County budget to total \$1

Yoakum County Commission- of \$1,017,159.93 for county op- is based upon a county valuation of \$46 million, compared with valuation of \$50 million used in determining the 1960 budget. Valuation decrease was made necessary by oil company refusal to accept the \$50 million figure.

> Commissioners also plan to wipe out the deficit which exists in the general fund. It is the commissioners' plan to iswarrants to cover the deficit and also make up the additional \$40,000 which is being lost in taxes through the valuation reduction.

At the present time, the deficit in the general fund amounts to \$124,304.13. The Commissioners plan to issue warrants in the amount of \$165,000 to cover this overdraft and the loss of \$40,-

According to the budget prepared by County Auditor Bill Moorhead, tax collections last year reached their highest peak since 1955. The budget reveals collections last year were \$664,-375.58, or 99.29 per cent of the total taxes levied.

The proposed county tax levy, for each \$100 valuation, includes 80 cents from county wide taxes on county values; and 30 cents from county wide taxes on state values. The added 30 cents in Road District 1-A, which goes into the road district sinking fund, is based upon values in the district.

ticipates receipt of \$360,676.80 from county ad valorem taxes (80 cent levy), \$135,255.80 from farm-market levy (30 cent levy) and \$105,850.80 from the Road District 1-A levy (30 cents) for a total estimated tax income of \$601,781.40. Budget also lists \$4,-839 due the county from 1959 delinquent taxes.



the surrounding area is expect- good. ed to be less this year according to reports compiled by County Agent Leo White. Due to the unseasonal rains in July and the outcrop of angular leaf spot the cotton crop will probably total 80 per cent of last year's total.

White said that the July rains caused much of the fertilizer in the fields to leach below the cotton roots. He added that the rains coupled with cool days gave the growing season a poor

The actual cash income will remain approximately the same he added as more land was planted in grain sorghums. The sorghums he said was a cheaper crop which took less water and less insecticide. If the grains in the field can be harvested without any set-back area farmers will stay on par with last year's

cash income. One of the brightest spots in the agriculture outlook is the range land he said. Due to the rains the grasses and conditions havebeen the best in several years. As three-fifths of the county is in range lands the out- ments.

In an estimated break-down of planting in the county White said approximately 180,000 acres are in cultivation. Of this 33,000 acres are in cotton, 3,000 acres in truck crops, 12,000 in small grains such as wheat, bar-

net outstanding bond and time warrant indebtedness of the county was \$1,023,925.34. It is estimated that this sum will be decreased to \$977,658.68 on January 1, 1961, with payments of \$218,430.68 on principal and \$28,699.76 on interest.

The total indebtedness of the county on January 1, 1961, will include \$598,000 in county bonds and warrants, \$306,000 in district bords and warrants and \$73,658.68 in precinct obligations.

One-half of all taxes received will go into the general fund, with 50 cents of the \$1.40 levy earmarked for that fund. Seven cents will go to road and bridge fund, 30 cents is earmarked for farm-market lateral road fund, 22.4 cents is labeled for permar.ent improvement sinking fund and .6 of a cent is earmarked for jury fund. Thirty cents, for Road District 1-A orly, is earmarked for Road District 1-A Sinking fund.

The proposed budget is divided into 11 major categories, with most of them primarily the same as last year.

Greatest increase, is in the Officers' salary fund from which expenditures are expected to amount to \$131,623.69, compared with a sum of \$109,547.85 which was budgeted in this fund

Greatest decrease noted in the proposed budget's plans for expenditures next year is in the road and bridge special precinct funds. The total sum allotted for the four precincts for 1961 amounts to \$217,900 compared with a sum of \$246,810.30 in the 1960 budget.

Amounts for disbursements in 1961 have been proposed as follows: jury fund, \$2,775; road and bridge, \$18,624; total road and bridge special precincts (four precincts), \$217,900; total lateral road precincts, \$12,296; general fund, \$173,760.80; ofsalary, \$131,623.69; hospital, \$204,550; permanent improvement, \$8,500; permanent improvement sirking, \$100,165; Road District 1-A sinking, \$112,-340; road and bridge sinking,

The proposed budget, if adopt ed on Monday, will provide for expenditures next year which will bring all of the county's financial operation into the black, with the exception of road and bridge special precinct number four which will have a \$3,780.98 overdraft at the end of the year. General fund balance on January 1, 1962, will be \$1,858.07 according to the proposed budget, and a total of all funds will have a balance of \$7,279.29 at the end of next year.
