## Prentice Field gets new completion by Humble Oil

Humble Oil and Refining Company No. 13 Cobb I and others has been completed in the Prentice (6,7600) field in Central Yoakum County.

The new oiler finalized for a 24-hour pumping potential of 117 barrels of 30.2 gravity oil, plus 15 per cent water, through perforations from 6,500 to 6,740 feet, after a 30,000-gallon fracture treatment.

Wellsite is 1,980 feet from south and east lines of section 381, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

Rutter and Wilbanks Brothers of Midland No. 1 Bedford is a new 5,800-foot wildcat in North Yoakum County.

Location is 660 feet from north and east lines of section 128, block D, John H. Gibson survey. Skelly Oil Company No. 2-A Kendrick has been completed as a San Andres well in the Bronco (multipay) field in Northwest Yoakum County.

On 24 hour potential test, it flowed 19 barrels of 31.6 gravity oil, no water, through a 26-64 inch choke and perforations from 5,106 to 5,220 feet after a 20,000 gallon fracture treatment.

A re-entered project, it originally was completed as a Devonian producer.

Wellsite is 330 feet from south and west lines of section 455, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

J. D. Hancock of Dallas No. 1 Wimberly is a 5,638-foot wildcat failure in Northwest Gaines County.

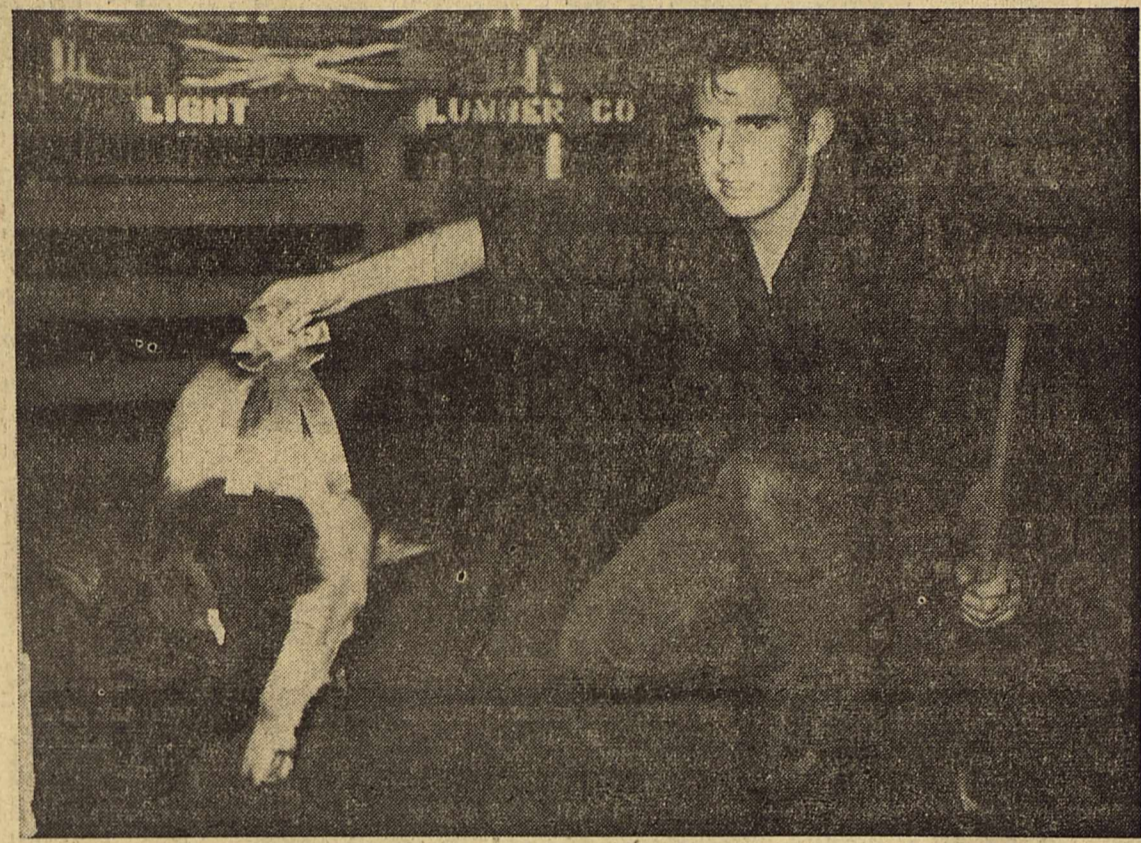
Drillsite was 660 feet from east and 1,980 feet from north lines of section 312, block G, CCSD and RGNG survey.

J. S. Abercrombie Minerals, Inc., No. 2 Ella Brown is a new oiler in the Reeves (San Andres) field in Southeast Yoakum County.

Operator reported a 24-hour pumping potential of 121 barrels of 32 gravity oil, plus 1.2 per cent water, through perforations from 5,580 to 5,596 feet, after a 5,000-gallon fracture treatment.

Wellsite is 2,310 feet from north and east lines of section 751, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

## Stock Show to open here Friday morning

A total of \$600 in cash premiums will be divided among 86 youthful 4-H club members this weekend as the seventh annual Junior Fat Stock Show is held at the Livestock Exhibition Building in Plains.

All of last years' winners will be making their bid for a repeat performance Friday and Saturday. Competition is expected to be keener this year with many more animals entered in each division.

Monday night when the directors met at the Livestock Exhibition Building to make final preparations for the show, Pat Henard and W. M. Taylor had to do some close calculating in order to place all the hogs and lambs in the 44 available pens. The pig and lamb barn will be filled to capacity this year but there will be some empty stall space in the beef cattle barn.

Professor Dale Zinn of New Mexico A. & H. College, will begin his judging duties at 10:00 a. m. Friday morning on the breeding beef cattle. One Angus bull, four Hereford bulls and six Hereford heifers will be exhibited during the morning according to Bob Loe, the breeding cattle superintendent.

The barrow show will begin at 1:00 p. m. followed by the show-buff utilized for the voting, it was reported. One will be at the elementary school building in Denver City with O. A. Byrd to be judge and Mrs. J. P. Williams and Mrs. C. A. Prewitt as clerks. Ballots may also be cast at the Shigo Community Building, where Mrs. H. K. Benton will act as election judge and Mrs. K. Dolloff and Mrs. Howard Webb as clerks.

Other members of the seven-man board whose terms do not expire this spring include Jack Akin, H. G. Brown, Joe Taylor, H. H. Ramage and Y. L. Wright.

## Cowboys slip by Roscoe

It made no difference whether he was Cowboy or Plowboy, there was not time to peep at the clock or scoreboard when the Plains Cowboys and Roscoe Plowboys held the crowd breathless for the entire four-quarter period Tuesday night in the Big Springs High School Gym.

Only when the final going sounded and the scoreboard read 41-40, could the local team say they had defeated the scrapping Roscoe quintet. Still weak from flu, strep-throat and pneumonia the Cowboys played a groggy, but persistent game.

Roscoe led the Plains team 12-9 at the end of the first quarter but the score showed a slight lead for Coach Sewell's boys at

the half-time. From thence it was "I will take one, you take one," with never more than two points separating the teams, until the clock showed eight seconds to play and the Plowboys led 40-39. When Huddleston was fouled off, Coach Rip Sewell put "wide-awake" Dick Cooke in from the B squad.

Roscoe's high-point man, Ethridge, missed the free-toss which was rebounded by Jim Williams, who is turn passed to Walt Coffman. Coffman drove the length of the court and missed a layout, but Cooke followed with a netted ball with three seconds left to go. There was not time for the Plowboys to retaliate.

Jim Williams, back after a bout with pneumonia, paced all shooters with seventeen points,

and the only double figure for the Cowboys.

The Cowboys sank fifteen field goals and eleven free tosses.

Rip Sewell's bi-district champs will meet powerful White Deer in the Regional tourney at 9:30 a. m. Saturday in Lubbock Municipal Coliseum, hoping to avenge the loss handed the Cowboys by the Bucks in football last fall. The Cowboys should be at top strength for this tussle, according to Sewell.

The Cowboys were out-played, out-scored, out-run and walked on by the Dimmitt Bobcat 1-AA champs in South Plains Junior College Gymnasium on Friday night of last week when several of the varsity team were out due to illness and the B squad had to come to their aid.

## Top quarter horses are purchased

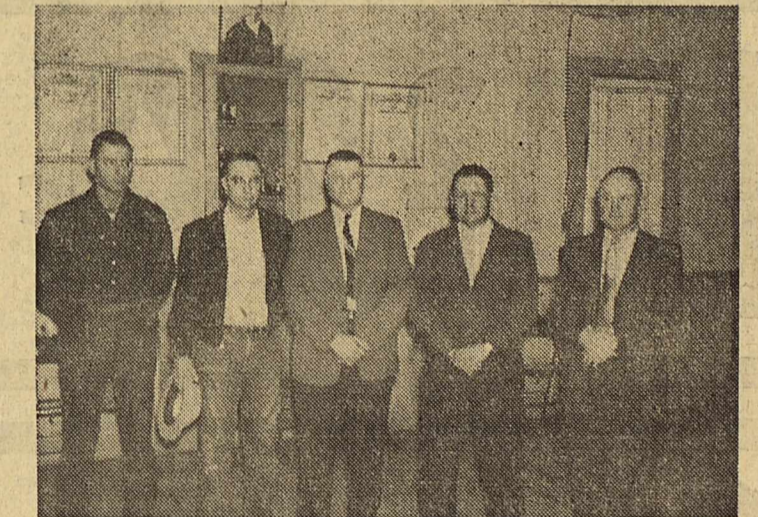
Phillip Williams and Bill Gray are to be congratulated on the recent purchase of two top quarter horses.

## Cotton classing office is discussed at Lions

At the regular Lions Club luncheon meeting last Thursday, a discussion on the proposed cotton classing office to be built in Brownfield, if interest in this project indicates that the people of this area want such an office, was given by Jim Foy, Terry County Agent and C. B. Bartley, Terry County Farmer and Chairman of the Committee organized to promote this project.

They discussed the proposed cost of the office and its potential benefits to the cotton farmers in this area.

Bartley pointed out that the building and equipment would have to be purchased and maintained by the farmers in the area but that the government would provide the men to work in the office in classing the cotton. He further stated that cotton in this area has some advantage over cotton produced in areas to the north of us as we have a somewhat longer growing season than some areas and con-

sequently can produce a better quality cotton. He feels that if this cotton can be graded in the area where it is grown and with cotton of similar quality that the over-all grades will be higher and more uniform.

In order to underwrite the cost of this office they are asking farmers in each of the three counties, covered in the area which includes Yoakum, Terry, and Gaines to contribute. No set assessment is being made but they would like for each farmer interested in the office to contribute about one dollar per bale ginned last year. They feel sure that most of the money can be raised in Terry County since it is the biggest cotton producing county but if it is to be a success, money will be needed from the other counties involved.

## Libraries observe first anniversary this week-end

## Turner HD Club meets Wednesday with Mrs. Bryson

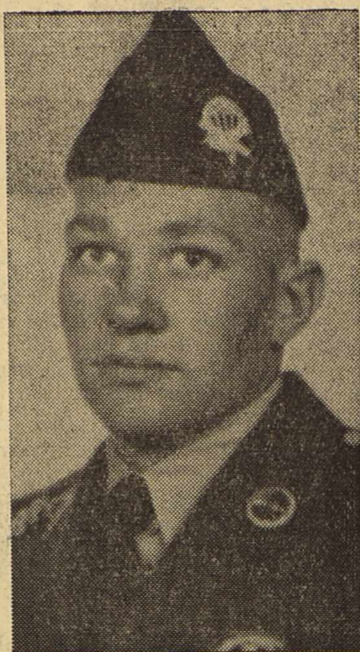

A reciprocal trade agreement is one which Congress has authorized the President to make with foreign countries in which both nations undertake to lower or adjust their respective import duties as a means of stimulating trade.

The Hon. George W. Malone states that all foreign trade is not good. He takes the stand that trade which brings distress to

American workers and restrict the development of American industries or which lessens our national defense capacities is detrimental to the Nation. Material for the discussion was taken from the Congressional Digest.

Mrs. Bill H. Powell talked on Private Investments in Latin America. She said "The United States is turning more and more to Mexico and it's potentialities for it is booming and politically stable." Mexico is moving through a period of tremendous growth and development, in which the U. S. trade and American capital are playing a major part. Trade between the United States and Mexico has increased 400 per cent in the past twenty years.

Six-hundred million dollars are spent annually by American tourists of which Mexico receives a substantial share. Mexico's trade with the United States is four times as large as with the rest of the world.

Private investment in Mexico by Americans now exceed one billion dollars a year and is being increased by millions annually.

## Grain sorghum conference at Amarillo March 3-4

Of interest to local farmers is the Grain Sorghum Research and Utilization Conference to be held March 3 and 4 at the Herring Hotel in Amarillo.

It is now widely recognized that grain sorghums are basic to the economy of a wide area of not only the Great Plains but

that they rank fifth in the Nation among cultivated crops. Individuals and institutions with wide ranges of interests in the many aspects of grain sorghum production, marketing and utilization have done a lot of research and development.

### ACROSS THE Cattle Guard

by LEO W. WHITE  
County Agent

A great deal of work has been done this year in an effort to improve the general appearance of the animals in the show being held this weekend. In the 1958 show most of the animals were well groomed but there was plenty of room for improvement. Especially was this true in the lamb classes. This year the lamb feeders are trying to bring into the show ring some animals that have more eye appeal than those last year. Some of the boys have been working at intervals all during the feeding season. Others have done most of their work during the last week or ten days.

The job of grooming a lamb for show is a tedious one. A nine year old boy, who has had no experience, is not going to be able to prepare his lamb for the show. It takes two or three years of practice for a boy to accomplish the art of blocking a lamb. A grown man can learn much sooner since he is more accustomed to working with his hands. Most of our lamb feeders are very young and a lot of the lamb grooming work falls to be done by the Daddy. The parents of these boys have been quite enthusiastic this year in helping their boys get the animals prepared for the show. I feel that the lambs this year will be a much more presentable group than we have ever had before.

Another attempt has been made this year to improve the showmanship ability of the boys and girls involved in the show. Monthly weigh days have been held for the beef calves since May and the participation has been very good. Seven of the calves have been at every weigh day. Ten others missed only one of the nine opportunities during the year to weigh and practice showing their calves. As a result of this practice the calves should be on their good behavior this Saturday when Mr. Dale Zimm performs his duties of placing them. The boys and

girls should do a good job of presenting their animals to the judge and a lot of their ability will be due to the practice they have had.

Most of the work with the pigs have to be done at home. Only one weigh day was held for pigs this year and only about 25 per cent of the animals showed up. We have a few pigs in our show this year that have had some excellent care taken of them. Very few of the pigs have been exercised a great deal before the show in prior years. This year there are several boys who have been exercising their animals for almost two months.

Most of the feeders realize that they are likely to lose money on their projects this year unless they sell for a premium. The lamb feeders are hardest hit by the price squeeze. All commercial lamb feeders have had low profits this year and some of them have taken a substantial loss. The price of fat lambs is very low at the present time in comparison with the price of feeder lambs last fall. Some of the pig feeders have some profit made even at market price but most of the calf feeders have fed their animals much longer and put on a higher degree of finish than a commercial feeder would put on them in order to get the most profit. Most of the calf feeders will need a premium of four or five cents above the market price in order to break even this year.

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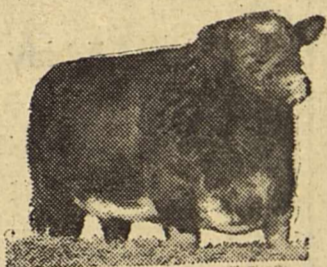
