## Tests Indicate Carp And Catfish Go For Plastics

ROCKPORT — Fisheries biologist, Lou Guerra, has come up with some interesting though not necessarily conclusive, information on trotline baits, according to K. C. Jurgens, inland fisheries supervisor at Rockport for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

In an effort to determine the success of introducing salt water redfish into Casa Blanca Lake at Laredo, Guerra fished with trotlines and an assortment of natural and artificial baits.

Natural baits such as cut fish and live perch produced the usual catch one would expect in fresh water, such as channel catfish and soft shell turtle.

Since redfish are caught in salt water with little strips of highly colored plastic ribbons for bait, these too, were tried. Neither the natural baits nor the plastic ribbon in four colors produced redfish, but Guerra discovered something which may have opened up a new field for freshwater trotlines.

The red plastic ribbon caught nothing, but the blue plastic caught both blue and the yellow catfish. The orange ribbon caught channel catfish and carp and the yellow caught large mouth bass and blue catfish.

"No conclusions are intended," Jurgens said, "but it is of interest that, on the basis of the information that is presently available, the plastic ribbon tape commonly used by trotliners on the coast has been successful in taking several species of fresh water fish."

## EXTENSION OF INTERSTATE HWY. 20 TO BEGIN SOON

Negotiations for additional right-of-way necessary for the construction of Interstate Highway 20 (U. S. Hwy. 80) from 1.5 Miles East of Ranger, East to 3.0 Miles West of Erath County Line will begin in the near future, according to Jack H. Kirby, Supervising Right-of-Way Engineer for the Texas Highway Department in Brownwood.

Appraisals are being made and reviewed by the Highway Department at this time. The minimum right-of-way width is 300 feet to provide working space for the proposed four-lane divided facility. In addition, frontage roads will be provided on both sides of the highway from its beginning point 1.5 Miles East of Ranger to Rogers' Truck Stop near Thurber Hill. There will be no frontage roads at Thurber Hill. Two roadside rest areas are also planned.

This highway improvement is a part of the 41,000 miles of Interstate and National Defense Systems authorized by the Federal Aid Highway Act

of 1956. Texas will have 3,033 miles of these express, controlled-access highways, of which Interstate 20 is a major link. It enters the state at Texarkana on the east and exits at El Paso on the west, having formed a junction with Interstate 10 west of Pecos.

The construction contract is planned to be let in March 1964. When completed, the facility will be similar to that section of Interstate Highway 20 previously completed from the Erath County Line to one mile west of State Highway 16 intersection, to which it joins. Another section of Interstate 20 is presently being constructed between F. M. Highway 569, 1.0 Miles West of Cisco and the Callahan County Line. Cecil Ruby of Austin, Texas, is the contractor on this \$2,000,000 project scheduled for completion late in 1964.

E. M. Pritchard, District Engineer at Brownwood, and R. P. Haun, Resident Engineer at Eastland, are in charge of construction on these projects.

Gorman visits will be made at 10 a. m. in the City Office on the following Mondays: October 23, November 25 and December 30.

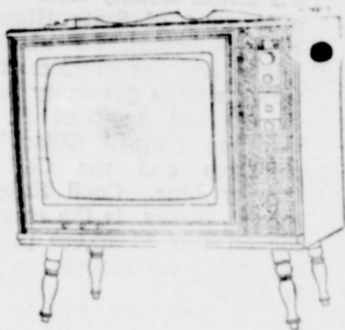
Regular visits to the Rising Star City Hall will be made at 10:30 a. m. on October 14, November 12 and December 9.

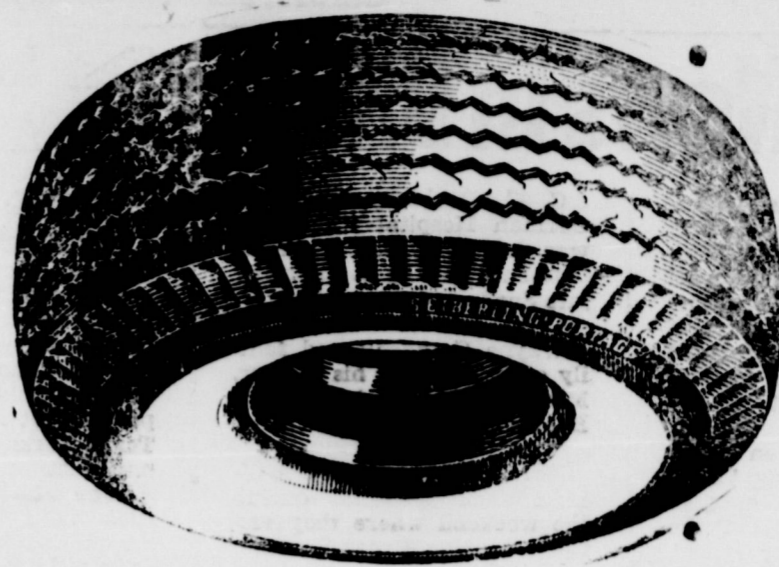

## Browsing With Bev

Double knit fashions are all the rage for this fall and winter, but they do present a sewing problem.

Double knits for home sewing are relatively new, a 1-though jerseys are familiar to most women.

While no special skill is required to sew double knit fabrics, an understanding of their characteristics can simplify and speed the handling.

Select a pattern with few seams, a rather easy fit and no buttonholes. It is wise to avoid circular skirts and bias cuts. Weight of the double knit fabrics should be chosen to conform to the design of the pattern. If the knit fabric is "off grain" more than one inch, it should be straightened by pulling slightly on the bias while steam pressing it.

All knit fabrics should be shrunk before cutting, steam pressed at home or at the dry cleaners.

Double knits are made in tubular form and some are sold this way. Others are cut along the fold of the flattened tube and edges are overcast. The lengthwise edges should be examined before buying the fabric to see that they follow the grain line. In knits, the grain line is a continuous rib. In the finishing process, some tubular knits twist as much as four to six inches. This cutting along the fold cuts across the continuous ribs the depth of the twist. To straighten such fabric will cause some loss.

If the tubular knit has not been cut, baste along the rib the entire length of the fabric, refold on this baste line and pull the fabric into a flat shape as it is steam pressed.

Time management can be taught by helping youngsters see that it is best to stay with a job until it is finished in order to be free later to do something else he wants or needs to do. Training in money management also can start early, for by the time a child is in school, he already is using a considerable amount of money. Skillful buying habits can be taught with the money management.

Storage of toys and equipment also can be taught early

## FINE PESTICIDES VITAL TO U. S. FOOD SUPPLY

Without pesticides, food would have to be rationed. Housewives would line up to buy inferior foods, blemished tomatoes, scrawny potatoes and sweet corn pocked with wormholes." So report John Strohm and Cliff Ganschow in an October Reader's Digest article, "The Great Pesticide Controversy."

While use of pesticides has killed wildlife, the writers find human deaths due to pest-

icides are "all from improper use of the chemicals, none from the consumption of contaminated food."

Some of the deaths have been suicides. More than half have been traceable to careless children got hold of the toxic material. The other deaths have been traceable to careless handling and application of some pesticide, failure to heed the warnings on the label.

The toll of 85 to 160 a year, I. L. Baldwin, University of Wisconsin bacteriologist points out is almost twice as many deaths as "are known to be caused by aspirin" and that bee stings kill almost half as many.

Without pesticides "the price of food items would double," says Dr. George Decker, head of the entomology section of the Illinois Natural History Survey. "The U. S. simply could not feed itself without the aid of chemicals," asserts Dr. Arnold Lehman, Pharmacology chief of the U. S. Food and Drug Administration.

The authors find most scientists favor more thorough inspection of food, more research on residues and their long range effects on humans, and stricter controls over use of chemicals, especially in wide-area spraying.

But they conclude that "proven benefits" should not be sacrificed "because of unproven fears" and that "red tape and excessive regulations must not tie the hands of the research chemists, who are urgently needed to help meet the greatest challenge of the 20th century — producing enough food for a world in which half of the people are hungry."
