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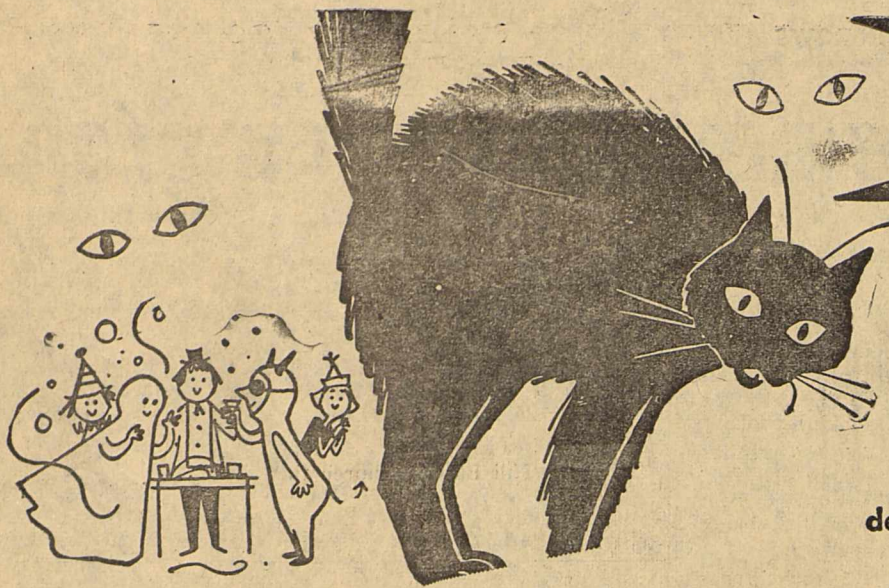

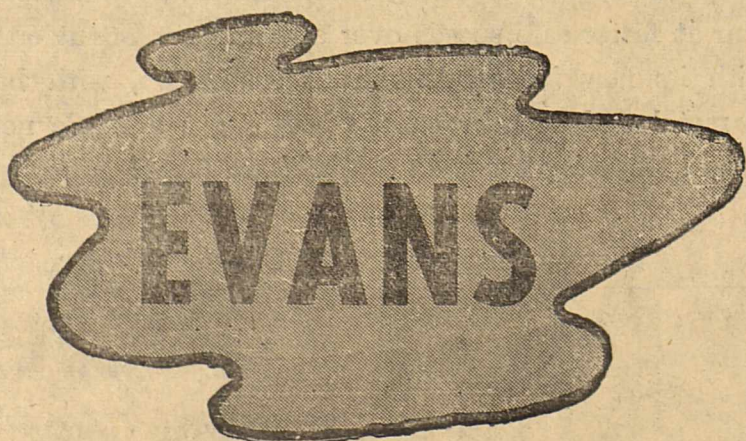

## Lubbock group gives Methodist program

Two members of the Gideons of Lubbock held special services in the First Methodist Church Sunday morning at the regular church hour.

Scriptures were read by Mr. Frank Koistra who introduced the speaker, Mr. Griffin.

The Gideons are an international organization of businessmen who place Bibles and New Testaments with Proverbs and Psalms in hospital, hotel and motel rooms and in prisons and jails, as well as giving New Testaments to 5th and 6th grade students in schools every two years. They extend the gospel wherever they may be and work in the United States and its possessions as well as in 48 foreign countries.

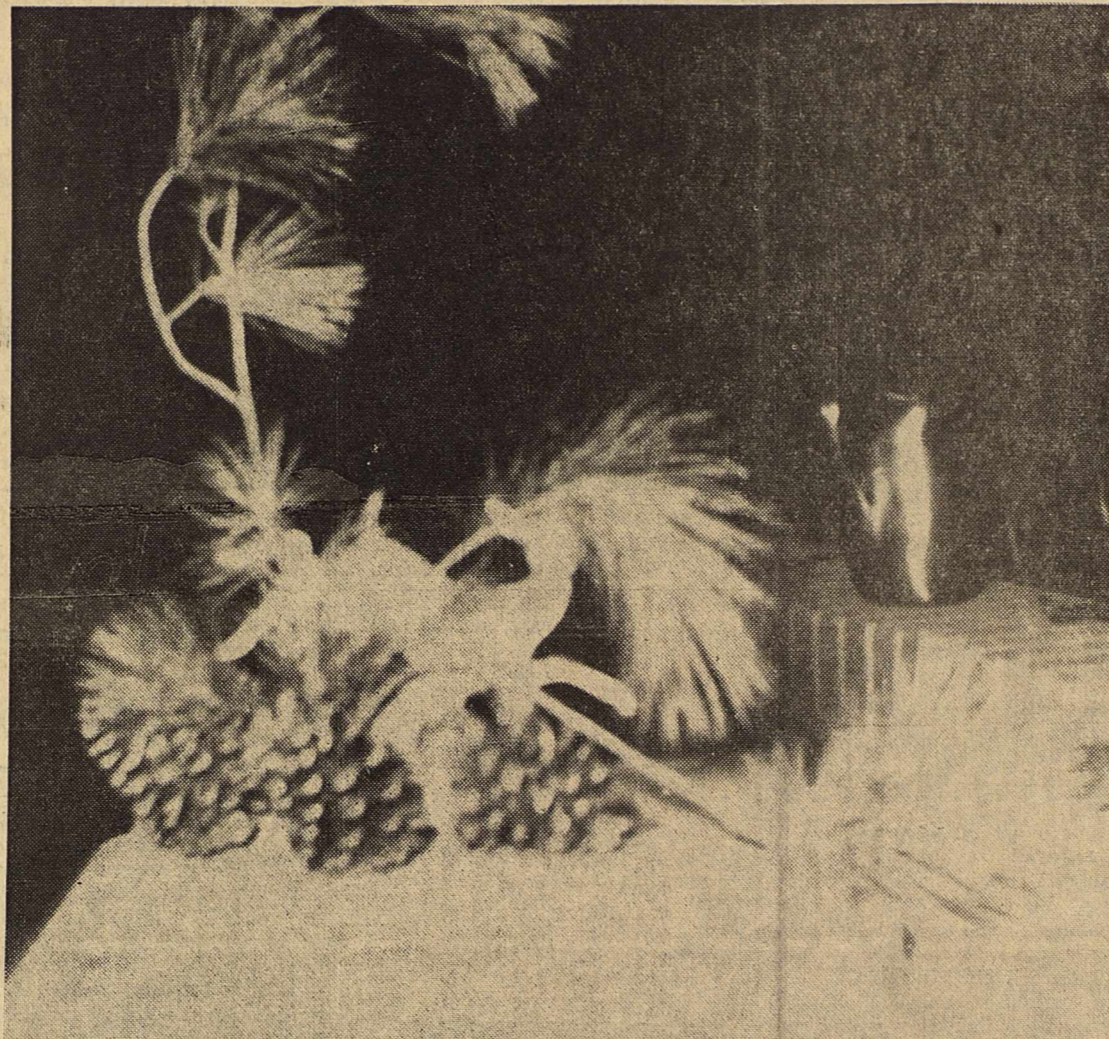
The show was deemed a success by all who attended, but the club hopes to make changes that will improve the 190 show.

tion regarding these limitations may be obtained at the Plains post office, Watson said. Addresses must be legible and complete and should be prepared by typewriter or pen and ink.

Domestic rates of postage are applicable and postage must be fully prepaid. Air mail articles weighing no more than eight

ounces are chargeable at the rate of seven cents per ounce and those weighing over eight ounces are chargeable at the rate of 80 cent a pound.

Christmas cards should be mailed within the periods designated for parcels, Watson said, if they are to have a reasonable expectation of delivery prior to Christmas. Greeting cards addressed to Canada and Mexico require four cents postage whether sealed or not.
