better than the group we had in at this time last year. Not only is the quality better but they are a uniform bunch of calves and most of them look like the right kind to start out with a club calf.

Most of the boys and girls who are feeding calves have had some experience in beef calf feeding which should be to their advantage. They should be able to improve their management practices as they go along. Each year they should do a better job than they did the year before even if the calf they started with is no better as an individual animal. The care and attention that is given an animal during the feeding period has a lot to do with his chances of coming out at the head of the line.

Mr. White stated, "The heaviest calf weighed in last Saturday weighed 593 pounds and the lightest calf weighed 233 pounds. We figure these calves were probably gain between 500 and 550 pounds from now until show time so we are not too worried about the smaller calves not making the 700 pound weight limit by the last of February. None of them are going to be too heavy and none of them are supposed to shed out any teeth. Everything looks good in the calf business including the fact that the boys and girls are intensely interested in their animals. This was proven by the fact that so many of them came in to the first weigh day. Another weigh day will be held on Saturday morning, July 19th. At this time we should be able to tell a little more about the animals and the calves that are going to Dallas should be shaping up pretty well by then."
