
Alice Beauty Shop is opened here







International Affairs was the encourage foreign trade. It is vital to our economic life. But we must be realistic in the application in our trade loans we are seeking to find better meth-

ods to employ in promoting foreign trade and provide reasonable protection for our own taxpaying citizens." A reciprocal trade agreement is one which Congress has authorized the President to make

with foreign countries in which both nations undertake to lower or adjust their respective import duties as a means of stimulating trade.

The Hon George W. Malone states that all foreign trade is not good. He takes the stand that trade which brings distress to

American workers and restrict the development of American industries or which lessens our national defense capacities is detrimental to the Nation. Material for the dicussion was taken from the Congressional Digest.

Mrs. Bill H. Powell talked on Private Investments in Latin America. She said "The United States is turning more and more to Mexico and it's potentialities for it is booming and politically Mexico is moving stable." through a period of tremendous growth and development, in which the U.S. trade and American capital are playing a major part. Trade between the United States and Mexico has increased 400 per cent in the past twenty years.

Six-hundred million dollars are spent annually by American tourist of which Mexico receives a substantial share. Mexico's trade with the United States is four times as large as with the rest of the world.

Private investment in Mexico by Americans now exceed one billion dollars a year and is being increased by millions anually.
