ASC Roundup

"A" and "B" Cotton Farms
Yoakum County Farmers signed up 36 farms for the Choice "B" Cotton Allotment. According to W. M. Overton, ASC County Office Manager, this is approximately 10 per cent of the Cotton Farms in Yoakum County. The 1959 Approved allotment will be approximately 88 per cent Choice "A" and 12 per cent Choice "B" Allotment. These figures could change some due to operators renting other farms after March 16th, the closing sign up date.

1959 WHEAT MEASUREMENT

The 1959 Wheat acreage is being measured in the field at this time. It appears that approximately 50 per cent of Wheat Allotment Farms will have wheat seeded. Farmers that have wheat without an allotment are urged to contact the ASC Office so that the Wheat Acreage may be measured.

1958 GRAIN SORGHUM

Only 5 of the 300 Grain Sorghum Loans made by the local ASC Office under the 1958 CCC Grain Loan Program were redeemed by Yoakum County Farmers. The maturity date on the grain notes was 3-31-59. All outstanding notes as of that date were forfeited to CCC. The amount loaned Yoakum County Farmers on 1959 produced grain sorghum was \$410,241.19. This is approximately one-half of the loan value of the 1957 Grain sorghum loans. Under the 1957 Program the County Office made approximately 850 loans.

WOOL

Wool producers, in order to be eligible for incentive payment on wool or inborn lambs sold during the 1958 marketing year (between April 1, 1958 and March 31, 1959) must present the original sales receipts to the ASC office and file an application for payment not later than April 30, 1959.

Chamber meeting well attended; projects discussed

A discussion was held on the need of the widening of the highway through the City of Plains. The State Highway Dept. states that this work will begin sometime this summer.

Burford Duff, city secretary, gave a report on the need of a larger gas line into the City before the winter months.

The Chamber of Commerce stated their desire to help in any way possible in getting some FH A houses started in Plains. It is felt that several houses could be sold now if plans could be approved by the FHA.

Buying lots for the building of houses is a big problem at this time. D. N. Taylor, president urges anyone who has lots that would be suitable for building homes should contact the Chamber of Commerce or list them with one of the several Real Estate Agencies in town.

The Chamber meets each second and fourth Thursday at 12-45. Every member is urged to attend and help make our city and community a better place to live.

Other members on the seven man board whose terms do not expire this spring are Ty Field, Paul Cobb, Ford Hawkins and T. J. Murphy.

Presiding judge will be Mrs. J. P. Robertson, assisted by Mrs. John Camp and Mrs. Raymond Bookout.

Voters balloting in the school board election will also be naming county school trustees, Olan Cox, precinct 2, George Buland, trustee at large and Perry Anthony, precinct 3.

Three named to all-district squad

The 5-A All District Basketball team was selected by district coaches at a meeting Saturday in Seagraves.

In all, ten players were selected on the team and eight were given honorable mention.

Four cases filed in district court

Two compensation cases, one suit for damages and one divorce suit were filed this week in district court.

M. E. Elms, a resident of Seminole, is seeking compensation from Liberty Insurance Company for injuries allegedly sustained on November 9, 1958, while employed by Murphy - Dyer Drilling Co., Inc. Elms asserts that he suffered disabling injuries while in the process of pushing on a 10 3/4 - inch casing, which was 20 feet long. He is seeking \$35 a week for 52 weeks, and \$30 a week for 300 weeks.

K. C. Adams, listing Denver City as his address, is asking compensation from Home Indemnity Co., for injuries which he allegedly received while working for the Hester Hardware and Lumber Co. Adams charges that he was injured by lifting reinforcing steel, and is seeking \$35 a week for 401 weeks.

Hanover Fire Insurance Co. of New York has filed suit against Westwind Gas Co. in the amount of \$7,601.55 to recover damages paid to Miss Annie Armstrong following an explosion at the Armstrong residence last October 16. They charge the explosion was a result of negligence on the part of the defendant's employees.

Filing suit for divorce was Irene Ashmore against Douglas Ashmore. The plaintiff is seeking custody of the minor child, plus child support.

G. P. Beane announced for the position of City Judge. The office is presently held by E. B. Teague who did not seek re-election.

Others serving on City Council whose terms do not expire this year are Mayor, Roger Curry; Aldermen, Kenneth Hale and Pete Sampson.

Mrs. John Camp will be election judge. Assisting her as clerks will be Dr. May Gainer and Mrs. Kenneth Hale.

All those seeking office are well known here. Smith is employed by the state highway department, and formerly owned and operated a service station here. Faulkenberry operates the local theatre, and in addition has farming interests.

Hayes is engaged as manager for Judge Beane's tourist courts, and Burke is owner of the Stop and Wash Laundry, as well as dealing in real estate.

G. P. Beane, candidate for city judge, is an oldtimer of Plains, formerly served as county judge. He owns the tourist court bearing his name.

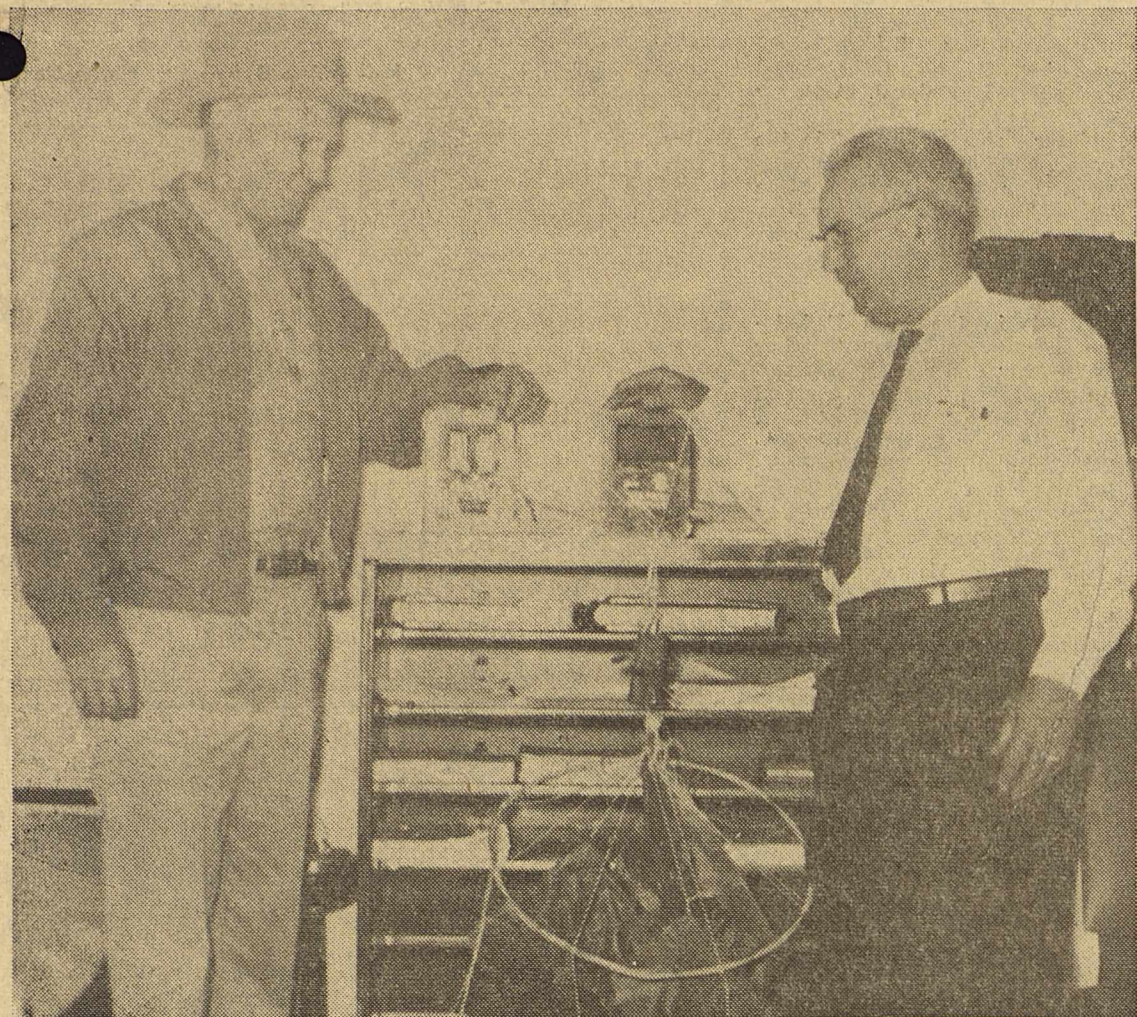
Rev. C. J. Coffman to attend Baptist conference meet

Vernon Yearby, former pastor First Baptist Church, Midland, and now associate in the department of Evangelism of the Baptist Home Mission Board, Dallas, will be the guest speaker in the conference meeting of Baptist district and associational leaders April 3 at Second Baptist Church, Lamesa. Another guest conference leader - speaker is to be H. H. McBride, Dallas, field representative of the Southern Baptist Protective Plan for churches and ministers.

This conference will commence at 9:45 a.m. Friday. It is a regular quarterly feature in the Baptist work in District Eight; comprising five associations, 130 churches, in a 12 county area. J. William Arnett, Big Spring, is the missions secretary.

Advisory boards named

Organization of two new county advisory boards, members of which will serve on a voluntary basis without pay, was revealed today by County Judge Don Hancock.

The first, which has already held its initial meeting, has been designated as a juvenile advisory board, and will be concerned with the disposition of cases involving youths under 17 years of age. The second is a charity advisory board, members of which will review applications for county relief funds.

The juvenile board, Judge Hancock explained, will include two separate groups, one to review cases involving Denver City juveniles, and the other to serve the Plains area.

Those named to the Denver City board include R. E. Dyer, John Derryberry, Mrs. Cecil Bickley, Harold Mead and Mrs. Willard Kidd. The board for the Plains area will be selected at a later date, the judge reported.

The juvenile board will meet on a "call" basis, primarily to afford a broader base for working out juvenile problems and to serve only in an advisory capacity to the county judge, who is also the county juvenile official. Final authority of decisions will continue to rest with the county judge, as it has in the past.

Juveniles who are in trouble of assistance, or who are in need with the law, will appear personally before the board as well as others who are connected with the case, for full hearing. Following appraisal of the case, members will recommend such disposition to the county judge as they feel to be the best interest of the juvenile and the public.

Members of the board will serve for one, two and three year terms, with terms of two members expiring each year, Judge Hancock explained. An informal meeting was held Friday night by the members to discuss the responsibilities of the board. The first hearing on a juvenile case has been set for this Friday morning at 10 o'clock, the coun-

ty judge reported.

Members of the new charity advisory board are to be named Monday at a meeting of the commissioners' court. Each commissioner will nominate, with the entire court to vote on approval.

The board will work primarily with Buford Dulin, county service and welfare officer, hearing requests for relief funds and recommending to the court those they feel are worthy of assistance.

"The creation of an advisory

board will in no way deprive those truly in need of assistance from receiving it", Judge Hancock pointed out, "but will, we hope, make sure that county relief funds are channeled in the right direction".

Expenditure for county relief has continued to rise steadily, it was pointed out, with some \$9,000 being expended during the first two months of this year. This, it was said, was substantially higher than for the same period last year.

Heath & Humbard stake wildcat in West Yoakum

Heath & Humbard of Midland No. 1 Ford will be dug as a 5,500-foot wildcat seven miles southwest of Plains in West Yoakum County.

Drill site is 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from east lines of section 471, block D, John H. Gibson survey.

Shell Oil Company No. 1 Cadenhead has been completed as second well in the recently opened Ownby (upper Clear Fork) field in East Yoakum County.

On 24 - hour potential test it pumped 313 barrels of 32.7 gravity oil, through perforations from 6,588 to 6,597 feet, after a 3,000 gallon acid treatment.

Location is 1,980 feet from north and 985 feet from east lines of section 457, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

Bruner & Homes of Midland have set 4 1/2-inch casing for completion attempt in No. 1 Frost, Central Yoakum County wildcat.

Bottomed at 5,368 feet in the San Andres, the project has pipe set at 5,349 feet. Open hole was to be acidized and tested.

Location is 1,980 feet from north and west lines of section 333, block D, J. H. Gibson survey, 2 1/2 miles north of Plains.

El Cinco Production Company, Ltd. of Midland is a re-entry project in the Tex-pac area in Northwest Gaines County.

Scheduled for an 8,500 - foot bottom it is 12 miles southwest of Denver City, 660 feet from south and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 18, block A-7, ps1 survey.

Citizen chairmen named to plan for Library Week

"The Texas Library Week program is designed not just to stimulate reading", said Cullen, "but to offer concrete assistance to help every community attain the books its libraries need for knowledge and understanding in our present space age. Most state cities will conduct a bookplate sale where citizens may give the purchase price of a needed book and sign a specially - designed Texas National Library Week bookplate to be placed inside the cover".

Nationally, the week set aside to work toward achieving a "better - read, better - informed America", is sponsored by the independent non - profit National Book Committee, Inc., and the American Library Association. Its slogan is "Wake Up and Read".

Postmaster at training meeting

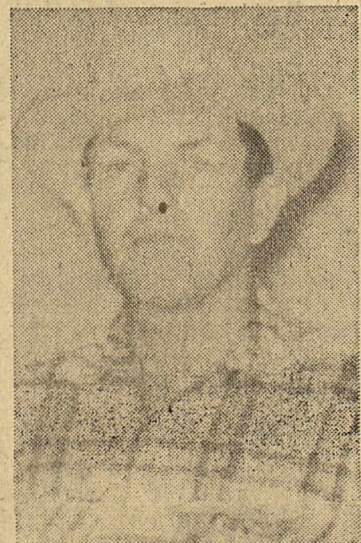
Robert C. Watson, local postmaster, attended a Postmaster's Training School in Lubbock Monday and Tuesday.

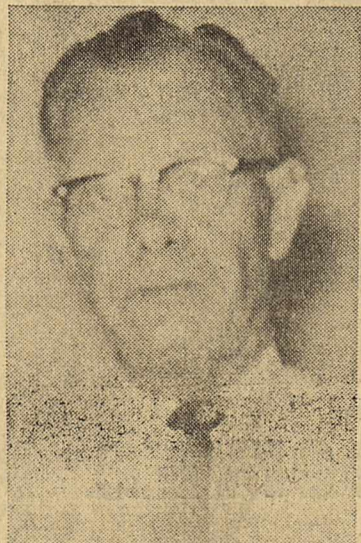
It is felt that this will improve the mail service all over the United States and perhaps be felt world-wide, Mr. Watson reported.



G. P. BEANE, candidate for city judge, is a former county judge here, and is owner of the Beane Tourist Courts.



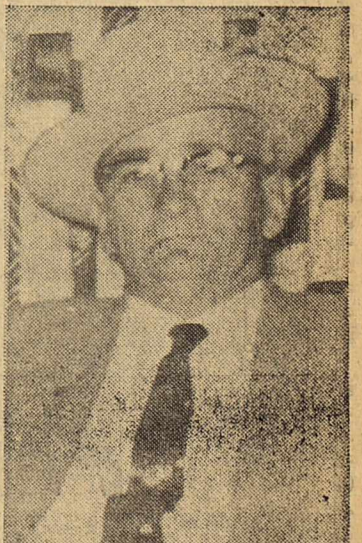
GEORGE BURKE, candidate for councilman, is owner of the Stop and Wash Laundry, and a local real estate agent.

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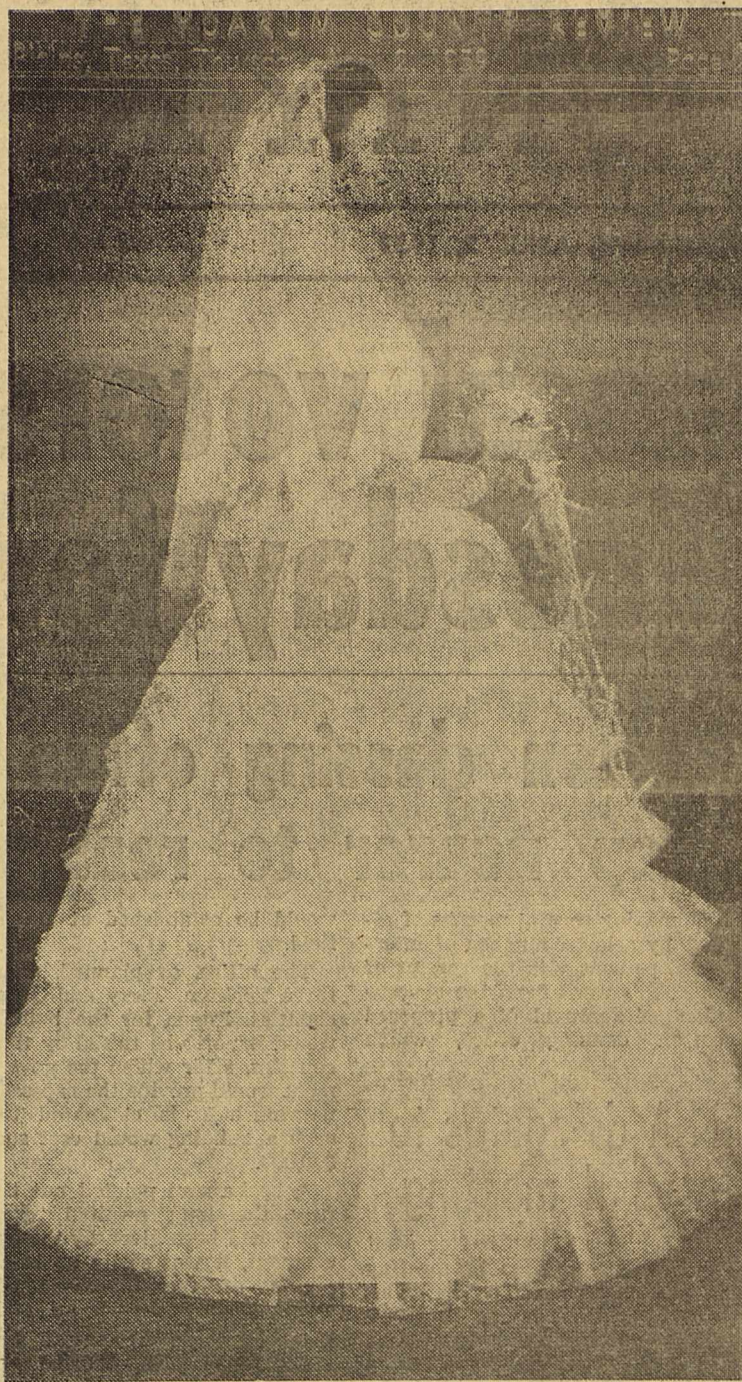

Gifts were exchanged and refreshments were served to seventeen members.

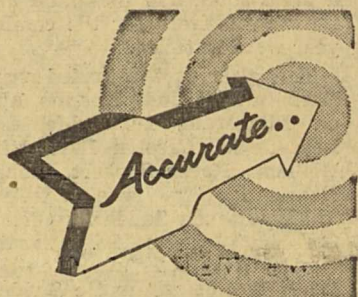
Pack meeting is held on Monday

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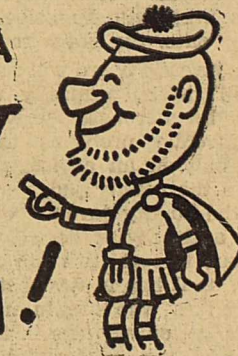
